School Board Hears Testimony About Greenbelt School Closing

Over one hundred people signed up to testify at a school board public hearing on February 18 about school consolidations. Before testimony began, it was obvious from the long list of speakers that many of these individuals, including those from Greenbelt, would not have an opportunity to speak. Although members of the Greenbelt Study Committee could not present their position at the public hearing, Chairman Howard Savage told the *News Review* that the committee would continue to lobby the school board for renovation of Center School, bus transportation, a crossing guard, and early transfer to Greenbelt Junior High for present North End fifth graders.

North End resident Bill Barber left a written statement with the school board calling for bus transportation to Center School from North End. Howard reported that School Study Committee members had discussed the issue with the school transportation department informally that evening and had been assured that if the distance is greater than one mile, a bus will be provided. By Barber's calculation, the distance is 1.1 miles.

North End PTA President Mary Moien told the *News Review* that the group would consider asking the City of Greenbelt for a 4-way stop sign at Laurel Hill and Ridge Roads, rumble strips before the Crescent Road crosswalk near St. Hugh's, moving the pedestrian warning sign farther from that

crosswalk, and possibly a pedestrian crossing light near that crosswalk.

Although Greenbelters had no chance to discuss the proposed Center and North End consolidation, attention was called to a Greenbelt school, Springhill Lake Elementary, during the long evening by a group of Berwyn Heights citizens upset about the proposed closing of their "community school." As one of several alternatives to this closure, Berwyn Heights supporters suggested that Springhill Lake be closed instead. Its students could be transferred to Berwyn Heights and Greenbelt Center or Oakcrest Elementary Schools. Springhill Lake could then be converted to a special education center instead of Powder Mill.

Reasons given for closing Springhill Lake were its lack of air-conditioning, a potential problem with the anticipated noise and dirt from future Metro construction, the school's limited access routes, and unstable community and school population. Ann Garofalo from Berwyn Heights reported that Springhill Lake apartments have a one-third annual turnover rate and a small proportion of children. She felt this situation would increase as more U. of Maryland students, attracted by a shuttle bus, moved into the apartment community. Berwyn Heights parents are concerned about losing their school—the location of many community recreational programs. Closing Springhill Lake would not have a detrimental effect on the community, said Ray Smith, because the Youth Center is used for recrea-

tional activities instead of school facilities.

Another alternative presented by Berwyn Heights was the closure of Paint Branch Elementary School. Among other reasons, the use of air conditioning and lack of suitable windows was given. Berwyn Heights had a large contingent at the meeting and several members gave statements in support of keeping the school open. One presentation made use of a humorous hand puppet.

Many other contingents were present. One of the largest, supporters of Samuel Morse Elementary School, vehemently asked why that school had been chosen for closure. The first speaker of the evening, Jim Herl, spoke for Councilman Frank Casula. Although a number of schools should be closed, he said, Samuel Morse, Hyattsville, and Berwyn Heights should not be closed. He requested a Citizen's Advisory Task Force to study the closings. Another early speaker, College Park Mayor Pro Tem Kushner stated that a plan was needed to equalize the school system by modernizing older schools which are kept open.

People from Colmar Manor also asked that their school be kept open. On the other hand, the PTAs of Powder Mill and Calverton supported the plan. The proposed elementary school consolidation plan is on the School Board agenda this Thursday, February 26. The meeting will begin at 6:30 in the Board Meeting Room in Upper Marlboro. School information officer Kathy Snyder informed the *News Review* that she knew of no major changes in the plan at this time.

Multiple Code Violations in GHI Electrical Systems Complicate Work for Sub-Contractor

Individual member-owners of Greenbelt Homes, Inc., will be responsible for the electric code violations that are being found currently in 50% of the units, the Board of Directors decided at its regular meeting February 19. The board adopted three design drawings for service side additions for frame homes and voted to support member Joe Michiline in his quest for a gold medal at next summer's Deaf Olympics in Germany.

The board spent most of the evening on a hot issue—violations of the electric code. Edison Electric, the rehab sub-contractor hired to test and ground the electrical system and replace receptacles in the original frame structures (not additions), has been finding many more code violations than the company can correct under its contract. Having now completed the contract work

in over 650 units, officials estimate the cost of the violations found thus far at \$40,000.

At issue are such questions as (1) who will do the corrective work and (2) who will pay. Edison Electric, which already has permits to do electrical work in the units, cannot receive final approval of its contract work by the county inspector until all code violations are corrected. Without that approval, the contractor cannot be paid. Thus Edison Electric is willing to do the work.

Several problems arise here. Should the individual member be given a chance to make the corrections himself? The board decided, yes. Some corrective work is as simple as disconnecting an improperly used extension cord or appliance; other items require a licensed electrician. A few are so serious as to present an immediate fire hazard. Edison Electric has been disconnecting wires in these situations and will continue to do so.

Should members have the option of selecting their own contractor to do the work? Again, the board decided, yes. Management pointed out several potential problems: (1) there could be considerable delay involved in giving members either of the above mentioned options. (2) It could be expensive for GHI if staff must notify members individually and then check up on whether the work has been done properly. What does the corporation do, asked Kopstein, if a member repeatedly says he will do the work, but doesn't? The board's answer was to give members a very limited amount of time in which to do the work themselves or by their choice of contractor. If the work has not been performed at the end of the time, Edison Electric will do it immediately.

The question of who is to pay brought more static; the board was split. It took several motions and amendments, a 15 minute

Two More Fund Raisers As Michiline Wins Again

Joe Michiline, Greenbelt's U.S. Deaf Olympics Trials Champion in the pole vault, has been traveling far and wide in an effort to retain his competitive edge so that he will be in shape to win in West Germany in July. He has been entering indoor track and field meets for masters (over 40 years) and competing in the sub-master category, age 30-34 years. This open competition is more difficult than competition limited to deaf athletes. Michiline placed 1st in the pole vault at Slippery Rock College in Pennsylvania on February 15, then second at Eastern Regional Masters at Lehigh University, Bethlehem, Pa. This weekend he travels to the University of Michigan, Ann Arbor, Michigan for the National Masters Championships.

Joe recently purchased two new poles and waited several weeks for them to arrive from the West coast. Now they have to be broken in before he can get up and over the height he has set for himself to win the pole vault in the Deaf Olympics. Joe hopes to recapture the world pole vaulting record for the deaf by scaling 15 feet.

The Greenbelt Jaycees are leading the campaign to raise funds for the cause.

Help Joe Michiline Bring Home the Gold

Saturday, February 28, at 8 p.m. in the Utopia Theater, the Greenbelt Jaycees will sponsor the 3rd annual Gong Show. Half of the proceeds from the show go to the Joe Michiline Deaf Olympics Fund. The Jaycees have been trying desperately to raise \$4000 for Joe so he may participate in the World Games for the Deaf this July.

Joe's chances to win the Gold Medal in pole vaulting is extremely promising. He holds the U.S. Deaf Athlete record of 14 feet 2.25 inches in the event, which is better than the World Deaf Olympic record of 14 feet, 1.25 inches. However, if Joe's expenses of \$4,000 are not raised by mid-March, he will not be allowed to attend the event in Germany this summer. This will probably mean one less Gold Medal for the United States.

The other half of the proceeds will benefit the Greenbelt Cultural Arts Center, where the show will be held at 8 p.m. Twenty-two acts are scheduled, promising an evening of entertainment mixed with fun and laughs for all.

Survey Needed

To the Editor:

In the Feb. 17, 1981 issue, the News Review erroneously reported that I expressed opposition to the proposed comprehensive survey of GHI homes approved by the Board of Directors at its February 12 meeting.


While I raised some questions about the details of the survey, I unequivocally supported the need for the survey. This survey apparently is required under the terms of Section 8 government subsidies. However, of greater importance is the fact that realistic estimates of rehabilitation costs for Phase 2 absolutely cannot be developed nor can valid specifications for bids be prepared without this survey. The initial specifications prepared and issued without such a survey were seriously deficient in that they were incomplete and lacked adequate detail. Though 35 contractors picked up copies of these specifications, only 20 submitted bids, of which only 2 had any semblance of validity. An architectural consultant employed by GHDC was severely critical of the lack of a comprehensive survey. As a result, the process must be repeated but with proper and detailed specifications.

The survey will indeed be costly. It would be more costly, inefficient, and time-consuming if the survey is not accomplished.



Metro "E" Route

The Metrorail "E" route to Greenbelt is scheduled for discussion and decision during the next few weeks by the Prince Georges County Council. There will be a briefing and discussion of the "E" route general plans on Tuesday, March 3, with a final decision to be made two weeks later on March 17.

Parris N. Glendening, chairman of the county council, in a recent letter to Greenbelt's Mayor Gil Weidenfeld, has said. "This is clearly one of the most important issues the council will address during the 1981 session. Accordingly, it is my intention as Council Chairman to press the Council for a decision on the scheduled date."

The decision by the county council will be whether to approve the proposed alignment for which engineering and environmental impact studies have already been completed, or to recommend the studying of other possible alignments. Any major shift to another alignment, such as is desired by University Park, would require further evaluation, environmental impact statements, and public hearings. Such action and the consequent delay would increase construction and planning costs. It would also cause the loss of the "E" route for the foreseeable future (or, according to a Metro official, perhaps permanently).

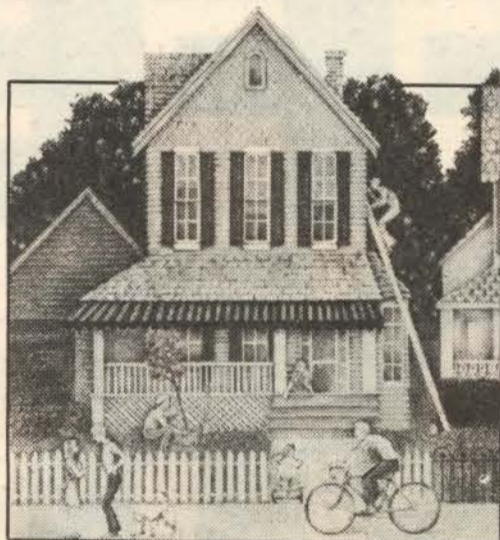

GHI BOARD con't fr. p. 1 break, some changed language and repeated explanations of that language before the board succeeded in voting 4 to 3 to contract with Edison Electric to do the work which will then be charged to the individual owner to be paid with his monthly charges. All code violations identified by Edison Electric will be verified by GHDC staff, members will be notified and will have the option to do the work themselves or have it done. Board members voting in favor of the motion were: Conrad, Hogensen, Donaldson and Lewis; voting no were Jenkins, James, and Curtis.

Siding
With the cost of vinyl siding expected to go up 14.5% in April, the board supported management's recommendation to sign a contract for the installation of vinyl siding (Gold Bond) as soon as possible. Several agencies must be contacted for approval of GHI's intention to fund half the work under Phase I and half the work under Phase II. The siding installation has been held up since last summer awaiting approval by the Advisory Council on Historic Preservation of the change from fibre shingle to vinyl. Final inspection of insulation is needed before siding can be installed. GHI is currently completing negotiations with the insulation company—Universal—to complete that job.

Because the siding will come from a new supplier, members in frame units will again need to select colors. Samples will be displayed soon.

Correction
Anxious to correct an error in last week's *News Review* article on GHI, member Nat Shinderman stated that his name should not have been linked with others who opposed the individual unit survey which the board approved last week. "I thoroughly endorsed the detailed survey, Shinderman said. He had questioned some duplication he thought to be unnecessary, but felt that problem was nominal.

Standard Design for Additions
The board approved three concept drawings for service side additions for frame homes and made a few changes to the set of standards to be followed. The changes, recommended by Stan Sersen, who designed the addition plans and who has since become staff architect, would increase the maximum possible depth of a proposed addition.

The aesthetics and maintenance committees and the staff concurred on the three designs which were presented to the board. These designs were selected from Sersen's original dozen. Sersen will now produce working drawings which will be made available free of charge to members for their use. The advantages, which would be multiple, center on (1) ease of approval for both member and staff and (2) improved exterior appearance through uniformity of design—a new concept for GHI. GHI is now trying to be careful not to allow on the service side the kind of hodgepodge of dissimilar additions which now exists on the garden side of many

courts. Because service side additions have not been allowed in past years, the original uniformity of design still exists.

A member who appeared before the board to request approval of a non-conforming service side addition poses a timely test of the board's mettle. The member was outraged to find that going her own way would no longer receive scant notice from staff or board as in the past. She was directed to proceed through the steps for obtaining the required special consideration of her case before coming to the board.

Cable TV, Co-op
Bruce Jacobs, representing the National Citizens Committee for Broadcasting, encouraged the housing co-op to support the idea of forming a subscriber co-op for cable tv in Greenbelt. "With your experience as a large and successful housing co-op, Greenbelt would be a good place to try a cable co-op." He warned that the cable industry is "going to change radically" during the 15 year period that a cable company would have a franchise under the ordinance now being set up by the city council. Subscribers would be highly motivated toward making changes and adapting to new technologies. Private cable companies, he suggested, would be more interested in regaining their initial investment and, later, taking their profits. Jacobs also suggested the option of a joint venture—a big cable company in partnership with a subscriber cooperative.

Lease Extension Tabled
The board tabled a request for extension of a three year sublease for a second 3-year term. The owner is on overseas assignment for the Army. Rarely approving a lease for more than the 2-year limit, management recommended denial. Board and members present appeared split on the issue. Member Bettie Denson, who had spent five years overseas herself, was very sympathetic to the request. On the other hand, Kopstein reported that the last time an owner was freely granted several extensions (resulting in a 7-year sublease) the owners, on returning, immediately sold their GHI unit, benefited from inflation, and relocated within the Washington area.

Jenkins moved to table. He was supported by Conrad, Lewis and Curtis. He asked staff to inquire

Michiline Fund

The board expressed its support for member Joe Michiline by voting unanimously to contribute \$50 to the Joe Michiline Deaf Olympics Fund. They wished him success.

On the National Scene

Kopstein urged directors and others to attend and participate in the March 30 - April 1 Legislative Conference of the National Association of Housing Cooperatives to be held in Washington. He pointed out that GHI is the largest housing co-op in the area and is closest to the event. Noting that many senior members of Congress would be attending the conference, Kopstein was anxious for GHI members to "be well-represented and show leadership." Kopstein, who is a co-chairman of the NAHC Legislative Committee, said, "Co-ops may wish to express concern over President Reagan's directions." The board approved the registration expenditure of \$75 each to send three representatives to the conference.

In a related item, board members received copies of mailgrams sent by GHI's legislative chairman, Tony McCarthy, to Maryland's senators urging support for the National Consumer Cooperative Bank. The co-op bank is currently under attack from the Office of Management and Budget.

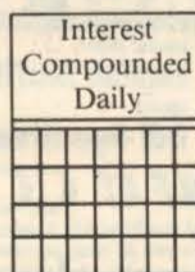

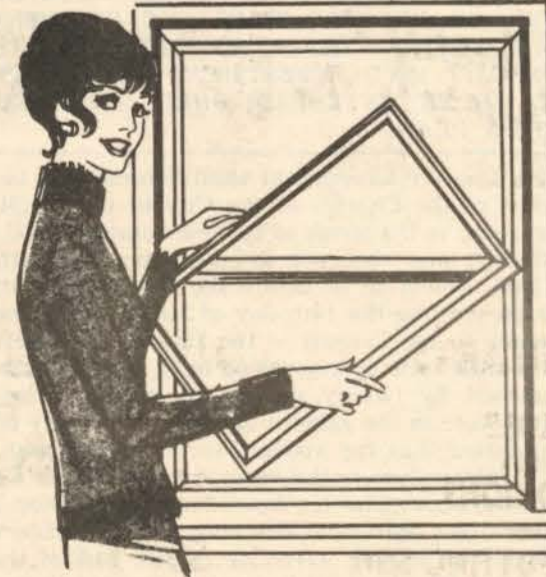

NOTICE OF CHARTER AMENDMENT

At its regular meeting of February 2, 1981, the City Council of Greenbelt, Maryland, adopted Charter Amendment Resolution Number 1981-1 (Resolution No. 468); and the following Title of the Resolution is a fair summary of the amendment:

Charter Amendment Resolution Number 1981-1

RESOLUTION OF THE CITY OF GREENBELT ADOPTED PURSUANT TO THE AUTHORITY OF ARTICLE 11E OF THE CONSTITUTION OF MARYLAND AND SECTION 13 OF ARTICLE 23A OF THE ANNOTATED CODE OF MARYLAND (1957 EDITION AS AMENDED), TITLE "CORPORATION-MUNICIPAL", SUBTITLE "HOME RULE", TO AMEND THE CHARTER OF THE CITY OF GREENBELT, SAID CHARTER BEING SUBTITLE 40 OF ARTICLE 17 OF THE CODE OF PUBLIC LOCAL LAWS OF MARYLAND (1963 EDITION AS AMENDED) AND CONTAINING IN WHOLE OR IN PART THE CHARTER OF THE CITY OF GREENBELT, BY REPEALING AND REENACTING WITH AMENDMENTS SECTION 54, TITLE "CUSTODY OF MONEYS", TO PROVIDE THAT THE PROVISIONS OF THE SAID SECTION SHALL NOT BE APPLICABLE TO THE DEPOSIT AND INVESTMENT OF MONEYS DEFERRED UNDER AN ESTABLISHED DEFERRED COMPENSATION PLAN.

The above Charter amendment shall become and be considered a part of the Charter of the City of Greenbelt, Maryland, according to the terms of the amendment, in all respects to be effective and observed as such, upon the 24th day of March, 1981, unless on or before the fortieth day after passage, which shall be the 14th day of March, 1981, there shall be presented to the Council of the City of Greenbelt, Maryland, or mailed to it by registered mail, a petition for referendum signed by twenty percent or more of the persons qualified to vote in the general election of the City of Greenbelt, requesting that the above Charter amendment be submitted on referendum to the voters of the City of Greenbelt. A copy of the above Charter Amendment Resolution is posted in the Greenbelt Municipal Building in accordance with the requirements of Section 13(d) of Article 23A of the Annotated Code of Maryland, and may be obtained from the City Clerk, 25 Crescent Road, Greenbelt, Maryland - Telephone 474-3870.
