## Smith Re-elected GHI Prexy Plan For Elderly Unveiled

To no one's surprise, James W. Smith was re-elected by his colleagues to another term — his fifth — as president of Greenbelt Homes, Inc. at the May 20 board meeting. Also reelected for another year were Don Volk as vice-president and James Foster as treasurer. The only switch in officers saw Norman Weyel selected as secretary in place of Steve Polaschik who declined to serve.

### Deferral of Charges

The board received a proposal from the Member and Community Relations committee to permit low-income elderly or disabled GHI members to defer future increases in monthly charges. A similar program was in effect for the years 1972 and 1973.

Under this new program, as proposed by the Member and Community Relations committee, members would, in effect, borrow money from the corporation to be repayable with interest at a later date when their homes are sold or otherwise disposed of. Their collateral would be the equity in their homes.

The new program differs from the old one with regard to the source of funds for borrowing. The old plan was financed by an assessment against all the members. The new plan calls for the reserves of the corporation — presumably the Land Sale Reserves — to be used for this purpose.

The new plan also differs from the old one with respect to qualifications. Under the new plan, age 60 (instead of age 65), total and permanent disability, and an annual income of less than \$5,000 (instead of \$4,600) would qualify. Also, the new plan requires that the annual total of the member's monthly charges must equal at least 25 percent of total annual income from all sources. Two years' membership in GHI is also required.

### Rationale

Age 60 was chosen because this is the minimum age for the city's tax credit, refuse fee credit and renters' grant, the county's disability tax credit and the State circuit breaker for property taxes. Similarly, the \$5,000 income limit was selected because it is the city's income limitation for its several programs. The 25 percent ratio of monthly charges to income was selected because that is the standard generally employed as the appropriate proportion of monthly housing cost to income.

The committee suggested that the interest charged be calculated monthly on the sum of the deferred increase in monthly charges at a rate 1/2 of 1 percent higher than the maximum interest rate the corporation is receiving on any demand savings account. The purpose of the interest charge is to cover administrative expenses and to make certain that no cost will accrue to the other members of the corporation.

It is estimated that borrowings in the first year would amount to about \$9,000. No long-range costs were given and some fears were expressed at the May 30 board meeting that the costs might escalate very rapidly. The Finance committee was asked for its views on the proposal.

The board decided to schedule further discussion of the proposal at its July 8 meeting. The board will be meeting only once a month in the summer — second Thursday

of each month — and it was felt that the next meeting scheduled for June 10 would not permit sufficient time for analysis.

### Painting Regulations

The board gave final approval to the painting regulations, the details of which were presented in the May 6 News Review. The new regulations relax many of the restrictions formerly in effect. A major change permits members if all in agreement to request that a row of homes be painted more than one color trim, provided they agree to pay the additional costs charged by the contractor (or paint the unit themselves). If it is not possible to obtain unanimous approval in a court, an appeal may be made to the management.

Similarly, with respect to wall paint, members are free to choose any approved wall color independent of their neighbor's choice. This was a controversial item and the board vote in favor was 4 to 3 as some members feared the ragged appearance of non-uniform colors. Two frame apartments one above the other are still to have uniform color.

### Other Matters

The board approved a donation of \$25 to the Greenbelt Choral Arts Society for their June 12 premier performance of "We the People". . . The Member and Community Relations committee suggested that a survey of GHI members be taken to determine age, size of family, future intentions about living in GHI. . . The Engineering and Maintenance committee considered favorably the suggestion for installing smoke detectors in GHI homes.

### City to Fly Historic Flags

Thirteen historic flags will fly continually on Southway Road beginning this weekend through Flag Day, June 14. These flags, which were flown previously on Presidents Day and Maryland Day, are part of the city's commemoration of the bicentennial year. Included are the Betsy Ross, Star Spangled Banner, Bedford, Bunker Hill, Washington Cruisers, Grand Union, Bennington, Moultrie, Gadsden, First Continental Regiment, First Navy Jack, Rhode Island Regiment and the new Bicentennial flag.

## Citizens Appear Resigned To 13-cent Tax Increase

Very little opposition was expressed to the 13-cent tax rate increase in the 1976-77 municipal budget at the public hearing on Monday, May 24. About 20 persons attending the meeting expressed either support for the \$1,907,200 budget submitted by city manager James K. Giese or asked for increased expenditures. The city council will take final action on the budget on Monday evening, June 7.

Two programs in the budget appeared to be of major concern to the audience. One was the police department and the other the Greenbelt CARES Youth Service Bureau.

### Police Budget

With respect to the former, several persons asked for an increase in the police force beyond the proposed uniform strength of 20 and the Greenbelt Lodge of the Fraternal Order of Police recommended a total department strength of 26. The latter noted that police calls have increased by 40 percent in the past year. The lodge also asked for a 5.9 percent cost-of-living increase in salaries. The city manager had recommended 4 percent.

Some differences in opinion developed over the hiring of a park patrolman if such hiring would delay augmenting the regular police force. The council is reluctant to use a trained police officer for routine patrol work at the park. But some members of the audience felt that the increasing demands on the police force caused by expansion of Greenbriar and opening of Roosevelt senior high school require immediate hiring and training of new police officers.

At the conclusion of the discussion, Mayor G. Weidenfeld asked point-blank whether anyone in the audience wanted to cut the police budget below that proposed by the city manager. No one spoke up.

### Greenbelt CARES

Audience reaction to Greenbelt CARES was also generally favorable, although this program will cost the city more than \$25,000, compared to about \$8,000 expended in the current fiscal year. The increase is due to Federal termination of grant money and the decision of the Maryland Department of Juvenile Services to fund only 75 percent of the cost of the program.

Some reservations were expressed as to whether the program was providing services that might be available from other quarters such as the church. Defenders of the program pointed out that the program provides a wide variety of professional services to troubled youth. Weidenfeld said that the voluntary professional services received from the University of Maryland alone would cost \$114,000 if paid for at full value.

There was also concern that the program was not oriented to Greenbelt residents. In reply, it was stated that 75 percent of the clientele are from Greenbelt.

Some questions were also raised about the future of the program and how much of a commitment the city was making toward setting up a "department of social services." There was general agreement, however, that the city should continue the program for the coming year at least.

### Miscellaneous Items

The budget hearing disclosed several miscellaneous items. It will cost the city \$1,500 to conduct a referendum on the housing for the elderly project. The waste collection budget includes \$2,300 for the addition of a hydraulic tail gate to aid in the collection of heavy appliance items. The recyclable program for glass is running into difficulties because of the low price offered. The electric bill for the lighted tennis courts is proving a burden on the budget. To date, revenue from the tennis courts equals \$900; the Pepco bill, \$3,000.

A feeler on dropping social security protection for city employees as several persons recounted the benefits available from the program that might be lost. The city must give two year's notice if they wish to drop out of the social security program.

## Registration Underway For E. Roosevelt High

Registration is underway for those students slated to attend the comprehensive portion of Eleanor Roosevelt Senior High School. Course offerings are being distributed to 655 tenth and eleventh graders from fixed boundaries. It is expected that registration for these students will be accomplished before the school year ends.

Over 35 applications from students outside of Roosevelt's attendance area have been received under the open enrollment provision that will permit 400 students to attend the new high school provided that there will be no "racial tipping" at the senior high school that the students would normally attend. The Office of Pupil Accounting is examining these applications and it is unlikely that all selections will be made before the term ends. However, Roosevelt principal Robert Ogden said that the school will be open during the day and on some evenings for this purpose, as well as for technical school re-registration.

Ogden said that he was "more than a little pleased" at the number of students eager to attend the 700-student technical portion of Roosevelt. Over 1,200 county students have taken tests and the criteria for the selection process is just about firmed up. In the meantime, all students from fixed boundaries will register for the comprehensive program including those students who have taken the test for the technical component. At a later date, those who are accepted will register for the technical program.

Three of four counsellors assigned to Roosevelt are on board, and Ogden has already indicated to personnel some preference with respect to teachers. The interviewing process is continuing. As far as the school handbook is concerned, Ogden hopes to get input from students. The booklet should be distributed by the end of June or the beginning of July and will contain regulations, map of building, listing of staff and other pertinent information.

Ogden and his staff are awaiting the "go-ahead signal" from the contractor to move into the school's administrative offices. The target date of June 1 may not be met since there were delays in the delivery of materials. The contractor and school construction personnel are now making final checks of the building and corrective work in some areas will be necessary.

## MUNICIPAL POOL OPENS

\*Aquatics - The Greenbelt Municipal Pool is one of the most complete facilities of its kind to be found in the metropolitan area. With three pools and accessory service areas, it is designed to meet the summer swimming needs of the entire community. Swimming activities include Recreational Swimming, Structured Learn to Swim Program, Diving Instruction, Swim Team, Adult and Children's Classes, Junior and Senior Life-saving, Water Babies Program and Synchronized Swimming.

Normal hours of operation are 1-8:15 p.m.; seven days a week for recreational swimming. Morning hours are scheduled for classes, swim team practice and general pool maintenance. The Greenbelt Municipal Pool will open for the 1976 season on Saturday, May 29 at 1 p.m.

Pool applications, with complete program and fee details, are available by mail and at the City Treasurer's Office in the Municipal Building. Season passes may be purchased at the Treasurer's Office Monday through Friday, from 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m.

## Bicentennial Activities

Greenbelt is an officially recognized Bicentennial Community approved by the American Revolution Bicentennial Administration. The City's Bicentennial Committee in conjunction with the Recreation Department has planned a variety of programs honoring the 200th Birthday of our nation.

Some of the activities developed for the enjoyment of all residents include the following:

Greenbelt Day - Sunday, June 6. The first Sunday in June has been designated as a day for citizens to celebrate their community, commemorate its incorporation and recognize its contribution to the state and nation. Planned activities take place from Friday, June 4 through Sunday, the 6th, highlighted by special ceremonies, concerts, a community ball and a variety of special recreation programs for all ages.

World Premiere Bicentennial Cantata - Saturday, June 12, 8:30 p.m., St. Hugh's Church. The Greenbelt Choral Arts Society presents the premiere performance of a major choral work, WE THE PEOPLE. Commissioned by the Society's Director, Douglas Freeman, and written by New England composer, William Johnson, WE THE PEOPLE is a stirring musical setting of phrases from the American Constitution and selections from the writings of Abraham Lincoln, Oliver Wendell Holmes, Grover Cleveland and others. It is scored for full chorus, soloist, narrator, organ, piano and percussion.

Fourth of July Celebration - On Sunday, July 4, Independence Day activities begin at 2 p.m. in the Greenbelt Center Mall, with St. Hugh's Young Americans in performance. The Greenbelt Concert Band of Prince Georges County presents their "Fireworks Concert" at the Lake Park Bandstand, 7 p.m. followed by the city's fireworks display, over the lake, at dark.

Greenbelt March Contest - An open competition is underway to write a Greenbelt 'March' to provide an official symphonic and marching band arrangement for city functions. The winning arrangement will be performed by the Greenbelt Concert Band of Prince Georges County on July 4 during the City Fireworks Concert.

Bicentennial Beautification - City flower beds have been planted with red, white and blue color schemes by the City's Parks Department. A special flower bed is located at Lakecrest Drive and Greenbelt Road spelling out "USA - 200". At Southway Road, the principal entrance to the city, a municipal location directory, historic marker, and Welcome Sign greet visitors to our city. To help celebrate national holidays, historic flags will be erected along Southway Road.

A wreath-laying ceremony will be held by the American Legion Auxiliary on Sunday, May 30 at 10 a.m. at the Center Mall.

In stark contrast, the only Greenbelt resident on the County Council—Francis White—first failed to alert the Greenbelt government of the impending vote, and then turned a deaf ear on the city's plea for denial. County councilman Frank Francois apparently opined that the proposed Cadillac dealership would be just the sort of high quality development that the densely wooded tract deserves.

Glendening suspected an Edsel and added requirements for landscaping along the Beltway plus county council review of the final site plan, before the council went ahead with its wheeling and dealing and approved the project.

Remember all that bombast about "a new quality"? The official motto of PG County remains Semper Eadem: ALWAYS THE SAME.

**Just So Much Rhetoric**

To the Editor:

Councilman Schwan's desperation is coming thru. I know, he knows, anyone who can read knows that . . .

The city of Greenbelt cannot legally "accord preference" to local residents.

Mr. Morgan (Executive Director, Prince Georges County Housing Authority) states that the city of Greenbelt will be "responsible for taking and processing applications for the proposed housing project." At NO POINT does he say that the city may "accord preference" to anyone, and they will be accepting and processing applications from non-residents at the same time.

Let us go back to the 12 Apr. public hearing, which Mr. Morgan attended. This quote is repetitious, but necessary. News Review, 15 Apr. 76: "Some confusion arose over occupancy eligibility. Apparently the MARKETING PLAN for the project can be directed to residents of Greenbelt but there can be NO RESIDENCE REQUIREMENTS and NO DISCRIMINATORY PROVISIONS." Emphasis mine. That is the statement I was agreeing with, not councilman Schwan's.

The very first time ANY city official taking and processing applications from residents and non-residents "accords preference" to an applicant for reasons of residence in Greenbelt, they can be charged with discrimination. They will have discriminated against the non-residents. Even before the Apr. 20 ruling by the Supreme Court, which certainly applied to NEW CONSTRUCTION, the Fair Share Program to which our officials committed this city in 1972 is an official agreement to accept public housing (i.e. the occupants thereof) on a Metropolitan-wide scale. Does council propose to ignore existing laws in order to defeat the democratic process, via referendum? Or is this just so much rhetoric?

The city council, thru their spokesman councilman Schwan had better ease up on the rhetoric in their attempts to hide the ugly truth about priorities, financial liability, possible effects on zoning, etc. Most of our citizens are literate.

The Concerned Citizens Group feels that the clause in the city charter which council proposes to amend, is there to protect residents from long range arbitrary decisions of an incumbent council. A decision to obligate th's small town to

a multi-million dollar project for 40 years should be made by the voters and voters only, not 5 politicians.

The Greenbelt News Review refused to publish, as a paid article, the flyer that lit Councilman Sewan's fuse. Yet they published the paid article of the opposition (Dove-Madden), one of a series of 5 articles, it seems. Wonder where those "pore old needy souls" are finding the approximately \$100 that it will take? Viola Keer

# Bicentennial Choral Work Will Premiere in Greenbelt

News Review reporter Jane Connolly talked with Douglas Freeman, music director of the Greenbelt Choral Arts Society, about the premier performance of *We the People*, an original choral work by William Johnson, which the group will present June 12 at St. Hugh's Church at 8:30 p.m.

**Q:** Mr. Freeman, how did the idea for *We the People* originate?  
**A:** About a year ago, I was thinking about a musical program for Greenbelt with a Bicentennial focus. I knew and liked the work of composer William Johnson and spoke to him about writing a choral work using American themes. He came up with several ideas using words of Abraham Lincoln, Oliver Wendell Holmes, Bret Harte, and Ralph Waldo Emerson, among others. We discussed which ideas worked best, and I commissioned him to compose *We the People*.

**Q:** Exactly what is a choral work?  
**A:** A choral composition is music written for voices — either all male or all female or mixed — that may or may not be accompanied by instruments. Quartets and quintets are choral works for four or five voices. This score is written for mixed voices and includes solos and a narrator, with accompaniment by organ, piano and percussion.

**Q:** Is this the first original work written for Greenbelt?  
**A:** As far as I know, yes. I believe we are the first performing arts group in this area to introduce an original composition. It has been a challenge to work through new music, from the bottom, giving it our own interpretation. The program is a unique opportunity, rare for a community performing arts organization inasmuch as we will be presenting the premier performance of a major musical composition.

**Q:** How many Greenbelters are involved in the Choral Society and *We the People*?

**A:** There are approximately 25 Society members, and about 23 are performing in the concert. The Society is open to men and women, 16 years of age and above, who are able to sing.

**Q:** Is the City of Greenbelt sponsoring the June 12 program?

**A:** The City, through the Department of Recreation, officially sponsors us and contributes to the Choral Society as it does to the Greenbelt Concert Band and athletic programs. However, we have not received additional money to finance this concert.

**Q:** How is the program being funded and approximately what will it cost?

**A:** The costs are approaching \$1,000. We have some revenue from members' dues, but we must raise the balance through sponsors' contributions. We welcome donations of any size, and anyone giving \$1 to \$50 and up before June 1 will have his or her name printed in the program as a sponsor with the size of the contribution. All contributions are tax deductible. Donations should be sent to Pat Martone, President of the Greenbelt Choral Arts Society, at 15-D Ridge Road. For more information, call 345-5871.

## Mishkan Torah News

Rabbi Kenneth Berger of the Mishkan Torah will report on the 16th Annual Reconstructionist Convention on Friday, May 28 at 8:30 p.m. The convention was held in Philadelphia last week.

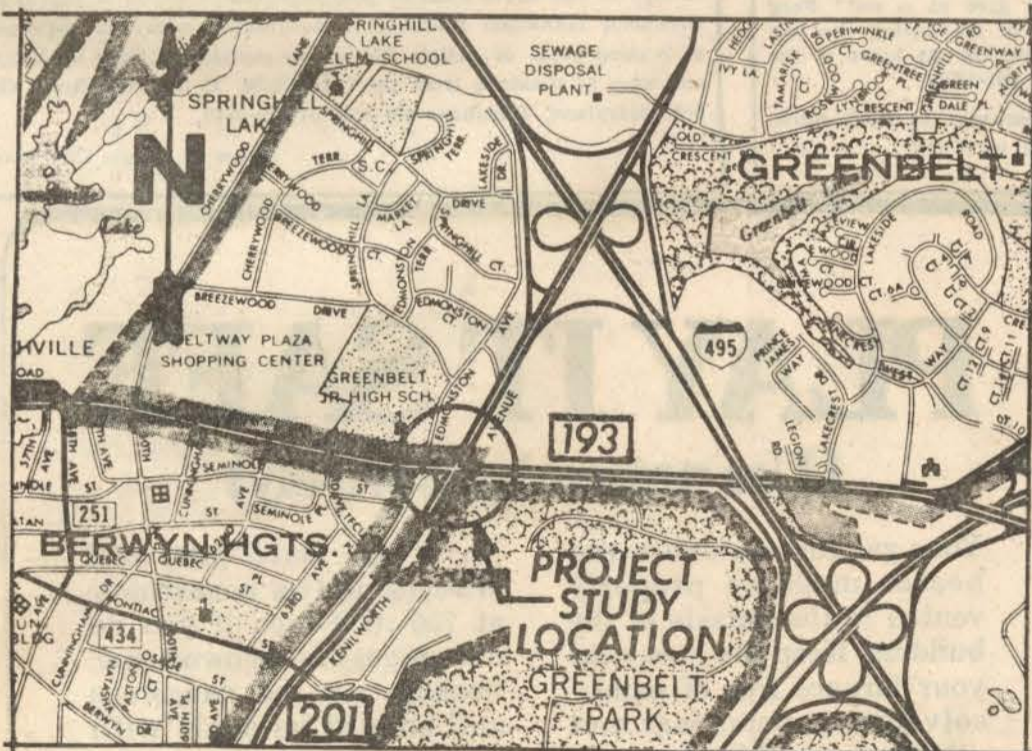

RESOLUTION OF THE CITY OF GREENBELT ADOPTED PURSUANT TO THE AUTHORITY OF ARTICLE 11E OF THE CONSTITUTION OF MARYLAND AND SECTION 13 OF ARTICLE 23A OF THE ANNOTATED CODE OF MARYLAND (1957 EDITION AS AMENDED), TITLE "CORPORATION-MUNICIPAL," SUB-TITLE "HOME RULE," TO AMEND THE CHARTER OF THE CITY OF GREENBELT, MARYLAND, SAID CHARTER BEING SECTION 40 OF ARTICLE 17 OF THE CODE OF PUBLIC LOCAL LAWS OF MARYLAND (1963 EDITION AS AMENDED) AND CONTAINING IN WHOLE OR IN PART THE CHARTER OF THE CITY OF GREENBELT, BY REPEALING AND REENACTING WITH AMENDMENTS SECTION 54, TITLE "CUSTODY OF MONEYS," TO REQUIRE THE DEPOSIT OF MONEYS RECEIVED BY THE CITY WITH FINANCIAL INSTITUTIONS HAVING ACCOUNTS INSURED BY THE FEDERAL DEPOSIT INSURANCE CORPORATION OR THE FEDERAL SAVINGS AND LOAN INSURANCE CORPORATION OR THE MARYLAND SAVINGS-SHARE INSURANCE CORPORATION.

### Charter Amendment Resolution Number 1976-4

The above amendments shall become and be considered a part of the Charter of the City of Greenbelt, Maryland, according to the terms of the amendments, in all respects to be effective and observed as such, upon the 6th day of July, 1976, unless on or before the fortieth day after passage, which shall be the 26th day of June, 1976, there shall be presented to the Council of the City of Greenbelt, Maryland, or mailed to it by registered mail, a petition for referendum signed by twenty percent or more of the persons qualified to vote in the regular election of the City of Greenbelt, requesting that either or both of the above Charter Amendments be submitted on referendum to the voters of the City of Greenbelt.

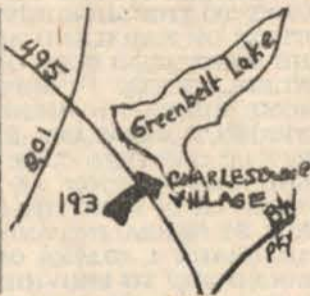

**BUDGET con't from page 1** made for a full-time soccer field. Councilman Dick Pilski suggested that it was time that the city investigated the pros and cons of utilizing the sanitary land fill for ball fields.

**Summary**

At the outset of the hearing, Weidenfeld acknowledged that the city property tax rate is higher than that for many other municipalities, but he observed that the city provides more and better quality services such as a full-time police department, a multi-varied recreation program, outstanding public works department, and a youth counseling service. Thus, he said, the tax rates are not comparable, because the services are not comparable. The pay-off, he believes, is seen in such things as a low crime rate.

Giese summarized the factors producing a 13-cent increase in the property tax rate. A shortfall in revenue; reduction in assessments of Greenbelt Homes, Inc., Springhill Lake, Charlestowne Village, and individually-owned property; elimination of Federal funding of certain city jobs; termination of Federal funding of CARES; operation of Springhill Lake Recreation Center on a full-time basis; increased premiums for Blue Cross-Blue Shield and for retirement capital improvements dealing with programs; the need to catch-up on roads mainly; and, finally, but not least, inflation requiring a cost-of-living increase for city employees among other things.
