Council Reviews Pool Dispute; **Appoints New Charter Committee**

Appointments, swimming pool renovation, condemnation of city property by State Roads Commission, and initiation of a citypaid fireman occupied the major attention of city council at its regular meeting on Monday, November 4.

In addition to 13 appointments made to the city's permanent advisory groups, the council made nine appointments to the 10-man Charter Review Committee. The second reading and final passage of the resolution setting up this committee was passed by council prior to the appointments after amending the resolution to provide for designation of the chairman by the mayor.

Each councilman was alloted two appointments. Councilman David Champion named Howard Chasanow and Ben Wimberly; Lewis Bernstein named Simon Pristoop and Charles Schwan; William Hoff named Allen Douglas and J. Richard Hoffman; Mayor Edgar Smith named Lester Myers and Francis White; and Cliff Simonson named Sam Schwimer with one name forthcoming.

Swimming Pool

Differences of opinion on the swimming pool renovation program received an extensive airing. Simonson introduced the topic by reporting on his conversations with various swimming pool architects and construction companies in the area. Present were James Cosgrove, representing a swimming pool architectural and construction firm, and Robert Scharf, representing Greenhorne & O'Mara the engineering firm which made the survey of the swimming pool, the renovation of which the firm estimated would cost \$139,700.

The chief point of contention revolved around the following: Does the kind of planning and work involved in the renovation of the swimming pool call primarily for the services of an engineering firm or an architectural design firm? Greenhorne & O'Mara has never designed or constructed a swimming pool, but Scharf contended that the work is primarily a structural engineering problem rather than one of pool design. In this position, he was supported by the city manager James Giese.

Simonson, taking the other position, contended that the city should take advantage of the know-how and experience of architectural firms that have actually built pools in order to get maximum value for dollar spent. He cited, for example, that these firms generally recommend gunnite in preference to poured concrete for the lining of the pool, and Cosgrove supported this preference, citing tensile strength as well as cost advantages. Greenhorne & O'Mara had recommended poured

further questioning council, it was revealed that Cosgrove's firm had little experience with poured concrete and that Greenhorne & O'Mara had no experience with gunnite. Scharf stated that either method was satisfactory and suggested that the specifications permit the contractors to submit alternative bids using either gunnite or poured concrete.

The question of whether primarily engineering or design work is involved also impinges on the matter of fees. Greenhorne & Q'Mara requested a 9.5 percent fee. Simonson arued that this fee is excessive, since most architectural firms charge 31/2 percent for swimming pools. However, Cosgrove admitted that the fee might be somewhat higher in the case of renovation work, of which his firm has had only limited experience. It was also pointed out that the city has

already incurred a charge of \$3,040.26 for services rendered by Greenhorne & O'Mara, so that savings by switching firms would not be great.

A motion by Simonson that an independent architectural firm review the specifications as finally recommended by Greenhorne & O'Mara and agreed to by council before letting out for bids was defeated 4 to 1.

A public meeting will be held on Tuesday, November 12, with Greenhorne & O'Mara to settle upon the final details for the pool, so that final plans and specifications for contracting out can be prepared. Condemnation

The States Road Commission has notified the city that it will institute condemnation procedures to secure the 71/2 acre property on which the present city warehouse is located if its offer of \$90,000 for the acreage is not accepted by council. The SRC wants the property as a site for a district office building to house its engineering staff (no equipment).

Mayor Smith pointed out that the city has already received an offer of \$150,000 for the property from a private developer. It was would be faced with the cost of constructing a new warehouse and finding a site - a cost which has been estimated up to \$100,000.

Bernstein suggested that answers to the following questions should be obtained: What does the State have to prove in court to secure the property? What criteria did the State use in establishing its price? What alternative sites did the State consider? It was suggested the corner opposite the Greenbelt Junior High School (which Stidham Tire Company wanted) might be a more satisfactory site. The city manager was instructed to consult with the city solicitor. Paid Fireman

Chief Robert Mogel of the Greenbelt Volunteer Fire Department submitted a plan for a paid fire truck driver to be paid by the city. He noted that it was difficult to find qualified drivers for the fire trucks during daylight hours when most men were employed out of town. This man would also be responsible for maintenance of equipment and for record-keeping.

Mogel suggested that J. Williams, who will no longer be driving the city bus when WMA begins its service, would be qualified for this post. Council decided to place this item on the agenda for next time, but asked whether there would be any problems of line-of-command or supervision.

Other Business The council agreed to hold special meetings on November 21 and November 25. The first meeting will review the current city budget and the audit report prepared by the firm of Emanuel & Pear. The second will be a public hearing on the recommended community goals prepared by the Advisory Planning Board (a future issue of the News

Review will publish this document). A dedication committee for the new Municipal Building was appointed consisting of former Mayors, former city manager, and all councilmen who have served since 1957. It is expected that the city will occupy the new building shortly after the new year and the dedication ceremonies will take place in the spring.

Geller, Gerton and Wuermser were appointed to full three-year terms on the APB; McDonald and Gibson to one-year terms to replace Lewis Bernstein and Cliff Simonson who resigned after their election to council. The five now join Mrs. Velma Chapman and Cyril Kovalchick whose terms run until October 1965. The APB will elect its own chairman at its next meet-

Members of the ERB serve for three years, with staggered appointments each year. To get the new board started, council elected Herling for a 3-year term, Downs for a 2-year term, and Mann for a one year term. Herling was named by the council as chairman.

In similar fashion, members of the PAB serve for three years with staggered terms. Rowland and Bailey were elected to the 3-year terms, Hanna and Polaschik to the 2-year terms, and Baron to the one-year term. Rowland was named by the council as chairman.

Appointment Procedure

The council expressed appreciation for the number of citizens who offered their services to the city and noted their high caliber and qualifications. In seven meetings, the council interviewed and considered 19 candidates for the APB, 12 candidates for the ERB, and 11 for the PAB.

Councilman Lewis Bernstein. speaking for the council, explained that the council met as a committee of the whole on Sunday, November 3, to consider candidates and make the appointments. The selection of names was made by written ballot with the councilmen agreeing that it would take a majority of four votes to make an appointment.

According to the statements of the individual councilmen, the criteria used in the selection were length of residence in Greenbelt, education, experience, employment, availability of time, analytical qualities, and personal views.
