Special City Registration For Voters August 3 at SHL

A special city voter registration will be held on Saturday, August 3, at the Springhill Lake Community Center from 10 a.m. to 7 p.m. in coordination with a special county election registration. Although the next general election for City Council will not be held until September 1969, there is a possibility of a city referendum on capital improvements this fall.

To vote in a city election, one must be age 21 and a resident of Greenbelt for six months. To register to vote for county, state and national elections, one must have lived in the State one year and the county six months; one must also be 21 years old by election day. Residents are reminded to send a change of address to the Prince Georges Board of Supervisors of Elections at the Court House in Upper Marlboro if they have moved from one precinct to another.

Voting registrars in Prince Georges County have set special times and places for residents to register before the August 12 deadline for the September 10 primaries for senator and congressman. In this area, registration centers are located at Capital Plaza and Prince Georges Plaza; hours are from 4 p.m. to 9 p.m. on Thursdays and Fridays, and 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. on Saturdays. The Board of Supervisors will hold extended office hours from 8:30 a.m. to 9 p.m. Monday through Friday, through August 12. The office is in the County Courthouse in Upper Marlboro - telephone 627-3000.

Greenbelt's Chief Judges are: Republican, Ada Snyder - Democrat, Belva Weisel - third precinct; Republican, Elizabeth Maffay - Democrat, Peg Baldwin - sixth precinct; Republican, John Cassidy - Democrat, Deanne Peltin - eighth precinct. Democratic precinct chairmen are: Francis White, third; Edgar Smith, sixth; Tom Dugan, eighth. Republican precinct chairmen are Bill Barbour, third; Glayde Goodenough, sixth; and Mike Gendel, eighth.

Ex-Councilman Cliff Simonson Moving to Illinois

When Clifford Simonson moves to DeKalb, Illinois, in August to take up a new position as Associate Professor of Physical Geography at Northern Illinois University, he will leave behind a long record of public-spirited community participation in Greenbelt. A former city councilman and member of the Board of Directors of Greenbelt Homes, Inc., Simonson was also an original member of the Advisory Planning Board. As chairman of the Subcommittee on Planning, he made a major contribution to the early development of the city's master plan.

Both Simonson and his wife, Evelyn, have been active in the Community Church and the Center School and Junior High School PTAs. Mrs. Simonson has also been a 4-H leader for nine years.

The Simonsons, who have lived at 8-C Ridge for the eleven and a half years that they have resided in Greenbelt, have five children - twins Laura and Linda, Jenny, Carl, and Judy. Laura will enter the University of Minnesota this fall, and Linda has received a scholarship for study at Stephens College, Columbia, Mo. Jenny, who will enter 10th grade in the fall, follows the record of her older sisters as a 4-H winner. On Friday, July 26, she won the District Championship (a five-county area) for her demonstration project in clothing.

City Notes

The coolest place in town on the recent dog days has been the city's dog pens—that is the assessment of Public Works Director Albert S. ("Buddy") Attick. The dog pens, which are built off the ground like rabbit hutches, and which are shaded by vines and low bushes and trees near the municipal warehouse buildings, were 5 to 10 degrees cooler than various other shaded places around the city, as recorded by thermometer, Attick said. The question arose when an interested citizen expressed concern for the impounded animals during the heat wave. In fact, only the morning sun reaches the animals, since the cages face east. There are six individual pens, each about 24 by 30 inches. All were freshly painted last week.

Painting of line markings around the city continues. One regular Public Works employee plus two summer workers have been marking off parking spaces throughout the center, as well as painting curbs and pavements in front of fire hydrants. In addition, they marked parking spaces in the newly paved lot behind the firehouse. This lot, which was paved by an outside contractor, received a four-inch base only. A further 2-inch topping will be applied next year. Since a new type of construction was utilized, in which the asphalt is poured directly over a clay base, it was felt wise to see how the paving weathered before applying the final layer.

The Parks crew have been trimming grass and pruning trees. They also have mulched the large area around the concession stand at the lake with a wood chip mixture. This mulch was acquired from a contractor who has been doing pruning for Pepco. The city will in the future be making its own mulch, after acquisition of a chipper machine. Since the county ordinance went into effect, prohibiting the burning off of brush and trees, woody wastes are being increasingly disposed of in the form of chopped up material suitable for mulch.

Work on the new municipal services building progresses. Two end walls have been completed, as well as most of the underground plumbing work. Bricklayers will return to build the side walls after some prior steel work is completed.

Parade

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Public Hearing to be Held On Firearm Ordinances

Amid concern that proposed ordinances to register and license firearms would be ineffective if passed, the Prince Georges County Commissioners voted 3-2 this week to hold a public hearing on the measures at 10:00 a.m. Tuesday, September 3rd, at the Upper Marlboro Courthouse.

Stressing that their action was "not necessarily a sign of support" the Board majority went along with Commission Chairman Gladys Spellman who declared "we feel we should do all we can do, and certainly must provide residents of the County to express themselves on this question."

The ordinances modeled after those drafted by the Metropolitan Washington Council of Governments, would require all firearms to be registered, both handguns and rifles and shotguns, as well as for licensing of the long guns.

Hanoi Shows Restraint

When President Johnson announced that he had ordered curtailment of the bombing of North Vietnam last March 31 as a step toward peace, he declared: "Even this very limited bombing of the North could come to an early end—if our restraint is matched by restraint in Hanoi." During the past month there have been a number of signs that Hanoi not only has matched American restraint but has gone considerably further than the United States toward de-escalating the war.

The number of American combat missions flown against North Vietnam actually has increased since the President limited the area of attack. Defense Secretary Clark M. Clifford said recently that "concentration of our efforts on a more limited target has in some respects produced more dividends and rewards than if the bombing were spread over a larger area." The Allies have continued to reinforce and re-equip their forces and have followed what American officers have described as a "fight hard" strategy. On the other side, however, according to official American sources:

The rate of infiltration has dropped to approximately the pre-March 31 rate in the past two months and is perhaps much lower.

One-quarter to one-third of the estimated 80,000 North Vietnamese main-force troops in the South have been pulled back across the border.

Enemy forces have sought to avoid combat, leading one American officer to comment a few days ago: "We can't find the war. We can't find the enemy."

The number of terrorist attacks has dropped sharply, to less than one-half the recent weekly figure.

American casualties have dropped substantially.

Rocket and mortar attacks against Saigon have been suspended for more than a month and enemy forces threatening the capital have been withdrawn.

In the face of this amazing transformation, it is puzzling that Presidents Johnson and Thieu should have concluded in their Honolulu communique that "there had been no response to the major limitation of bombing put into effect on March 31." The explanation of American officials has been that the enemy is merely regrouping for further assaults.

This may be true. But it is inevitably a self-fulfilling prophecy since the other side obviously cannot afford to remain passive for long in the fact of the persistent buildup and aggressive posture of allied forces. The only way to test the authenticity of Hanoi's apparent restraint is to stop the bombing as the President has indicated he would do.
