City Concerned About Disposition Of Surplus Land in Parcels 1 and 2

Surplus land, a rezoning petition and a State adolescent pregnancy bill will be discussed by the Greenbelt City Council at its meeting on Monday, March 3. The issues received a preliminary airing on February 26.

Council is concerned about the disposition of 72 acres of Board of Education property on Parcels 1 and 2 at the end of Northway and Hamilton Place. Slated for a 3-school complex in 1966, the Board deeded the unused land to the county in mid-1979. For some time council has shown interest in the property and so notified the county.

Several months ago, City Manager James K. Giese met with an administrative assistant from the office of County Executive Lawrence Hogan. Giese made two suggestions for the possible use of the property. The first proposal, for which city council members have voiced preference, would have the county transfer the entire acreage to the City of Greenbelt. The second provides that if the county will not agree to the transfer of the land to the city because of the value of the property, the city and the county will engage in joint planning of the property for ultimate development prior to its sale. Adequate areas would be retained for park and open space and the remainder sold with restrictive covenants as to its use. Under this proposal the property would essentially be planned for subdivision prior to its sale and the

sale conditioned upon its development as planned.

Giese noted: "This is a method that has been used successfully in the development of much of the vacant land in Greendale, Wis., Greenbelt's sister city."

Hogan, in a letter to the city in March 1979, wrote that because of the imposition of TRIM he preferred to try to sell all surplus properties in order to gain revenue for the county.

Council members studied the proposals in a work session on Tuesday. They also discussed provisions of the county's surplus lands law dealing with first acquisition rights. It appears that the city would have first right under county law to buy land within its borders for the amount paid by the county originally, plus expense incidental to the retransfer.

Rezoning Petition

Council accepted Advisory Planning Board Report #226 dealing with the rezoning of 2,3807 acres of land from R-R (Rural Residential) to C-O (commercial office) for a medical office building. Located on the south side of Good Luck Road, the parcel lies just east of the intersection of Kenilworth Avenue across from Greenbelt Park. Since the property is not located within the city limits, council can only comment on the petition rather than make recommendations.

APB is opposed to the rezoning because it fears that "commercial zoning for this parcel could be the start of strip com-

mercial development along Good Luck Road, east of Kenilworth Avenue." Additionally APB pointed out that C-O zoning would be an intrusion on Greenbelt Park and is contrary to the area Master Plan (Bladensburg-Defense Heights Master Planning Area).

Pregnancy Bill

City Manager James K. Giese asked council members whether they wanted to act on House Bill 444 on adolescent pregnancy. Giese also wanted guidance on whether department heads should take a position on legislation on which council had taken no stand. Director of Greenbelt CARES Carol Leventhal had drafted a letter to Governor Harry Hughes in support of the bill.

Council members seemed reluctant to go on record concerning State legislation on which they had no expertise. However, the council thought that department heads like Leventhal should have a chance to comment on legislation as individuals.

Giese said the purpose of this bill is to establish state programs that will address the problems of adolescent pregnancy, parenting and pregnancy prevention and to develop and implement community-based comprehensive multi-service programs.

Council deferred action insofar as expressing its view until Monday when they will also review recent changes in the bill and hear comments from Leventhal.

District Council Upholds City On Gas Station Modernization

The Prince Georges County Council, sitting as the District Council, on Monday, January 28 approved (9-0) the various special exceptions and variances requested by Mobil Oil for modernizing its existing 40-year-old gasoline station on Crescent Road at Centerway. However, the District Council also approved the conditions which the City of Greenbelt had asked for—attendant service and no convenience food store.

In so doing, the District Council agreed with the arguments set forth in a 4 page letter from city manager, James K. Giese and in oral argument before the District Council by City Solicitor Emmett Nanna.

In his letter to the District Council, dated November 9, 1979, Giese took exception to the decision of the Zoning Hearing Examiner that the city's conditions appear "to be an unwarranted restriction."

Giese points out that only the existing use—a full service gasoline station with repair facilities and attendant service—is what the city has agreed should be modernized. He lists the special exceptions and variances to which the city is willing to accede in order to allow the needed modernization: (1) building within right-of-way, thus restricting the future widening of Crescent Road; (2) departure from normal landscape design standards; (3) loss of a long-established sidewalk connecting the commercial center to a pedestrian underpass; and (4) driveways that are not built to current standards.

City's Conditions

In justifying the condition for attendant service which the city council had recommended, Giese took note of the attraction to the core of Greenbelt as a place of residence for persons who are elderly or have physical disabilities, including the new city facility, Green Ridge House, just one block away. "Council feels it is essential," Giese wrote in his letter, "that the station offer attendant services . . . since some of its customers are not able or willing to fill their own vehicles with gasoline."

Council was equally concerned, Giese wrote, that the planned service bays not be turned into a mini-market for the sale of groceries sometime in the future.

Zoning Examiner's Decision

In justifying his decision, the zoning examiner, according to Giese, had said: "If persons are unwilling to service their own vehicles, that is an individual choice; if they are too debilitated to perform such services, then perhaps they shouldn't drive." Giese called the statement "calous and not substantiated by the record."

'Kid of the Week' Program Started at Center School

Giese claimed the zoning examiner erred by failing to make certain findings required by the Zoning Ordinance. The Ordinance requires the District Council to find that "the proposed use as a gas station (1) will have no detrimental effect on vehicular or pedestrian traffic, (2) is necessary to the public in the surrounding area, and (3) must not . . . upset the balance of land usage in the area for other trades and commercial uses . . ."

"Only a full service (gas) station that does not also operate as a quick convenience food store . . . meets those criteria," Giese summed up. "A self-service gas station is not a demonstrated need of the community and to grant the special exceptions and variances to allow a convenience food store to be placed closer to the street than others in the neighborhood would upset the balance of land usage in the area for other trades and commercial uses."

Police Still Looking For Missing Mother



Three-day-old "Vickie," found abandoned in Springhill Lake, will be put up for adoption if the search for her mother proves fruitless.

Greenbelt Police are baffled. After two weeks, they still have no solid leads in the search for Vicki's mother.

Vickie was found abandoned in Springhill Lake on February

16. Since then, Lt. John C. Krob of the Greenbelt Police has appealed to the public and appeared on television, asking for any information about the child, but to no avail. Most of the calls have been from people offering to adopt the 7-pound 3-ounce baby.

Teams of officers scoured Springhill Lake questioning residents and custodial personnel. While several leads were developed through the search and the media coverage, none turned up the mother.

Vicki was left in front of the apartment of Francis and Barbara McQuade of Breezewood Terrace. She was wrapped in a yellow blanket, somehow appropriate to the banana box she was in. The mother was nice enough to leave an ample supply of Pampers.

Vicki, so named because she is the twenty-second foster child of her foster parents and "V" is the twenty-second letter in the alphabet, is doing fine. But she still does not have a mother.

The child has been placed under the jurisdiction of the county Department of Social Services. If the mother is not found, social services will petition the District



Bruce Robinson of Silver Spring won the 19th Annual George Washington's Birthday Marathon over a 330-member field with a time of 2:26:22, more than four minutes slower than the National Agricultural Research Center course record.

Susan Crowe, 24, was the first woman finisher with 3:06:52 time, good for 72nd place overall.

A bitter wind on the final loop forced an unusually high 105 runners to drop out of the February 19 race.

Al Morris of Greenbelt was 125th with a time of 3:17:44. Another city resident, Alexander Barnes, finished the course in 3:49:35 for a 193rd place finish.

The Marathon attracted runners from as far away as Michigan, Connecticut, Massachusetts and New York as well as runners from Virginia, Maryland and the District.

Many organizations and Greenbelters helped make this a safe race. Prince Georges and Agricultural Center Police, the Red Cross, Laurel Amateur Radio Club, Alen Dale Boy Scout Troop, Greenbelt Recreation Dept., and the race sponsors, Greenbelt Jaycees.


