Announce Membership and Aims of GHI Central Planning Committee

Some of the matters to be dealt with by the new GHI central planning committee were outlined by director Nat Shinderman in a first presentation to the board, Thursday, Dec. 3. It was the hope of the board that this committee will carefully investigate and propose goals and plans which can serve as policy and guides for the development and adoption of a well-planned, long range program which will most effectively utilize the corporation's resources and potential to achieve the maximum benefit for its members.

The items suggested in this first draft, which was accepted by the board, were:

1. Long-range plans for the ultimate disposition of the frame homes.

2. The most desirable utilization of the corporation's undeveloped land. 3. Should the corporation be in any business other than housing management or properly be involved in related enterprises, i.e. lending programs, land development, elderly housing, etc.?

4. Programs for long-range loans in connection with the resale of G.H.I. homes and for additions and alterations for member's homes. Should the corporation administer lending programs or should outside financial organizations be sought to underwrite these programs? 5. The financial posture the corpor-

ation should attain. Are reserves needed? if so at what levels and for what purpose.

6. Programs for home improvements and beautification. 7. Review of by-laws and regula-

8. Long-range maintenance and re-

placement program.

9. Member relations activities

10. Sales programs.

The committee personnel are: Lloyd L. Moore, chairman; Jeremy Anderson, Bernard Bordenet, Bruce Bowman, Corinne Champion, Eli Crupain, Roy K. Davis, Edgar T. Groark, Donald G. Kern, David W. Lange, James L. Martin, Stephen J. Paddack, Scott Sandilands, James C. Smith, and Joseph P. Vella. The committee will hold a first joint meeting with the board of directors on Tuesday, Dec. 15, to discuss the scope of its operations.

Acting board chairman Ed Burgoon commended Shinderman on the draft report; director John O'Reilly suggested that perhaps the main function of the committee would be to push vigorously ideas originating in the present separate committees.

Manager Roy Breashears submitted to the board an expenditure authorization for 1965 of \$1,538,892, some \$12,900 less than the adopted budget because of an increase in the cash position. This was accepted for first reading.

The manager reported he had received a letter from Surburban Trust Co. giving GHI a firm commitment of \$600,000 for a year, to finance resales, so that serious discussions could now proceed in this area. On another matter, he read a letter from the Washington Suburban Sanitary Commission to the effect that a GHI member would be held responsible for any problems which might arise from his addition, built over a WSSC pipe-

On a motion by O'Reilly, it was decided not to prepay city taxes this year; Breashears noted this seemed reasonable because GHI was no longer the city's single largest taxable resident.

City Notes

Lakeside Drive Repairs

City Manager James Giese reports that city workmen tore up a 100-foot strip of roadway on Lakeside Drive during the week before Thanksgiving. It had been hoped that a pavement base would be laid before the holiday, but adverse weather conditions prevented this. The job has now been completed. The roadwork was a part of the city's periodic program to repair the bad spots on Lakeside. The street presents a perennial maintenance problem, partly because the original construction was in accordance with standards inferior to those presently in force and partly because several springs run underneath the road, undermining its foundation.

Parking Lot Islands

An experiment in the parking lots behind the shopping center was adjudged a failure last week. An attractive, low-maintenance ground cover is needed for the islands in the parking lot. Concrete, which would solve the maintenance problem, would kill the trees in the island by preventing water from reaching the roots. Last week a decorative gravel cover was spread, but it was not packed as tightly as had been hoped. A better solution is sought, and consideration is being given to flagstones set in sand.

Civil Defense Open House

"Know What Your County Civil Defense is Doing" is the keynote of the Prince Georges County Civil Defense Open House, scheduled for Sunday, Dec. 13, between 1 and 6 Public demonstrations and exhibitions will be held in three locations: at Civil Defense Headquarters in the Greenbelt Armory, at the American Red Cross building, 4112 Hamilton St., Hyattsville and at the Radio Amateur Civil Emergency Service Area Communication center, 4404 71st ave. in Landover Hills. Bus transportation will be provided from the Greenbelt Armory to the other two points.

At the Greenbelt Armory a simulated emergency exercise will be conducted, demonstrating radiation measurement and the use of communication equipment. Displays of model fallout shelters, shelter maps, radiological instruments, medical and food supplies will be displayed.

Fair Housing Group Requests **Human Relations Board Here**

The City Council heard a letter from the Greenbelt Citizens for Fair Housing, read by Chairman Albert Herling last Monday night, in which the Fair Housing Group asked Council to resume consideration of a proposal for a Human Relations Advisory Board. The group pointed out that the original proposal had been presented over a year ago, and that subsequently, at a public hearing, the Council had decided to take the matter under consideration.

It also was pointed out that at least two cases of alleged discriminatory practices within the city limits of Greenbelt have been taken before the Prince George's Human Relations Committee. A local board might have avoided the necessity of taking the cases out of the city for deliberation and discussion, Herling stated.

After discussing the letter, Council agreed to hold a special meeting to consider the establishment of a Human Relations Advisory Board on Monday, Dec. 14, at the municipal building.

Clubhouse Renovation

A request from an art instructor to renovate the Athletic Clubhouse behind St. Hugh's school and perhaps make use of it to instruct youngsters in art, was discussed. It was brought out that the Lions Club and a few other organizations have expressed their interest in using the building also. After discussion, Council was of the opinion that the Youth Center, built expressly for the youth of Greenbelt, price exceeding \$150,000, should be the location for youth ac-

City Christmas Tree To Be Set Up Dec. 18

City workmen, under the direction of Albert "Buddy" Attick, Director of the Department of Public Works, were busy Monday setting Greenbelt's Christmas tree in place in front of the municipal building.

The tree, a Norwegian Spruce, is approximately 20 feet tall, and had been growing near the old city warehouse - a location that is scheduled to be cleared in the near future by the State Roads Commission.

The tree will be decorated with colored lights, to be lit Dec. 18th after Santa's arrival in the Center. For the past few years, a tree-

shaped string of lights, in lieu of a tree, had been erected on the roof of the old city offices.

Police Officers Graduate From Training Courses

Officer John W. Pugh, Jr. has completed a four-week course on law enforcement conducted by the Maryland State Police Training Academy. Officer Pugh scored high on his examinations, and was in the upper ten of his class of thirty-six students.

This four-week, full-time course is, according to City Manager James Giese, one of the best basic courses available. Giese hopes that eventually all new Greenbelt nolice officers will graduate from this course It is the city's practice to give new policemen some-onthe- job experience first, in the belief that they will then be in a position to profit more from the in-

tivities. It was further suggested that the Athletic Clubhouse might be used for adult functions, Manager Giese was instructed to investigate the condition of the building and attempt an estimate of the cost for repairs. Among the problems which exist now are a furnace which is in need of repair or replacement, broken windows, need for cleaning and painting, and improved lighting, and a faulty sewage.

Ordinance System

Two ordinances were approved at the meeting. The first was an ordinance which prohibits parking on the east side of that portion of Edmonston Road between Greenbelt Road and Springhill Drive having concrete curbs and gutters; providing that parking will be permissible on the side having the gravel shoulder. Greenbelt police officers will issue warning tickets for violations of the ordinance during the thirty-day period after the ordinance is in effect, if the violation is a first offense.

A request for special exception for the purposes of rezoning a portion of land adjacent to the miniature golf course at the Beltway Shopping Center was discussed. Council agreed to write a letter to the County Commissioners advising them of the existing traffic conditions in that area and that, since the State Roads Commission has offered to install a light in that area, the application should be denied until such time as the light is installed.

Other Agenda Items

The city manager will advertise in the News Review for applicants to fill vacancies on various Advisory Boards. Council will discuss appointments to the boards at their meeting on Jan. 11.

Construction of a Lakewood Park path and a pathway from Northway to Lakewood are the next projects to be considered, as funds become available.

Mayor Edgar Smith has requested a report from the Recreation Department and the Recreation Advisory Board concerning recent vandalism to the Youth Center. These reports are expected by the second Council meeting in January. City employees, if non-essential to the time period, will be given time off starting at noon on the eve of Christmas and New Year's. Those who are essential to the efficient operations of the city will be given time off later.

CURTAIN RISES TONIGHT

The Greenbelt Players tonight will present the first of three performances of "Witness for the Prosecution" at the Center School at 8 p.m. The Recreation Department, which is sponsoring the play, hopes for a large audience at each show. This is the first professionally-produced major theatrical production in Greenbelt for many years, and a full season of plays and musical comedies is planned if this first venture is a success.

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

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
