Burgoon Named FCH Vice President



Last week the FCH Company, Inc. (a subsidiary of the Foundation for Cooperative Housing) announced the appointment of Edward A. Burgoon as Vice President of the company.

In addition to serving as Director of their Washington office and contact person for the company with the State Department and the Agency for International Development for foreign assignments on cooperative housing, Burgoon will be assuming part of the duties of the President and General Manager. Burgoon helped organize Greenbelt Homes, Inc. and has served on its board of directors for some nine years. The past seven years he has served as president of the board. Prior to his employment less than a year ago by the FCH Company, Burgoon served 15 years with Greenbelt Consumer Services.

Little League Opens Play

Greenbelt Little League will open its 14th season on Sunday, April 29 at 2 p.m. at McDonald Field.

The opener pits last year's National League champs, the D.A. V. Tigers, against the American League and City Champs, the Pepsi Cola Athletics.

The D.A.V. Tigers, banking their hopes on the return of veterans from last year's team and bolstered by rookies picked up this year, are looking forward to another fine season. Manager Lonnie Palmer has the boys in good shape as possible, considering the weather -- which has not been good for baseball.

The Pepsi Cola Athletics, pinning their hopes on the return of most of last year's team, will be ready to do battle when Sunday arrives. Manager Bud Dean states, "We will be there but what kind of a team we put on the field will be a different matter."

"The election is less than 3 weeks away," said Fonda, "and we desire to have at least two candidates for each vacancy." There are 4 openings for the 2-year terms on the 9-man board. Board members receive a salary of \$500 per year and officers \$750. In addition, board members are eligible to participate in GHI's group life insurance, hospital, surgical, and major medical expense plan for its employees. The insurance plan is jointly financed, with GHI paying 65 percent of the cost.

Fonda stressed that in a democratic organization it is important that there be active competition for elected officials. "We should also like to have some woman candidates. And, of course, we would welcome candidates for the 3-man audit committee."

The only qualification for office is membership in good standing in the corporation. Fonda suggested that since modesty often prevents some qualified candidates from announcing their candidacy, his committee would appreciate receiving from fellow-members the names of likely candidates. The committee in turn will make a concerted effort to induce such persons to run.

Other members of the nominations committee are Charles Schwan, Mat Amberg, Amos White, and the latest appointee, Bruce Bowman. Candidates' consent forms can be obtained from committee members or the GHI office on Hamilton Place. These forms must be returned to the committee by Sunday, May 6, if the biographical sketches are to be printed in the News Review.

Hour of Crisis

TO THE EDITOR:
Words cannot express my
gratitude to the Greenbelt
Volunteer Fire Department and
Rescue Squad when they rushed
to my aid last week in my hour
of crisis.

My daughter Mary Joan was in
great pain when she stepped on
a needle which pierced her foot
completely. I immediately
started to take her to the hospital,
although I am pregnant, I had
driven just a short distance from
my home, when I realized I
could not make the trip.

Fortunately, the firehouse was
nearby, and I rushed there on the
verge of collapsing myself. On
hand at the firehouse were Jack
Swisher and junior member Bill
Bingham. Mr. Swisher took one
look at me and thought I was in
need of assistance for myself
alone because of my condition.
When they were able to calm me
down enough to talk, I explained
that it was my daughter who was
in need of emergency treatment.
They found that Mary Joan had
passed out in the car. While
she was being revived, they were
already sterilizing some carpen-
ter tools and then with great
gentleness and self-assurance,
the needle was extracted and the
wound neatly bandaged.

Before I knew it, an ambulance
crew had been summoned and we
were rushed to the hospital. My
daughter was taken to the emer-
gency room, and was given a few
cc's of penicillin to fight off any
possible infection. Nothing else
had to be done. It had already
been done skillfully by the men
in Greenbelt.

My sincerest appreciation goes
to all the members of the de-
partment.

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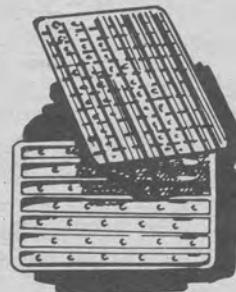

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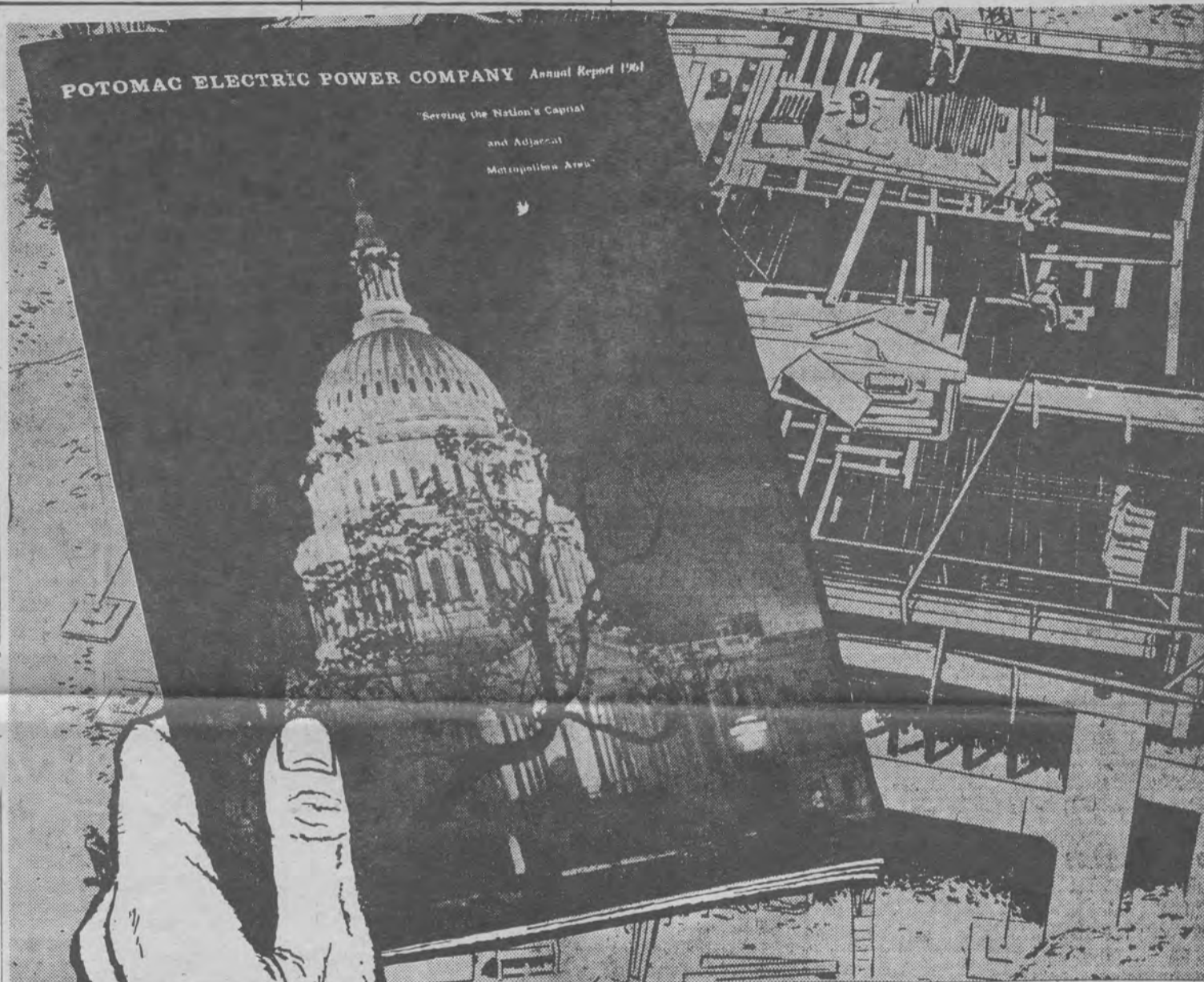
