300 SHL Voters Register; County Deadline Aug. 12

Approximately 300 residents of Springhill Lake were put on the city voter books as a result of the special registration session at the SHL Community Center on August 3. In part the high registration for the city election was attributed to its coordination with registration for the county and State election in this presidential election year.

Although the next general election for City Council will not be held until September 1969, there is a possibility of a city referendum on capital improvements this fall.

There is still time for city residents to register to vote for county, state and national elections. To be eligible, one must have lived in the State one year and the county six months; one must also be 21 years old by election day. Residents are reminded to send a change of address to the Prince Georges Board of Supervisors of Elections at the Court House in Upper Marlboro if they have moved from one precinct to another.

NOTICE

Names of Greenbelt residents who have lost their voting privileges in county, state, and national elections are posted on a list at Twin Pines. The list includes those who have failed to vote in preceding elections and those who have failed to register after changing address.

Anyone in doubt concerning his registration status should be sure to check the list.

Voting registrars in Prince Georges County have set special times and places for residents to register before the August 12 deadline for the September 10 primaries for senator and congressman. In this area, registration centers are located at Capital Plaza and Prince Georges Plaza; hours are from 4 p.m. to 9 p.m. on Thursdays and Fridays, and 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. on Saturdays. The Board of Supervisors will hold extended office hours from 8:30 a.m. to 9 p.m. Monday through Friday, through August 12. The office is in the County Courthouse in Upper Marlboro - telephone 627-3000.

City Notes

An application of the Greenbelt Sports Center, Inc., Agent, for permission to operate a Recreational Establishment of a Commercial Nature (Indoor Archery Range-Bowling Alley) at 121 Centerway (lower level of the Co-op Food Store) will be presented at a special exception hearing before the Prince Georges County Commissioners on Wednesday, August 21, at 1:30 p.m. at the Court House in Upper Marlboro.

The Public Works Dept. has completed a paved pathway from the foot of Maplewood Ct. to the property line at the lake. The path is 4 feet wide and 120 feet long. Since it must pass over a steep bank near the lake, shallow steps made from railroad ties were set into place.

The line crew worked most of last week on marking off parking spaces along city streets in Springhill Lake. They also marked off parking spaces along Westway in University Square.

The Parks Crew continue with grass cutting, but as if they did not have enough of that job, they also planted new grass throughout the new filled area behind the dam at the lake.

New County Pupils Urged to Register

Students who have moved into Prince Georges County during the summer months and will be attending county public schools in September are urged to register during the remaining weeks prior to the opening of schools after Labor Day.

Parents are requested to contact the schools which their children will attend to validate the specific time when appropriate school personnel will be available for early registration. In most secondary schools, counselors are on duty in the guidance offices during the summer months so that educational programs can be planned and registration procedures completed prior to the beginning of the school term.

The opening day of school for pupils is Tuesday, September 3.

Minimum Size Change For Industrial Parks

A reduction in minimum size for any planned industrial park in Prince Georges County from 50 to five acres was voted last week by the County Commissioners.

The so-called I-3 zone was amended to effect the reduction after the Commissioners were advised that the year-old ordinance had failed to draw in desired space-age and other light industrial users as planned, because of the large minimum acreage previously demanded.

A further amendment to I-3 adopted today also reduces the maximum set-back rules from 200 to 50 feet from any boundary or lot in residential zones.

For added farm flavor, judging will include open and closed greatest swine, Ayrshire dairy cattle, and Hereford beef cattle. There will be a tractor-driving contest by volunteer firemen, 4-H horse show, a dog show, a model rocketry demonstration, a bicycle rodeo.

In the Firemen and Floats Parade the hook and ladder boys will show off their spit and polish in the big Sunday afternoon extravaganza.

There will also be a number of educational and commercial displays offering the services of County agencies, business firms and service clubs. Fifty-five displays are in the fold, with some room left for those wanting in. All private and commercial exhibitors are asked by the County Commissioners to get their requests in now.

There are well-founded rumors making the Courthouse rounds that Carlton Sickles, Hervey Machen, Fred Wineland, Larry Hogan (pulling to the right) and Harold Stassen have challenged the County Commissioners (Commissioner Francois anchor man) to a tug-of-war at the Fairgrounds with the winner awarded the latest Louis Goldstein treasury surplus prediction. Governor Spiro Agnew, it is reported, will be a partial referee in the match.

Oh well. There always will be the fine print, "Void where prohibited by law," and we are sure such games will be illegal in Mary-

Bid opening On I-95

Bids were opened on August 8 by the State Roads Commission on the remaining portion of construction of Interstate Route 95 between the Baltimore City limits and the Capital Beltway (Interstate-495) in Prince Georges County. The total cost of I-95 will be an estimated \$77.5 million and the eight lane expressway is expected to be open to the public in late 1970.

The final road section will involve 4.2 miles of I-95 between the Patuxent River and a point north of Van Dusen Road in Prince Georges County. Advertising of bids began on July 11th. The project is being funded under the Federal-Aid Interstate Highway System, which absorbs 90 percent of the total cost. Contracts on Interstate I-95 in Howard County and the 7 interchanges between the Baltimore Beltway (I-595) have already been awarded.

In Prince Georges County and among the largest and costliest of the Road Construction Projects, according to the State Roads Commission, is a 2.7 miles of dual highway, from a point northeast of Old Gunpowder Road to a point southwest of Cherry Hill Road, including interchange ramps and connecting roads. Wright Contracting Co., the low bidder, was awarded a contract in the amount of \$9,385,182. The project cost represents the largest single bid ever received for a State highway project, with the exception of toll facilities.

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How to Propagate Ornamental Plants

Now's the time to start propagating ornamental plants, such as azaleas, forsythia, weigelia and other related shrubs, advises Francis R. Gouin, University of Maryland horticulturist.

First select the strongest and most vigorous shoots. Then cut a stem of from 4 to 6 inches long taken from the top 4-6 inches of each shoot.

Take cuttings in the early morning when plants are turgid to insure success in rooting. Then immediately place the cuttings in water until you are ready to place them in the propagating structure.

One of the easiest ways to propagate them is to place 4 to 6 inches of sand in the bottom of a large plastic turkey bag. Then stick the cuttings about 1 inch into the sand. After all the cuttings are in place, moisten the sand thoroughly and seal the opening of the bag. Place the bag near a window facing north, or in the shade, and ventilate the bag periodically each day.

August 24 Deadline for P.G. College Admission

Prince George's Community College will close off admission for the fall semester on August 24.

In view of the rapidly approaching deadline, applications for fall admissions are flooding into the college at the rate of more than 100 per week. More than 2500 new students have already been admitted, almost 900 more than were admitted to Prince George's Community College by this date last year.

The college's admissions office will be open Saturday, August 24, from 9 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. to accept last minute applications. However, all admissions requirements of the college for testing and credentials must be met by that date.

Watch Out For That Sun

Every year people spend hour after hot hour basking in the sun with great pleasure and little thought of risking skin cancer.

Skin cancer, if anyone happens to think of it, (it's really too hot to think), may happen to George - never to me - is the general care-free attitude of most, yet every year some 105,000 people in the United States develop skin cancer - and about 5,000 die of it.

These deaths seem the most pitiful of all because most of them could so easily be prevented. Most skin cancers are caused by over-exposure to the sun and wind. Showing a little sense, such as putting on a shirt with long sleeves, a wide-brimmed hat, using lotions or creams to filter out rays should be common practice, but only too often isn't. Fair-haired and fair-skinned people are particularly vulnerable to sun rays.

Skin cancer is readily detectable. A blemish that won't disappear within two weeks, a change in a wart or mole, a tendency to bleed or darken - all these are tell-tale signs and should be looked at by your doctor as soon as possible.
