City To Elect New Council Next Tuesday, September 18

About 2,000 Greenbelters are expected to trek to the polls next Tuesday, September 18, to cast their votes for the five city council members who will head the municipal government for the next two years. The three polling places at the Greenbelt Municipal Building (3rd precinct), North End Elementary School (6th precinct), and the Springhill Lake Community Center (8th precinct) will be open from 7 a.m. to 8 p.m.

Four of the five incumbents are seeking re-election: Mayor Richard Pilski, Charles Schwan, Elizabeth Maffay, and Gil Weidenfeld. Eight other candidates are competing for the spots: John Bogumill, Fred Ford, William McCarthy, Vincent Palacino, Richard Castaldi, Michael Burchick, James O'Sullivan, and Thomas X. White. Biographies of the candidates appear on page 4.

Election Procedures

All council members are elected at large. In order for a candidate to be elected, he must receive 40 percent or more of the votes cast. If fewer than five candidates receive such a vote, a run-off election will be held one week later on Tuesday, September 25.

In the run-off election, the ballot will consist of those unsuccessful candidates receiving the highest number of votes, up to twice as many names as there are positions to be filled. Candidates polling the greatest number of votes are declared winners in the run-off election, regardless of the percentage of votes received.

The 40-percent requirement for election was introduced in 1967. Prior to that a majority vote was required, usually resulting in run-off elections. Since 1967, no run-offs have taken place, though many observers believe that the large number of candidates this year will require a run-off.

Each voter is entitled to vote for five candidates. Voting for fewer than five obviously increases the possibility of a run-off election.

Registration Count

The number of Greenbelters registered to vote is 3,568, not much changed from the 3,433 registered in 1971. Only 53 percent of the voters cast ballots in 1971, with the highest percentages registered in North End (61%) and Center (59%).

This year the Center precinct has 1,297 registrants; the North End precinct, 1,274; and the Springhill Lake precinct, 997. The Springhill Lake registration has dropped considerably from its 1971 total when it surpassed the other two precincts.

If all five council members are elected September 18, there will be an organizational meeting on Monday, September 24. (This meeting is set by charter.)

Upon being sworn in, the newly-elected council members will choose the mayor. Although the charter is silent on this point, past councils have generally chosen the top vote-gatherer.

Adult Education Holds Registration Sept. 17

Registration for Prince Georges County public schools' Adult Continuing Education Program will be held on Monday, September 17, 1973, between 7 and 9 p.m. at 29 centers throughout the county including the Parkdale and Northwestern Senior High Schools.

Enrollment in adult education classes is limited to individuals who are 16 years of age or over and who are not regularly attending a day school program below the college level. Adults must register at the center where they plan to attend classes. There is a registration fee.

New Circulation Manager

James Hilton, 46 Ridge Road, has joined the News Review staff as the new circulation manager, replacing Mrs. Carolyn Rhine who has moved to Indiana.

Lesley Kreimer Wins Easily In Greenbelt

Lesley Kreimer easily led the primary balloting in Greenbelt for a school board seat from the 2nd District. She received 789 votes to 243 for Dolores D. Burcham and 198 for St. Clair Reeves. Altogether, 1,230 persons voted out of 8,521 voters registered in Greenbelt — a 14.4 percent turnout.

Greenbelt's vote represents about 32 percent of the 2nd District total. As this newspaper went to press, Kreimer and Burcham were the two top vote-getters in the entire 2nd District and will compete in the general election on November 6 for a seat on the 9-member school board.

Mrs. Kreimer made her best showing in Springhill Lake, receiving 74 percent of the total vote. She received 68 percent in Center and 54 percent in North End.

Queen Pageant

Miss Kim Nickolson was crowned "Miss Greenbelt" 1973 at the Labor Day Festival. Kim was sponsored by the Greenbelt Little League. Other participants in the Queen Pageant were: first runner-up, Alice Plaster (Ben Franklin); second, Pamela Davis (La Jon's Beauty Shop); third, Kim Robbins (Greenbelt Sports Center); fourth, Robin Corbin (Greenbelt Homes, Inc.). Other participants were: Patsy Fleming (Greenbelt Variety); Brenda Bradford (Beltway Barber Shop); Shirley Clute (Kash Realtor); Robin Tasker (Springhill Lake Community House); Terri Raley (Sonny's Barber Shop) and Julie Sontheimer (Greenbelt Youth Center). The Miss Congeniality award went to Pamela Davis and the Miss Photogenic award to Julie Sontheimer.

ABSENTEE VOTING: Section 7-5 of the Greenbelt City Code provides that any citizen of the city who is a qualified elector of the city and who is registered or has been issued a proper certificate of registration by the city clerk, but who would otherwise be prevented from voting in a general municipal election or run-off election because of absence from the city on the day of election, or because of illness or incapacity, or because of religious precepts or the laws governing the church or religious order of which he may be a member or follower, shall be entitled to vote by absentee ballot.

Voters Get First Hand View Of Candidates

Springhill Lake voters were eagerly wooed at the SHL Civic Association-sponsored candidates' night forum on Wednesday, September 5. City council candidates listed their accomplishments on behalf of Springhill Lake and aspirants promised they would do even more. Actually, there was almost complete agreement among all the 11 candidates present (incumbent Elizabeth Maffay was sick and unable to attend) as to the needs of Springhill Lake.

These included a SHL recreation center building, improved ballfields, an intra-city bus service, pedestrian pathways and bicycle trails over the highways, alleviation of traffic problems (entry and exit to the SHL project), adequate representation on city bodies, and reduction of crime.

SHL Recreation Center

The only SHL item that produced some differences concerned the location of the SHL Recreation Center. Incumbents Charles Schwan and Gil Weidenfeld stressed their vigorous efforts to purchase the SHL golf course with the help of Federal and State funds and to hasten the construction of the Center on the site. Candidate Thomas White, while favoring the Recreation Building, thought it was poor planning to put it on the golf course site, which, he said, is part of a flood plain that should be preserved for its storm water holding capacity. He favored a more centralized location for the building, but didn't specify where.

Mayor Richard Pilski, along with Schwan and Weidenfeld, took pride in the use of Federal revenue-sharing funds to help meet the costs of constructing the SHL Recreation Center as well as the costs of other capital improvements. White, however, favored using the revenue-sharing funds to reduce taxes. The incumbents, in response, pointed out how the city benefited by the use of revenue-sharing funds for capital improvements. Additional bond issue money, they said, is thus released for acquisition of parkland — money which in turn can be stretched to the fullest through matching Federal and State open-space funds.

Candidate Vincent Palacino also warned of the dangers of using Federal revenue-sharing funds for tax reduction purposes or for meeting on-going city programs because of the lack of guarantees that such funds would be forthcoming in future years. Drying up of these funds, he said, would mean heavy tax increases in future years.

City-Wide Issues

Turning to city-wide issues, the candidates showed more divergences, but generally speaking, these differences were more a matter of emphasis than of substance. Candidate Fred Ford, for example, thought the council should spend more time keeping communication channels open with the youth to avoid their alienation. Candidate Richard Castaldi warned of the need to keep a close eye on erosion and other problems that may be created by the development of the Golden Triangle and the SHL industrial tract.

Palacino stressed the need for long-range planning. Candidate James O'Sullivan emphasized the need for open, available, and responsible government (citing his voluntary disclosure of finances). Candidate Michael Burchick pledged to vote the will of the people on important issues.

Several candidates saw an overriding need as that of the council working together to represent all the people and not just particular sections. Making this point were candidates William McCarthy, John Bogumill, Pilski, Ford, and Burchick.

Land Development

One issue that drew response from all candidates was that of future development of Greenbelt and the need to keep controls on developers. McCarthy summed up the general sentiment with a pithy slogan: "A better but not bigger Greenbelt."

Bogumill said that from his observations, developers have county and State laws going for them, but "they won't have Bogumill." Schwan challenged anyone to match his record of keeping developers

under control.

Several candidates saw the problem as being the wrong kind of development. O'Sullivan and Weidenfeld stressed the need for single-family housing. Burchick said that Greenbelt needs housing that young couples can afford. Castaldi said that before any development takes place "we should have adequate facilities" and was seconded by White.

The candidates were on their best behavior. White praised Schwan for his record as a long-time fighter for the city's goals, although adding he felt Schwan's thinking had not kept up with the times. White cited the need for going beyond the master plan to seek reversion of undeveloped land back to original zoning and he thought there might be some virtue in the city seeking its own zoning powers.

Weidenfeld responded that he thought the most feasible way to control undesirable development is for the city to purchase land as open space.

Greenbriar

There were some inevitable questions about Greenbriar. Palacino thought that the council was at fault for not foreseeing the uproar that the Greenbriar issue would create. Ford thought that the Greenbriar issue had had the undesirable effect of diverting council's attention from other problems, especially those of youth.

Pilski was asked to explain his letter to NASA favoring the granting of an easement for the on-site treatment plant. He said that the easement was the last step in a long list of conditions that council had requested the developer to meet. There was nothing in that letter, he said, that had not already appeared as part of a statement to the press he made in February 1972.

Schwan rejoined that there were two aspects of the Pilski letter that the majority of council did not agree with. The statement that "the majority of council are anxious to see the project go forward" and that the Pilski letter reflects "the attitude of a substantial majority of the citizens of Greenbelt."

Intra-City Bus Service

The need for an intra-city bus service connecting SHL with the central core and meeting the need of the elderly won the support of all candidates. Pilski, Schwan, and Weidenfeld pointed to the Federal and State grants the city had received to study the costs and feasibility of a bus service and to plan for its operation.

White and Burchick indicated a desire to dispense with the planning and use the funds to buy a mini-bus now. Schwan pointed out that the city is putting up only \$2,500 of the \$10,000 study and that the \$2,500 wouldn't go far toward meeting the costs of a bus system. All three incumbents agreed that a study was a first necessity.

Pot Shots

The meeting, presided over by moderator John Roth, consisted first of each candidate speaking for five minutes, followed by a question and answer period. The latter produced the usual number of pot shots at the candidates.

Weidenfeld was asked to explain his vote against an anti-busing motion (he considered it improper action to take when the constitutional issue was before the courts); Pilski was asked why he opposed a separate polling place for Springhill Lake four years ago (he said he first wanted to study the need for additional polling places throughout the city); White was asked why the Democratic Club, of which he is president, has held no meetings for two years (he said attendance had been poor, but things would be picking up again next year with the State-wide election).

Tacit Alliance? To the Editor:

I have been reading with growing amazement some of the letters published by the *News Review* in the last three issues. What is going on?

My curiosity was aroused first by Mr. Pilski's letter of August 23, approving the Greenbriar Sewage plant. In it he took to task three council members, presumably Maffay, Schwan and Weidenfeld, for their disavowal of his letter to NASA when it was the fourth, Cohen, who discovered the letter and disclosed it to public scrutiny.
In the same issue Leonard Cohen attacked the entire council majority" and the "four incumbents" the next week, but in his latest letter on September 6, while he continued to charge four with derelictions, he named only Maffay, Schwan, and Weidenfeld, each twice, as being guilty of specific wrongdoings.

In that same issue Mr. White criticized the "four member majority," but likewise gave individual attention to only three, Maffay, Schwan and Weidenfeld, devoting a separate paragraph to each one's transgressions. Also Mrs. Cohen chimed in with a letter criticizing Mr. Weidenfeld for naming his campaign treasurer as an election judge, when in point of fact she never accepted the judgeship.

I have heard many times that politics makes strange bedfellows, but I find it hard to believe that Cohen-White can maintain their credibility and Pilski his if there exists a tacit alliance among them directed against the candidacies of Maffay, Schwan and Weidenfeld.

"Confused" To the Editor:

I get confused every time I read one of Leonard Cohen's letters. To take the latest.

He denounces Mr. Schwan's resolution invoking "safeguards" against the Greenbriar sewage plant as merely a ploy designed to safeguard the developer's interests since the resolution could not bind the developer. But as Mr. Cohen knows very well, the action he favored of outright rejection of the plant would also not have bound the developer. This is because only State and county authorities, not the city council, could make the decision to approve or disapprove the plant.

At the time the city considered this matter, these decision-making State and county authorities had already indicated that they were favorably inclined toward the plant. Ms. Cohen and Mr. White themselves pointed this out in letters to the *News Review* on February 1, March 30, and November 2, 1972, and on August 23, 1973.
A council vote of outright rejection would have meant taking the risk that the plant would be approved without safeguards. Apparently Leonard Cohen was willing to take that risk. I am glad the council majority was not.

Zoning Map Amendment To the Editor:

There is one aspect of planning and zoning that can improve Greenbelt's quality of life in the future which has not been previously emphasized. County Resolution 57-1971, charges the County Executive and the Park and Planning Commission to review the entire County by Planning Areas for the purposes of adopting new Comprehensive Zoning Maps. The adoption of Council Bill 43, which details the procedural mechanism for the proposal is imminent. The official zoning map for Greenbelt is not clearly defined because of its R-P-C (Rural Planned Community) "limbo" status, and there are some areas of the city than can possibly be "down-zoned," or alternative zones imposed that more clearly reflect the wishes of the community. Piecemeal zoning only engenders parcel-by-parcel controversies. What Greenbelt needs is a new beginning that can only be accomplished through sectional zoning map amendment of Planning Area 67.

COUNCIL ENDS TERM IN HARMONY REINSTATES ANTI-BURN ORDINANCE

The last meeting of the present city council on Monday, September 10, ended in good cheer, as council members congratulated each other and the city staff for their efforts during the last two years. Councilman Charles Schwab observed that despite impressions to the contrary, out of 521 votes taken by council during the past two years, 83% or 431 votes were unanimous. There were, he said, only 89 split votes, of which 53 were 4 to 1.

Last Monday's meeting revealed the same pattern of unanimity, but there was one split vote — on an issue that continued to plague council. The council, by a 3 to 2 vote, decided to revert to the city's original anti-burning ordinance. Last April this ordinance by a 4 to 1 vote had been amended to permit the burning of stumps as part of a compromise whereby the Greenbriar developer agreed to clear the rest of the land by chipping and making the chips available to Greenbelters.

The council members changing their minds were Elizabeth Maffay and Schwab. They voted to join Rhea Cohen in making the necessary three votes. Apparently they were influenced by the fact that the new county regulations going into effect July 1 made it difficult to use the air curtain destructor method in clearing land in Greenbelt. Schwab said that what was needed was a more constructive approach to land-clearing that involved something other than burning or hauling. He thought the Fredericksburg operation involving a scissors machine and stump grinder may be the answer, provided sufficient equipment becomes available.

The dilemma facing council last April was that this equipment was not available and that the developer was hauling stumps (which cannot be chipped) and other tree products to a landfill 26 miles away. The council at that time (with the exception of Rhea Cohen) felt that the pollution created by exhaust fumes of trucks hauling away stumps and other tree products was much worse than the controlled method of burning stumps through the air curtain destructor method. The majority of council made clear at Monday's meeting that it had not changed its evaluation of this situation. Mrs. Maffay pointed out that the amount of air pollutants created by the ACD method was not known, but it was known that trucks are high pollutants. The council's action of last May, she said, was designed "to cause the least damage to the environment."

On one other Greenbriar matter, council unanimously requested the Maryland State Department of Health and Mental Hygiene to hold a public hearing within the city boundaries on the Greenbriar sewage treatment plant. Under new regulations, such a hearing is required before a permit is given for a construction permit.

Campaign Contributions

The council unanimously moved ahead to pass a charter amendment giving the council authority to re-

quire candidates to report on campaign contributions and providing that no person shall be deemed elected to the city council until such reports have been filed (if authorized).

At the same time council passed a city ordinance implementing the charter change, after increasing the amounts to be reported from more than \$10 to more than \$25. An interim report is required seven days before the election, giving the names of contributors and amounts in excess of \$25. A final report must be submitted six days after the election. This year's election will not be affected by this legislation.

On the matter of a public disclosure law, council decided to defer to the new council, since there were questions of reconciling the proposed city ordinance with the new State legislation. The latter directs municipalities to pass legislation which substantially agrees with the requirements of the State law for State officials. The council thought it best that a new look be taken at the proposed city ordinance with the idea, according to councilman Gil Weidenfeld, of taking the best of both legislations. In the meantime, the language of the State law was introduced for first reading.

Land-Acquisition

The council received a report from its Park and Recreation Advisory Board recommending that the city acquire all 75 acres in parcel 1 (land between Greenbelt Homes, Inc. property and the Baltimore - Washington Parkway). PRAB suggested that 30 of the 75 acres be developed as a recreational park consisting of the following: nature trails, bike paths, picnic areas, primitive camping, barbecue pits and free play area. PRAB chairman Joseph E. Wilkinson said that such a park area would relieve the overcrowding at the present Greenbelt Lake Park.

Other Matters

Council agreed to a change in the contract with Three State Construction Company doing the Center Mall concrete work, to permit waiving the bond requirements, provided the city pays the suppliers directly. The work is expected to begin next week. . . Cathy Foster was named as SHL election judge, since Marcia Krasnick did not accept the position. . . Two Greenbelt Troops, No. 202 and No. 746, received the President's Award of Excellence for their environmental protection services.

Ed Turney To Open Md. Ceramist Show

Edward Turney of Channel 7 Television News "Scene Tonight" will be guest of honor at the ribbon cutting ceremony at the annual Maryland Beltway Ceramists show. The ceremony, which will be the official beginning of the show at the Greenbelt Armory, will take place at 6 p.m. on Friday, September 21.

Awards will be presented on Friday at 8 p.m.

Activities for all three days include demonstrations, display booths, white elephant sales, door prizes, refreshments, and raffles. There will be an admission fee.

During the term on council, Schwan has been a member of the Land Use Policy Committee, Metropolitan Washington Council of Governments.

A member of the Greenbelt Homes, Inc., Board of Directors from 1963 to 1971, Schwan served as president of the housing cooperative from 1964 to 1970. His other community activities have included his being a member of the Steering Committee, Citizens for a Planned Greenbelt; co-chairman, Greenbelt Freedom of the Press Committee; and chairman, GHI Advisory Committee on Housing for the Elderly.

Prior to city election, Weidenfeld served as a member of the Greenbelt Advisory Planning Board, and was co-chairman of the SHL Civic Association Committee for voter registration in 1971. He is now a member of Boxwood Civic Association.

Weidenfeld is employed as a primary examiner for the U.S. Patent Office. An Open Letter to the Citizens of Greenbelt

In my open letter published in last week's (September 6) edition of the *Greenbelt News Review*, I promised to make available to the public the findings of the independent economic consultants, Robert R. Nathan Associates, as to the tax benefits of the Greenbriar project for your city. I have taken this advertisement to reproduce the text of Mr. Nathan's letter transmitting the report and summarizing its contents.

The central conclusion is this:

If Greenbriar were occupied today, the city would enjoy \$137,000 in annual tax and other revenues in excess of public expenditures attributable to the development — monies which could be applied to reduce your local taxes from \$.92 to \$.75 per \$100, to improve your public services, or both.

Transmitted herewith is our report, "The Effect of the Greenbriar Development on Revenues and Expenditures of the City of Greenbelt at Current Tax Rates and Levels of Service." We have discussed a draft of this report with the City Manager and members of his staff for accuracy and the reasonableness of our assumptions and have made such adjustments as seem to us appropriate. However, we are solely responsible for the report and its conclusions.

Our study is addressed to this question: if Greenbriar were fully occupied and part of Greenbelt today, what would be the increase in the city's (1) revenues, and (2) expenditures, at current tax rates and levels of service?

The basis of the analysis is the approved budget for 1973/74. The method of approach was to examine the line items in the 1973/74 approved city budget and estimate what each revenue or expenditure item would have been this year if Greenbriar were developed, occupied, and on the tax rolls. It is estimated that the assessed valuation of city property would be increased from \$63,500,000 to \$79,700,000, or an increase of about 25 percent. The ex-

pected increase in population is 3,000, or about 16 percent.

On the foregoing basis, we find that the Greenbriar development would increase the city's revenues by about \$243,000 per year at present tax rates, and require city expenditures of about \$106,000 per year at current prices and levels of service. Thus, net revenues available to the city as a result of Greenbriar would increase by \$137,000.

The major increases in revenues would be \$149,000 from the property tax and \$59,000 from income taxes. The balance would come from other public sources, local, state and federal.

If Greenbriar were part of the city now, the Council would have the choice of maintaining the present level of services and reducing the property tax rate or increasing the level of services with the same tax rate or some combination of these two applications. If the level of services remained the same, the property tax rate for the year 1973-74 would be about \$.75 per \$100 of assessed valuation instead of the current rate of \$.92.

The following table shows the reduction in tax rate if the level of services were not changed.

Metro Meeting On Contract Bus Service

The pricing of contract bus service will be the subject of a meeting sponsored by Metro next Wednesday night, Sept. 19, at 7:30 in the State Highway Administration Building, Kenilworth Avenue at Crescent. This is one of three meetings on the subject being held in the metropolitan area to help the Metro board of directors decide on the need and price of such services.

At present only Reston has contract services. Contract service means that a body (a private corporation in the case of Reston) guarantees to meet Metro's cost for express bus service (with perhaps a small profit margin for Metro if the directors so decide.) The sponsoring group then undertakes to fill the buses, hoping to get enough regular riders to offer a reasonable fare.

At present Greenbelt has only one express bus into Washington (leaving between 7:15 and 7:30 a.m.) and one back (leaving downtown just after 5 p.m.) How many private vehicles make the same trip at the same hours? More to the point, how many private vehicles make the trip an hour earlier or an hour later with drivers and passengers who might switch to the bus? (Besides the express, there is local service; the express gets downtown in just over 30 minutes but the local takes two or three times as long. Both cost 85c. As increased parking costs, pollution of the air (nearly all from cars) and commuter taxes become realities, express bus service looks better and better.

City officials (perhaps members of the new council) and persons on their own or as part of organizations might wish to attend the Metro meeting Wednesday. For more information call 484-2673.

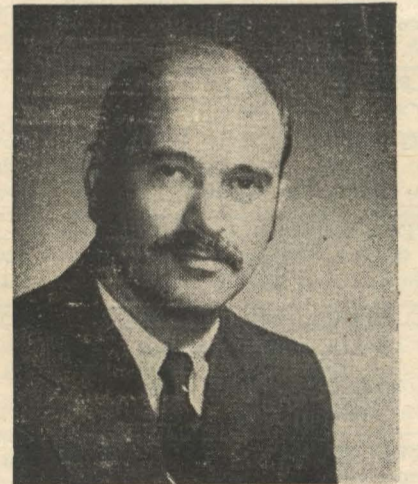

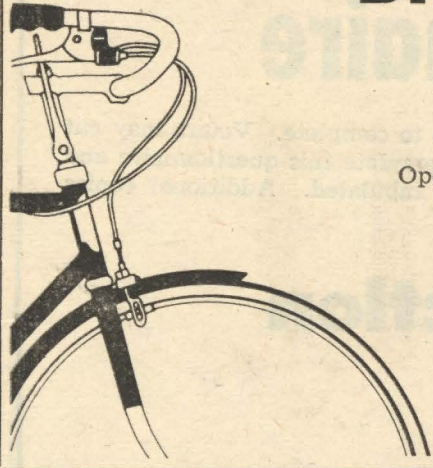

CITY OF GREENBELT, MARYLAND NOTICE OF CHARTER AMENDMENT

On August 13, 1973, the City Council of Greenbelt, Maryland adopted Charter Amendment Resolution Number 1973-4, and the following Title of the Resolution is a fair summary of the amendment:

Charter Amendment Resolution Number 1973-4

RESOLUTION OF THE CITY OF GREENBELT ADOPTED PURSUANT TO THE AUTHORITY OF ARTICLE 11E OF THE CONSTITUTION OF MARYLAND AND SECTION 13 OF ARTICLE 23A OF THE ANNOTATED CODE OF MARYLAND (1957 EDITION AS AMENDED), TITLE "CORPORATION-MUNICIPAL", SUBTITLE, "HOME RULE", TO AMEND THE CHARTER OF THE CITY OF GREENBELT, SAID CHARTER BEING SECTION 40 OF ARTICLE 17 OF THE CODE OF PUBLIC LOCAL LAWS OF MARYLAND (1963 EDITION) AND CONTAINING IN WHOLE OR IN PART THE CHARTER OF THE CITY OF GREENBELT, BY REPEALING AND REENACTING WITH AMENDMENTS SECTION 69 TO PROVIDE THAT ANY OFFICER OR EMPLOYEE WHO HAS A SUBSTANTIAL FINANCIAL INTEREST IN ANY CONTRACT WITH OR SALE TO THE CITY SHALL MAKE KNOWN THAT INTEREST AND REFRAIN FROM PARTICIPATING IN THE PURCHASE, TO PROVIDE THAT COUNCIL MAY ESTABLISH PROCEDURES FOR FILING REPORTS DISCLOSING FINANCIAL INTERESTS OF COUNCIL MEMBERS AND THE CITY MANAGER, AND TO PROVIDE FOR FORFEITURE OF OFFICE AND VOIDANCE OF CONTRACTS WHEN WILLFUL VIOLATIONS OCCUR.

The above amendment shall become and be considered a part of the Charter of the City of Greenbelt, Maryland, according to the terms of the amendment, in all respects to be effective and observed as such, upon the 2nd day of October, 1973, unless on or before the fortieth day after passage, which shall be the 22nd day of September, 1973, there shall be presented to the Council of the City of Greenbelt, Maryland, or mailed to it by registered mail, a petition for referendum signed by twenty percent or more of the persons qualified to vote in the general election of the City of Greenbelt, requesting that the above Charter Amendment be submitted to referendum to the voters of the City of Greenbelt.

A copy of the above Charter Amendment Resolution is posted in the Greenbelt Municipal Building in accordance with the requirements of Section 13(d) of Article 23A of the Annotated Code of Maryland, and may be obtained from the City Clerk, 25 Crescent Road, Greenbelt, Maryland, Telephone 474-8000.

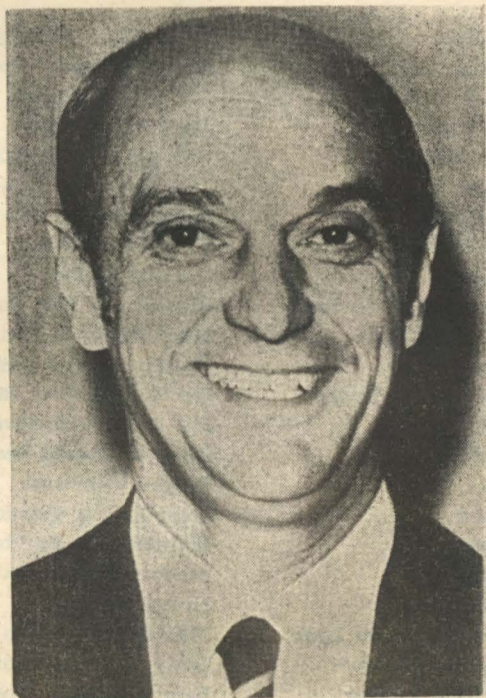

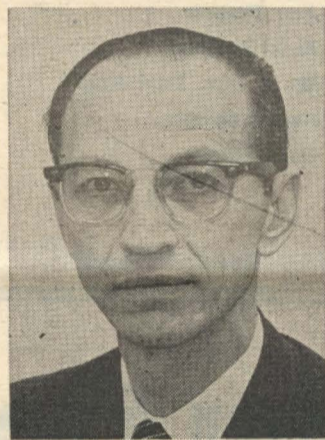
