GHI Board Backs Manager's Rejection Of Member Applicant

The board of directors of Greenbelt Homes, Inc., at a special meeting called Tuesday to consider new membership applications, unanimously upheld the decision of the manager to reject an applicant who had appealed the manager's decision to the board.

A letter from a local real estate firm protesting the manager's decision was read to the board. GHI Manager Paul Campbell reported to the board his reasons for disapproving the membership application, and the unanimous vote followed.

However, board member Harry Zubkoff raised the question of whether it was appropriate for the board to delegate to the manager the authority to reject applications for GHI membership. Campbell said that at the present time he brought to the board's attention those borderline cases which he felt required evaluation by the board.

Zubkoff recommended that either all membership applications be brought before the board for approval or disapproval, or that the manager report to the board on all rejections so that the board could be aware of them.

GHI President Ed Burgoon pointed out that the decision had been made to delegate this re-sponsibility to the manager because these cases could be del-icate and not suitable for discussion in open meetings. Frank Lastner supported this view, noting that open discussion of the background of these cases could be harmful to the applicant. Zub-koff suggested that such matters could be taken up in executive sessions.

Burgoon also noted that it was a more efficient operation to have management screen all applicants rather than to require the board to review all these cases. He said that background reports on all disapproved ap-plications are available to board members.

Campbell admitted that he has come under a great deal of sharp criticism and even personal abuse as a result of his rejecting some applications. Zubkoff argued that such a burden should not be imposed on the manager and should be spread more even-

Details of a request for an easement through city-owned land, to eliminate a present traffic hazard at the Co-op service station entrance, were presented to the Advisory Planning Board Thursday evening by a repre-sentative of Greenbelt Consumer Services, Inc. The Board decided to consider the technical and legal aspects more fully before making a decision. A second public hearing may be held if the Board deems it necessary, Chairman Bernstein indicated.

During the public hearing, questions were raised concerning the legality of the proposed easement and the extent to which conditions should be attached to the easement should it be granted. The G.C.S. representative, Mr. Hess, said that the only obvious alternative, a passage through the center strip of the new roadway, had been ruled out in talks with the State Roads Commission. He used a sketch to illustrate the size and location of the requested easement, a triangular segment of the present cityowned buffer strip between the garage and 10 court of Southway. He claimed that the easement would provide necessary safety and legality -- eliminating illegal use of the northern exit against present traffic flow -- and also convenience for Greenbelt citizens.

Matt Amberg, a resident of the nearby court, asked for assurances that granting of the easement would not mean further physical encroachment by the station in the direction of the residences. It was brought out that the screening by existing hedges was not adequate, Hess replied that G.C.S. would abide by any conditions the Board thought fit to attach.

The fact that the proposed driveway would lie below the bank of the roadway and thus not be visible to residents was cited by Hess as an advantage, but was viewed as a possible traffic hazard by one questioner. Other citizens strongly urged that before such an easement be approved all possible conse-quences be considered carefully and the city's interest be safeguarded by attaching appropriate conditions. Among such undesirable possibilities, relocation of the gas pumps and new ownership of the station land were mentioned.

The Board of Directors of Twin Pines Savings and Loan Association has declared the regular quarterly dividend at the rate of 5% per year. More than 1100 members of the local cooperative savings institution will have approximately \$5,600 in dividends added to their savings accounts on June 30th. This is the 15th consecutive quarterly dividend the Association has paid, according to Harvey Geller, President.

The Board also voted a 1/4% reduction in the rate of interest charged borrowers beginning July 1st. The new rate on loans secured by co-op homes will be 5 3/4% per year on the amount borrowed. On a thousand dollar loan for one year the interest cost is reduced from \$60 to \$57.50.

Geller also pointed out that the assets of Twin Pines have now passed the half-million mark. On June 1st they totaled \$508,722. A year ago they stood On June 1st they totaled at \$268,139.


