Greenbelters Working with USAID Abroad Prepare to Return Home

As uncertainty at the U.S. Agency for International Development (USAID) sends ripples through Greenbelt, one family shares how the political and legal battles in Washington, D.C. are impacting their work and lives, thousands of miles from home.

Just as the

ers we spoke with last week requested we withhold their names due to fear of reprisal, this family also requested we not use their names, position or specific geographical posting to avoid being identified.

"Max" works for a company that is a USAID contractor. He's been working with USAID for over two decades and for the last two years he's been in his current location in Asia, posted with his family, which includes a child in elementary school. "The news says two thousand USAID people

are ordered home," but "there are more than that, because [there are people] like us, and then I think that many people do not really know what that means ... there are families," said Max.

Speaking with the News Review on Sunday he said, "We don't know anything. That's, I think, the main concern ... the absence of any guidance." He said he thinks his company has decided to repatriate his family by the end of the month but he has also been told, "We will send you further guidance." He contin-

ued, "The entire communication with USAID has basically broken down. They're in the same boat. It's not that they don't want to provide any guidance but they just can't. ... They don't have any idea what's going on, what they're supo posed to do."

Stop Work Order

25, Max and his company received a stop work order. It came on a Saturday evening. Stop work orders are not common, but not entirely unusual, he says. He describes them as a tool to intervene. "Usually, however, you get a stop work order, discuss terms and solve an issue, he says. Yet, in this case there's no ability to discuss and no guidance. The stop work order came in the middle of trainings

Five County Executive Candidates United In Opposition to Maglev

The Greenbelt News Review asked the 12 candidates running for the position of Prince George's County Executive to share their stance on the maglev project, a proposed highspeed rail line that would connect Washington, D.C. and Baltimore. The proposed project has been met with strong resistance from Greenbelt residents, who raise significant environmental and financial concerns. With this in

mind, we asked the county executive candidates: "How do you plan to address these concerns, and what is your stance on the project?" Six candidates responded, although Jolene Ivey subsequently dropped out of the race.

All who responded expressed opposition to the project, though their reasons and proposed approaches varied. Some said they



Council Approves Matching Funds For Repair of Indoor Pool Deck

At its January 27 regular meeting, the Greenbelt City Council approved contracts to repair the indoor pool, modified and deferred proposed ethics legislation until the next meeting, agreed to support a coalition seeking to improve emergency services and took positions on several pieces of proposed state legislation.

Indoor Pool

Council approved legislation to transfer \$1.7 million from the rainy-day fund to the Capital Projects Fund to cover urgently needed structural repairs to the


indoor pool deck. City Manager Josué Salmerón said that the city has obtained \$1.5 million in Program Open Space funds to cover most of the cost of the repairs. The city will need to provide matching funds to cover the remaining cost.

Open Space funding is provided on a reimbursement basis; that is, the city must first pay for the repairs, then submit requests

for reimbursement. Salmerón said that the city would not need to wait until the project was complete before submitting reimbursement requests.

Council then approved contracts with C. A. Lindman, Inc. for \$1.4 million to serve as general contractor and with CPJ for \$111,700 for engineering quality assurance. Salmerón said that

USAID Article On the Other Hand

The article in last week's News Review on Greenbelt's view of USAID failed to mention any of the outlandish USAID programs funded by US taxpayers while the U.S. is running an unsustainable \$36 trillion deficit. Government wasteful spending was one of the issues that got the Trump – Vance administration elected: in addition to immigration and border security, inflation and the economy, domestic energy independence and push back on DEI and wokeism.

It was uncovered that \$400 million was spent on: Condoms for Palestine; LGBTQ projects in Guatemala, Ecuador, Uganda, Colombia; a DEI musical in Ireland; a DEI project for Serbian companies; an Iraqi Sesame Street project; promote tourism in Egypt and Turkey; a transgender comic book for Peru; \$2 million granted to the BBC to bolster media ties with Libya; \$8 million for instructing Sri Lankan journalists how to avoid using binary-gender language. 
I'm wondering how those impacted by fires in California, and flooding and tornadoes in the

Robert Snyder Editor's Note: The use of USAID funding for the projects listed by Mr. Snyder has been proven inaccurate by fact checkers. For example, the claim that millions were spent to send condoms to Palestine is false, though USAID did fund health projects in the Gaza province of Mozambique; funding for a DEI musical at a US embassy in Ireland came from the State Department rather than USAID and the State Department also funded a 2022 opera in Colombia that tells the story of a transgender woman; the comic book produced in Peru featured a hero who was gay and was funded through the Fulbright Program, again from the State Department; the funding sent to the BBC went to its international charity, BBC Media Action, whose mission is to bring impartial media and communication to

Insight on BEP Project

I read with interest Deanna Dawson's article about the cancelled USACE Baltimore solicitation for construction of the Bureau of Engraving and Printing project in Beltsville. (See Feb. 6, 2025 issue.)

One of the key reasons why the project was mothballed is because of a lack of competition from qualified contractors. The Biden administration's decision to require a controversial unionfavoring project labor agreement (PLA) on the project deterred four of the five pre-qualified contractors invited to bid on Phase 2 of the procurement from doing so. The lone bidder couldn't meet the project's budget/scope, unfortunately.

A federal court in January ruled that former President Joe Biden's policy requiring project PLAs on 12 federal construction projects of \$35 million or more to be unlawful for violating the federal Competition in Competi-

"The agencies' 2024 imple-

mentation of the mandate-ignoring the agencies' own market research concluding project labor agreements would be anticompetitive—relying solely on executive order presidential policy is arbitrary and capricious. Specifically, the functionality of the mandate as applied to the individual contracts in this case stifles competition and violates the statutory directive that agencies must promote "full and open competition" in federal procurements unless a statutory justification is properly invoked."

This BEP project will need to be rebid and project costs will most certainly increase because delays equal added costs in the construction industry.



Comedy! A Good Prescription For Curing the Winter Blues

Winter got you down with those long cold nights and short days? Maybe it's world or local events giving you that knot in your stomach. Greenbelt Arts Center (GAC) has the perfect prescription to cure the blues: Comedy.

GAC Vice President of Programs Wes Dennis was scouting last year, to encourage local artists to submit to GAC for a production. Jeff Dunne was one such creative artist and after meeting with Dennis, Dunne submitted one of over 175 scripts he has written in the last 15 years. The play, No Laughing Matter, is a comedy sure to give you warm laughs, a perfect prescription for winter blues.

While Dunne is not a physician, he does have a doctorate in the sciences and did post-graduate work at Purdue, completing intern work as far away as California and Utah and working his way back to the East Coast. He has been residing in Maryland now for over 20 years. Writing scripts is not his only talent by a long shot. He loves to play guitar, is accomplished on several other instruments and has written over 150 songs. However, theater occupies much of his endeavors (when he is not working at Johns Hopkins), including acting and directing. He has directed several short plays, and this is his second

outing to direct a full-length play.

Dunne has been working since December with his selected thespians whom he describes as a "super-talented cast." He confides it was stressful to have to turn away so many unbelievably talented actors. That's a good thing for GAC fans, because they will have the opportunity to see some of the very best local players. And since comedy is actually a pretty serious business for actors, it's good that Dunne had many performers from whom to choose. It's not enough to know the lines. It's about timing, and it takes a lot of rehearing to make it right.

Taking the opportunity to watch one of the rehearsals, it was clear the actors were already honing their characters with much attention to detail. Dunne's play uses character conflict to create

a lot of laughs for his audience. He has found a way to blend outlandish characters and have them oppose others who are just trying to get through life. Can conflict be funny? Think of Will Ferrell and Mark Wahlberg in The Other Guys. The cast of No Laughing Matter has several such conflicts, and they are sure to make the audience laugh out loud.

The premise of the play is sort of a spy thriller with two conflicted FBI (Federal Bureau of IDIOTS) agents who verbally spar with each other throughout their endeavors to catch a Russian spy. Their focus is on a recent Russian immigrant who is still learning English. His mistakes with language add to many comedic opportunities to fulfill a prescription from Dr. Dunne, uh, Director Dunne. Can't give away too much here, so see it for yourself.

No Laughing Matter opens Friday, February 21 and plays Fridays and Saturdays at 8 p.m. and Sundays at 2 p.m. through March 8 at the Greenbelt Arts Center, 123 Crescent Road. On Sunday, March 2, all supporting personnel and audience members are required to wear masks so those who are immunocompromised have an opportunity to see the show. Tickets are required. County Schools Will Be Open February 14 for Make-up Day

So far this school year, Prince George's County Public Schools has closed schools for five days due to inclement weather, including Wednesday, February 12. Below is the plan for making up these instructional days:

Make-up day one: February 14 – This day, originally scheduled as a professional day for teachers, was designated in the school calendar as a potential make-up day. Schools will now be open for students on February 14.

Make-up days two, three and

four: June 16 to 18 – These three make-up days are built into the 2024-25 school calendar at the end of the school year.

Make-up day 5: March 17— This week, Wednesday marked a fifth inclement day, which means March 17 will be converted to an instructional day.

If inclement weather closings exceed five days, additional school days may need to be scheduled at the end of the school year.

Community Federal Credit Union Announces Scholarship Program

As of Wednesday, February 5, heat was restored to the Crescent Pointe and Parkway Gardens apartments, whose residents had been without it since October.

A groundbreaking documentary born from Detroit's labor struggles will screen at 7 p.m. on Monday, February 17 at the Reel and Meal at the New Deal Café. Finally Got the News (1970) captures a watershed moment when Black autoworkers challenged both racial discrimination and exploitative working conditions in Detroit's automotive plants. The film's title comes from autoworker Joe L. Carter's pointed lyrics about union dues at the Ford Rouge plant: We finally got the news about how our dues being used.

In the early 1960s, when automobile manufacturers reluctantly began hiring Black workers, they relegated them to the most dangerous, lowest-paying positions. By 1968, Black workers at Chrysler's Dodge plant had had enough. They formed the Dodge Revolutionary Union Movement (DRUM), demanding safer conditions and an end to racist practices.

The movement quickly expanded beyond auto plants. The League of Revolutionary Black Workers, formed in June 1969, united workers across Detroit's industrial and service sectors. Revolutionary Union Movements (RUMs) sprang up at United Parcel Service (UPRUM), healthcare facilities (HRUM) and the Detroit News (NEWRUM), joining their counterparts from Dodge (DRUM), Ford (FRUM) and other auto plants. Together, they built a powerful cross-industry coalition of Black workers fighting for better conditions and racial justice.

The film's own story mirrors this worker-led struggle for selfdetermination. When a New York alternative film collective called Newsreel began documenting Detroit's social upheaval but later lost interest, the League refused



Greenbelt Community Orchestra Offers Free Concert Feb. 23

tions of composers from the African Diaspora. Orchestra founder Anne Gardner points out, "It was difficult to choose between so many wonderful pieces of music. Hopefully the final choices will give the audience a taste of the breadth, variety and quality of music composed by Black musicians. We hope to include more in future concerts, as our budget allows."

Joseph Bologne (1745-1799), Chevalier de Saint-Georges, was an acclaimed composer of classical music, including quartets, concertos, sonatas, symphonies, opéra comique and more. Bologne was a free man of color; his father was a white plantation owner in the French Caribbean colony of Guadeloupe, where his Creole mother was enslaved. He excelled in many fields - as an athlete, marksman, fencer and dancer, and of course as a violinist, conductor and composer. His dramatic life during the Revolutionary era was fictionalized in the movie Chevalier. The orchestra will play his Symphony #1.

The orchestra will play a piece by Samuel Coleridge-Taylor (1875-1912) called Danse Nègre. His name might sound familiar because his English mother named him after the Romantic era poet, Samuel Taylor Coleridge; his father came to London from Sierra Leone to study medicine. Coleridge-Taylor toured the United States three times in the early 1900s and was sometimes called the African Mahler. His two children were also successful musicians.

Florence Smith Price (1887-1953) was a prolific composer born in Little Rock, Arkansas. Price double majored in piano teaching and organ at the New England Conservatory of Music. Having married an attorney, she and her family moved to Chicago to escape the Jim Crow south, and there she was part of the Chicago Black Renaissance. Price composed over 300 works: four symphonies, four concertos, choral works, art songs and more, including two songs dedicated to her friend, the acclaimed contralto, Marian Anderson. The orches-

tra will perform her work called Ethiopia's Shadow in America. "I am a big fan of Florence Price's music," Gardner states. "I love the lush orchestration and the way she incorporates elements of jazz, spirituals and folk songs in her music."

Quinn Mason (born 1996), is a prize-winning young composer whose music has been commissioned and performed by over 170 orchestras. Conductor Derek Maseloff said, "We're thrilled to present the second-ever performance of Quinn Mason's Symphony No. 5. Mason is one of the rising composers of his generation and this symphony, inspired by the tumult in 2020, is unfortunately quite fitting for the current uncertain moment we find ourselves in. The members of the orchestra had the rare opportunity to work directly with the composer and gain valuable insight into performing his work."

Greenbelt Community Orchestra provides an outlet for local musicians to play together and to share their love of music with the local community, with more than 50 people in the orchestra, 40 percent of whom are Greenbelt residents. They held their first concert in November 2023, led by conductors Derek Maseloff and Seth Glabman, and have drawn 150-200 attendees to each of their subsequent three free concerts per year.

The orchestra seeks donations in order to pay for rights to perform a diverse selection of music. Pieces by women and composers of color have mostly been published recently and are scarce in the public domain. The orchestra has sought grant funding, including operating funds from the City of Greenbelt, which would allow the orchestra to pay their conductors, and a grant from Prince George's Arts and Humanities Council

to support a Women's History concert in 2026. Both grants, if awarded, would require oneto-one matching funds from donations. Learn more about supporting the orchestra at GreenbeltOrchestra.org or follow them on Facebook.

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





wanted to focus on improving current transportation options while others questioned whether the maglev is the correct solution to the transportation issue. Most said that they see no benefit in the project to county residents.

Below are the candidates' unedited answers.

Ron Hunt

The project should not happen. It's going to cost us 10 times it would have cost for us to rehab and make these places brand new and not affect the environment in the process.

The bottom line is this, we have people that are driving this train that have no idea how fast they're going. So if they think they get a good deal, and they say things like, yeah, that's a good deal, we're going to make a deal with the contractor, somebody that knows what they're doing is going to pay at least 30 percent less, but they're not spending their own money. That's why they do what they're doing. So I say no to the new deal. And now what we do in the Greenbelt area, find out how many properties are vacant that Prince George's County has, and let's see if we can rebound, rehab them because the infrastructure is already there with the electric, with the water and gas, and why not see if we can spend a fraction of the money and not mess with the environment at all?

George McDermott

Greenbelt was a vision as someone who was born in Bowie, Maryland in the 40s. The whole metropolitan region has changed along with population growth and transportation needs; Greenbelt has grown from a segregated community to a racially diverse community, when the FBI is relocated to Greenbelt it will mean even more changes to the community. The new County Executive and County Council, along with parking planning commission all have a responsibility towards maintaining responsible use of our limited land resources.

Unfortunately. With the new federal administration taking over the relocation of the new FBI headquarters to Greenbelt and the maglev may never be funded the best the county executive can do is to ensure our residents and environmental impacts and community impacts as well as educational index on our citizens on a compromised by federal of a reach and corporate Government. Abandonment of principles and legal and constitutional rights which they are encroaching on each and every day. The county executive must serve all of the diverse community and not let our communities to be trampled

Moisette Tonya Sweat

I first learned the detailed plans for and concerns with the maglev in 2021. Before then, I was familiar with the train system in Japan and only knew what little I had heard in the press. Based on the environmental impact statement and other reports, I have grave concerns about SCMaglev. I cannot support the project based on the environmental impact statement alone. My research indicates the potential harm to the environment far outweighs any benefit maglev is projected to bring. I am also concerned about the financial costs, especially considering the developer has not been transparent and forthright about projected ridership or the cost of construction. I appreciate the need to reduce traffic congestion and to provide transportation options. I also understand light rail is a possible solution. However, I question whether maglev will really address those needs. The project includes limited stops, which will impact the number of people who choose to use this mode of transportation. Specifically, there are no stops planned for Prince George's County, even though we will be expected to sacrifice a large portion of our environment. I will raise my and Prince Georgians' concerns with the State, M-NCPPC and the District Council regarding the maglev project. I do not have the authority to stop the project, but I can oppose it loudly and influence the construction if it is approved through the permitting

Alonzo Washington

I am unequivocally opposed to the maglev project and will continue to fight against it as County Executive. As Greenbelt's State Senator and Delegate, I have held several town hall meetings, created community sign-on letters and sponsored legislation to prevent the train from becoming a reality. The maglev is not in the best interest of Prince Georgians – and I will continue to stand in opposition to this project. Instead, we need to focus on supporting existing public transportation and improving pedestrian infrastructure. My administration will also work to spur new economic development around existing transit hubs in New Carrollton, Greenbelt, Largo, etc.

Jonathan White

I oppose the maglev project due to its environmental and financial risks to Greenbelt and surrounding communities. Concerns include potential harm to the Patuxent Research Refuge, increased noise pollution and disruptions to local ecosystems. The unclear financing structure raises fears of taxpayer burdens with limited benefits. While transportation improvements are needed, this is not the right solution for Prince George's County. The project's estimated \$10 billion cost and extended timeline could cause prolonged disruption. Our focus should be on completing existing infrastructure projects and investing in communitydriven transportation solutions that are less invasive and more practical. As County Executive, I would support communityfocused transit solutions that prioritize sustainability. Enhancing MARC train service and exploring bus rapid transit (BRT) options are key strategies for cost-effective and eco-friendly improvements. I will collaborate with federal and state officials to ensure major infrastructure projects in Prince George's County meet resident interests and environmental standards. If the project proceeds, I will ensure strict environmental safeguards, transparent financing and active community engagement. Residents will have a decisive say

repairs will begin in April, and the project will be completed by the end of September. During that period, the fitness center will remain open but the indoor pool will be closed.

Councilmember Rodney Roberts opposed both measures. He did not comment on the legislation or explain his opposition, but in the January 22 pool worksession he questioned the use of Open Space funds for the project.

Ethics Ordinance

At its last meeting, council introduced legislation repealing and replacing the Article IV Ethics Provisions in the city code to align with state law. In an unusual move, council agreed to start the approval process, but to defer introducing the legislation for first reading until the February 10 council meeting at the urging of Mayor Emmett Jordan so that the city solicitor could vet the changes. Jordan had proposed and council had accepted adding a provision that council could waive fees for failure to file specified reports on time by a simple majority vote. Additional changes were proposed by Jordan and the ethics commission.

Legislative Update

Council also received an update from Darrell Carrington of Carrington and Associates, with whom the city has contracted to monitor state and county legislation affecting Greenbelt. He noted that the state faces a \$3 billion projected deficit. Governor Wes Moore has proposed \$2 billion in cuts, leaving the General Assembly to find another \$1 billion in reductions.

One step is that state senators will get an allocation of just \$400,000, down from \$1 million in bond funds. He said that his company is still reviewing the

president's executive orders to examine their potential local impact.

Council moved to support proposed state legislation: 1) opposing magley, 2) permitting civilian police personnel to review speed camera footage, 3) giving zoning authority to municipalities, 4) enabling municipalities to levy food and beverage fees and 5) imposing a deposit on cans and bottles.

Consent Agenda

As part of the consent agenda (actions approved without discussion), council:

- Agreed to support the Coalition for Prince George's County Fire and Emergency Management Services. The coalition plans to send a letter to county executive candidates regarding the reallocation of career firefighters. The letter says, in part, "A combination of foreseeable circumstances led to this emergency, which resulted in longer response times and multiple deaths. It doesn't have to be this way." The coalition has prepared a number of recommendations to address the problems. These include reducing barriers to volunteerism, funding 150 new Fire/EMS personnel, facility support for volunteer properties and apparatus and establishing a task force for efficiency and recruitment, among others.
- Reappointed members of several advisory boards, appointed former councilmember Judith Davis to the Advisory Planning Board and accepted the resignation of John Paul Schmidt from the Forest Preserve Advisory
- As recommended by the Park and Recreation Advisory Board, approved four new recognition groups: French Conversation, Ukulele Ladies, Boys to Men and Greenbelt Book Club.

Dorothy and Norm Dobson

Dorothy Baluch and Norm Dobson were both local University of Maryland students, Norm living in Adelphi with his parents and Dorothy with hers on Lakeside Drive, before she moved to Adelphi. Here's how they told their story to the News Review.

Norm (N): "When I was 19, I was a University of Maryland shuttle bus driver, and when I would drive the bus up Westway, she would get on the bus at the synagogue."

Dorothy (D): "But you'd also see me when I lived in Adelphi."

N: "That's when I finally got the courage to ask you out. But I saw her the first year. When you drive the same route every day and pick up two people here and one person there, eventually you know who's going to be there, so you almost wait for them because you know they're coming. I started seeing Dorothy on the other routes because she moved over to Adelphi."

D: "Norm loves to tell this story. I'll start. I lived in an apartment in Adelphi, and I came out, and the bus is sitting there and I got on the bus. He's in the driver's seat and I sat down, but then I realized 'What's going on, why aren't we going anywhere?"

N: "Because the bus was just sitting still and the engine was off."

D: "And then? I'll let you tell the rest."

N: "I had a flat tire on that route. I had told my sister about Dorothy. I didn't know her name, but 'There's this girl that I really like.' And she said, 'Well, you have to ask her out.'

"So I had a flat tire, and I would stop the bus and people would get on the bus and say, 'You know you have a flat tire?' I got out the first time and I said, 'Oh, my gosh, I do.' So I said, 'Get on the bus,' because I knew where Dorothy's gonna get on the bus and I had to get there. So I drove down another hill and let somebody on the bus, and he said, 'You know you have a flat tire?' I said 'I know, get on the bus.' Now we go up the other side. At this point, the tire is starting to come off the rim, it's so flat. I turn this hard turn to get up to where Dorothy is gonna be and I park the bus.

"So I'm sitting there, and people get off the bus, Dorothy gets on, and I start just talking with her. And people get on, and say, 'Where's the bus driver?' 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Ukrainian Refugees in Greenbelt Affected by New Policy Changes

Recent executive orders issued by the Trump administration have ramifications for refugees in the Greenbelt area. Three Ukrainian families, sponsored by Greenbelt Refugee Aid Committee (GRACE) came to the United States under the State Department's Uniting 4 Ukraine (U4U) program, and have temporary protected status (TPS).

Individuals with TPS under the U4U program have American sponsors and can stay in the United States for up to two years from date of entry. On January 10, the Department of Homeland Security under Secretary Alejandro Mayorkas announced the extension of TPS for Ukrainian refugees for 18 months. This extension requires re-registration and is limited to individuals already registered for TPS under Ukraine's designation. This population includes nationals of Ukraine (and individuals without nationality who last resided in Ukraine) who have been continuously residing in the United States since at least August 16, 2023, with or without lawful immigration status.

However, the designation of Venezuela for TPS is set to expire on April 2, 2025. New Secretary of Homeland Security Kristi Noem determined that "conditions in Venezuela no longer support the 2023 designation of Venezuela for Temporary Protected Status."


As of February 6, 2025, the U.S. government has ended humanitarian parole programs for Cubans, Haitians, Nicaraguans and Venezuelans (CHNV) and paused Uniting for Ukraine, according to Welcome.US, a nongovernment not-for-profit organization that encourages Americans to help resettle newcomers seeking safety in the United States. Humanitarian parole is temporary, discretionary authorization

granted by the U.S. immigration services that allows individuals who are otherwise inadmissible to enter the U.S. for urgent humanitarian reasons. This means Americans cannot submit new sponsorship applications for newly qualified refugees and existing applications will not be processed.

If, as some think likely, the current administration terminates existing humanitarian parole for newcomers who entered the U.S. through CHNV or U4U, parolees who do not already have TPS or a pending application for TPS or asylum will be considered unauthorized to be in the U.S. Anyone wishing more information can call Samantha Deshommes at the United States Customs and Immigration Service, 800-375-5283.

All individuals or families with humanitarian parole status should seek advice from a competent immigration attorney immediately and should work with that attorney to seek alternative status, Welcome.US advises.

GRACE President Frank Gervasi said, "We will continue to support our Ukrainian families. The Greenbelt community has opened its arms to welcome those fleeing war and oppression." For more information on how to help GRACE in its efforts, go to greenbeltrefugeeaid.com.

with host government counterparts. "It's not necessarily helpful in building a good relationship with the government," he noted, "but that's what we had to do because stop work is stop work."

Though stopping work may sound simple, there are lots of questions to consider. For Max's project, there are lots of staff, almost all of them local, and "you need to stick to the labor laws in the country," he noted, yet there are unanswered questions about whether you're allowed to pay the salary of the staff who are now not working. There are dayto-day questions where someone needs to make a decision, he says. "It would be very simple at the national level to decide whether salaries are eligible or not ... then you can do something about it, whatever the decision is. But that's not provided so a lot of things are up in the air. So we need to interpret, provide the best guess of how things are and then operate like that. All while not getting paid from the government," he said.

"The stop work order is a lot of work," joked Max. He's directing people not to work, looking at regulations and financial scenarios, figuring out how to respond and determining how they can communicate with USAID and if there's someone to communicate with. "It does keep me quite busy, actually," he said. "It's definitely not a joyful situation, because I get a lot of question marks that I look into every day: the eyes of my staff." It's disheartening to not be able to guide his staff on what's go-

It's also hard to stop their work when they were at a good spot, he says. They had worked very closely with the government there and they had just had some breakthroughs. They were in the middle of trainings that were the result of long negotiations. "This project is in year four of a five year term. That's the time when you harvest the fruits," said Max. Even if they were to restart he's not sure they could make up for the time and the trust that's been lost. "It took a while to build it," he said of that trust.

Max describes USAID as "one of the more stringent organizations" when it comes to how dollars are spent and financial audits. "This is not an industry where there's always fraud and corruption. It's the opposite," he said.

No Payments

Stopping payments to companies and non-governmental organizations "will basically break the entire sector right now," said Max. "That's what's driving the entire downfall." Even work done as far back as December has not been paid for, he said. Now his company is paying employees with no guarantee there will be reimbursement and weighing options in a current vacuum of information. "We are obliged to pay our employees, otherwise that would be slavery," said Max, but each day the company is advancing more money, not knowing if it will ever be repaid, on top of past work that hasn't been paid for. "Is this a 90-day review, is it not a 90-day review? How long will it take? Is it a review at all? Who will do this review if everybody is fired from USAID?" asked Max.

Personal Outlook

The uncertainty is hardest.

"That makes it, on a personal level, quite traumatizing," said Max, "because you cannot prepare for anything." His family had expected to stay where they are for at least another year. Their home in Greenbelt is rented. They will need to arrange a school transfer for their child and also what to do with their belongings. "Basically, day-to-day life is very, very difficult," he said. For more than two weeks everything's been up in the air, creating a situation that he described as "distressing." Further guidance is supposed to be coming and possibly exceptions for families with children in school.

Max feels confident that his company will be able to make travel arrangements and fly them home but he doesn't know what will become of their belongings: his daughter's piano that she brought from Greenbelt, bicycles, their furniture. There are things they flew there via airfreight in some 20 or so bags spread over several trips, and there are things they bought there that they were planning to bring home to Greenbelt. "We might be told next week that we can't bring anything with us, so we might just sell it," said his wife, Julie (not her real name). Yet if they don't go home they may need it. They're expecting a single flight to take them home and don't know how much they'll be able to ship, but clarity on that would bring some peace of mind so they can pack, sell things or give them away. They're expecting to hear more this week, whether they are an exception, whether they need to pack.

Future Work

Max said he tries not to be too pessimistic but on return his company will likely have to quickly pivot to other sectors, which might not be development. "We're good at what we're doing," he said, noting that project management is applicable across the board; however, "that's not our soul, I'd say." So, about the future for his company and himself he said, "I don't know, it very much depends on how the new USA could shake out." He noted that, "Many companies will certainly go down through this," though hopes his will not. Obviously, the prospects in the job market are "very bad," he conceded. "First of all, that sector is not there any more and then everybody who was in that sector is looking for a job. ... and these are generally very, very good people, so you have strong competition," he said. If they need to return he may need to look for a job in another field, he believes.

Meanwhile, Julie was not permitted to work in Asia and gave up her job back home when they left. She's already reached out to people she used to work with, who are supportive and kind, she said.

A Home in Greenbelt

The way their child is handling the situation is a bright spot for Max and Julie. Though she is in elementary school there and has "tons of fun" and "tons of friends" where they are, she would be happy to come back to Greenbelt, her friends and her old school. Being able to return home to Greenbelt also brings them comfort. They have a community that is friendly and supportive to come back to and it's heartwarming, said Max.

Neighbors have offered them a room to stay in. Looking for the positive, Julie suggested it will be like a sleepover every day for her daughter if they have to implement their plan to return. "We are excited to actually go back," she said. "It's sad but also it's nice to have something to look forward to," she said, of the community they have back in Greenbelt." Max said, "There are nice people in Greenbelt. That's really something that is heartwarming with all these things that are ongoing. I'm not sure if many sorts of islands like that exist now. ... Greenbelt is a nice community that sticks together." It enables them to look forward to returning home, despite the situation. Julie recounted the conversations with their daughter: "'When are we leaving? When are we leaving?' - 'We don't know' - 'When will we know?' - 'We don't know.'" "I sugarcoat things so it doesn't sound so bad," said Julie. Their daughter knows what it means to transfer, said Max, she's done it before and in fact she was born at another post. It's her birthday at the end of the month. Her mother has promised her two celebrations - one with her school friends there before they leave and one with her friends in Greenbelt when they get back.

Some Greenbelt USAID Workers Are Back on the Job, for Now


On Friday a judge issued a temporary restraining order to block the order placing USAID employees on administrative leave.

Of the three Greenbelt USAID workers reported on last week, Melissa, who had expected to lose access by Friday evening, was never placed on administrative leave due to the interceding order. At press time, she was still working, though she said a union had advised them not to expect any more paychecks.

Stephanie, who was placed on administrative leave on Tuesday, February 4, was working again and had regained access to the system this week. On Monday, several USAID employees attempted to return to work in the Reagan Building and were turned away. They were told there was a list of only about eight people who were allowed to enter, a Greenbelter told us. Some USAID workers had left their government furnished equipment (GFE) laptops inside and were unable to get back to

work due to not being able to access them. Others had personal belongings still in the building, the Greenbelt USAID employee said. Employees who showed up at the building were also told USAID no longer has the lease, something the Associated Press reports the Trump administration has confirmed.

Meanwhile David, who is a personal services contractor (PSC), has been told they are supposed to be getting system access back and email accounts reinstated, but hadn't as of Tuesday. He was told he was named as someone who should have access. "When I contacted system support they were unable to reactivate my account because, '... (they) are unable to restore accounts without authorization from political leadership," he told the News Review. Thus, he said the message to restore access isn't being communicated or implemented by those who would restore it. "Of course this is incredibly frustrating," he said.



USAID employees and supporters rally in Washington, D.C. on Wednesday, February 5.



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

ERHS Boys Basketball Posts Electric Winning Streak

Senior forward Benaiah Nwosu struck twice within minutes during a momentum-shifting third quarter for the Eleanor Roosevelt Raiders boys basketball team on Thursday, February 6. Nwosu jammed home two slam dunks after jumping in Bowie Bulldog passing lanes to help the Raiders shift the trajectory of a game they trailed after each of the first two quarters. With their 39-38 lead at the end of the third quarter, Roosevelt's hope of a seven-game winning streak solidified.

The Raiders withstood the Bulldogs' three-point display early on to remain within reach, but it wasn't until Nwosu's electricity that Roosevelt jolted past the team that defeated the Raiders by three in December amid a woeful six-game losing streak. With the 57-52 victory in hand, the Raiders' early season travails feel distant.

After controlling much of the fourth quarter, Roosevelt missed six straight free throws to provide the Bulldogs with a sliver of hope. But after a long-range miss from their archrivals, the Raiders secured a rebound to seal the game in the final 10 seconds.

Junior guard DeKare Tyler, who found himself in foul trouble much of the night, has steadied the Raider offense along with senior backcourt mate Dione Wells, as second-year coach Chaun Miller continues to steer the Raiders toward success as the regular season's finish awaits.

After earning three wins in a week, including a win over the Wise Pumas - who were previously undefeated in the county the Raiders are poised to avenge last season's early playoff exit. A home rematch with the Pumas on Thursday, February 13 at 7 p.m. will influence playoff seeding, where the Raiders hope to maintain Nwosu's energy that catalyzed the victory over the Bulldogs.




