Citizens Castigate Council, CRAB

Council Meeting Goes to the Dogs Or -- It Was a Dog Day Evening

There was no humor in the August 8 meeting of Greenbelt's city council as approximately a dozen furious citizens, led by Steve Polaschik, voiced their disapproval with what they termed the inaction of the council and the city's Community Relations Advisory Board (CRAB) on the problems created by unleashed dogs, an issue which the citizens had presented at a council work session three months ago.

Even City Manager James K. Giese, took it on the chin for his "penny pinching" advertisement for a second animal warden several weeks ago. Noting that College Park pays its animal warden \$6 per hour, Eunice Coxon and others felt that \$4.49 would not attract the mature kind of individual needed to be the city animal warden. (A second advertisement in last week's News Review offers \$5.50.)

The citizens were as angry about having to come to council for a second time with their complaint as they were with the issue itself. "Nothing's been done since the last (council) meeting," said an irate Joe Costa. "A matter of this importance should not be passed to CRAB," he further stated

CRAB came under considerable attack for not listening to the complaints at its last scheduled board meeting, held in July. A number of citizens had attended that meeting expecting to voice their concern on the dog issue. However, CRAB had instead scheduled the meeting to discuss the cross burning incident. Councilmen Tom White and Bob Zugby apologized to the citizens for CRAB's failure to hear them. However, Mayor Gil Weidenfeld. White, Zugby and Councilman Ed Putens all felt that CRAB still had a valid role to play as the dog issue was a sensitive one to many citizens. Only Mayor pro tem Richard Pilski thought that council should act, that evening

Wed., Aug. 24, 8 p.m. CRAB Meeting on Pet Problems, Youth Center to establish a more severe fine, such as \$100 for dog owners who permitted their pets to run loose. This was in line with fines established in the pet ordinances of College Park and Bowie. "The research has been done. The city manager knows how to change an ordinance . . . Council should act immediately," he urged to fervent applause.

CRAB will meet on Wednesday, August 24, at 8 p.m. in the Youth Center to discuss the pet problems. The public is invited.

However, other minds prevailed as council once again instructed ORAB to look at the overall issue. Zugby, a former member of CRAB before being appointed to council, defended the beleagured advisory board by suggesting that it might hold regularly scheduled meetings and publicize its agenda. (At present the board meets only when called upon by council to deal with a specific issue.)

Tom White noted that "CRAB might not have the leadership they've had in the past," but urged the group to meet sometime in August — not waiting until one week before the September city council election as they had scheduled.

Coxon warned council that "this is an election issue" and that she wanted to see an animal warden who would be "as visible (in the community) as a policeman and a postman".

Giese admitted that the parttime animal warden currently employed by the city is a member of the public works crew and generally does not respond to animal complaints until his regular job is completed at 4:30 p.m. By that time, the animal would be long gone from the scene. However, Giese said that if the situation were serious, a policeman would respond.

Costa complained about the conditions at Attick Park, stating that on a recent visit he counted six dogs, four unleashed. He suggested more signs be placed around the lake park warning dog owners of the penalties for letting their dogs run loose. "Council is negligent in this area...

New General Manager Appointed by GHI

Assistant general manager Shekar Narasimhan has agreed to accept the position of general manager of Greenbelt Homes, Inc., board president Margaret Hogensen announced today. Narasimhan will assume his new duties on Sept. 6.

Let's get this thing ironed out . . . I hope this is the last time people have to come here . . ." on the dog issue, he commented.

Lekh Batra told council that he has been bitten by a dog twice in the last five years. "Both times the dogs were without a leash and the owners were nearby... Both times the owner reassured me 'the dog won't bite'. Both times they were far from the truth." He also warned that he had been informed by employees who lived on the Beltsville Agricultural Reseach Center (BARC) property that packs of wild dogs lived on the farm and were quite dangerous. Batra, who himself works at BARC, indicated he knew of one pack that was presently breeding. "Also rabies is being increasingly reported from wild animals," he stated. "Un-vaccinated pets are not under adequate control and can pose a danger to all of us, including the

Council expressed concern about the wild dog report. All of the council members stated that they recognized the urgency of the whole problem of wild and unleashed dogs and would "take the proper procedures." Signs at the lake, a second animal warden and referral to CRAB with instructions to hold its meeting at the earliest possible date were targeted.

This issue took one hour and thirty minutes of a lengthy City Council agenda after which the citizens left Council Chambers — assured that their message in this election year was heard.

Bulletin

Tonight the staff of the Prince Georges County Board of Education will recommend to the Board that Greenbelt Center Elementary School be "modernized" instead of "demolished." After a determination is made, the Board will seek additional input from the Greenbelt community and other interested parties.

JONES IS CANDIDATE FOR CITY COUNCIL

Herbert Jones, whose biography appears below, filed as the eighth candidate in the city council elections to be held September 20. Since the deadline for filing kas now passed, the complete field of candidates will consist of the following names (in their order on the ballot): Herbert Jones, Robert Zugby, Richard Pilski, Gil Weidenfeld, Francis White, Antoinette Bram, Edward Putens and Thomas White.

JONES BIOGRAPHY

Herbert R. (Herb) Jones, 54, a native Washingtonian and resident of Greenbelt for 11 years, attended both grade schools and Bell Vocational High School in Washington, D.C. He served both in the Air National Guard in 1948-49 and again with the United States Army Signal Corps during the Korean conflict.

Jones graduated from the U.S. A.F. Field Radio Repair School in 1949 and completed courses in welding, control wiring, appliance repair, etc., in Washington, D.C. and Maryland schools between 1945 and 1981. He has recently earned 24 credits at the University of Maryland (night classes) in radio and television production and programming related fields.

Jones is currently employed as a high voltage electrican at the University of Maryland in College Park, where he has maintained electrical service to some thirty buildings for over 11 years. Prior to this employment Jones was a commercial laundry equipment specialist and vending machine mechanic for various companies in New Jersey, Maryland and Washington, D.C.

Jones is also an ordained minister in the Pentecostal Church of God. He is an alumnus of Valley Forge Christian College (EBI, 1952-56) and a graduate of Baltimore School of The Bible (1970). First licensed to preach in 1956 by the New Jersey District of the Assemblies of God, Jones received ordination by the Pentecostal Church of God in April, 1979. His early ministry includes six years in Madison Manor Nursing Home in Hyattsville, two years jail ministry at Jessup House of Corrections, pastoring at Morristown, N.J., and pioneering churches in Boonton, NJ and Everett, PA. In the past eight years with the Pentecostal Church of God, he has served in official capacities as Home Missions Director and Sectional Presbyter. He is the current president of the Kings Men's Fellowship of the Capital District (New York, NJ, PA, MD and Delaware), which activates men to ministries of service and outreach. Jones is presently a member of the Trustee Board of Full Gospel Temple, Severn, Maryland. Jones lives at 7 Research Road with his wife



Greenbelter Walks to Raise Funds for Seniors' Park

Greenbelt resident Tom Doremus plans to walk from Calais, Maine to Key West, Florida in an effort to raise funds for the purchase of land where a Seniors National Park (SNP) can be built.

Park (SNP) can be built.

The SNP is an idea which Tom Doremus, 27, wants to make a reality. "I want to honor senior citizens for their contributions to this country and to provide a recreational/educational facility geared to their needs," explained Doremus. The Greenbelt Golden Age Club and the Gray Panthers of Prince Georges County are also backing the SNP project.

Doremus is petitioning the government, groups and individ-uals for several acres of land to be allocated in the Baltimore-Washington area, indicating that Greenbelt would be "an ideal lo-cation" because it is near major east coast population centers, health institutes, major educa-tional centers including the Senior Center Training Institute at the University of Maryland, and has a great deal of tourist traffic. Doremus suggested several park components, but says once a location for the park is found, a committee comprised mostly of seniors will determine the structure of the park Doremus' suggested several park Doremus' suggested. ture of the park. Doremus' suggestions include: a petting zoo, a game center, a miniature golf course, a workshop building and a seniors international center where seniors from ethnic groups around the country could help assemble displays and provide entertainment that reflect their culture. Doremus indicated that the park should be built with easy access for physically handicapped seniors.

Doremus, who has a Bachelor of Science degree in Family and Community Development from the University of Maryland attended the Senior Center Training Institute in College Park, said "a combination of schooling and projects I've worked on" has promoted his interest in the welfare of senior citizens. Doremus explained that while he worked as a house painter in Greenbelt, he came to know senior citizens better. "Through conversations with them, I realized that many felt they weren't recognized for their capabilities and I feel they are often shoved aside — it's a national attitude and I see SNP as a "respectful applause" to seniors and a model for some future State Park additions." "This is why," added

Doremus, "I want senior citizens to build (the park) as much as possible . . . to prove they're ca-

pable."

Doremus said the walk is primarily for publicity reasons. "I need to get the media's attention first," pointed out Doremus. Once the media is involved and the concept has public exposure, Doremus said he is condifient that

the SNP will be supported.

Doremus flew by People's Express on August 8 to Maine, where he began his journey. While Doremus does do quite a bit of hiking, he has never attempted to walk in marathons or the like. Financing this walk by himself, Doremus said he will carry everything he needs in a backpack. Although he said he will go to churches, senior centers and senior citizens homes to ask for shelter, Doremus said he will carry a sleeping bag and tent. Doremus said he will also carry with him a copy of the "Up with Seniors Project Kit," explaining the SNP Concept,

which he will photocopy at libraries along the way and distribute to various churches, schools, newspaper offices, etc. Doremus expects to arrive in Key West sometime in March or April, making the trip in a total of seven or eight months.

Doremus said if SNP is supported and land is granted, he hopes to serve as an events coordinator and fundraiser for the park. But, Doremus insists that his interest in senior citizens will not stop at the SNP. He wants to continue to be an advocate for senior citizens programs and encourages assistance from others who want to help.


