January 6 - City Workers, Manager Voted Pay Increase (a five percent increase with a minimum of \$200 for all full-time employees; entire increase to cost \$7100). Councilman Smith Blasts Litter Situation; Schedules "Trash Tour" (Smith charges administration with failure to clean up city.)

January 13 - Fate Of Newspaper To Be Decided At Community Meeting Next Friday (diminishing advertising and lack of new staff threatens continued publication of 17-year-old News Review.) Goldfaden-Panagoulis Legal Action Against GLIC On Land Deal Fails (they attempted to challenge legality of Warner-Kanter's purchase of land adjacent to Lakeside. Chasanew's dual role as GVHC counsel and counsel to June Construction Co. involved with Goldfaden and Panagoulis causes GVHC to hold up final action on 1955 contract with Chasanow.

GCS Set Sales Record

Sales of all of the stores operated by Greenbelt Consumer Services were at an all time high of \$235,000 for the week ending December 24, 1955. This was \$15,000 higher than the previous record, which was set during opening week of the GCS Wheaton Store last year (week ending December 18, 1954). All three major Divisions-Food Division, Petroleum Division, and General Merchandise Division had all time record sales. All time records were also set by the Greenbelt Supermarket (\$39,283) and the Greenbelt Service Station (\$6,880.).

Mary G. Long

Mary Griffin Long, one of Greenbelt's oldest residents both in age and in length of residence, died Saturday, December 10, 1955, at Prince Georges General Hospital. Cause of death was cancer.

Seventy-eight years old at her death Mrs. Long, an active influence in the Greenbelt community as plano teacher and tutor in many subjects until recent months, was mourned by many friends and pupils who felt she was young at heart, mentally alert, charitable, and a source of inspiration and encouragement. Born in Crystal Springs, Mississippi, she was gradwated from Judson College, Marion, Alabama, where her major study was music. She was married in 1899 to Leonard Long, who died in 1924. Having taught first grade in the Perry County, Alabama, schools for 25 years, she moved to Greenbelt in 1938. She lived at 9-B Ridge with her daughter and grandson, except for a five-year period at 2-A Eastway

Not until about 1940 did she start teaching piano. She then went to Peabody Conservatory in Baltimore for piano lessons and continued studying until approximately five weeks before her death. She started with a few friends as pupils, but at times she had as many as 50. She also coached Greenbelt children of all ages in English, mathematics, languages, shorthand, and other subjects. Fees were not first with Mrs. Long, so she had many scholarship students.

She was a member of St. John's

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Episcopal Church, Beltsville, where she had taught Sunday School and played the organ for about ten years. Almost until her death she served Mowatt Memorial Methodist Church by playing the piano for Sunday School. The latter church held memorial services for her and established the Mary G. Long Memorial Fund in her honor.

Mrs. Long's final illness lasted only about five weeks. She was buried in Uniontown, Alabama, the town in which her children were born. She is survived by two daughters, Mrs. Martha Keith of 9-B Ridge and Mrs. William Albritton of Andalusia, Alabama, by three grandsons, and by two greatgrandchildren.
