Municipal Building Ceremonies



LARGE TURNOUT IS REMINDED OF PAST

About 400 persons turned out under perfect skies Sunday afternoon to join in the dedication of Greenbelt's new \$120,000 Municipal Building.

An aura of nostalgia filled the air as guest speakers Brooks Hays and the Rev. Eric T. Braund reminded Greenbelters of their history and accomplishments.

Hays had worked with Rexford Guy Tugwell in the old Resettlement Administration which prepared the plans for the Greenbelt towns. He cited some of the opposition that existed to such plans.

But Greenbelt survived, and, he said, as a successful experiment it promoted the values of democracy, cooperation, and interdependence.

The Rev. Braund, who resided in Greenbelt from 1946 to 1957, stated that the one thing that lingers in his mind about Greenbelt is its spirit.

"We all came from different parts," he said, "this saved us from being provincial or parochial. There was and is a Great Society in Greenbelt."

He ended his remarks with a plea to "Keep Greenbelt Green."

County Commission Chairman Frank J. Lastner, taking his cue from Braund, also gave his support to the plea for a green Greenbelt, and gave assurances that he was not moving from the city. Lastner then unveiled the dedication plaque to be placed inside the front door of the Municipal Building, and called it "another instance of growth in Greenbelt."

Mayor Edgar L. Smith and councilman David Champion awarded certificates of recognition to 68 Greenbelters who have voluntarily served the city without compensation as members of various boards and committees.

Former Mayor Tom Canning introduced other former mayors and councilmen of Greenbelt who have served the city since 1937.

Register To Vote

Greenbelters will have an opportunity to register locally to vote in November's General Election on Saturday, September 12, and Tuesday, September 15. Registration will take place at North End School for those residents in the 21st District, 6th precinct, and at Center School for residents in the 21st district, 3rd precinct. Both schools will be open from 9 a.m. to 9 p.m. on these dates.

Residents may also register from 1 to 9 p.m. on Tuesday through Friday and on Saturday from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. in the County Service Building in Hyattsville through September 19. The courthouse in Upper Marlboro is also open for registration Mondays through Fridays from 8:30 a.m. to 4 p.m. until Sept. 22.

Voters who have not registered before must do so by September 22 to be able to vote in the November election. All United States citizens who will be at least 21 years of age on or before November 3 and who will have lived in Maryland 1 year and in the county 6 months by November 2 may register to vote. Those who have registered previously do not have to register again if they have voted once within the last 5 years. Changes of address, however, should be reported to the Elections Offices.

World's Fair Post Office

Visitors to the New York World's Fair from Greenbelt have an unusual opportunity to see a post office of the future, Postmaster Emory A. Harman said today.

A carefully-chosen group of 80 employees from New York area post offices man the facility which handles all the Fair's mail and some from the Flushing, New York area. The outside mail is used to keep the highly mechanized devices operating at "full tilt".

The post office handles approximately 250,000 pieces of mail each day.

Postmaster Harman notes that residents of Greenbelt who attend the Fair and wish to try out their foreign language ability can either talk with the multi-lingual window clerks or listen to a tape recorded presentation in the post office lobby with individual earphones for those who speak Japanese, French, German, Italian, and Spanish.

A prototype stainless steel mail box being tested as an eventual replacement for the standard box used for the past forty years is located at one of the Fair's busiest intersections. Postmaster Harman suggests that Greenbelt area visitors to the Fair express their comments on the new box by dropping a note addressed to the "Superintendent, World's Fair Post Office" through the mail slot. Postage is not necessary.
