Fun - Filled Labor Day Festival Begins Fri.

One last summer fling can be enjoyed this weekend at the Greenbelt Labor Day Festival. The Festival theme, "Unity through Community Involvement," has been amply demonstrated by the numerous individuals and organizations that have arranged the 27th annual Labor Day Festival.

September 4, are representative of the wide variety of exciting programs and activities available during the Festival, During Opening Ceremonies, the highly-anticipated announcement Greenbelt's Outstanding Citizen of 1981 will be made. The ceremonies also include a concert by the Greenbelt Concert Band, a drawing for free carnival tickets, and the introduction of city officials and the Festival Committee. Other events of the first day are athletic contests, the presentation of Miss Greenbelt contestants, and a street dance.

The climax of the Festival—the Parade on Monday morning—features all the candidates for city council, Senator Paul Sarbanes, Congressman Steny Hoyer, and city, county and state officials. Also, bands, floats, clowns, fire engines, decorated bikes and trikes, and the Greenbelt Marching Kazoo Band are only a few of those who will march before the reviewing stand. There may even be a few surprises—such as a famous mystery guest.

Midway

The Carnival Midway will be open from 6 to 11 p.m. on Friday, 1 to 11 p.m. on Saturday and Sunday, and after the Parade on Monday. All the favorite rides will be available each day except during a dinner break from 5 to 6:30 p.m. Dedicated riders can enjoy unlimited rides for just one price from 1 to 5 p.m. on Saturday and Sunday. Many new Midway activities are scheduled this year in addition to the old standbys. Games include a political raffle, bingo, zoo dip, and the dunking game. Food (funnel cake, ice cream sundaes, juice, ice tea, corn-on-the-cob, pizza, hot dogs, hamburgers, and caramel apples)

Events on the first day, Friday, and merchandise (frisbees, T-eptember 4, are representative shirts, used books, buttons, and the wide variety of exciting white elephants) will also be sold.

Miss Greenbelt Pageant
Thirteen lovely girls will be contestants in the Miss Greenbelt Pageant. On Saturday evening the contestants will provide entertainment featuring a Country-Western theme. Aerobic dancing, a popular feature of last year's Pageant, will also be performed. Breaking with tradition, a Fashion Show instead of a swim suit competition will be presented on Sunday afternoon. All these ac-

tivities culminate Sunday evening with the crowning of the new Miss Greenbelt.

This year there will be more local Greenbelt talent than ever before. New acts such as a D.J. and his unlimited music will be tried this year. One act, Expressions with Janet Bailey, will use sign language. Street dances will close the Festival on Friday and Sunday evenings.

Dial -a- Ride Call 474-1518

The Greenbelt Labor Day Festival Committee has arranged two special services for the convenience of Festival patrons. First, a special area for senior citizen seating will be roped off in the grassy area in front of the Festival Stage. Also, for the fifth consecutive year, free transportation will be available to and from the Labor Day Festival.

A dial-a-ride service tried as an experiment last year proved to be a big success and will be used again this year. The dial-a-ride service has proven to be faster and more convenient than the previous shuttle bus with its extended route,

By calling the Festival information number, 474-1518, Greenbelters can arrange to be picked up anywhere within the city limits and driven to the Festival, Members of the Woman's Club of Greenbelt will answer the phone and take messages at the Festival information booth. A ride to leave the Festival can also be arranged at the information booth.

The service will be available from 1-10 p.m. on Saturday and Sunday and 1-6:30 p.m. on Monday. If a request is made on Sunday, a 9 a.m. pickup can be arranged for the parade. To streamline departures in the evening, a schedule of final departures has been set up. Final departure of the day on Saturday and Sunday will be 9:15 p.m. for Springhill Lake, 9:30 p.m. for Windsor Green and Greenbriar, and 9:45 p.m. for old Greenbelt. Final departure of the day for Monday will be 6 p.m. for old Greenbelt, 6:15 p.m. for Windsor Green and Greenbriar, and 6:30 p.m. for Springhill Lake.

Capitol Cadillac will lend the Festival its van over the weekend for this service. Normally the van is used to transport people whose cars are being serviced. Gary Gentilini of Capitol Cadillac has been instrumental in arranging this contribution.

Policeman Escapes from Danger After Assault in Greenway Lot

Pfc. Mark A. DiPietro of the Greenbelt Police Department was the victim of armed robbery, assault and battery on a police officer, and abduction on August 31 at 3 a.m. in the Greenway Shopping Center.

Pfc. DiPietro saw a suspicious person approaching the back door of Jasper's Restaurant. As DiPietro got out of his police car, he was accosted by two other males armed with a sawed-off shotgun and an automatic handgun. The suspects took the officer's service revolver and handcuffs, and he was taken to a construction site near the shopping center while the third suspect drove the police car to that location. The officer was then locked into the trunk of the squad car.

The suspects had not taken DiPietro's portable radio, and he was able to make an emergency call to other units and to the Greenbelt police station. Although this action put him in further jeopardy, other officers were alerted to the critical situation.

Responding officers, in addition to those from Greenbelt, included members of the Prince Georges County Police, Maryland State Police, U.S. Park Police and other municipal departments. The

area was surrounded and checked but the suspects had apparently left prior to arrival of these units on the scene.

Pfc. DiPietro was released from the trunk and treated at Doctor's Hospital for an injury to his head caused when one of the suspects struck him with a shotgun. He was released from the hospital later in the day.

Sgt. James R. Craze, shift commander, coordinated activities of police at the scene until Chief William Lane arrived. The investigation has been turned over to Greenbelt detectives, and lookouts have been issued.

The suspects are three black males who were wearing necker-chiefs over their faces. The department speculates that the suspects planned to rob Jasper's Restaurant.

On two other recent occasions, restaurants in the Greenway Shopping Center were robbed in the early morning hours. Jasper's was robbed at about 5:40 a.m. on July 31, and H. T. McDoogal's was held up at 4 a.m. on July 18. In these cases also, the suspects were three black males wearing masks. In all three cases, the suspects were armed.

Any qualified elector who would be prevented from voting in a city election by reason of religious beliefs, physical condition, or absence from the city on the day of the election may vote by absentee ballot.

Correction and Update At the Library On Police Incident

The News Review, in its August 27 issue, reported on the August 14 pursuit by Greenbelt police of motorcyclist speeding northbound on Ridge Road. The predawn chase ended when the lead police car and the motorcycle collided. Nearby residents awakened by the noise of the collision later questioned actions taken by police after the crash.

Assistant City Manager Dennis Piendak has corrected earlier information he gave the News Review, which was reported in the August 27 article. According to Piendak, the second police car involved in the pursuit of the motorcycle did not collide with the lead police car.

The article also reported that Greenbelt detectives had been assigned to investigate a formal written complaint by a witness alleging unnecessary use of force by a police officer after the crash. City Manager James Giese, when asked Tuesday about the status of the investigation, would make only a very guarded statement. According to Giese, a detective has interviewed residents of the northern Ridge Road area where the collision occurred, and has confirmed that residents making allegations as reported in the News Review article. Giese added that the investigation is not completed.



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COUNCIL CONCERNED WITH FUTURE PLANS FOR NORTH END SCHOOL

Education-or rather the safety of school children and the use of a former school - concerned council at its August 10 session.

Council passed a motion to express to the County Executive the city's possible interest in obtaining the recently closed North End School. The city would like to be informed of any county actions relating to the property.

Previously Council had directed that the Community Relations Advisory Board, Park and Recreation Advisory Board, Advisory Planning Board, and School Study Committee examine the issue. In a joint report, the advisory boards recommended that the city obtain the property, prevent its purchase by private developers, and permit no use which would require a zoning change.

A seemingly endless list of uses for the closed school has been suggested. A community center which would house a variety of programs is one frequent suggestion. The city staff has requested that Maryland National Capital Park and Planning Commission do a use feasibility study of the facility for a community recreation and meeting center.

In a related matter which had placed on the agenda by Councilman Thomas White (who along with Councilman Richard Pilski was absent), council considered the effect of the North End School closing on student pedestrian traffic. White had noted that children from the North End would be crossing Crescent Road at various locations. Council moved to request county school crossing personnel to determine the need for and location of additional crossing guards.

also on the agenda. This was the Baltimore-Washington Parkway Overpass, which will provide a safe route for Eleanor Roosevelt Senior High School students.

After many years of delay, including the need for a condemnation trial, the city has received a memo of agreement for the project between the Federal Highway Administration, the National Park Service, and the city. Having no surprises, the agreement contains earlier city commitments to the project. The Federal Highway Administration will be responsible for construction of the overpass and the city for construction of the connecting pathways. Council authorized the Mayor to execute the agreement.



THE FREE RIDE

Candidates Give Views on Zoning, **Transportation & Crime Control**

The first Candidates' Night for city council aspirants, on August 26, was held at the Greenbelt Library's Meeting Room, where eight incumbents and challengers fielded several topical questions and gave some of their general philosophy in the relatively brief time allotted. Viewpoints of these office-seekers were sought by the meeting's sponsors - Citizens for Greenbelt and the Jaycees - on three main issues currently affecting Greenbelt: zoning and development, transportation and crime control.

The reactions of the eight to these issues—at least as expressed at the gathering-were fairly similar, so that the flavor of the event may be best conveyed by some actual quotes:

On development:

Ed Putens - " . . . naive to expect that all development be stopped . . . but retain a consultant to advise city (against) rampant, outrageous growth"; Tom White - "(as) commitment to Greenbelt, (urge) purchase of park land and green space by city"; Ed James - "accumulate professional services . . . and businesses for people to work at to avoid commuting"; Gil Weidenfeld - "prefer not to see development but realistically there will be, (therefore) hold developers strictly accountable for their concessions"; Ron Ott - "as chairman of PRAB, I've been involved (but) I don't think you can leave land undeveloped forever"; Richard Castaldi - "economics won't allow us to purchase the open land we'd like to (and) there will be a lot of pressures around Beltway Plaza"; Bob Zugby - "will the cost of services for new growth be balanced by income from that growth"; Richard Pilski - "I've opposed undesirable development . . . annexation is the only way we can control anything further."

On transportation:

Ron Ott - "push for completion of the Green Line, as a vital neccssity (but) a local minibus system would be expensive for the taxpayer"; Gil Weidenfeld can subsidize inner city bus transportation"; Ed Putens - "advocate a minibus system linking Beltway Plaza, Greenway and Greenbelt Center (maybe) financd from the business community"; 2d James - "work with other municipalities to complete the Green Line . . . privately finance internal city transportation"; Tom White-"intergovernmental relations are very important (to) represent the city"; Richard Castaldi - "have to tell our citizens where the underutilized . . . bus routes

On crime:

Richard Castaldi "I've been working with the police (to) make sure citizens are aware"; Tom White - "urge no more multifamily zoning . . . protect inner walkways and extend them"; Bob Zugby - "urge more police . . . a shopping center requires more police protection"; Richard Pilski -"(need) vigilance and awareness of citizens"; Gil Weidenfeld -"crime is everybody's business, not just a police job . . . I will give such programs a high priority"; Ron Ott - "need more police . . . but the city (needs) to put more teeth in the laws"; Ed Putens - "advocate communica-

tions, (such as) the court parent system"; Ed James - "publicize crime areas better . . . police foot patrol rather than cars".

After these replies to questions the candidates had a chance to prepare for, they were asked to field some further questions from the audience:

What are your priorities?

Weidenfeld stressed that he did not want to see the wrong type of development coming in. Zugby said his priority was security and crime prevention, while Putens agreed that crime was a major problem, but questioned whether more police and studies were the answer. Pilski asserted that the important issue was public health and safety. James favored an approach of self-sufficiency for citizens, rather than "feed at the public trough". Ott urged more "pre-planning" on matters such as school closings, and because of the economy "do more with less". Castaldi felt that with respect to development citizens need to be unified, to influence the coming redistricting process. And White repeated his emphasis on the importance of relations between the city and other (county, state) governments to assure Greenbelt gets fair treatment.

Will Metro cost too much?

The candidates basically were in agreement that the important thing was first to get the Green Line completed to Greenbelt, one of them (Putens) noting "the longer it takes, the more it will cost". Most also agreed that taxing highway development was a reasonable way to help pay for it. Though one suggested the city should use its influence to keep fare rates down, another cautioned that higher fares "should not be prematurely opposed without a viable alternative"

Two more questions pertaining particularly to Greenbelt's internal affairs were raised, one on the use of "special assessments... method for down-zoning", and the other on the use of community volunteers. The first of these, evidently referring to a recent city council action affecting eight citizens building homes in the North End of the city, was supported or defended by practically all the candidates as a "good working tool". James did not respond directly, but suggested that requirements for development (curbs, sidewalks) should be re-Weidenfeld (one of the homebuilders involved) noted that while he had taken no part in the voting that affected him, as a general principle he would put the interests of Greenbelt citizens first "to provide the type of development we need".

With regard to the role of volunteers in Greenbelt, predictably, the complete cast of candidates spoke as one in praise of the concept, with Zugby for example asserting that "volunteerism is what makes Greenbelt run"", and James urging that fledgling organizations be helped to be selfsupporting. Weidenfeld reminded listeners that people thereby get to know each other and feel part of the community, and "I think you get more out of volunteering than the community does." T-16, R-12 Metro Routes Combined in Old Greenbelt

The T-16 Metrobus route will be changed effective Sunday, September 6. Because the bus does not run Sundays and holidays the change will become effective for Greenbelters on Tuesday morning.

The T-16 Metrobus coming from New Carrollton to Beltway Plaza comes into the Center as it formerly did. Then it will take up the old R-12 route through Gardenway, Ridge Rd., Laurel Hill Rd., Hillside Rd., Crescent Rd., Kenilworth Ave., Greenbelt Rd. to Beltway Plaza. All trips will make a loop into Mandan Rd. and Hanover Pkwy. After 8:30 a.m. the loop will include the Greenway shopping center. (Before 8:30 it will stop on Greenbelt Rd. near the shopping center.)

Return trips leaving Beltway Plaza and heading toward the New Carrollton station will return the same way, i.e., Greenbelt Rd., Kenilworth Ave., Crescent Rd., etc.

The first bus will leave New Carrollton at 5:45 a.m. and will reach Greenbelt Center at 6:10 and Beltway Plaza at 6:19. Other buses will reach the Center at 6:40, 7:10, 7:35, 8.07, 8:37, and 9:10. After 9:10 they will run hourly until 3:10 p.m. when they will again run more frequently.

The first trip will leave Beltway Plaza heading for New Carrollton at 5:40 a.m. followed by buses at 6, 6:30, 7, 7:30, 8, 8:30, 9, 9:30, etc. They will arrive at the center about nine minutes later. New schedules are expected to be available on the buses by Tues-

Schedules have been coordinated with the C-2 (Beltway Plaza, Prince Georges Plaza, Wheaton Plaza, Montgomery Mall) so as to eliminate the long wait between buses. Hourly T-16 buses are scheduled to arrive at Beltway Plaza around twenty minutes after the hour and the C-2 should arrive about twenty-five minutes after the hour. They are both scheduled to return around half past the hour,

Saturday schedules have been changed to include hourly runs instead of the present seventy-five minute ones.

The R-12 will now run between Deanwood and Beltway Plaza (by way of Springhill Lake). Service to Westway, Lakeside Dr. and Lakecrest Dr. will be provided by the F-6.

Free Saturday parking at New Carrollton, Landover, Cheverly, Deanwood and Minnesota Ave. is being offered on a trial basis until the end of January. Parking is free on Sundays.



- Initiation of an intra-city, small bus or van public transportation system to give needed mobility to the elderly, youth and those who cannot drive.



- Construction of the Greenbelt Metro line.
- Greater community input and involvement in zoning and development matters.
- Increased involvement of the business community in the interests and wellbeing of the Greenbelt residential community.
- Improvements in traffic and pedestrian access in those areas of the City where unsafe conditions exist.
- Greater unity of the communities in Greenbelt so that everyone feels prouder to be "a Greenbelter."
- The enhancement and continued operation of the Cultural Arts Center.
- Retention of North End School as a community facility.
- Implementation of "Staying Alive" drug prevention/intervention program.
- Full funding for Greenbelt CARES.
