### CITIZENSHIP DAY - CONSTITUTION DAY CHAIRMAN AMERICANISM COMMITTEE THE AMERICAN LEGION

By Joint Resolution (Public Law 261) of the Eighty-second Congress of the United States of America (Second Session), approved February 29, 1952, September 17 of each year designated as ZENSHIP DAY" in commemoration of the formation and signing on September 17, 1787, of the Constitution of the United States of America and in recognition of all who, by coming of age or by naturalization, have attained the full status of citizenship. By this Resolution, the Joint Resolution creating "I AM AN AMERICAN CITIZEN DAY," approved May 3, 1940, was repealed and joined with "CONSTITUTION DAY" to make for one observance on September 17 of each year.

The major objectives of CITIZENSHIP AND CONSTITUTION DAY are: To prepare young people becoming of age and naturalized citizens to accept the responsibilities of citizenship, and to acquaint them with the rights and privileges, the duties and obligations of citizenship, and to further the observance of the anniversary of the completion of the Constitution and to encourage an adequate ap-

preciation of its importance.

Each year during the week of September 17th, the observance of National Constitution Week plays an important part in the education phase of the National Americanism program of the American Legion. The fundamental precepts on which The American Legion was founded include an individual obligation to uphold and defend the Constitution of the United States and to safeguard and

transmit to posterity the principles of justice, freedom and democracy.

The Constitution is a living document, a basic charter protecting every American which has, since its adoption more than 160 years ago, served as the beacon light of free men, We the American citizen should always be constantly on the alert. Foes of our form of government, foes of liberty within and without our country around the world, are continuously making insidious attacks on the fundamental principles embodied in the Constitution.

We, the American citizen, should hold the deepest respect for every fundamental principal expressed in the Constitution, and it is responsibility to instill these basic American concepts in the minds and hearts of the youth of the nation, and to join in building better citizenship through an increased interest in the Constitution of the United States

### Remodeled North End Homes on Sale. Buyers -- First Come, First Served

First come will be first served. That is the policy set down by Greenbelt Homes, Inc. with respect to the sale of the 4 renovated 2-bedroom units in the North End property. With the board of directors concurring, GHI manager John O. Walker announced at last Thursday's meeting that registration for the homes will begin Friday, September 19 and continue for a week. There will be no acceptance of telephone registrations. The remodeled homes will be open for inspection the weekend of September 20-21,

First preference will be given to GHI members in order of registration, Walker said. "As with any sale, the corporation will need to get a financial and credit report on prospective buyers so as to make certain they can meet the monthly charges," Walker continued, Monthly charges, it is estimated, will come to \$82 for the \$7,000-priced end units and \$77 for the \$6,500priced middle units. A 13-percent down payment (including 3 percent for working capital) will be asked, amounting to \$910 and \$845, respectively. However, Walker added, since GHI will carry the mortgage. alternative arrangements can be worked out which may inculde provisions for a larger down payment or for acceleration of the amortization payments.

A purchaser of one of the units, like any other GHI member, will receive a perpetual lease to the property. He will be entitled to the same services and be subject to the same rules of the coroportation as any other member.

Some discussion followed on the procedures to be used in facilitating the exchange of housing for purchasers of the renovated units. Under the rules of the co-op, no member can own two homes. Since the corporation is anxious to get the remodeled units occupied as soon as possible, the question arose as to how much time should be granted purchasers to sell their old units. A 30-day time limit was suggested with the possibility that the co-op might purchase the old home decided that this matter could best be handled on an individual basis by management.
