Council Studies New Bus Shelters, Calls for Area Plan, Cites Cost

Bus shelters, road construction, and proposals for two more buildings in Capital Office Park met with swift action at the Monday, September 10, meeting of the Greenbelt City Council. Mayor pro tem Richard Pilski, chaired the meeting of only three members of council as both Mayor Gil Weidenfeld and council member Tom White were out of town.

Although Greenbelt's Outstanding Citizen of 1984, Jose Morales, demanded that council respond to his request that bus shelters be built in Springhill Lake immediately, council demurred. Council told Morales, who had no plan for where the shelters were needed, that the city must first establish a policy on locations for bus shelters and a procedure for their construction. According to the city's estimate, erecting shelters at each possible location would cost between \$100,000 and \$280,000 depending on the type. Greenbelt currently has 83 bus stops, 20 of them in Springhill Lake. It is unlikely that a shelter can be placed at each location.

Mayor pro tem Richard Pilski advised Morales that the city could not make a decision on erecting bus shelters without additional information from the staff and from METRO on the number of passengers at each stop. The staff was advised to come up with a plan. The city has erected two shelters, one on Crescent Road near Lastner Lane and one near Green Ridge House on Ridge Road. These shelters are not enclosed, as are the METRO shelters, and cost considerably less to construct.

Road Construction

Saturday, September 22 Is Voter Registration Day Here

October 8 is the last day for residents of Prince Georges County to register to vote in the November general election. Special registration efforts are planned for Saturday, September 22, in the Greenbelt area. Qualified Prince Georges County residents may register to vote at the Giant Food Store at 62nd Ave. and Greenbelt Rd. in Berwyn Heights on Saturday from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m.

State legislature members representing Greenbelt will participate in a special registration drive. Delegates Gerard Davlin, Joan Pitkin and Charles Ryan, State Senator Leo Green, as well as County Council member Richard Castaldi and members of the Democratic Central Committee, Tom White and Jeanette Gordy, will be registering in the 23rd District on Saturday, September 22. The door-to-door effort will target Greenbriar, Windsor Green and Glen Ora.

much discussion by the Greenbelt Homes, Inc. (GHI) board, council approved the plan to reconstruct Plateau Place at a total cost of \$108,700, of which \$104,000 will come from the Community Block Grant, a federal entitlement program. The additional cost, to be borne by the city, will include landscaping at the entrance to Plateau Place, an island with ornamental plantings and additional parking spaces at the end of the street. The GHI board had recommended against the island because of a possible loss of trees in the area. City Manager James K. Giese, however, stated that only one tree of "questionable value" would be sacrificed to create the island. Council member Toni Bram strongly urged the aesthetic improvements with plantings in the area. The city also approved reconstruction of Ridge Road from Southway to Westway using \$93,000 in CDBG funding. As recommended by GHI, an additional \$4,000 was allocated for construction of a sidewalk from court Ridee to the Jewish Community Center provided the GHI easements are obtained.

Program Open Space

Council conveyed its 1986 priority list of projects to be funded by Prince Georges County through Program Open Space. Greenbelt expects to receive \$48,325. In agreement with the Parks and Recreation Advisory Board's top choice, Council named improvements to Attick Park in the form of a comfort station, band stand, picnic shelter and concession stand as the top choice. Second was the bike path construction, followed by land acquisition to assure funding for the PEPCO substation, North End School improvements, Northway ballfield lights, a park maintenance building, an addition of

To qualify for registration the voter must be: a citizen of the U.S.; at least 18 years old by November 6; a resident of Prince Georges County; not convicted more than once of an infamous crime and not currently under a sentence imposed pursuant to a conviction of an infamous crime; not under guardianship for mental disability.

Capital Office Park

Council echoed the Advisory Planning Board's (APB) concern over traffic generated onto Ivy Lane once the two proposed office buildings join the four already on the site of Capital Office Park. According to the developers, a traffic study had been performed which indicated that Ivy Lane could handle traffic from six buildings with only one access point for each; APB however, requested that the Maryland-National Capital Park and Planning Commission examine the developer's preliminary plan to determine if, in fact, Ivy Lane could handle such traffic and if there should be an additional access point for each of the office buildings.

Speaking on behalf of the developer, attorney Nancy Slepicka of the firm of Foster and Brugger maintained that no additional access points or road development would be required until perhaps the sixth building were constructed.

Council also concurred with APB in recommending that a vehicular easement be granted access to the city's cemetery from Ivy Lane, that vegetation be preserved as a buffer, that consideration be given to building

Debate on TRIM Set for Friday

The Eleanor and Franklin Roosevelt Democratic Club will sponsor a debate on the proposed amendment of TRIM (Question A) at the Greenbriar Community Building on Friday, September 21. The debate will follow the Club's regular business meeting scheduled to begin at 8 p.m.

The November elections will be significant to Prince Georges County residents not only because they will be voting for President and members of Congress, but also because they will again consider an amendment to expand the county's property tax income which has been frozen at a specific limit by TRIM since 1979. The proposed amendment would freeze the county's property tax rate rather than continue to place a limit on the total amount of property taxes that be collected as is now required by TRIM.

Speaking on behalf of the continuance of the Tax Reform Initiative by Marylanders (TRIM) will be Charles Blumenthal, former Maryland State Delegate. Appearing in support of the Fairness for All County Taxpayers (FACT) amendment to TRIM will be Dr. Francis George, City Councilman from Cheverly.

Angela Schreiber . . . Miss Greenbelt 1984

This year's Miss Greenbelt, Angela Schreiber, says she was "really shocked" when they called her name, placing her among the finalists in the Miss Greenbelt Pageant.

"I wasn't expecting the crown at all," she recollects. "I didn't even think I'd place." At that point she remembers saying to herself, "O.K. I'm ready for third runner up."

With the announcement that she had won, she says, "I remember bringing my hands to my face. I just shook."

Those who heard Schreiber's coloratura voice warble through "I Could Have Danced All Night" know she has talent. The 19-year-old daughter of actress Angela Schreiber and actor and set designer Tom Schreiber has had plenty of opportunity to display her acting and singing ability. Recent acting parts at the Utopia Theater include Anne in "The Diary of Anne Frank," the mermaid in "Avrey's Magic" and parts in "Ticket to Broadway" and "As Time Goes By." She has performed at the University of Maryland in "The Music Man."

Schreiber enjoys acting and singing and says, "I haven't been pushed. What I've done is what I've wanted to do." And fortunately her parents and siblings (three brothers and two sisters) have been supportive of her pursuits. "All of my brothers took me to ballet lessons and my father took me to voice," she says.

Of her voice teacher Mary Cunningham she says, "She has given me a lot of confidence in myself. I don't think I could ask for a better teacher."

The new Miss Greenbelt plans to give a Christmas program of songs at the nursing home and at Green Ridge House.

A nursing student at Prince Georges Community College, Schreiber says, "I want to work with the elderly."

Choosing her career was "a really hard decision," she says. Though acting was a temptation, Schreiber carefully assessed her desires and personality and decided it was most important to her to select a profession in which she could help people, "to be with them and interact with them. I could never sit behind a desk all day," she says.

Schreiber describes herself as family-oriented and felt that an

acting career might cause her to sacrifice a home life she holds dear.

Pleased with her decision, Schreiber conscientiously attacks the long hours of scientific reading required for her nursing courses. This semester, "a stressful one," she says, leaves her with very little free time.

Schreiber made her decision to enter the Miss Greenbelt Pageant during the first week in August before the onset of classes. "We had rehearsals every Wednesday and Thursday night for four weeks," she says, not a problem before school was in session, but difficult after it began.

Schreiber says she entered the pageant "because I wanted to meet some new friends. I had a good time doing it. I have been contemplating it for two or three years and I knew this year was my last chance." Schreiber will be 20 next month, one year above the limit for Miss Greenbelt contestants.

Had she come away with no recognition, Schreiber would have considered the pageant rewarding. It served to bring her the desired friends and one close friendship with Laura Raley, elected by the contestants as representing the congenial spirit of the pageant.

Schreiber vigorously contends, "I didn't do this pageant by myself. It wasn't just me. There were a lot of people behind the scenes. All the girls were very supportive of each other." She particularly appreciated the help of Jean Cook and Sherry Gainor, pageant coordinators, and Gwen Vaccaro, in charge of makeup. "During the pageant everybody was real nervous," she says, "but the girls cheered each other on."

Just prior to the talent competition, Schreiber confided to Raley, "If neither of us places it doesn't matter. The friendships last. If you get the crown you only reign for one year."

An apparent suicide attempt occurred on September 13 at 12:39 p.m. in an apartment in the 8000 block of Mandan Rd. When officers of the Greenbelt department responded to a call and entered the apartment, the occupant fled to a bedroom and barricaded himself inside, refusing to talk to the officers or to come out of the room. A negotiator from the Prince Georges County Police Department Emergency Services Team responded to a request for assistance and developed a successful communication with the occupant of the apartment. When the negotiator determined that the man was a threat neither to himself nor to the community, all police units left. According to the police, the incident developed because of a domestic situation and the subject's false threat of suicide to his estranged wife.

A suspect was arrested in the Springhill Lake area after a resident reported that the suspect had vandalized a vehicle and had left the scene, striking a second vehicle. The incident occurred about midnight on September 7 in the 9100 block of Springhill Lane.

A radio was stolen from an auto in the 12 Court of Plateau Place on September 9.

Two persons were arrested in the Greenway Shopping Center and charged with forgery and possession of a controlled dangerous substance with intent to distribute. Both suspects were incarcerated in lieu of bond.

A traffic accident occurred in the 120 block of Westway shortly after midnight on September 9. The driver was charged with driving while intoxicated.





heights on surrounding areas, that pedestrian access to the cemetery be available throughout the site and that passive recreational facilities be provided.

While attorney Slepicka unveiled preliminary drawing for the two new buildings, which showed them to be somewhat similar to the other four in design, Al Herling, speaking from the audience, remarked that he was feeling nostalgia for "the old Greenbelt. All I see is examples of stone which show concern for cost but no artistic imagination. Greenbelt reminds me now of Stonehenge," he wryly commented.

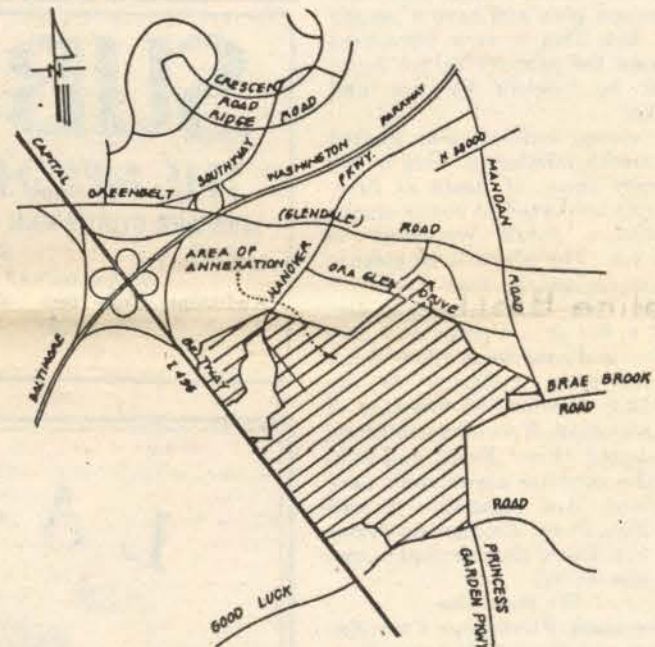

title; and provides that all laws of the State of Maryland applicable to the City of Greenbelt which are now in force or may hereafter be enacted; and all the existing charter provisions and ordinances of the City of Greenbelt, except as otherwise provided in this resolution, shall be extended and made applicable to such portion of Prince George's County as is under the provisions of this resolution annexed to and made a part of the City of Greenbelt; and said resolution further provides that all the inhabitants of the territory annexed to the City of Greenbelt by this resolution shall in all respects and to all intents and purposes, be taken and considered as a part of the municipal corporation of the City of Greenbelt.

Said resolution further provides for the special treatment of taxable real and personal property of the territory thereby annexed by deferring the time the property first shall become taxable by the city until the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1985 or until six months after the date of annexation, whichever occurs last.

A Proposed Outline for Extension of Services and Public Facilities has been prepared, and copies of this outline, as well as copies of the Resolution, may be obtained from the City Clerk, Municipal Building, 25 Crescent Road, Greenbelt, Maryland, Telephone 474-3870 or 474-8000. Such copies will also be made available for public review and discussion at the public hearing herein before advertised.

In accordance with Section 19(d) of Article 23A of the Annotated Code of the State of Maryland (1957 Edition and Amendments), the governing body of Prince George's County, and any regional and state planning agencies having jurisdiction within the county shall be heard first at the public hearing, after which the hearing shall be open to the general public.

Fire & Rescue Review

The G.V.F.D. & R.S. responded to 72 emergencies for the first two weeks of September.

Apartment Fire

On Sunday morning, September 16, at 10:59 a.m. fire broke out at the Brae Brooke Apartments on Greenbelt Road. Upon arrival of fire department units, an apartment on the first floor was engulfed in fire which was rapidly extending into upper apartments.

Lessons to Be Learned

The fire started as a result of a pan of grease left on a stove. Many apartment fires start in this manner, and the "ounce of protection" is simple: Never leave food cooking unattended for long periods of time and if possible cook on low heat to avoid the chance of ignition. Parents should teach children the importance of safety in the kitchen and home.

Avoiding Injuries

Several residents were injured and two firefighters were burned. One resident sustained rope burns to the hands after sliding down a rope from an upper balcony. The importance of a second exit cannot be overstressed. In this situation, the injuries sustained were minor when one thinks of the consequences of being trapped in heavy, noxious smoke, hot gases and extreme heat. Plan now an escape plan and have a second way out. This is very important because the primary escape route could be blocked by fire and smoke.

A second resident was treated for smoke inhalation. This is the primary cause of death in fires. Anyone subjected to heavy smoke conditions should remember to stay low. The air will be cleaner and cooler at the floor.

Help Your Neighbors Help Us

If a fire should occur and only if time and conditions allow, think of the other residents in the building who may be unaware of the situation. Knocking on doors, screaming "Fire! Fire!" and pulling the local fire alarm could save a friend. And remember to call the Fire Dept. Emergency Number 911. Don't assume that someone else called.

We Hurt Too

Greenbelt Firefighter Carl Anderson and Berwyn Heights Firefighter Mike Marisco both sustained burns to the hands fighting this fire.

"Don't let us find you still inside." Know your escape plan, and get out. The firefighters will do the rest. And remember... Fire's worst enemy is the smoke detector."
