Project 80 Cuts Swath Across Greenbelt

Project 80, the giant water pipeline being laid by the Washington Suburban Sanitary Commission to link the Central Ave. area of lower Prince Georges County with a Potomac River filtration plant in Montgomery County, is making its rather conspicuous mark now across the Greenbelt landscape. Under construction by the Marbro Co. of Beltsville, the current section of the vast pipeline connects with sections previously laid. According to a spokesman for the WSSC, the Greenbelt portion is scheduled for completion around October 1982.

The right-of-way for the 96"-diameter pipeline leads from the south end of the municipal warehouse, where an earlier completed section crossed Kenilworth Ave., and will travel along the northern edge of the Beltway exit ramp through city parkland. From there it will move through Parcel 15 somewhat to the west of the high-rise apartment building, on the projected right-of-way for Prince James Way extended and will reach Greenbelt Rd. west of the American Legion parking lot. A swath of trees in the wooded tract next to the Beltway has already been cleared for this purpose.

After crossing Greenbelt Rd., the pipeline will parallel the highway between the Lutheran Church building and the roadway. From there it will follow a diagonal path, already cleared of trees, between the church and a private residence that fronts on the Baltimore-Washington Park-



way. After crossing the Parkway, it will link up with a section of pipeline laid earlier in the Greenway Shopping Center. Heavy construction equipment is currently working at the west end of the church parking lot.

At the request of the city, which received \$11,000 from the WSSC over a year ago for its right-of-way on municipal land, the pipeline was moved in some distance from the Beltway to leave a buffer of trees between the residential property of Charlestowne Village and the heavily traveled highway artery.

Access Road

In order to reach the construction site below the dam in the Lake Park, the Marbro Co. has worked out an agreement with the city to use what is called the haul road from the west end of the Lake parking lot. This is a dirt trail used by city service vehicles

to provide access to the band stand and picnic areas.

Marbro, which will use only that section of the road to the northern edge of the dam, has agreed to regrade the road to eliminate an area where the surface is too steep for the heavy construction equipment used to lay the pipeline. Marbro will also resurface the road with asphalt pavement.

The agreement is considered a boon to both parties — to Marbro because the company will not have to clear an access road to reach the pipeline right-of-way, and to the city because of the improvement to the haul road, a necessary artery for service vehicles. A further condition of the agreement between the parties states that Marbro will take responsibility for repairing possible damage to the Lake parking lot by the contractor's heavy equipment.

City Supports Rezoning Request For Western Development Tract

On Wednesday, July 22, city manager James K. Giese attended a public hearing before the Zoning Hearing Examiner on petitions presented by Western Development, owners of 12 acres of land on both sides of Hanover Parkway east and southeast of the Greenway Shopping Center. Giese had been directed by the city council to indicate support for the rezoning.

In question are applications to change the zoning of that portion of the land lying east of Hanover Parkway to R-T (Town Houses) and that portion west of the Parkway to C-O (Commercial-Office). Also under consideration was a request for a special exception for a planned service station in the southwest corner of the intersection of Hanover Parkway and Greenbelt Rd.

The city has a direct interest in this property since an informal agreement has been reached with Western Development for the

city to annex this acreage. A letter of intent to annex has been filed with the city but a formal agreement has not yet been worked out. Western Development had asked for the city's support of the rezoning and for assistance in financing public improvements, including storm water management.

Although no definite plans have yet been filed concerning development of the property, the rezoning is in conformity with adjacent land usage. The property abuts on the Windsor Green tract on one side, and the Greenway Shopping Center on the other. Both the city's Advisory Planning Board and the Technical Staff of the County Planning Board have supported the rezoning request.

Testifying for the developer at the July 22 meeting was the developer's traffic engineer, Lou Slade of Gorov/Slade, who indicated the counts he had made during the preceding month that included traffic from the Greenway Shopping Center tended to confirm his earlier projections. He estimated that the ultimate

volume of traffic on Hanover Parkway, if the requested rezoning is approved, would be at an adequate level of service pending minor improvements at the intersection. These improvements would include a double left turn lane from Hanover Parkway on to Greenbelt Rd. and a third lane on the north side of Greenbelt Rd. between Hanover Parkway and the Baltimore-Washington Parkway.

Following the meeting, the Hearing Examiner held the record open at the request of the People's Zoning Counsel, Barry Levan, so that the traffic specialist on the staff of the Maryland National Park and Planning Commission could review Slade's traffic analysis and reconcile it with that done by the technical staff.

Gas Station Testimony

RONALD OTT JOINS SEVEN OTHER CANDIDATES FOR COUNCIL SLOTS

Another name has been added to the list of Greenbelt city council candidates as Ronald Ott, Chairman of the city's Park and Recreation Advisory Board, presented the required nomination form before the filing deadline last Monday. He joins challengers Ed James, Ed Putens, and Robert Zugby in vying for the five council seats against incumbents Gil Weidenfeld, Thomas White, Richard Pilski and Richard Castaldi.

On Tuesday evening, August 8, the eight candidates met at the city offices to draw for their positions on the September ballot. After introductory remarks by the city clerk, Gudrun Mills, Betty Moore, Chairman of the Board of Elections, started the drawing. Each candidate or someone of his choosing—usually a family member—was asked to draw one of eight identical envelopes containing numbers from 2 to 9, indicating ballot positions. Number 1 was eliminated since that space on the voting machines is larger than the others.

The final order for ballot posi-

tions is as follows: Ronald Ott, No. 2; Richard Castaldi, No. 3; Thomas White, No. 4; Ed Putens, No. 5; Gil Weidenfeld, No. 6; Richard Pilski, No. 7; Robert Zugby, No. 8; and Ed James, No. 9.

Members of the Board of Elections, beside Chairman Moore, who supervised the drawing, were Joe Comproni, Jule Churchill, Pat Gardes, and Nat Shinderman.

Registration

Although the deadline has been passed to file as a candidate, there is still time for Greenbelt residents to register to vote in the September 15 election.

Citizens may register at the city offices during regular office hours, Monday through Friday, from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Also the city clerk has arranged for on-site registration from now until the books close at three additional places: Greenbelt Homes office on Hamilton Pl., Greenbriar and Springhill Lake Community Buildings. (See city ad for more information.)

Persons who cannot register at those times may request a voter registration form by writing to the City Clerk, 25 Crescent Road. (See city ad for more information.) The last day to register will be August 17.

Once registered, citizens need not reregister as long as they live here continuously and have voted in at least one of the two previous regular city elections. Persons who have never registered here or who have moved out of town and then moved back or who have missed voting in the last two general elections must register again.

Council Sees Slide Show, Gets Certificates of Appreciation

Meeting only once a month during the summer, the Greenbelt city council had a number of routine matters to act upon at its July 13th session. The beginning of the evening, however, was spiced up with two presentations — one by former Greenbelter Bobbie Willey, representing the Prince Georges Association for Retarded Citizens, of certificates of appreciation to council and other community leaders and the showing of a slide-tape show. The former (see separate story on page 6) evoked a picture-taking session and both elicited many words of praise.

Councilman Thomas White presented the slide show, which he had used for a panel session about municipal support for the arts at the recent Maryland Municipal League convention at Ocean City. The slide show had been prepared under the direction of Administrative Assistant Michael McLaughlin and Recreation Director Hank Irving. "My participation on the panel was greatly facilitated by this work," White said.

Highlights of the show included aerial views of Greenbelt, a picture of the mother-and-child statue in the Center, the Center School friezes, views of the Greenbelt Concert Band of Prince Georges County in practice sessions and in performance, views of Greenbelters from preschoolers to senior citizens participating in arts and crafts activities, a shot of the Labor Day Festival art contest, and a history of the Greenbelt Theatre and its re-emergence as the Utopia Theatre under the aegis of the Greenbelt Cultural Arts Assn. The show was enthusiastically received by those at the meeting.

Later in the evening, council expressed support of another part of Greenbelt life—the contributions of the Volunteer Fire Dept. & Rescue Squad. Council voted to write a letter in support of its position against a new order changing the emergency chain of command during daytime hours. Under the new rule, paid Battalion Commanders, who may not be from Greenbelt, would be in command at emergency sites where the geographically nearest volunteer chief or deputy chief was not present.

Council had met with representatives of the Department at a previous work session (see News Review article of July 9). It decided to send the letter to members of the county council, to the county executive, to County Fire Chief M. H. Estep, and to other interested municipalities. Councilman Richard Castaldi also agreed to present the city's position at an upcoming meeting in Upper Marlboro with the county fire chief.

"We all agreed," said councilman Richard Pilski, "that the fire department has done a tremendous job all these years."

Windsor Green Streets

Several street construction items received council attention. First, council accepted two sections of Windsor Green streets into the city road system except for driveway entrances and lead sidewalks. One acceptance was conditional upon a Washington Suburban Sanitary Commission acceptance of the storm drainage system.

Council also authorized Mayor Gil Weidenfeld to execute a right-of-way agreement with Greenway Shopping Center. The agreement permits Greenway to use a city right-of-way for a retaining wall. Partially on the city property, the retaining wall was needed for a Pepco electric transformer.

Center Parking

Council preferred to defer action on a request from the attorney for George Christacos, owner of the commercial center build-

ings, to establish a parking district of at least 340 off-street parking spaces. City manager James Giese noted that the request was complicated by another city agreement to provide parking spaces for the new post office below the Co-op food store. Council members decided to schedule a future work session on July 27 with commercial center business people, and to hold a public hearing before making a decision on the request. All felt they needed more background information.

During the evening council passed two resolutions in conformity with the 1982 budget. Effective with the election of the new council on September 15, council salaries will rise by \$500 per year — to \$3400 for the mayor and \$3000 for each councilman annually. The resolution passed 4-1, with only councilman White voting against the measure. The other resolution established fees for judges and clerks in the upcoming election.

Tidbits

Council decided not to take action on handgun control other than to inform the Metropolitan Washington Council of Governments, one of whose committees introduced the subject, that the city feels the state or federal government is the appropriate level for such action; refused to take action on a liquor license transfer request for the Arco Mini-market in Springhill Lake, which is changing ownership; declined to reconsider a previous decision not to contribute to a regional fund for water resources management activities as outside the city's responsibility.

The mayor was appointed to serve as the city's representative on a Prince Georges Municipal Assn. committee, and council agreed to pay his expenses for a Maryland Municipal League Board workshop he would attend. Early in the evening they heard a complaint from citizen Charlie Kendall concerning the behavior of city police in directing traffic during the July 4 fireworks display.

The final two regular meetings of the current Greenbelt council were scheduled for August 10 and September 14.

City Council Actions

The Greenbelt City Council met for a short special meeting on Monday, July 27 to discuss two requests for waiver of construction requirements, a cost certification of special assessments for the Greenway shopping center, and TV cable deregulation.

The first request was for a waiver of street construction requirements in parcel R at Glen Ora (Windsor Green). The street is adjacent to a playground, and is not needed at present. Assurances have been given by developers Kay and Rozansky that the street will be constructed when townhouses are built at some time in the future on adjacent land. If the parcel is sold to U.S. Homes the purchase price will reflect the need to build the street. Council decided to ask the Windsor Green Homeowners Association for its views before granting the waiver.

Council also agreed to accede to a request for a waiver of sidewalk construction on Walker Drive opposite to the side on which the new Prudential building is being built. This waiver is consistent with past waivers granted by the council.

Council adopted a lengthy motion approving the cost certification for the Greenway Center special assessment improvement and authorizing the City Treasurer to render bills. After Councilman Tom White read the motion, which passed unanimously, councilman Charles Schwan quipped that this motion involving \$2,024,000 dollars passed more quickly than one to purchase paper clips would have. Council expressed dissatisfaction with S 898, a bill that would deregulate cable television and reduce local authority to control cable services and fees. The city staff will contact Senators Mathias and Sarbanes and urge them to vote on the Senate floor to delete the Cable deregulation rider from the bill.

Work Session

The meeting was followed by a work session in the library of the city offices. Council discussed problems connected with the building of sidewalks in the Center Mall area and the parking area. The Post Office will be moving the first week in August, but this should not seriously affect parking for merchants in the upper Mall. There was a consensus that the city should be given parking authority and have control of parking. They also discussed possible annexation of land on the south side of the city to even out boundaries, and rejected an offer of two extremely aged and decrepit vehicles to use in transporting Greenbelt's senior citizens.

service station is in fact needed, whether it is too close to a school building, whether the parking layout will preserve enough green space, and whether the proposed sign is aesthetically acceptable.

Speaking to the first question was Vic Rasheed of the Greater Washington Maryland Service Station Assn., who mildly opposed the proposal. Although he noted that there were already 24 service stations within a 3-mile radius of the site, he nevertheless refrained from making a judgment on the need for another station.

Discussion at the hearing, however, brought out some ambiguity concerning whether or not the location was in violation of a county ordinance requiring a distance of at least 300 feet between a public school and a service station. On a direct line, only 256 feet separate the property from Eleanor Roosevelt High School. But the Western's attorney, Robert Manzi, argued that if the distance is measured as is done for liquor licenses, from door to door of the two structures as pedestrians would walk, the proposal would be in compliance.

In previously considering plans for the service station, the technical staff for the County Planning Board had recommended revision of the parking layout in order to create more green area next to the road. The revised plan, however, did not incorporate this change. An Exxon representative said that the proposal would place the parking spaces closer to the gas pumps than the company thought desirable but that they could live with the change.

Sign Placement

Considerably more debate fo-

cused on the height and location of a sign. Instead of the 4½ foot ornamental low rise sign at the northwest corner of the property, as recommended by the technical staff, a 7½ foot ornamental sign at the northeast corner was now proposed, near the intersection of the two highways. The sign would face to the northwest and southeast and thus sideways to the street intersection.

According to Giese, who has since made an on-site study of the proposal, the sign would not obstruct vision at the intersection. It would, however, be more visible from Greenbriar than the prior alternative, though reduced in impact because viewed from an angle. Giese felt that in most areas of Greenbriar the sign would be screened from view by buildings and the curvature of the road. It would be fully visible, he said, from Hanover Parkway approaching Greenbelt Rd. from the south and from the property directly across Hanover Parkway from the filling station.

In a memo to council, Giese noted that he favored the original recommendation of the technical staff; however, he still considered Exxon's proposal "far superior to the signs that exist in most other filling stations in the area."

ERHS Orchestra Begins Fund Raising Campaign

Members of the Eleanor Roosevelt High School Orchestra will kick off their fund-raising campaign for their trip to Vienna, Austria and the International Music Festival in July, 1982 with a booth at the Labor Day Festival. The orchestra will be selling submarine sandwiches and also run a face painting booth.

The orchestra will also perform at the Labor Day Parade stage on the day of the parade.

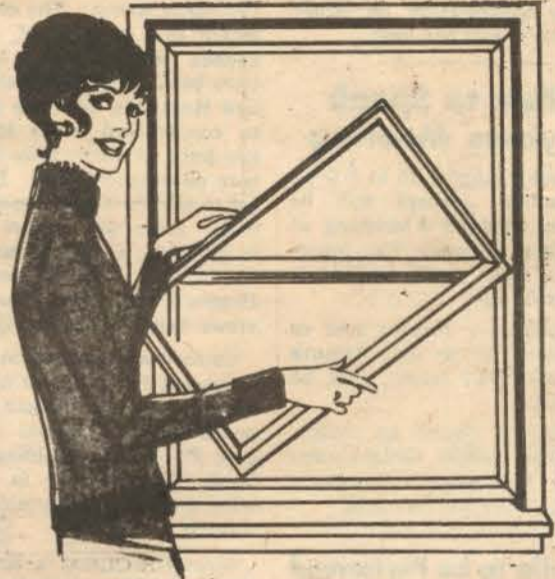

NOTICE OF CHARTER AMENDMENT

At its regular meeting of July 13, 1981, the City Council of Greenbelt, Maryland, adopted Charter Amendment Resolution Number 1981-3 (Resolution No. 488); and the following Title of the Resolution is a fair summary of the amendment:

CHARTER AMENDMENT RESOLUTION NUMBER 1981-3

RESOLUTION OF THE CITY OF GREENBELT ADOPTED PURSUANT TO THE AUTHORITY OF ARTICLE 11E OF THE CONSTITUTION OF MARYLAND AND SECTION 13 OF ARTICLE 23A OF THE ANNOTATED CODE OF MARYLAND (1957 EDITION AS AMENDED), TITLE "CORPORATION-MUNICIPAL," SUBTITLE "HOME RULE," TO AMEND THE CHARTER OF THE CITY OF GREENBELT, SAID CHARTER BEING SUBTITLE 40 OF ARTICLE 17 OF THE CODE OF PUBLIC LOCAL LAWS OF MARYLAND (1963 EDITION AS AMENDED) AND CONTAINING IN WHOLE OR IN PART THE CHARTER OF THE CITY OF GREENBELT, BY REPEALING AND REENACTING WITH AMENDMENTS SECTION 4, TITLE "CREATION; QUALIFICATIONS; COMPENSATION" TO PROVIDE A SALARY OF \$3,400 PER ANNUM FOR THE MAYOR AND \$3,000 FOR EACH OF THE OTHER MEMBERS OF COUNCIL

The above Charter amendment shall become and be considered a part of the Charter of the City of Greenbelt, Maryland, according to the terms of the amendment, in all respects to be effective and observed as such, upon the 21st day of September, 1981 (the beginning of the new term of the City Council to be elected September 15, 1981), unless on or before the fortieth day after passage, which shall be the 22nd day of August, 1981, there shall be presented to the Council of the City of Greenbelt, Maryland, or mailed to it by registered mail, a petition for referendum signed by twenty percent or more of the persons qualified to vote in the regular election of the City of Greenbelt, requesting that the above Charter amendment be submitted on referendum to the voters of the City of Greenbelt.
