Roosevelt Commemoration

Greenbelt Plans 5-Day Fall Celebration

A five-day period, from September 29 through October 3, has been chosen for special events to commemorate both the 100th anniversary of the birth of Franklin D. Roosevelt and the founding of Greenbelt 45 years ago. At a formal ceremony on Sunday, Oct. 3, to be held at the Lake Park, the lake itself is expected to be officially named for the late President, under whose administration the concept of the planned community was first conceived and brought to reality. The Greenbelt Concert Band of Prince Georges County has agreed to perform for the occasion.

The lake, a permanent land-

mark significant enough to name for a President, was visited by that President. President Roosevelt had participated in an event, even before the city itself was built, in which the lake was first stocked with fish. To name it in his honor therefore appeared to be an appropriate gesture.

Another commemorative event tentatively scheduled for September 29, would feature the opening of an exhibit of 40 specially selected photographs depicting WPA activities in Maryland. Photographer Arthur Rothstein who was employed by the Farm Services Administration during the New Deal years, and whose work originally appeared in the FSA publication *Parade*, is expected to be present for the kickoff affair in the Greenbelt Library, as well as historian Keith Olson from the Department of History of the University of Maryland.

The 40 photographs selected for the exhibit would be culled by photo-historian Connie Schultz according to archivist Mary Boccaccio, from among a huge collection encompassing some 10 to 12 cubic feet of space in the archives and manuscript collection of the University of Maryland. A general guide, or brochure, and photo captions would be prepared to accompany the exhibit.

Unfortunately there is some uncertainty, Boccaccio reported, about the September 29 target date, since the carrying-out of the project would depend on financial support from the Maryland Committee for the Humanities. A decision on a fund-grant request is expected to be made by the Committee sometime in the first two weeks of August.

In Greenbelt an ad hoc com-

mittee of citizen volunteers, the Greenbelt Commemoration Committee, is seeking community input concerning other ways to celebrate Greenbelt's historical connection with FDR. A letter sent out on July 14 by city staffer Dorothy Lauber, who functions as secretary for the commemoration committee, to local civic and non-profit organizations, lists some of the ideas that are already being considered. Among these are special showings of two films associated with Greenbelt's early history—"The City," a late-30's documentary on the concept of the planned city, which shows numerous scenes from the earliest days of Greenbelt, and "Little Miss Marker," a Shirley Temple opus that was the first film shown in the Greenbelt Theatre.

Other suggestions include: a community square dance (a type of event popular in the 30's); a guided walk along the Greenbelt trail; a display of plans, photographs, furniture and books on Greenbelt in the 30's; the wearing of 30's-era costumes; and a "Collection of Recollections" of both the Roosevelt era and the early See ROOSEVELT, page 4, col. 3

Windsor Green Home Sustains Fire Damage

A fire on the top floor of one unit of a quadruplex condominium in the Windsor Green Townhouse development caused an estimated damage of \$50,000 to the building and \$20,000 to the contents. The Fire Marshal's office is still investigating the cause.

The fire, which started at 2:44 p.m. on July 25 at 8331 Canning Terrace, was brought under control within 15 minutes by firefighters from six volunteer departments. The Greenbelt Volunteer Fire Department was the second "due engine company" on the scene. Owner William E. Pruitt was not at home when the blaze broke out.

"There was heavy fire showing" said Captain James Mundy of the Prince Georges County Fire Department. Firemen cut away the roof of the burning unit to allow heat to escape. The Greenbelt Public Works Department secured the unit by boarding up windows and doors.

The roof of an adjoining unit was also cut to investigate for possible fire. That unit sustained damages estimated at \$5,000. Repairs are already underway.

Two firemen from West Latham and one from Riverdale suffered minor injuries and heat exhaustion. They were treated at the hospital and released.

According to Mundy, the walls between the units are constructed so that they will be separated from fire for an hour. The masonry fire walls are constructed of cinder blocks, brick or drywall, as required by county building codes.

Ginsberg Awarded Damages, Motion for New Trial Heard

In the defamation trial of Albert Ginsburg, former legal counsel to Greenbelt Homes, Inc., versus John M. Lewis, GHI Board member, Carl M. Conrad, former Board and Audit Committee member and Greenbelt Homes, Inc., the jury found for the plaintiff against defendants Lewis and GHI but not against Conrad. The jury awarded Ginsberg \$4,000 in compensatory and \$500 in punitive damages from Lewis and \$6,000 in compensatory and \$500 in punitive damages from the corporation.

The case was tried before Judge James Taylor in the Circuit Court for Prince Georges County from July 8 to July 13. Later, on July 23, a motion for a new trial was heard by Judge Taylor, who took the matter under advisement. In question was the issue involving the apportionment of damages.

The primary question that the jury faced was whether the qualified privilege of the remarks in question, having been made in the course of doing business, would apply or whether the privilege had been forfeited because of malice (a statement made that was knowingly false or made in reckless disregard for its truth or falsity).

The remarks leading to the suit against Lewis had been made at a meeting of the Board of Directors on December 11, 1980. The

claim against GHI is based on the statement made by Lewis on the ground that Lewis was acting as a director and agent of GHI, thereby making the corporation responsible for his actions. Further, GHI acceptance and ratification was alleged in the subsequent termination by the board of directors of Ginsberg's employment as corporation general counsel.

The liability of GHI is covered by insurance. The News Review was unable to confirm that Lewis' liability is covered by the same policy.

GHI, Lewis and Conrad are represented by the firm of Galliker, Clarke, Martell & Donnelly of Rockville. Ginsberg is represented by James D. Newton of Silver Spring.

School Board Votes to Keep Instrumental Music Program

Instrumental music has been put back into the Prince Georges County elementary schools. The decision to retain most of the elementary school instrumental music program was made by the Board of Education in a special meeting, Monday, July 19. At the urging of parents, teachers and music supervisors the board made a compromise decision taking some things out of the music program and putting other things back in.

Fifth and sixth graders will be given the opportunity to take instrumental music twice a week in strings, brasses and woodwinds. No special instrumental music training for such instruments as guitar and autoharp will be given. Of the county's instrumental music teachers, 20.5% will be used for this elementary school program so that it will be necessary for each teacher to be assigned to several schools. Although the program will be dropped from the fourth grade, the system whereby elementary instrumentalists feed into the junior high will not be disrupted at all during this coming school year. During succeeding years, students will come to the middle schools with two instead of three years experience.

As part of the compromise music decision, kindergarten was eliminated from the county vocal music program. First, second and third graders will have music for 20 to 30 minutes twice weekly and fourth, fifth and sixth graders will have two 30-minute classes per week. Chorus will meet once or twice weekly for fifth and sixth graders. The diagnostic center will have music once weekly. Of the county's vocal music teachers, 81.5% will be used for this program.

Athletic Program

The athletic program was also slightly changed at the July 19 meeting: the junior varsity program has remained intact but will only be 50% funded so that only half the number of games played last year will be played this year.

All varsity sports have been funded. The football revolving fund (gate receipts from football games) will be used to pay coaches' salaries. This will be depleted at the end of the 1982-83 school year. Next year a user fee may possibly be charged. This would

be a \$10 to \$15 fee per sport with a provision for those who could not pay. Another possibility to increase game receipts might be "game bells," or scheduling games, 2 in fall, 3 in winter, and 2 in spring in the afternoon hours to make it possible for more students to attend games.

The board also reduced the amount of insurance that it pays for football; that sport will still be basically covered by insurance, however. A few assistant coach positions have been eliminated; most sports will still have an assistant coach.

A further reduction was made in the amount schools were given to purchase athletic equipment. Formerly each school was given funds of \$12,000 for athletic supplies; this has been reduced to \$5,000 for this year. All equipment that is needed for this coming year has been bought out of this spring's funds. There has been no provision made for the following year's supplies.

The next meeting of the Board of Education will be August 19.

All Stand to Gain

To the Editor:

I noted in the July 22 issue of the Greenbelt News Review that a member of the GHI Board stated during the July 8 Board meeting that inspection has gotten to the place "where it is ridiculous." This is a very subjective statement. What this particular director might consider a minor correction could become, from the standpoint of an incoming member, a very expensive project. If my previous home, for example, had been for sale before a cut-off switch was installed for a dryer, and the inspection did not note this deficiency, a new member would have been faced with an unexpected electrician's bill to correct the problem. Similar examples have been cited in the past where GHI members had to share expenses that new members incurred in correcting deficiencies that would have been corrected by outgoing members, if the inspections had been thorough.

GHI's interest should always be to protect the interests of its current and new members, rather than to insure that outgoing members reap the greatest profit from the sale of their units, often at the expense of incoming members who may be unaware of the work that needs to be done to correct State or County code or GHI regulation violations. The greater the number of problems that the inspector finds and has corrected, the smaller the number of dissatisfied members in GHI.

In my view, it is the responsibility of the Board that we have elected to insist that the policy of GHI insuring that our properties are kept up, is enforced, and not to work towards a weakening of vigilance. We all stand to gain from enforcing our policy, or to lose if we relax our standards.

The phrase "Let the buyer beware!" should not be an implied slogan of GHI.

Right Decision

To the Editor:

Contrary to recent comments in the News Review, I feel the GHI board made the right decision in letting the shed at 10-G Plateau Place stand. I'll admit that in first learning about it, a shed of 13' height seemed absolutely unreasonable to me, and I felt it should not be allowed to stay. When it first came before the board, I urged it be cut down to size to conform to regulations. The board then moved that the owner/-builder consult with management and come back to the board with a plan to do so.

At the following session, management reported that due to the nature of the shed construction it would be very difficult to alter it without essentially dismantling it. The board was then faced with two options: tear it down or leave it intact.

I suggest the writers of the letter and editorial look at the shed. It backs up to the woods at the end of Plateau Place on a downward-sloping hill, so that from the rear of the house the top of the shed appears to be of about regulation size.

The neighbors who signed a petition asking it be allowed to remain do not feel it is an eyesore. In fact, it is a well constructed, attractive shed, something the owner built with pride, and which the buying member very much wanted. (The house was in the process of resale.)

In no way does the granting of this exception set a precedent for GHI. The board has always had the power to use its discretion on a case-by-case basis in such matters.

If any other illegal structures are discovered, the board and management should deal with each individually. Anyone requesting a variance or exemption to existing policy has the right to bring the matter up before the board. It is the board's responsibility to consider the facts rationally and act accordingly.

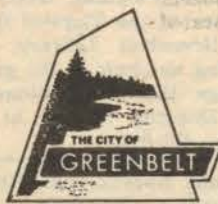

Street Numbers Are Lifesavers

Recent comments from city officers indicate they are having difficulty locating address numbers of homes and businesses when responding to requests for service from citizens. Some numbers are distorted by age, weather, or hidden by landscaping. In fact, some structures have no numbers at all! This problem can affect the time it takes us to reach a citizen in need of help. SECONDS ARE VITAL WHEN A SERIOUS INCIDENT HAS JUST OCCURRED.

The following criteria should be followed for your home, apartment complex, or business establishment to aid us in providing faster assistance to you in emergency situations.

1. Numbers should be on contrasting background. Light on dark or dark on light.
2. Place your numbers where they can be easily seen from the street.
3. Numbers should be reflectorized or illuminated by your porch light.
4. Place your numbers either to the left, right, or immediately overhead of your entrance way.
5. If your house is a distance from the road, post your numbers on a fence or a column at the entrance to your property.
6. If your dwelling or business establishment is on a corner lot, numbers should face the street named in your official address.

The time you take in preparation today will give us those much needed seconds tomorrow. We need your help in order to better help you.
