Personnel Increase, Equipment Raise Police Budget Request

A police department budget calling for expenditures of \$208,000 in fiscal year 1970 — an increase of \$50,000 over the amount appropriated for the current year 1969 — was reviewed by city council on Thursday, May 15. Council will next review the recreation budget on Monday, May 26.

The major issue in the police budget is the addition of three police officers, bringing the force to a total of 17. The additional men, Police Chief William Lane said, would be used to beef up the 11 p.m. to 7 a.m. shift so that there would be three men on duty instead of two. These are the hours, Lane added, during which much of the auto thefts and larcenies occur. Since the budget also proposes the creation of a detective corporal position, one of the three additional policemen would be used to replace the man becoming the detective.

The last expansion of the police department took place two years ago when one man was added. City manager James Giese pointed out that during the past three years the city's population has increased by 35 percent. Even with the addition of three new policemen, the police force will only have risen 29 percent during the three-year period. He stressed the fact that the demands on the police department are directly related to the city's population.

About one-third of any new police department expenditures will be reimbursed as a State grant for improved police protection.

The creation of a detective position was justified on the grounds that many investigations need continuity. At present, Giese said, the officer originally handling the complaint is expected to conduct any follow-up investigation. This has necessitated overtime work in many instances and has frequently resulted in slow and sporadic investigation, as normal patrol duties interfered.

The 1970 budget calls for additional equipment, including a new squad car and tape recorder system. The later, which would cost \$1,400, would be used to record interrogations and for dictation and transcribing of police officers' reports. Portable units would be carried in each car so that reports could be dictated at the scene of the crime or accident. This would eliminate the need for an officer to return to the station to write up his report.

Another capital outlay item (\$700) would be the relocation of the radio base station and antenna from the city offices to the water tower on Ridge Road. This is the highest point in the city and would provide for better radio reception.

Other new equipment includes two emergency generators (\$600) and new file cabinets and counter (\$500).

City Notes

Drag lines were operated last week to enlarge the settling basin below Olivewood Ct. on the inlet to the lake. A new basin was also dug near the peninsula end of the lake behind the Pepco substation. This basin will trap silt from the stream that flows down from the Lakewood subdivision. The idea of constructing another basin on the stream from Braden Field was abandoned because too many trees would have to be destroyed in order to make room for it. Instead, the city plans to build at least two small dams along the stream to achieve the effect of silt basins. Both new silt basins will be surrounded by protective fences to keep neighborhood children safe.

\$64,487 is the price tag for construction of a new access ramp for southbound right-turn traffic from Kenilworth Ave. into Edmonston Rd. The new road will be immediately adjacent to Greenbelt Rd.

The contract, which was let by the State Roads Commission recently, was awarded to Regal Construction Co. of Upper Marlboro. Work is expected to begin soon.

First to take advantage of a new policy by the U. S. Civil Service Commission which makes available federal training courses to employees of other governmental agencies was Mrs. Mabel Kandler. City Treasurer, Mrs. Kandler recently completed a course in Automated Data Processing. She reports that it was very worthwhile.

With the back hoe, the Public Works Dept. was able to excavate the ditch running alongside Braden Field down to the original paving stones. Over the years the ditch has silted over. The new, deeper channel should help to eliminate flooding of the playing field after heavy rains.

Another clean-up job was to clear out a stopped storm sewer on Empire Place, where willow tree roots had plugged the line. The city crew also repaired the electrical line to the bandstand.

The major Public Works project last week was concentrated at the bay end of the lake near Olivewood Ct. Piles of dirt on the west shore left from the dredging last fall were removed from near the bases of trees and used to fill a low area at the west corner of the bay near the drainage pipes. The opposite corner, which was redesigned and rounded off last fall, was fine-graded and seeded. The riprap wall forming the boundary of the lake was also repaired and rebuilt.

City officials have noted that the lake water so far is noticeably cleaner than in previous summers. This is attributed to the small amount of rain that has fallen this spring, so that little wash-down of soil has been carried into the lake. The construction of the silt basin and seeding by the city of the area along Lakecrest Drive near the tennis courts and by the developer of Charlestowne Village of the previously barren area along Prince James Way, where a ball field has been built, may also have cut down on the serious erosion from that end of the lake.

Lange, Chavrid Lead GHI Voting; Schwan, O'Reilly, Smith Returned

Greenbelt Homes, Inc., membership voted in some new blood at last week's board of directors election, but at the same time clung to the tried and true by re-electing the triumvirate of president Charles Schwan, treasurer John O'Reilly, and director James Smith. For Schwan and O'Reilly it was their fourth straight successful contest for the two-year terms on the board, and for Smith, his third.

The two successful newcomers were David Lange and Alex Chavrid, who surprised observers by easily outdistancing the rest of the field. Lange, the top vote-gatherer received 65 percent of the vote. The five incumbent board members finished next behind Lange and Chavrid with only 46 votes separating the five.

The casualties among the incumbents were Josephine Seay and Norman Weyel. Only 7 votes separated Mrs. Seay from fifth-place winner Smith.

The winning candidates now join the present four members of the GHI board — Nat Shinderman, Steve Polaschick, Katherine Keene, and Douglas Hawes — to round out the nine-man board. The organization of the new board and election of officers will take place at the board's regularly scheduled meeting tonight.

Winners in the race for the 3-man audit committee were incumbents Tom White and Janet James, and newcomer Milton Hoffman.

Elected at Wednesday night's meeting to the nominations and elections committee, out of a field of 9 candidates, were George Adams, Darwin Beck, Katherine Foster, Gordon Allen, and David Bridge.

The 485 ballots cast were considerably greater than last year's total of 371, but were not as high as the 585 cast in the 1967 election. Three proxy votes were cast. There are about 1,500 eligible GHI voters.

By-law Changes

The 150 members who attended Wednesday night's meeting approved without change by-law amendments proposed by the GHI board. There was little discussion or controversy, as the by-law changes were mainly designed to clarify existing provisions and to bring others into conformity with corporation policies and practices that have developed over the years.

Easily defeated were amendments proposed from the floor to permit open hearings for persons facing termination of contract and to limit the veto power of the membership with respect to increases of 10 percent or more in monthly operating payments.

Questions

As a departure from previous years, the format of the Wednesday evening meetings was changed in that the annual reports of the corporation's officers were mailed to the members beforehand. Instead, the major part of the meeting was devoted to a question and answer period.

The result was a series of provocative and sometimes hostile questions directed to the chair. Some of the questions and the answers provided by the chair were:

"Was the recent increase in the assessment of GHI property due to the new townhouses?" (Ans. No. The houses have not yet been built and therefore could not have been considered by the county assessor's office.)

"Isn't the decline in the cash balance of the corporation a dangerous situation?" (Ans. The cash balance is a fluctuating item and therefore not as important as the equity situation and in that respect the GHI position is good.)

"What will happen if the new townhouses can't find buyers?" (Ans. The membership may be asked to open the lists to non-members.)

"What is going to happen to the \$282,500 capital improvements program?" (Ans. If satisfactory financing cannot be obtained, the program may be scaled down. Alternate financing methods now be-

ing considered are sale of debentures, mortgaging GDC apartments and a bank loan.)

Also getting caught up in the whirlwind was a request by Mat Amberg for an apology from the chair, which he got, with respect to some harsh words that were spoken at the special membership meeting of December 1968. As further evidence that GHI members have memories like elephants, a change in the minutes of that meeting was voted, 35 to 30, to record the statement of GHI president Schwan that "the initiation of construction of the 25 townhouses, opposite the North End School, may be postponed because financing conditions are not favorable" and that "this news was received with a burst of applause." Also the minutes were amended to record the fact that the board had threatened at the December meeting to resign if certain on-the-spot proposals made from the floor were approved by the membership.

Audit Committee Report

The Audit Committee through chairman Tom White gave a report which commended the financial position of the corporation and the operating of certain committees such as the landscape committee. It felt that membership-management communications could use improvement and suggested that the working capital assessment be based on the market value of the home instead of the book value.

In another connection, White later proposed that the agenda for the next membership meeting include a proposal to raise the pay of the board of directors. He suggested a raise from the present \$750 a year to \$1,000 for officers and from \$500 to \$750 for other board members. This resolution to consider the item at the next membership meeting was approved.

Resolutions

Other resolutions approved included one commending GHI for the tremendous amount of aid provided disaster victims during the recent fire and another proposed by Amberg to instruct the board to set up a committee to investigate local environmental effects of a nuclear plant on the Chesapeake.

A resolution submitted by Mary Ford to purchase a tape recorder for GHI board meetings and executive session was voted down. Another resolution to substitute mail ballots for the present system of voting was ruled out of order since this would require a by-law change.
