Arson Suspected in Jaycees'

Arson is suspected in a fire that caused extensive damage to the clubhouse next to St. Hugh's on July 30. It is estimated that the Jaycees, who lease the building from the city, sustained personal property losses of \$500-\$1,000. Total damages amounted to approximately \$2,500. A combined investigation by the Greenbelt Police Department and the Prince Georges Fire Marshall's office is underway.

At approximately 1:30 p.m. last Thursday the fire was observed and the Fire Department notified. A squad of 14 men remained on the scene for about one and a half hours. It appears that the fire originated on a wooden table placed next to wooden wall panels. Sitting on the table were combustible goods - corrugated boxes, fabrics and other materials used by citysponsored Camp Pine Tree. The young campers had left the building only one-half hour before the

Many lost lunch derly project. fire erupted. boxes and other treasured personal possessions. The group will be meeting at the Youth Center

for the remainder of the session.

Neither the city nor the Jaycees carried fire insurance on the facility, which was constructed by the Greenbelt Athletic Association on government land in 1939 (the city did not control the land until later years). Volunteers constructed the two-story cinderblock building with federal government surplus materials and with the assistance of federal and city maintenance personnel. Since that time various private organizations have operated the clubhouse.

Three major fires have hit the building over the years. The Jaycees leased the clubhouse after the second fire occurred in 1966. At present the organization has a month-to-month lease, since the site is one of several being considered for the housing for the el-

Jaycees president Pat Cramblatt indicated that the club hopes to restore the building and will appeal to the city for a five year lease if the site is not chosen for development. According to the city, structural damage is minimal.

Cramblatt also spoke of the organization's intentions to participate in the Bicentennial. On the drawing boards are (1) renovation of the first level of the clubhouse. which now consists of one large room and an inoperable bathroom, (2) painting of the interior and exterior of the building, and (3) beautification of the grounds. A separate building fund has been earmarked for the project, which will utilize the labors of the mem-

When the Jaycees first took over operation of the clubhouse they installed new floors, panelled the walls on the second level, added a bathroom and purchased chairs and furniture.

The latest candidate to throw her hat in the ring before the deadline last Monday was Virginia Moryadas, 11-S Ridge. Rd. Pilski lives in Boxwood Village with wife, Claire, a Registered Nurse, and three children, Richard, Jr., 21; Nancy, 18, and Chris, 12. He has been employed as a tax representative and consultant for Prentice-Hall Inc. for the past 17 years.

Pilski attended King's College, Wilkes-Barre, Pennsylvania, and holds a B.S. degree in Business Administration from Syracuse University. He is a member of the Lambda Chi Alpha Fraternity. He also served three years in the United States Navy.

Mayor Pilski currently represents Greenbelt as Vice-Chairman of the National Bicentennial Committee and on the National League of Cities' Transportation Committee. He also serves on the Council of Government's Board of Directors and the Energy Policy Committee. Previously, Pilski has represented Greenbelt on the Prince Georges County Tax Differential Committee, the Executive Committee of the Maryland Municipal League, and the Environmental and Public Safety Committees of the Council of Governments.

Locally, he has served on the Charter Review and Advisory Planning Board Committees of the city: board of directors of Greenbelt Credit Union, Manager of Minor Leagues; and President of the Lakewood Citizens Association.

Pilski is currently active in the Greenbelt American Legion, the V.F.W. and the Loyal Order of the Moose. He serves as a citizen counselor to the Prince Georges Boy Scouts and to the Greenbelt Troops.

Schwan

First elected to council in 1971 and re-elected in 1973, Charles Schwan's prior service to the city includes his having been chairman of the Advisory Planning Board (1959-60), member, Charter Review Committee (1966-67), and chairman, Indoor Swimming Pool Committee (1971). During his tenure on council. Schwan has been a member of the Land Use Policy Committee, Metropolitan Washington Council of Governments. Since its inception he has served as a member of the Greenbelt Bicentennial Com-

A member of the Greenbelt Homes, Inc., Board of Directors from 1963 to 1971, Schwan served as president from 1964 to 1970. His other community activities have included his being a member of the Steering Committee, Citizens for a planned Greenbeit; cochairman, Greenbelt Freedom of the Press Committee; and chairman, GHI Advisory Committee on Housing for the Elderly.

Schwan received an A.B. degree from Hiram College, and did graduate work in political science at Syracuse University. There he was variously a Graduate Teaching Assistant, Fellow, and Instructor in the Maxwell School. He served in World War II until discharged a captain in 1945. He was Washington Representative of the Council of State Governments from 1952 to 1962, when he became Director of the Council's Washington office.

At various times during these years he served as principal staff aide to the National Governors' Conference on intergovernmental aspects of roads and highway safety, corporation taxation, natural resources and environmental health. In 1968, he became a partner in Wendell and Schwan, Consultants on Governmental Affairs. The following year he joined with others to form Environments for Tomorrow. Inc., a consulting firm organized to assist public and private entities in meeting environmental requrements. In February 1973 Schwan retired from both of the firms.

Schwan is a member of the National Committee on Uniform Traffic Laws and Ordinances; former member of the Advisory Council on Police Training, International Association of Chiefs of Police;
