13 Board Candidates Set for GHI Vote

Charles Cormack, Sr., 6-B Ridge, and Bernard Fritz, 2-C Woodland Way, announced their candidacy this week for the 3-man audit committee of Greenbelt Homes, Inc. As published last week, 13 nominees to date have signified their intention of running for the 9-man board of rectors, including 8 of the present incumbents.

The deadline for submitting nominations to the GHI Election Committee is Monday, March 16. Thereafter, any GHI member wishing to get his name on the ballot must submit a petition signed by at least 10 GHI members. These petitions must be in the hands of GHI secretary Bruce Bowman no later than Wednesday, March 18. Biographies of the candidates will appear in next week's News Review.

The election will be held in conjunction with the annual membership meeting scheduled for the Center School Auditorium, Wednesday, March 25, starting at 8:15 p.m. The polls will be open throughout the meeting and during the next day from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m.

In addition to the election of officials, the membership will consider a proposed by-law change directors, including 8 of the present to stagger the terms of the board of directors. At present, board members serve for one year. Under the new plan, board members would be elected for two-year terms, with half the body standing for election each year.

The membership will also be asked to approve a new resolution authorizing the board to use the net proceeds from the sale of the undeveloped land for the establishment of a revolving fund for GHI to purchase back and finance the resale of housing units. Authority is also sought to invest land proceeds with local organizations such as the Credit Union and Twin Pines Savings and Loan Association.

New Beltsville Warehouse Planned By GCS; Will Move Offices There

Greenbelt Consumer Services, Inc. is moving its offices from Greenbelt to a newly planned warehouse building in nearby Beltsville, it was disclosed this week by Ed Burgoon, GCS membership relations director. Over 10 acres of land is being rented, with an option to buy, in an industrial tract owned by Frank Ewing at the intersection of US 1 and Rhode Island Avenue. On this site, GCS plans to build a new warehouse and office with over 66,000 square feet. The building will be ready for occupancy in August.

According to Burgoon, the grocery warehouse will be moved from Baltimore. "For some time it has been the objective of GCS to combine its warehouse and office operations," he disclosed. "We knew that this would be a much more efficient operation because it would eliminate certain duplication of office staff and make possible better internal communication. With this objective in mind, we have been searching for the past five years for a site near enough to a railroad to provide a spur so that our carload shipments of groceries could be delivered directly to the warehouse. The closest site to Greenbelt that we could find, which had both railroad and siding and good road transportation available to it, is on the Ewing tract . . ."

GCS expects to sublease the present office space in Greenbelt either for offices or for additional bowling alleys.
