Fire Prevention Program Features **Prizes for Slogans and Posters**

"Fire Safety for Children" is the theme of Fire Prevention Week this year. October 7 to 13, the anniversary week of the great Chicago fire, has been set aside to place national emphasis on the need for fire prevention.

In Greenbelt, the fire department is preparing a program aimed mainly at the children in grade school and their parents, through the PTA. Practical preparations have already begun with fire drills held at Center school, North End school, and St. Hugh's. These drills were observed by the Prince Georges county fire inspector and representatives of the Greenbelt fire department.

The program will include prizes given to children in grades one through six for the best slogans and posters. Prizes will include belts, scarves, ties, T shirts, and "Sparky" pencils. Movies will be shown to children at school and to parents at PTA meetings. There will be fire-equipment demonstrations at each school and rides on the apparatus. Children will be invited to enroll in Sparky's fire department and will be given inspector's cards and information folders telling where to look for fire hazards and how to report them. The high mark of the week will be a trophy, awarded to the school most active in fire-prevention work during the week.

The week of October 7 to 13 promises to be fun for Greenbelt's youngsters, but fun with a purpose -fire prevention.

COUNTY PTA COUNCIL

The Prince Georges County Council of Parent-Teacher Associations will hold its annual dinner meeting Tuesday, September 25, at 7 p.m. at Suitland senior high school on Silver Hill Road.

Speakers will be Dr. Vernon Anderson, dean of the college of education at the University of Maryland, and Prince Georges county superintendent of schools William S. Schmidt.

Dr. Anderson will speak on, "How Laymen and Professional Educators Can Work Together for Better Schools." Mr. Schmidt will talk on, "Why We Should Accept Experimentation in Our Schools if Our Educational System Is to Adto be followed in the sale of homes was postponed until the September 28 meeting, because management and board members had insufficient time to study the proposals. The board also expects to hear shortly from the Phariss committee, regarding possible methods of financing resales of departing members' perpetual use contracts.

The board received a request from Eli Don Bullian of 7-D Ridge for permission to rent unused garages for storage of personal private property. GVHC president Ed Burgoon explained that it was against GVHC policy to rent garages for any purpose other than garaging of cars. It was pointed out, however, that Greenbelt Development Corporation had a number of unused garages near its apartments on Parkway which, because of their isolated position, might be considered for conversion to storage rooms, provided they were not used for commercial purposes nor as workshops. GVHC manager Paul Campbell outlined certain financial, zoning, or insurance difficulties that might be encountered. The board suggested that Don Bullian and Campbell work out agreements covering these difficulties and present their proposals to the GDC board.

The board received sympathetically a plea by Robert Mogel for a contribution to assist the Fire Department and Rescue Squad in its program for Fire Prevention Week next month. Mogel pointed out that the rescue squad is short of funds because it did not receive its full share of state tax money this year. After examining the criteria which the board had previously agreed to follow with regard to contributions to outside activities, the board came to the reluctant conclusion that a donation to the rescue squad would becontrary to GVHC policy, since, among other things, the rescue squad was planning individual solicitations and a door-to-door canvass for funds. A GVHC contribution would, in effect, mean a double contribution from GVHC members. On director Al Long's suggestion, the board moved to have included in the next GVHC Newsletter a plea to members to give generously to the rescue squad

The board went on record as opposing moves to permit truck traffic on the Washington-Baltimore parkway. Campbell was directed to express this opposition in writing to the Prince Georges chamber of commerce, which had been soliciting local opinion on this issue.

Burgoon appointed a committee consisting of Bruce Bowman and Percy Andros to confer with Campbell regarding the possibilities of offering mortgage insurance to the membership on a group basis. The purpose of such insurance would be to help members meet monthly charges in event sickness, disability, or death interrupted family income.

A true story from telephone files, as told by a grateful parent

"I wish to commend the resourceful efficiency and warm personal interest demonstrated last night by one of your alert operators, Mrs. Josephine Vinsh, in response to a call for assistance from my six-and-a-halfyear-old daughter, Michelle.

"I had left Michelle about 6:15 p.m. with her 14month-old sister while I made what was to be a tenminute visit to the local shopping center. Because of heavy snow, however, I encountered difficulty during the return trip, thus an unexpected delay. My tardiness in returning and the baby's crying caused Michelle to seek aid by dialing 'O' and requesting Mrs. Vinsh to connect her with our next-door neighbors. Calmly questioning Michelle, Mrs. Vinsh learned their name. Assuring Michelle that all would be well and persuading her to hang up, she called them and told them that the little girl next door was crying and wanted one of them to come over.


"It is most gratifying to know that a busy operator is alert to recognize a true signal of distress and is sympathetic enough to go to the rescue."

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
