City Objects to Friday's Sign

Not four hours after TGI Friday's opened on Monday, April 23, the Greenbelt city council told a representative of the restaurant and bar that the Friday's free-standing sign must come down.

The sign's "height is extremely objectionable" Council member Thomas X. White told John Rabik, a construction representative for the restaurant chain.

But the height of the sign wasn't the only thing that concerned council.

Mayor Gil Weidenfeld said council was upset about two other issues as well. First, a representative for Friday's told council a year ago that a free-standing sign would not be needed. And second, the council was not given an opportunity to review the sign permit application when Friday's later decided to erect a sign. The Greenbelt Road restaurant had agreed to allow the city to review any plans for a free-standing sign.

According to a report issued by the council's Advisory Planning Board (APB), a representative of Friday's indicated that a sign was not needed because the red and white awnings on the front of the building would serve the same purpose.

When Friday's did seek approval for the sign the restaurant sent its application for a sign permit directly to the county for review by the Maryland-National Capital Park and Planning Commission (M-NCPPC). The M-NCPPC apparently missed the condition that the city be granted a sign plan review and issued a permit. "It's just a foulup," Rabik said. "We didn't try to sneak the sign in. We just went to the wrong people."

But council said the builders should have known that the city council must review the sign plan because a sign plan review was a condition written into the site plan, which was approved by the restaurant and the city council nearly a year ago.

The APB report states, "The city recommended approval of the site plan with the condition that if a free-standing sign is ever proposed, the city should be granted sign plan review. The condition was granted by the Prince Georges County Planning Board in its approval of the site plan, May 19, 1983."

The report also indicated that the M-NCPPC is withholding final approval of the sign permit

until the city can have "an opportunity to review the situation," and that approval of the sign would set a "precedent for others to violate the city's procedures."

The APB report also advised council that the 20 foot sign, which was erected several weeks ago, "goes against the guidelines and type of signage desired by the city." The city requires that signs be no higher than four to five feet.

Council, which has no authority to remove the sign itself, decided, after speaking with Rabik, to "recommend disapproval" of the permit.

Rabik said he would have the sign taken down "if there is no other choice."

"There was a mistake and we'll probably be here for quite a few years" so there is no point starting with an antagonizing relationship, Rabik said.

If the County Department of Licenses and Permits agrees with the city council and revokes the permit, then the restaurant will be required to remove the sign.

Council member Edward Putens said, it is "likely that the county will look at (the city's recommendation) very favorably."

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Three APB Reports Scrutinize Proposals for Development

City Council accepted three reports from its Advisory Planning Board (APB) at Monday's meeting. Two are new site plans, one a revised site plan, outlining prospects for immediate further development. In each case, APB notes the plans for parking exceed county code requirements, as do the landscaping plans for two commercial properties and the green space for the residential property.

Maryland Trade Center III

APB recommends approval of the site plan for the third office building of the Maryland Trade Center Park in their Report No. 325. The building would be located to the southeast of the two present structures. In reviewing the plans, APB particularly looked at the traffic impact to be created by adding another 297,000 square feet of office space and at the highway improvements promised at the time of annexation of this property into the city of Greenbelt. APB asks what the city might do to insure that a use and occupancy permit not be granted in the event that highway improvements have not been met.

Other recommendations asked for (1) additional sidewalks, all with handicap ramps; (2) larger trees, particularly around the building and in the plaza; (3) review by city of any plans for signs; and (4) elevation not to exceed Maryland Trade Center I. The board commented on the fact that buildings II and III add 69,000 more square feet of office space than called for in the original covenant. Developers claim the additional space is not "usable floor area."

Capital Cadillac

APB in report No. 326 takes a tough line on Capital Cadillac's

application to build an addition to house another 20 service bays and provide more paved parking. The Board seeks a good faith display on the part of Capital Cadillac to meet the landscaping requirements of previous plans before acceding to the latest proposal. Specifically APB recommends approval only after "plantings (are) in place along the entire western property boundary, in the (three islands in the parking area), also a row of Leland Cypress or White Pines should be planted along . . . the Capital Beltway." APB also called for additional plantings as part of the new plan.

Glen Ora Gardens

APB takes an equally hard line in recommending denial of the site plan for the fifth or final section of Glen Ora Gardens in Report No. 327. The Board calls for full compliance within section 1 with site plan commitments even while noting that some corrective work is under way. Section 1 has been fully occupied for more than six months.

Specific problems APB has identified are: (1) interior walkways have not been completed to connect with existing walkways in Windsor Green (that portion of the development built by Rozanski and Kay, before the remaining property was sold to another developer, U.S. Home); (2) only the base has been laid in parking area roads (and is now deteriorating); (3) curbs and other concrete work are substandard; (4) common areas are not adequately graded and landscaped, some are eroding and others are just unattractive.

AN OPEN LETTER TO CITIZENS OF GREENBELT RABIES PREVENTION DURING RABIES CRISIS

As you may have read in the newspapers, there have been an increasing number of raccoons found infected with rabies throughout the metropolitan area and as close as College Park and the Agricultural Research Center. One cat also was found infected. It is a matter of concern to us all. The County Health Department describes the situation as of crisis proportion. While we cannot prevent or control the outbreak of rabies among raccoons, there are measures which can be taken to prevent its spread to people and pets:

1. **ELIMINATE SOURCES OF FOOD TO RACCOONS.** Place refuse in covered containers with lids that cannot be pried off. This is a city ordinance requirement, and refuse containers will be inspected this summer throughout the city to determine their compliance with regulations.
2. **KEEP PETS CONFINED IN YOUR YARD OR ON A LEASH,** as required by the city animal control ordinance. Dogs and cats are prohibited from running at large. There is a maximum fine of \$25 and an impoundment fee of \$10 for pets running at large.
3. **HAVE YOUR PET VACCINATED.** The County offers rabies inoculation clinics from time to time. Shots may be obtained from any veterinarian. For more information, call the Prince George's Division of Zoonosis Control at 386 0241.
4. **REPORT TO THE POLICE IMMEDIATELY ANY PERSON BITTEN BY AN ANIMAL,** 474-5454, and if possible, confine or identify the animal.
5. **NOTIFY THE POLICE IMMEDIATELY OF ANY ANIMAL ACTING STRANGELY,** 474-5454. Do not attempt to catch the animal or otherwise come in contact with it.
6. **WARN YOUR CHILDREN** not to try to capture or play with wild animals and, most particularly, raccoons.
7. **REPORT TO THE POLICE ANIMALS RUNNING AT LARGE,** 474-7200.

Your cooperation and assistance in eliminating food supplies for raccoons and in keeping pets confined or otherwise under control will help to assure that no one in Greenbelt is infected by this deadly disease.

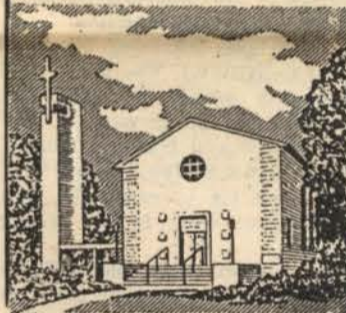

City Plans for Extending Northway Ballfield Complex

The City of Greenbelt will try to obtain a 72-acre surplus tract of land from Prince Georges County to improve existing recreational facilities.

Previously slated for a three-school complex, the land surrounds the Northway Ballfields at the northeastern limits of the city. Should the land be obtained, it would be put to use in conjunction with the Northway recreation facility.

Among plans submitted to the City Council, by the city manager for use of the land, the Northway fields would be expanded beyond the existing two softball fields and overlapping football-soccer fields. This expansion would include creation of two more softball fields, two football-soccer fields, picnic areas and completion of a perimeter trail currently being constructed along the northeastern edge of the city.

The trail, which will be unpaved, is currently being delayed by drainage problems. The additional county land would also result in a continuation of the trail running parallel to the Baltimore - Washington Parkway and ending at McDonald Field.

Without the land, the city manager's plan still includes upgrading the existing Northway Field. Restrooms, storage facilities, a picnic shelter and an announcer's booth are planned for Northway. Lights, to make use of the fields at night, are proposed for the facility, but according to Mike McLaughlin administrative assistant to the city manager, they are still tentatively planned. "We are purchasing lights for Braden Field," he said. "We don't have the money for lighters at Northway," he added.

The same problem is occurring with the perimeter trail accord-

ing to McLaughlin. The perimeter trail is not a high priority project," he said.

A widened access road to Northway Field has been criticized by citizens because it involves cutting down trees along the way. McLaughlin says that clearing away a sufficient area around the road is necessary. "It's being done for safety reasons," he said.

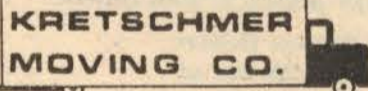

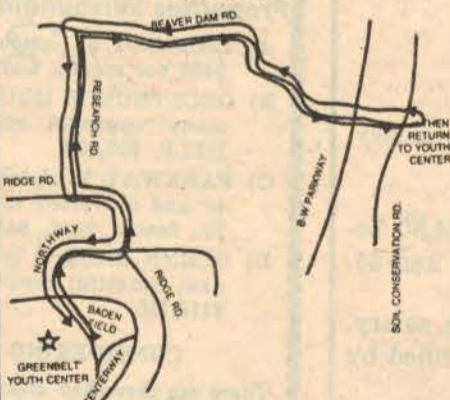
