GHI Board Listens To Members' Problems; Changes Meeting Nights

Problems of individual members who are unable to settle their differences amicably preoccupied most of the attention of Greenbelt Homes, Inc. board of directors at last Friday's meeting, June 13. These problems ranged from the correction of drainage defects to the securing of approval for garage additions.

The drainage problem arose when middle residents of a row frame house filled in their swales causing water to back up at the end of the row. GHI, while anxious to rectify the situation, cannot get agreement from the residents involved as to which method to use. The best solution, from the engineering standpoint, is to restore the swales, but this would mean disrupting the work the middle residents had done to beautify their yards. An alternative solution would be to lay drain tile, but this would cost about three times as much.

The board decided that if the members concerned cannot agree as to the method, management should proceed on its own and bill the members accordingly. GHI attorneys will be asked if there are any legal obstacles to the corporation performing such corrective work without the consent of the

Another dispute brought before the board concerned the refusal of permission by a brick home owner for a 4-foot extension of the rear of a garage adjoining his land. The complication in this case was that the owner had recently extended his own garage in connection with the building of an addition to his home—an addition which had never received the approval-as required by GHI regulations-of the neighbor requesting the garage extension. Board members felt that the home owner was really in no position to deny the request of his neighbor since he was engaged in construction work which conceivably could be stopped by GHI. Management was requested to bring this to the attention of the party involved.

The board also heard a request from a member to buy a freestanding garage which because of its location, it was claimed, should logically have been part of the member's house to start with. The board felt that it was not equitable to force out the present tenant who had occupied the garage for over 15 years, but agreed that if and when the tenant vacates, it will reconsider the possibility of selling the garage.

FMIC Loans

Turning to policy matters, the board voted to advise First Mutual Investment Company that it wished to have FMIC financing confined, as much as possible, to loans for down payments on GHI homes and for home improvements.

Director Frank Lastner suggested that perhaps the land opposite 73 Ridge could be so developed if the Department of Agriculture could be prevailed upon to dedicate some adjoining land which is now fenced

Director Hans Jorgensen reported that the city council is moving in the direction of having the proposed Greenhill Rd. running through the new subdivision be joined with Hillside Rd, He wanted to know who would bear the costs of leveling and landscapping the land affected by the juncture. He was assured by management that such costs would have to be borne by the city or the developers:
