KID CARE WARNING

The city health authorities remind residents caring for children in their home of the County Law regarding this practice.

It is unlawful for anyone to care for an unrelated child or children under 10 years of age in Prince George's county without first obtaining a permit from the County Health Department; unless such child is placed by a Placement Agency, complying with Chapter No. 63 of the Acts of the General Assembly of Maryland for 1949

PENALTY FOR VIOLATION: \$24 for first offense. Not more than \$100 for the second and each subsequent offense.




