CFPG Discusses School Site and Charlestowne Covenants

The senior high school site question and the repudiation of the covenants by developer Charles Bresler on the 50-acre Charlestowne tract occupied most of the attention of the Steering Committee of the Citizens for a Planned Greenbelt at its meeting on Tuesday.

The committee will make an evaluation of the school site matter to determine if any further action should be taken. In addition, it voted to reply to State Superintendent Dr. James A. Sensenbaugh's letter of March 22, 1966, in which he stated that the parcel 2 site (next to the sanitary land fill) was acceptable. He cited as one of the influencing factors in the decision that "future projections of highways and access streets indicate that the three-school complex will be served equally well (as the Beltway-Lake site)."

The committee pointed out that many obstacles stood in the way of the development of a perimeter road, for example (1) estimated costs would run up to a million dollars, (2) the school board has indicated many times that they would not pay for any off-site roads, (3) the city of Greenbelt is financially unable to bear the cost of the road and (4) complicated negotiations with property owners for rights of ways and dedications would be necessary. As one committee member stated, "The road is merely a line on a map and the prospects of its becoming a reality are so dim that it can hardly be considered a factor in determining the location of the senior high school."

County Budget to Go Up! May use 1% Local Income Tax

Prince Georges County fiscal officials presented a \$121.9 million budget to the county commissioners last week for fiscal year 1966-67, representing a proposed increase of \$25.8 million. If approved in its entirety, the real estate tax rate would be increased 64 cents per \$100 of assessed valuation. The present tax rate is \$2.79.

Instead of raising the real estate tax, by the full 64 cents the county commissioners have the alternative of using a newly-authorized local income tax which was passed last week by the state legislature. The so-called "local option" law allows the county, if it chooses, to impose a 1 percent levy on income and earnings of local residents. Such a tax would raise about \$8 million annually.

Largest single item in the proposed spending program is the school board's \$74.7 million, up \$16.4 million from last year. There is also an increase of \$2.4 million in debt retirement, most of it for schools.

Other large increases included a jump of \$708,000 for highways, \$1.5 million for the county police department, \$845,000 for the health department, and \$642,000 for libraries.

The county's assessable tax base is now a record \$1.8 billion, up \$250 million this year. The present real estate tax would produce about \$50.2 million in revenue, leaving \$11.5 million to be raised through higher real estate taxes, a local income tax, or both. The rest of the budget will be met through revenues from State and Federal grants plus shared taxes.

Public hearings on the budget have been set for 8 p.m. April 14 at the County Service Building in Hyattsville and 10 a.m. April 19 in the courthouse at Upper Marlboro.

Charlestowne Covenants

Former Councilman Lewis Bernstein, traced the history of the covenants, which restricts the density on the Charlestowne tract to 7 units per acre, from the time they were drawn up in 1962 to the present day. He especially drew attention to the City Council meeting of May 17, 1965 when Bresler denied reports that he was planning a 470-unit development in Charlestowne Village in violation of covenants limiting the development to 350 units. Bresler did not inform the council that eleven months earlier, on June 2, 1964, he had unilaterally abolished the covenants. Bresler also stated at that meeting that he would deed the 3.3 acres of parkland (1962 agreement) to the city within four or five months, an action that still has not taken place.

The steering committee supported the city's efforts to halt the construction of an 8-story apartment on the Charlestowne tract which according to city officials would be a clear violation of both the agreement and covenant that Bresler signed with the city in 1962.

Harold Siegel was elected chairman of the CFPG steering committee. Other officers are Thomas White, vice - chairman, Marge Bergemann, secretary, and Harvey Geller, treasurer.

1965 Labor Day Profits

Victor M. Fisher, Treasurer of the 1965 Greenbelt Labor Day Festival Committee, has submitted a final report to the Committee which shows that the organizations which participated realized an estimated net total of \$1261.59. The Committee grossed \$1200.55 and after disbursing money to cover expenses, an estimated \$447.88 was declared profit. Copies of the Financial report are available at Twin Pines on request.

At the present time, the Committee is considering several suggestions as to disposition of the money declared profit. It will be used in a way which will most benefit the residents of Greenbelt. An announcement will be made when a decision is reached.

GHI Elections May 18, 19; Four Vacancies on Board

Four positions on the 9-man Greenbelt Homes, Inc. board of directors will be filled at the election to be held in conjunction with the GHI annual membership meeting, Wednesday and Thursday, May 18 and 19. The meeting on Wednesday night will be held at the Center School, starting at 8 p.m. Balloting will begin that night and resume the next day. Terms of office are for two years. A 3-man audit committee will also be elected for 1-year terms.

Three of the four incumbents on the board have indicated their intent to run for re-election. They are Nat Shinderman, Steve Polaschik, and Josephine Seay. The fourth incumbent—Ed Burgoon—has declined to run because of pressure of business. Burgoon has served on the board for 14 years, 7 as GHI president.

George Adams, Chairman of the Nominations and Elections Committee, has announced the names of three other individuals seeking board seats. They are Sam Schwimer, 45-M Ridge; Miss Katherine Keene, 6-H Hillside; and Cliff Simonson, 8-C Ridge.

Also announced by the committee were two candidates for audit committee: Norman B. Charles, 2-D Gardenway, and Seymour Kaplan, 71-H Ridge. Kaplan is a present member of the audit committee.

GHI members interested in running for the board or audit committee are asked to contact any member of the Nominations Committee or the GHI office to pick up a Candidate's Consent Form. Other members of the Nominations Committee in addition to Adams (474-9263), are Elizabeth Allen (474-4963), Andrew Feeney (474-6051), Richard Gramm (474-8383) and Thomas White (474-6440).

The Candidate's Consent Form should be completed as soon as possible and no later than Saturday, May 7, accompanied by a short biographical sketch of 200 words or less, outlining education, experience, family background, and other pertinent information.

Board members receive a salary of \$500 per year and officers \$750. In addition, board members are eligible to participate in GHI's group life, hospital, surgical, and major medical expense plan for its employees. The insurance plan is jointly financed with GHI paying 65 percent of the cost.

Eyes Are For Seeing

During the month of April in 1956, Dr. Harry J. King a leading ophthalmologist in the metropolitan area of Washington, D.C. was invited to be the guest speaker at a luncheon meeting of the Georgetown, D. C. Lions Club.

Dr. King's subject, "The Need for An Eye Bank and Research Foundation in the Washington, D.C. Area," so fascinated the Lions who heard him that they felt compelled to do something about it.

The District 22-C Eye Bank and Research Foundation then founded by the Lions since that time has processed over 5,000 eyes for use throughout the world. During the 10 years of operation, more than 25,000 eye pledges have been obtained by Lions of District 22-C.

Ten years later during the month of April 1966 the Lions of District 22-C will ask for all our used eyeglasses to be sent to Chile. The Lions Club of Chile are presently distributing 500 pairs of glasses a month.

The Lions of Greenbelt urge the citizens of this City to support the work of their local eye-bank by donating all their old eyeglasses. Collection points will be located at Twin Pines Savings and Loan Association and Greenbelt Homes, Inc. during April.

Arts and Craft Guild Exhibit at Twin Pines

Twin Pines is currently host to an art exhibit done by students of the Greenbelt Arts and Crafts Guild's Wednesday classes. The exhibit consists of 36 selections representing some of the material studied during the last four sessions.

The exhibit is broken down into three categories. One, the Color and Design Emphasis consisting of several selections, includes a good example of a color-tissue montage. The selection entitled Studies, Paintings and Abstracts from Nature demonstrates the relationship between abstracts made using primarily vertical and horizontal lines and the natural scenery. Figure Drawings, done for the most part in from 3 to 30 minutes, show how the artist's imagination can visualize a given motif from an ordinary model's pose.

The tuition cost is payable in five installments. The first installment, which is payable at the time of registration on April 22, will be refunded if any parent wishes to withdraw the child during the summer. Enrollment is limited to 25 children in each class.

Interviewer Needed To Take Surveys

The U. S. Census Bureau is expanding its field staff and is in need of a permanent part-time interviewer to conduct regular monthly surveys in Prince Georges County and surrounding areas.

These surveys, which give a monthly picture of the nation's economic and social characteristics, are the Monthly Retail Trade Survey, involving interviews with business establishments in selected areas, and the Survey on Employment, involving interviews with households in selected areas.

Applicants must be high school graduates, permanent resident of Hyattsville and Greenbelt, Maryland, or the immediate vicinity. A car is necessary. From 50 to 80 hours may be expected each month. Selectee will be thoroughly trained at Philadelphia in procedures and techniques of interviewing and will be paid for training. Persons interested in full-time work should not apply.

Who Is Responsible?

To the Editor:

I live on Plateau Place where there are two playgrounds in the vicinity for our children. One is on the corner of Ridge rd. and Plateau place. This playground is right on a main street, without any protection to stop young children from running into traffic. It is a beautiful playground, equipment kept up, playgrounds sodded, in perfect condition for children; for children above the age of six.

The second playground is located between 2 court and 8 court, completely off the street. A very good location for what should have been a perfect playground. But a more blighted area cannot be found here in Greenbelt. All children in this area, from age 2 up, spend most of their play hours here.

The swings in this playground are in good condition, but nothing else is. Of course, the holes beneath the swings, that fill up with water causing muck, we won't talk about. The sliding board is dented and rusted. Unusable, to say the least. But the grounds - these are the worst.

Within the play area, there is nothing but dust upon dust, with tree roots coming through the ground as in an army bivouac area, some as high as 6 inches off the ground, all due to erosion. Our children play among these roots, tripping, cutting and bruising themselves.

Why is this? Because no one can solve the problem. No new soil can be added because it, too, would wash away. Asphalt cannot be laid, because it would kill the trees. Sod could be laid down but no organization in Greenbelt claims to own the playground. Therefore, who would pay for it or lay it?

So we're back where we started. This is not a personal problem but one that belongs to a community, a community of children whose needs are not heard and apparently not heeded.

IT'S THE LAW

The city ordinance calls for a 25 mile-per-hour speed limit unless otherwise posted. At present, the only area posted for a higher speed is Greenbelt Rd. All residential areas have a speed limit of 25 m.p.h. The maximum penalty for exceeding this limit is \$50 fine or 30 days in the county jail.
