"We the People" A Bicentennial Concert

We the People, a three-part musical tribute to America's past will be presented by the Greenbelt Choral Arts Society on Saturday evening, June 12, at 8:30 p.m. at St. Hugh's. Commissioned by the Society's director, Douglas Freeman, the work will be sung by 23 members of the Society accompanied by organist Nancy Stavelly and pianist Joyce Meekins. George Huttlin, member of the Greenbelt Concert Band, will be the percussionist and Tim Miller will narrate. The performance lasts about an hour.

When asked by the News Review — how did the idea for **We the People** originate?— Freeman said:

"About a year ago, I was thinking about a musical program for Greenbelt with a Bicentennial focus. I knew and liked the work of composer William Johnson and spoke to him about writing a choral work using American themes. He came up with several ideas using words of Abraham Lincoln, Oliver Wendell Holmes, Bret Harte, and Ralph Waldo Emerson, among others. We discussed which ideas worked best and I commissioned him to compose **We the People**."

The three major parts of the work represent three major eras in United States History: the revolutionary period — "A Nation of Liberty and Justice," the Civil War — "This Hallowed Ground," and the modern development of the U.S.

Composer William Johnson is flying in from his home in Laconia, N.H., to attend this first performance of his work. Many local dignitaries have been invited to attend. Also State Senator Ed Conroy, County Councilman Parris Glendening and State Legislator Gerard Devlin will attend.

Financing a specially commissioned work has been a problem for the group. Donations, slow to come in at first, have now been received from Suburban Trust, American Legion, Greenbelt Homes, Inc., Leisure Learning Centers, Greenbelt Consumer Services, Greenbelt Variety and a number of individuals. Parkdale Senior High School is loaning two tympani for the performance as is the Greenbelt Concert Band.

We the People is an original Bicentennial work endorsed by the City of Greenbelt, the Prince Georges American Revolution Bicentennial Commission and the Maryland National Capital Parks and Planning Commission.

The Choral Arts Society is the only community performing arts organization in the Washington area this year to premiere a major choral work written especially for that organization. Freeman says "It has been a challenge to work through new music, from the bottom, giving it our own interpretation. The program is a unique opportunity, rare for a community performing arts organization inasmuch as we will be presenting the premier performance of a major musical composition."

Council Holds Tax Rate Incr. To 5c, Budget Under \$2 Mill.

The officers and executive board of the Lakeside Citizens Association were out in strength at the Special Meeting of the Greenbelt City Council, which was held Monday, June 7, 1976 to adopt the budget for fiscal year 1976-77. Their thorough questioning of items in most sections of the proposed budget capped nearly two solid months of public hearings and examinations of city governmental operations, and caused the final budget decision to be carried over until the wee hours of the next morning.

By that time council was down to squeezing blood out of a turnip, finally reducing the proposed 13c tax rate increase to 5c (or increasing the rate of taxation on real and personal property within the boundaries of the City of Greenbelt to \$1.05 on each one hundred dollars of assessed valuation beginning July 1, 1976). This actually represents an increase of only 2c over the rate in 1971, which at that time was \$1.03 per one hundred dollars, but which subsequently was reduced 3c by Council. As Mayor Gil Weidenfeld pointed out, however, the rate never would have been reduced if council had known that they were going to be faced with the financial shortfalls which unexpectedly occurred—primarily the court-won tax refunds which had to be made to Springhill Lake and to Greenbelt Homes, Inc., the sizes of which were underestimated by the city.

At the outset of the meeting, George Loutsch, President of the Lakeside Citizens Association, was permitted to read a three-page statement that had previously been submitted to Council. In essence, the Association supported the general government expenditures, the proposed 4% across the board average pay raise for city employees, and the addition of two police officers, but strenuously objected to items in the Youth Service Bureau

(Greenbelt CARES) and the Recreation and Parks sections. "One can only look on this Budget item as being out of control," stated Loutsch, "and can see no justification for the major portion of this item being financed through a property tax levy."

Loutsch's statement, and several subsequent comments by others throughout the evening, claimed that owners of free-standing homes were carrying a disproportionate share of the tax burden and that user fees for city facilities and programs must be maximized to provide "relief from this property tax burden." The figures cited were in dollar amounts, which showed larger absolute number in dollar increases for homes of Lakeside residents, (although the actual percentage increase in taxes has been substantially higher for GHI residents). Charles Fuchs, also a board member of the Lakeside Citizens Association, was particularly critical of the support through taxes of any activity which did not prove to be "cost effective." He urged the city to develop a five-year plan and greater rationality to its planning of programs and services.

Joseph Wilkinson stated that he was a free standing home owner on Northway Road, who paid comparable property taxes to Lakeside residents, and that he wanted it understood that not all free standing home owners were in favor of emasculating recreation services—that in fact, he strongly supported the budget before the council "as it stands."

Council Votes

Council considered and then voted on each section of the budget, with Councilmen Charles Schwan, Thomas White, Richard Castaldi and Richard Pilski alternately sharing the honors in making the motions for passage.

Comments by members of council made it clear that they were jointly sharing responsibility for the final budget—that whatever individual differences they may have held were resolved through the hearing and budget review process, and that all actions were unanimous—as they were.

The ordinance to adopt the budget appropriated the following amounts for the following general activity areas: General Government (mostly administration) \$222,700; Public Safety (mostly Police Department) \$452,600; Public Works (mostly waste collection and street maintenance) \$369,600; Parks and Recreation \$419,800 (the largest increase related to providing a full-year's program at the Springhill Lake recreation center); miscellaneous (mostly retirement contributions and Greenbelt CARES) \$180,200; and Debt Service \$138,900.

The total amount appropriated for the new budget was \$1,900,200. Just over \$1 million of this amount will be raised through taxes, of which approximately \$700,000 will be property taxes. The remainder will come predominantly from service charges for the use of services, and from such other sources as revenues from other agencies (approximately one-half million dollars), fines, license fees, and miscellaneous revenues.

At the end of the meeting, Loutsch and Fuchs thanked council on behalf of the Lakeside Citizens Association, for their patience in answering all of the questions and listening to all of their concerns. Loutsch, in a parting shot, suggested, however, that council should raise the city manager's salary even higher because he was now living in a high tax area (an allusion to James Gies's recent move to 2 Maplewood Court).

Sewage Plant Closes

Greenbriar's temporary sewage treatment plant closed in early April when the Washington Suburban Sanitary Commission okayed hook-up into the public system.

Alan Kay, when asked what he plans to do with the plant now, said, "It's been sold. It will be used in Montgomery County. The dismantling of the plant, however, must await completion of the 15 million gallon expansion of the Western Branch Treatment plant."

Along with the closing of the plant has come a closing of the suit-countersuit between the Kay brothers (Greenbriar developers) and former W.S.S.C. Commissioner David Elliott over the opening of the plant.

According to a June 2 story in the Prince Georges Sentinel the federal District Court judge informed both parties he just didn't want to hear the cases and told them to settle out of court. Both suits now have been dismissed by the judge with an order that the charges cannot be revived.

Kay told the News Review "It's best to let it drop. The whole thing is a moot issue, and that's why the suit was settled. The plant was built, operated and closed — it served its purpose."

Bike Ramps for Greenbelt?
 To the Editor:

The current construction of a bikeway on both sides of Greenbelt Road augurs well for the future of this energy-saving and non-polluting form of transportation. The planners and builders of this bikeway are to be commended for their sensitivity to the needs of cyclists, smoothing out street curbs into ramps whenever the bikeway crosses a highway. The same thing has been done on the campus of the University of Maryland, where street curbs are flattened out at certain points, allowing bikers to cross street with greater ease and safety. The curb ramps also serve the need of handicapped people using wheelchairs.

Hopefully the City of Greenbelt will follow the example set on Maryland's campus and along Greenbelt Road by replacing street curbs with bike ramps wherever paths and sidewalks intersect streets in our town. In so doing the city would make biking more pleasant, thereby encouraging travelers to use bikes instead of cars. The provision of bike ramps should also improve traffic safety by diverting current cyclists from streets to paths off-limits to autos. This would reduce the chance of the hapless biker being squashed by speeding automobiles while gasping in their fumes.

Oil Savings

To the Editor:

I have often wondered why in savings of oil per month or year GHI has never mentioned this fact: In 1974 the burners were reset to run two hours less by turning them off from 12 (midnight)-5 a.m. instead of from 1-4 a.m. This means 330 hours difference per night. If it only meant a savings of one gallon of oil per hour or 330 gals. per night and using the least number of running days per year (200), that should come to a savings of 66,000 gals. of oil per year.

I would say that this method is and will be a greater savings per year than any control they now have.

In Determining Success . . .

To the Editor:

If you only want easy answers, don't read this.

I grant that the city (or its designated agent: quasi-public corporation or whatever) may have located a source of funding and a choice of site for projected elderly-intended housing. These are prime determinants of project accomplishment or non-accomplishment, but let us face the fact that they determine nothing else. They have nothing whatever to do with project quality, appropriateness, or potential success.

Are we interested in determining success for this project, or do we want to build only in order to make ourselves feel good? Do we want to fill needs in this community? Whose: our own, or a specific group's? If we want a successful project, there are at least three major, and much more important requirements to consider.

The first of these, and absolutely indispensable, is the ability to describe the "beneficiary group", for whom the project is undertaken, and its specific needs.

It is proper that the process of group/need identification: the surveys, expert testimony, interviews, etc., and the methods of applying them to the problem should be completely visible from start to finish. This is especially true for a public agency: the city. It is definitely not sufficient to rely on any individual to describe these needs vicariously out of his own head, even if he has the experience of belonging to the beneficiary group, himself.

I have not seen any reference to this kind of process or methodology, and I don't think I've been offered any. I've seen no reference to cost/benefit study or need analysis. I think there is a useful place for this project in Greenbelt, but do we intend to build for projected, theoretical needs that the users may possess only in far different forms?

I hope not. It seems grossly insulting, as if we expect to cram others into a mold of our careless making, then expect them to pay gladly for it.

The next requirement is the ability to assign responsibility for translating these applied needs into construction that will meet them.

This may be characterized in terms of space allocations to facilitate necessary processes, equipment that is appropriate and in adequate quantity and construction that is also appropriate: flexible for temporary needs and durable for long-term ones. Probably maintenance costs should be taken into account at this step of the proceedings.

Who in the city administration has experience in any specialized construction project of comparable size? What are the qualifications we can bring to bear on it? There is a considerable gap between the simple desire to build and the qualifications to do so successfully. Do we understand this difference?

A third requirement is the ability to assign or assume responsibility for seeing that the construction meets the specifications drawn up to fill the applied needs. It is further to establish equitable and effective means of solving or circumventing unforeseen problems that may arise.

Do we demonstrate any ability or qualification to meet these responsibilities?

If their avoidance, and especially avoidance of the financial necessities were a desirable objective, then the recent GHI experience would be pertinent. It is not.

I look for demonstrated abilities and qualifications. I do not see them. This concerns me, but I am more concerned that no one in Greenbelt has even raised public voice in their support. It is almost as though the appearance of expressing concern for elderly (or for taxpayer) is more important than the effort of doing so.

Indeed, the debate now has been almost exactly parallel to that on the GHI project over five years ago: and GHI looks forward to more construction projects. The end results are completely foreseeable.

CITY OF GREENBELT, MARYLAND Notice of Charter Amendment

On May 17, 1976 the City Council of Greenbelt, Maryland, adopted Charter Amendment Resolutions 1976-3 and 1976-4, and the following Titles of these Resolutions are fair summaries of the amendments:

Charter Amendment Resolution Number 1976-3

RESOLUTION OF THE CITY OF GREENBELT ADOPTED PURSUANT TO THE AUTHORITY OF ARTICLE 11E OF THE CONSTITUTION OF MARYLAND AND SECTION 13 OF ARTICLE 23A OF THE ANNOTATED CODE OF MARYLAND (1957 EDITION AS AMENDED), TITLE "CORPORATION-MUNICIPAL," SUB-TITLE "HOME RULE," TO AMEND THE CHARTER OF THE CITY OF GREENBELT, MARYLAND, SAID CHARTER BEING SECTION 40 OF ARTICLE 17 OF THE CODE OF PUBLIC LOCAL LAWS OF MARYLAND (1963 EDITION AS AMENDED) AND CONTAINING IN WHOLE OR IN PART THE CHARTER OF THE CITY OF GREENBELT, BY REPEALING AND REENACTING WITH AMENDMENTS SECTION 54, TITLE "CUSTODY OF MONEYS," TO REQUIRE THE DEPOSIT OF MONEYS RECEIVED BY THE CITY WITH FINANCIAL INSTITUTIONS HAVING ACCOUNTS INSURED BY THE FEDERAL DEPOSIT INSURANCE CORPORATION OR THE FEDERAL SAVINGS AND LOAN INSURANCE CORPORATION OR THE MARYLAND SAVINGS-SHARE INSURANCE CORPORATION.

Charter Amendment Resolution Number 1976-4

RESOLUTION OF THE CITY OF GREENBELT ADOPTED PURSUANT TO THE AUTHORITY OF ARTICLE 11E OF THE CONSTITUTION OF MARYLAND AND SECTION 13 OF ARTICLE 23A OF THE ANNOTATED CODE OF MARYLAND (1957 EDITION AS AMENDED), TITLE "CORPORATION-MUNICIPAL," SUB-TITLE "HOME RULE," TO AMEND THE CHARTER OF THE CITY OF GREENBELT, MARYLAND, SAID CHARTER BING SECTION 40 OF ARTICLE 17 OF THE CODE OF PUBLIC LOCAL LAWS OF MARYLAND (1963 EDITION AS AMENDED) AND CONTAINING IN WHOLE OR IN PART THE CHARTER OF THE CITY OF GREENBELT, BY REPEALING AND REENACTING WITH AMENDMENTS PARAGRAPH 2, "DATES OF FINALITY" OF SECTION 63, "TAX PROCEDURE" TO PROVIDE FOR A QUARTERLY DATE FINALITY FOR REAL PROPERTY TAX ASSESSMENTS.

The above amendments shall become and be considered a part of the Charter of the City of Greenbelt, Maryland, according to the terms of the amendments, in all respects to be effective and observed as such, upon the 6th day of July, 1976, unless on or before the fortieth day after passage, which shall be the 26th day of June, 1976, there shall be presented to the Council of the City of Greenbelt, Maryland, or mailed to it by registered mail, a petition for referendum signed by twenty percent or more of the persons qualified to vote in the regular election of the City of Greenbelt, requesting that either or both of the above Charter Amendments be submitted on referendum to the voters of the City of Greenbelt.
