## Terms of 5-year Lease Agreement For New Fire Building Disclosed

The city council continued its study of a lease agreement with the Greenbelt Volunteer Fire Department and Rescue Squad for the occupancy of the new \$125,000 fire department building. At a special meeting last Monday night, a revised draft of the lease was presented which disclosed the following terms:

The rent will be ten dollars a year for a term of 25 years. The lease will be renewable every five years. According to the lease, the premises will be used "only as a headquarters building for housing the equipment . . . and all activities pertinent to the operations and function of said department, and will not suffer or permit the premises to be used for any other purpose without the prior written consent of the city."

The first department will provide all janitorial services, but the city will provide snow clearance for which this building will take priority over all other public buildings. The grounds will be maintained by the fire department, who will also be responsible for keeping the building vermin-proof. No alterations will be permitted.

Insurance against damage by fire or other causes will be paid by the fire department, who will also carry public liability insurance for protection against injury to persons or property by reason of accident in or upon the premises. Governmental immunity will not be permitted. Utility services will be paid for by the department. They also must pay for and obtain any necessary licenses and permits to comply with all applicable laws and ordinances of the State of Maryland or political subdivision having jurisdiction.

The lease also prohibits the fire department from transferring or assigning the lease or any property. The property cannot be sublet without the written consent of the city. They also cannot alter the premises or install fixtures without written consent.

The city council members will continue their review of the lease agreement after which the council will send its final recommendations to the fire department for consideration. Both sides hope to sign a formal agreement within the next few weeks.

The building, standing on 1.15 acres of city owned land, is situated along Crescent road adjacent to St. Hugh's. It is now occupied by fire department equipment, but water service has not been completed at this date. The building was financed by the city from proceeds derived from the sale of the Center elementary school to the county board of education. Another building, the Greenbelt Youth Center, is nearing completion at a site on Braden Field adjacent to the swimming pool. This, too, is being financed from the sale of the school.

In planning stages is the proposed municipal building, to be erected between the fire department and St. Hugh's, on city-owned land, and financed by a bond issue authorized in a city referendum.

## 8:30 Means 8:30

A plea by a local ice cream vendor that the ordinance prohibiting hawking after 8:30 p.m. does not specify Eastern Daylight Time cut no ice with local city officials. ## Diaper Derby Sunday

Even the smallest of the small fry will have a place in the Labor Day Festival this year.

A new program, a "Diaper Derby," has been added to the Festival program. On Sunday afternoon on Braden Field a baby Crawling contest will be held. Boys and girls must be 11 months old or under. All parents entering children must enter them by 1:30 p.m. at the field. Supt. of Recreation Warren G. Ledick will hold the event and accept entries at that time.

The contest will start with all the children in the center of a 20 foot circle. At the whistle, all children will start crawling to the white line 20 feet away. Parents may use any device they wish to entice the children to crawl. There will be prizes for the first three places and a gift for all participating. The children will crawl on the grass.

## High Point High Opens

Students of High Point High School should report to school on Tuesday, Sept. 6, prepared for a full day of work. Allen Chotiner, High Point principal, has announced. Due to a new IBM system, little time will be taken with opening day enrollment.

Old students are asked to report to their former home rooms. New students from Greenbelt Junior High should report to the cafeteria. Other students who are new to the area are to report to the library. Enrollment this year is expected to be about 1650 for the senior high school, which is an increase of 100 over last year.

The school bus schedule will be the same as last year with buses leaving at 8:20 p.m. from Greenbelt Center, Laurel Hill and Ridge, and Hillside and Crescent.

## Parade Bike Entries

All youngsters who wish to enter their decorated bicycle, tricycle or wagon in the Festival Parade must obtain a parade number in advance in order to be eligible for a trophy. These numbers may be obtained at the Greenbelt Tobacco Shoppe on Friday, Saturday and Sunday.

## College Park Takes Festival Majorettes Cup

The College Park VFD Majorettes swept to an overwhelming victory in winning the Grand Champion Corps award in the annual National Open Majorette Competition held at the Greenbelt Armory on Aug. 17 under the sponsorship of the annual Greenbelt Festival.

The College Park twirlers won first place in senior corps, first place senior team, first place junior team and second place juvenile team. These victories combined with points received by members in individual contests accumulated a total of 224 points. Runner-up, Grand Champion Corps, was the Middle River Majorettes from Baltimore with a point score of 171.

The all events Grand Champion Twirler was a battle between Peggy Lenkiewicz, Norwich, Conn., Elaine Hudson of Morganton, N. C. and Gail Fuchs of Baltimore, Md. Final tabulation showed top individual honors went to Gail Fuchs with the runner-up spot to Elaine Hudson.

Local winners were the Greenbelt VFD Majorettes who took second place in the senior corps contest.

Chairman and organizer of the contest was Earl Thomas.

## National Champion Twirlers to Perform

The 1960 National Baton Corps Champions, the famed College Park VFD Majorettes, will give a special performance at the Greenbelt Labor Day festival as well as participate in the parade and baton twirling contest. The performance is scheduled to take place at the Athletic Field Saturday, Sept. 3 at 7 p.m. preceding the talent contest.

This well known organization, under the leadership and direction of Mrs. Ann Walker Bittenbender, 1956 "Miss Maryland Majorettes" and formerly of Greenbelt, recently won the title of 1960 National Champions at the National Baton Twirling Corps Championship Contest in South Milwaukee, Wis. where they competed against corps from all over the country, including top corps from Tex., Fla., Calif., Wis., Pa. and Okla. In addition to the trophy awarded for winning this honor, the College Parkers were given a "Little Brown Jug" bearing the inscription "NBTA National Champions," which must be carried in front of the champions for one year wherever they make a public appearance. An accurate record must be kept of all places the "jug" has been and recorded on a scroll to pass along to future National Champions. Greenbelters will have an opportunity to view the "Little Brown Jug" at the special performance, as well as the parade and contest.

The College Park VFD Majorettes have been the Senior Maryland State Champions for the past 5 years, in addition to being National Champs. Some of their other most important wins include the Kenosha Round-up in Kenosha, Wis. in July, 1959, the George Washington Memorial Tournament Champions won at Uline Arena, February, 1960, and the Grand Champion Corps of the Greenbelt Labor Day Festival Contest, August, 1959. They were also chosen the Grand Champion Corps at a National Open Baton Twirling Contest in N. C. in August, 1958, where director, Ann Bittenbender, was chosen "Miss Ideal Majorette." The College Park Fire House, which houses the awards won by their majorettes, is overflowing with over 160 trophies.

The champions, who have scheduled public appearances for months ahead since winning the National title, have already appeared on the Don McNeill Breakfast Club radio show in Chicago and the Baltimore Colt Intra-Squad football game halftime show in Baltimore, Md. They will also perform at the halftime of one of the University of Maryland football games this year. The Sunday Star Magazine section of the Washington Star carried a cover picture and feature story of the College Park twirlers in June. Another feature story with pictures is in the process of being written about the champs and will appear in a few months in the "This Week" Sunday magazine section of newspapers all over the country.

## CAT NATURE

To the Editor:

When I told a European friend that the Greenbelt City Council was considering a leash law for cats, he laughed, thinking it was a joke, and then said with some apprehension, "but cats don't take to leashes." Let us hope the Council will be guided by similarly humane considerations. (The comments of everyone else who heard the story were uniformly critical, less restrained and, in quite a few cases, not printable.) A really puzzling aspect is what was all this damage "... to lawns, trees, gardens and other property" that vexed the Council? Those of us who have some ground had the idea that cats discouraged moles, kept voles from girdling young trees and occasionally buried nitrogenous matter in the soil, thus benefiting lawns, trees and gardens. In any case, the main point is still a humane one.

The nature of a cat is quite unlike a dog, which can be trained to enjoy a walk on a leash in spite of cars and cyclists; he can roam in an enclosed yard or exercise freely on a leash of the "trolley" type. To say that a cat will enjoy a walk on a leash is cruel claptrap, and it is evident that a yard would need to be closed on top—rather impractical. A cat left on a trolley device, will probably end by hurting or strangling herself. The main protection an animal as small as a pet cat has is flight, from larger animals or from unintentional mishandling by children.

If a large number of strays are causing a civic problem, surely the Council could insert notices in the newspapers and post the city to the effect that all strays would be picked up on a certain couple of days. Help and advice is surely available from local Humane Societies in such matters.

## Emotional Experience

The significant role which one's emotional response plays in giving to activities the character of recreation makes it a factor of fundamental importance. Unless participation in an activity brings a favorable emotional response to the individual, it is not likely to become for him a form of recreation. The emotional satisfactions which are sought and achieved through recreation are as varied in quality and scope as humanity itself. Some are wholesome, inspiring, or rich in association; others appeal to the individual's baser emotions.

The thrill of tobogganing, the mass hysteria at the championship fight, the suspense of the reader as he approaches the climax of the novel or the solution of the detective mystery, are examples of emotion in recreational activities. Emotional satisfactions are shared by participants and spectators alike, although in differing ways and intensities. The tense excitement of the players; the soul-stirring majesty of the symphony is felt by both musicians and listeners; and the emotion with which the actor plays his part or the warmth with which important issues are threshed out in the forum are shared by the audience. The strong emotional appeal of many offerings of the motion picture theatres, dance halls, and sex and adventure magazines explains much of their widespread popularity.

The element of emotion in a recreational activity may be introduced or increased by the organization of a tournament or contest or public performance. The emotional appeal of a party beach picnic, or moonlight sail is greatly enhanced when it is conducted as a co-recreational project.
