It is a time for the community to recognize those who have helped to make Greenbelt what it is today.

The Greenbelt American Revolution Bicentennial Committee in its early planning concluded that one way Greenbelters could celebrate our American heritage was to recognize the contribution of this city to the history of America, and that one way to look towards the future of our country was to consider the future of our own city. LONG RANGE PLANS DISCUSSED AT GHI MEMBERSHIP HEARINGS

"What happens when the GNMA mortgage is paid off?" is a question that Greenbelt Homes, Inc. must deal with in the near future. At two recent informational hearings members of the GHI board of directors and of the Long Range Planning Committee outlined plans for the first six years of a 20 year program. A total of some 85 GHI residents attended at least one of the hearings and the question-and-answer period that followed.

At the North End School hearing on May 25 the report of the Long Range Planning Committee was presented by Director Virginia Moryadas, committee chairman. At the May 26 meeting in the Greenbelt Library it was presented by Director Mary Clarke. Other speakers at both meetings were committee members Charles Schwan and Wayne Williams. President James W. Smith presided.

The committee report, which was distributed to all GHI members in April, was characterized by Director Clarke as a document outlining a method for achieving a goal - the goal of rehabilitation of Greenbelt Homes, Inc. The aim, she said, is to preserve and enhance the community as it now exists. She emphasized the importance of immediately obtaining the services of a consultant with professional expertise to evaluate

needs and establish priorities. At the same time, she noted, funds must be built up to provide the money with which to accomplish the goal.

A hypothetical program for rehabilitation projects during the next six years was detailed by Charles Schwan with the aid of beautifully legible charts and tables. Improvements planned for the masonry homes include electrical heavy-up, storm doors and windows, replacement of flat roofs and porch roofs, insulation, and aluminum siding. For frame homes the list includes replacement of gutters, as well as roofs, repair and replacement of "risers" (pipes carrying water up to the second floor) and termite extermination. At present prices and without allowance for possible savings through quantity buying or through salvage, Schwan put the cost of the 6-year program at over \$4,700,000. Some projects, such as the resurfacing of parking courts, are already in progress.

Wayne Williams listed as alternative methods for financing the renovation program: (1) assessing the membership, (2) borrowing, (3) a combination of these in varying proportions. The possibility of a federal grant was also mentioned as something to be actively explored. If the membership decides to continue assessing itself for the amount now paid annually on the GNMA mortgage, it could realize \$367,200 a year for renovation, said Williams; but the corporation would still have to borrow substantial sums to carry out the full program.

In reply to questions, Smith advised the group

- That increases in monthly operating charges will be held down to 10 percent if possible;
- That residents who install storm doors and/or windows should not expect to be reimbursed by the corporation;
- That technical consultants are necessary because, although residents can (and do) notify management of the need for repairs, professional expertise is needed on technical matters such as the replacement of "risers";
- That a 3-year program of termite control has already been adopted for the frame homes. (Termite inspection should be extended to the masonry homes in one member's opinion.)

To make the renovation process smoother for residents, a member suggested from the floor that the corporation might do well to acquire one entire row vacated with the consent of the residents; renovate it with speed, safety, and economy; and use it on a revolving basis as temporary housing for residents in rows undergoing extensive renovation.

Finally, several members asked why bank loans for down payments on GHI units are harder to obtain than loans for condominium units. It was explained that ownership in a condominium is on a "fee simple" basis; the property is security for the loan. In a cooperative like GHI, the first mortgage is held by the corporation itself. With the exception of a few savings and loan associations like Twin Pines, therefore, conservative banking interests consider loans to members of a cooperative as "second mortgages" on which higher interest rates are usual.

One member suggested that the Long Range Planning Committee might consider the idea of converting GHI to a condominium. Smith pointed out that a cooperative offers some advantages, such as easier settlement arrangements, saving in legal and other fees, and lower water rates.

At 10 o'clock the meeting room had to be vacated to comply with Library regulations, bringing the lively discussion to an end.

WHEREAS, in order "to commemorate the anniversary of the city's incorporation and in order to honor and reflect upon this city's past achievements, to look towards the city's future and to renew its commitment to the goals of good citizenship and community development" the Greenbelt City Council in 1975 adopted a "Resolution to Designate the First Sunday in June of Each Year as GREENBELT DAY"; and

WHEREAS, in this Bicentennial Year of our Nation when we reflect on our history and mark the Birth of this Country, Greenbelt will celebrate the 39th Anniversary of its Incorporation - the incorporation of a "New Town" which in those short but eventful years has been able to offer its residents a way of life and true citizenship which our Nation's founders envisioned 200 years ago -

NOW THEREFORE, I, Gil Weidenfeld, Mayor of the City of Greenbelt, Maryland, by authority vested in me by the Council and the citizens of Greenbelt, hereby issue this Proclamation on the occasion of this Second Annual.

Notice of Charter Amendment

On May 17, 1976 the City Council of Greenbelt, Maryland, adopted Charter Amendment Resolutions 1976-3 and 1976-4, and the following Titles of these Resolutions are fair summaries of the amendments:

Charter Amendment Resolution Number 1976-3

RESOLUTION OF THE CITY OF GREENBELT ADOPTED PURSUANT TO THE AUTHORITY OF ARTICLE 11E OF THE CONSTITUTION OF MARYLAND AND SECTION 13 OF ARTICLE 23A OF THE ANNOTATED CODE OF MARYLAND (1957 EDITION AS AMENDED), TITLE "CORPORATION-MUNICIPAL," SUB-TITLE "HOME RULE," TO AMEND THE CHARTER OF THE CITY OF GREENBELT, MARYLAND, SAID CHARTER BEING SECTION 40 OF ARTICLE 17 OF THE CODE OF PUBLIC LOCAL LAWS OF MARYLAND (1963 EDITION AS AMENDED) AND CONTAINING IN WHOLE OR IN PART THE CHARTER OF THE CITY OF GREENBELT, BY REPEALING AND REENACTING WITH AMENDMENTS SECTION 54, TITLE "CUSTODY OF MONEYS," TO REQUIRE THE DEPOSIT OF MONEYS RECEIVED BY THE CITY WITH FINANCIAL INSTITUTIONS HAVING ACCOUNTS INSURED BY THE FEDERAL DEPOSIT INSURANCE CORPORATION OR THE FEDERAL SAVINGS AND LOAN INSURANCE CORPORATION OR THE MARYLAND SAVINGS-SHARE INSURANCE CORPORATION.

Charter Amendment Resolution Number 1976-4

RESOLUTION OF THE CITY OF GREENBELT ADOPTED PURSUANT TO THE AUTHORITY OF ARTICLE 11E OF THE CONSTITUTION OF MARYLAND AND SECTION 13 OF ARTICLE 23A OF THE ANNOTATED CODE OF MARYLAND (1957 EDITION AS AMENDED), TITLE "CORPORATION-MUNICIPAL," SUB-TITLE "HOME RULE," TO AMEND THE CHARTER OF THE CITY OF GREENBELT, MARYLAND, SAID CHARTER BEING SECTION 40 OF ARTICLE 17 OF THE CODE OF PUBLIC LOCAL LAWS OF MARYLAND (1963 EDITION AS AMENDED) AND CONTAINING IN WHOLE OR IN PART THE CHARTER OF THE CITY OF GREENBELT, BY REPEALING AND REENACTING WITH AMENDMENTS PARAGRAPH 2, "DATES OF FINALITY" OF SECTION 63, "TAX PROCEDURE" TO PROVIDE FOR A QUARTERLY DATE FINALITY FOR REAL PROPERTY TAX ASSESSMENTS.

The above amendments shall become and be considered a part of the Charter of the City of Greenbelt, Maryland, according to the terms of the amendments, in all respects to be effective and observed as such, upon the 6th day of July, 1976, unless on or before the fortieth day after passage, which shall be the 26th day of June, 1976, there shall be presented to the Council of the City of Greenbelt, Maryland, or mailed to it by registered mail, a petition for referendum signed by twenty percent or more of the persons qualified to vote in the regular election of the City of Greenbelt, requesting that either or both of the above Charter Amendments be submitted on referendum to the voters of the City of Greenbelt.
