State Axes 1977 Funds For Youth Service Bureaus

A campaign is mounting to overrule a recent decision by the State's Juvenile Services Administration (JSA) not to provide fiscal assistance to local youth services bureaus in fiscal year 1977. Greenbelt CARES, one of several such youth bureaus in the State, would be seriously impacted if this decision stands. The city of Greenbelt would have to assume the State contribution.

Already Delegate Gerard F. Devlin has urged Governor Marvin Mandel to intercede. In a letter to Mandel, Devlin said that the decision of the State agency not to include funds in the fiscal year 1977 State budget "may mark the death knell for the State's youth service bureaus."

"Juvenile crime," the state legislator said, "today is our major local problem. Recent studies in the metropolitan Washington area confirm the staggering amount of crime committed by juveniles. To make cuts in this area is a classic case of penny wise — pound foolish."

Devlin also said that he would appeal the decision to chairman John Hargreaves of the House Appropriation Committee. The two men serve on the six member Joint Committee on Expenditure of State Funds.

The city council has also appealed for help to Senator Edward T. Conroy and county executive Winfield M. Kelly, Jr.

In an August 21, 1975 letter to city council, the director of JSA explained why the decision was made not to include money for the maintenance of local youth service bureaus.

"As a result of more stringent enforcement of policy by the Governor's Commission," director Robert C. Hilson said, "we now find it necessary to commit funds from our budget to programs which will be losing Federal funding in fiscal year 1977." As a result, Hilson said, the agency was forced

to choose between these programs and continuance of funding for youth service bureaus.

Hilson added that since all the Federal funded projects are direct grants to the State, they represent a priority which supercedes programs where local support can conceivably be utilized.

The recent announcement by the state does not affect funds committed to Greenbelt CARES for the present fiscal year which ends June 30, 1976.

Another Hassle

Meanwhile representatives of the city will appear tomorrow before a Committee on Appeals of the Governor's Commission on Law Enforcement and the Administration of Justice on a matter concerning this year's grant to Greenbelt CARES. The city has appealed the grant's condition that receipt of funds be contingent on its "maintaining a minimum average of 7 juvenile service referrals a month." The city maintains that the number of referrals Greenbelt CARES receives is something over which it has no control. Failure to receive such a number of referrals could jeopardize payment of the remainder of this year's grant.

The city and Greenbelt CARES are more than willing to accept 7 or more referrals up to the limit of Greenbelt CARES' capacity to handle cases.

Health Fair Sept. 26, 27 At Beltway Plaza Mall

Thousands of Prince Georges County residents are expected to take advantage of a multitude of free health tests, demonstrations, and informational programs at the Health Fair at Beltway Plaza Mall, on Friday and Saturday, Sept. 26 and 27, starting at 11 a.m. each day.

The Prince Georges County Health Department, the Greenbelt Jaycees, and the Merchant's Association of the Mall have combined their resources to produce the Fair. Numerous units from the Health Department and over fifty other health-related agencies will have booths in the Mall.

Free screening for oral cancer, diabetes, cholesterol, anemia, high blood pressure, tuberculosis, glaucoma, vision and hearing problems will be available.

A 'first' at the fair will be a poster and oratorical contest for the youngsters, and exhibits featuring health movies and cartoons. Radio and television personality 'Super Star Mr. Health' will be there in person for the youngsters to greet.

Leland Memorial Hospital will bring out 'Smoking Sam', a cigarette-loving manikin who graphically illustrates what happens to smoke-filled lungs. There will also be a demonstration by manikin Resusci-Anni to teach mouth-to-mouth resuscitation and external cardiac compression techniques. Dental hygienists will show people how to brush-teeth in a zany new way while staff nutritionists will tell folks how to serve nutritious foods and balance the budget, too.

The infant and child stimulation booth will provide the preschool set with finger paints and homemade toys.

A festive air filled the council chambers on Monday, September 22 as the 1975-77 Greenbelt City Council took office. It was almost a replay of 1973. The characters were the same — the only difference was the casting.

Suspect Surrenders After Shooting County Policeman

About 200 policemen, police dogs, helicopters and other equipment converged on Kenilworth Avenue near Crescent Road early Saturday morning, Sept. 20, following the shooting of a county policeman by a person later identified as Paul Creaven Crawford, 46, who surrendered to police on Tuesday, Sept. 23.

Crawford had been stopped by county Patrolman Douglas Henegar for a traffic violation. According to the police reports, when Henegar asked Crawford to put his hands on the hood of the car, Crawford pulled a gun and shot the officer in the stomach and shoulder. Henegar was saved from serious injury by the bullet-proof vest he was wearing. The bullet did not penetrate the vest, although Henegar was hospitalized for the shoulder wound. Henegar is the son of Frank and Frances Henegar, 6 Hillside.

As Crawford fled the scene, he was pursued by the park police. Greenbelt patrolman, John Lann, heard the radio dispatch and set up a roadblock by placing the squad car across the intersection of Kenilworth Avenue at the point where it narrows into Edmonston Rd. Crawford hit the squad car broadside, slightly injuring Lann, who has since returned to regular duty. Crawford escaped on foot through the woods.

The Greenbelt police car was badly damaged and it will be determined by the insurance company if it is repairable.

March at Mishkan Torah

Greenbelt churches will join the Mishkan Torah Congregation at a Simchat Torah service followed by a processional on Saturday, September 27 at 7:45 p.m. The newly formed Greenbelt Clergy Association has endorsed the march protesting the discrimination of Jews in the Soviet Union, and has expressed concern of the plight of Jewish prisoners in the U.S.S.R.

The march will form in front of the synagogue at Ridge and Westway Roads, Greenbelt with children carrying flashlights and adults, candles. Upon return to the synagogue, there will be dancing and singing in the street. Interested persons are invited to participate.

Simchat Torah, the day of "Rejoicing of the Torah" signals the completion of the reading in the synagogue of the Five Books of Moses and beginning again the reading with the timeless story of creation. On the holiday the doors of the Ark are opened and Torah scrolls, taken and carried around the synagogue and in the streets.

Mishkan Torah will also honor its adopted Soviet Prisoner of Conscience, Boris Penson, who is serving a 10 year sentence in the Patma prison camp. He is among many men and women who are imprisoned in the U.S.S.R. because they desire to live in Israel.

By virtue of getting high vote in the September 16 election, Gil Weidenfeld was unanimously named mayor replacing Richard Pilski, mayor since 1971. Charles E. Callow, clerk of the Circuit Court, administered the oath of office. Named mayor pro-tem was Richard Castaldi who finished 12 votes behind Weidenfeld.

Weidenfeld spoke with pride of the quality of life in Greenbelt which he felt was "superior to that of any community in the Washington area." "Greenbelters," he said, "have been environment and pollution conscious before such terms became fashionable." He cautioned, however, that Greenbelters not be complacent, but should continue to seek improvements. "This," he said, "has been and will continue to be my major goal during the next two years."

He welcomed the support and help of the citizenry in continuing to provide the community with recreation programs that are "enjoyed by the entire state," parkland for "picknicking, walking, jogging . . . or just sitting around," and other outstanding services such as "a first-class police department, Greenbelt CARES, facilities for senior citizens, etc."

Charles Schwan felt the electoral results signified a desire on the part of citizens for improved public services and continued efforts to protect the environment. "Because, he said, "some projects, such as enlarging the Municipal building or building a new police facility, constructing athletic fields, acquiring more parkland . . . cannot be accomplished without a bond issue, I believe we should move without delay to determine what should be included in a bond proposal and to authorize the appropriate referendum."

Castaldi pledged to continue to strive for facilities and programs that all Greenbelters could enjoy and Thomas X. White said he will place special emphasis on transportation planning, land use and development, pedestrian and bicycle paths and road maintenance. He looked for more citizen input especially at budget time.

Pilski said, "It is with a great deal of pride that I have served as Mayor — I will do as much as I have in the past and hope I will do more." Pilski has served 10 years on council, Weidenfeld and Schwan 4 years and Castaldi and White 2 years.

The first business meeting of council will take place on Monday, October 6 at 8 p.m.

Housing For Elderly Gets Wide Support

Preliminary tabulations of the election survey questionnaire, with first results confined to the simple yes-or-no housing for the elderly question, were made available shortly after the election. This question produced 569 (78%) responses in favor of a city-sponsored rental apartment housing project for the elderly, 104 (14%) no's, and 56 (8%) non-responses.

A few respondents qualified their answers along the lines of "Yes, but not on parkland" or "No, not on the sites proposed," or "No, not by the city".

The city cautioned that the questionnaire does not have an official status like a ballot or referendum. It reflects, the city said, only the opinions of those persons who took the time and trouble to complete the questionnaire form.

Altogether, a total of 729 questionnaires were completed, representing 50 percent of those who voted at the September 16 election. The greatest number completed were from the North End precinct. Single family homes produced the greatest number of responses — 43.9%. GHI homeowners accounted for one-third of the responses.

The group most in favor of the elderly housing project were apartment dwellers, with 90% responding affirmatively, the remainder voting no or not responding. Next came GHI homeowners with an 85% yes vote. Single-family residents (including condominium owners) reported a 73% yes vote.

Next Steps

The latest addition to the city's recreation program — the Springhill Lake Recreation Center — was the source of much praise and admiration at last Sunday's dedication ceremony. The beautiful new facility with a full-scale air-conditioned gymnasium is one that the citizens can well be proud of.

The citizens can also be proud that they had the foresight in November 1968 to approve a \$950,000 bond issue which made this facility, along with many other needed improvements, a reality. At that time, there was concern over the impact the bond issue might have on the tax rate, but the majority proved ready to make the necessary financial sacrifice for the benefit of the entire community.

Among the benefits accruing to the city from the 1968 bond issue were: (1) the city purchase of parcels 7 and 8 (near Boxwood Village entrance), and the purchase of the south shore of Greenbelt Lake, thus forestalling commercial and high-density apartment development of open-space land; (2) the expansion of the city's recreation facilities by the construction of an addition to the Youth Center (Golden Age lounge, etc.) and the purchase of the Ridge Road Center (former Lutheran Church property); (3) construction of much-needed fire station addition; (4) the addition of such new recreation facilities as lighted tennis courts; and (5) highway improvements such as a new access to Springhill Lake apartments (Gentry Drive) and the reconstruction and beautification of Southway entrance.

In the next few years, the city will once again be faced with meeting the growing needs of a progressive community — needs that will be adequately met only through a bond issue. To name a few, purchase of parcels 1 and 2 near GHI and parcel 15 near Charlestowne Village to prevent high-density development, construction of new ballfields to serve a growing population in all parts of town, construction of a new police station and/or an addition to a city municipal building already outgrown, and development of outdoor recreation facilities at Springhill Lake such as tennis courts.

Once again, the council and citizens will have to pull together and exercise the necessary foresight to assure that Greenbelt will continue to provide its citizens with the services which have made the city a wholesome, wonderful place in which to live.

Credit Unions Merge; Offer More Services

After 15 months of negotiation, the merger of Consumers Co-op Federal Credit Union and Greenbelt Federal Credit Union, approved by their respective memberships, has been completed, with the active support of the National Credit Union Administration (NCUA), and with the Greenbelt credit union as the continuing organization. Organized in 1937, GFCU is among the earliest credit unions chartered under the Federal Credit Union Act of 1934.

The day-to-day services for all old and new GFCU members will be "business as usual" conducted in person, by telephone, or by mail with the GFCU office in Greenbelt. The GFCU quarterly dividend (5 1/2% annual rate) will be paid on all shares in the merged credit union qualifying as of September 30, 1975, the first such payment to members of the former CFCU in nearly a year.

The combined assets of GFCU and CFCU give the newly merged credit union some \$3 million in assets and access to the entire membership of GCS as a potential for future growth. Services provided include share savings, which may be made directly to the credit union or by the member's employer through payroll withholding; loans for any worthwhile purpose; and family financial counseling. For members in the full-time employment at the time they purchase shares, the credit union provides at no out-of-pocket cost life insurance based on the share balance and the member's age.

For borrowers, the credit union's interest rates on loans are attractive in today's market. The maximum interest rate is 1% per month on the unpaid balance (12% APR). However, many types of loans qualify for a lower interest rate. Loan life insurance is provided qualified borrowers at no additional cost. Loan payments may be made by mail, in person, or through payroll withholding.

New programs are of particular interest to GFCU members. One is the Government's direct deposit-electronic funds transfer program. Initially, upon request, social security and supplemental security income benefits will be paid directly into a recipient's account in a designated financial organization. Eventually, as planned, funds will be forwarded to the financial organization by electronic means. The credit union is participating in this program and may be named as a depository for these funds. The benefits of the direct deposit program will be set forth by the Government with October benefit checks.

It is important to have convenient access to these funds once they are deposited in an interest-bearing account such as the credit union offers. Therefore, the credit union plans to offer along with this program a share draft service which may be used like checks to draw on share accounts. Experience has demonstrated that these drafts are acceptable for payments under the same conditions as checks. By many, this is looked upon as one of the most significant advances in service to members in several years. The Greenbelt Federal Credit Union is located at 121 Centerway.

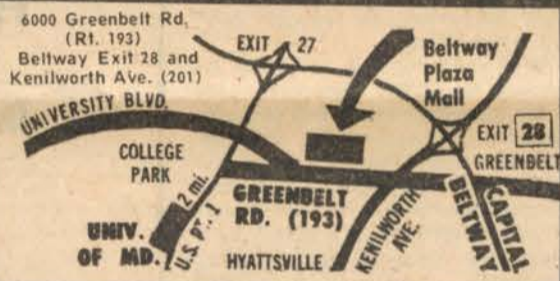
