New Highrise Apartments, Sunrise Village, Brings No Glow to Council

The Greenbelt City Council on January 28 was chagrined to learn that a high-rise apartment complex, Sunrise Village, is proposed for ten acres of recently annexed land near the Holiday Inn and Goddard Space Village apartments. Council was particularly disturbed that the county is considering the sale of Mortgage revenue bonds to finance the development and that the city was not consulted earlier.

Rezoning is not required for the property since it is already zoned R-10 (48 residential units per acre of high-density high-rise). Nor will there be an opportunity to determine if adequate public facilities exist because the property was subdivided in the 1960's, and the test for adequate roads, water and sewer occurs at the subdivision stage.

In a protest letter dated February 1 to County Executive Parris Glendening, Mayor Gil Weidenfeld said, "The Council questions the appropriateness of the county assisting this project when there are recognized traffic problems in the Greenbelt area that have not been resolved, and when there already exists a very large stock of rental apartments in the county, and particularly in

Greenbelt."

In the city there are 4,806 apartment units, 893 condominium units, 1,937 condominium and cooperative townhouse and 500 detached single-family homes.

In his letter Weidenfeld stressed "What Greenbelt needs is more single family and owner occupied housing, not more apartments." He also noted that (1) the traffic generated by the development of 478 units would add significantly to "already overburdened Greenbelt Road and Hanover Parkway, and Greenbelt Road and the Baltimore-Washington Parkway" and (2) because the proposed project could "move forward without any review of the adequacy of public facilities," the approval and development of Maryland Trade Center III, "one of the county's premier development areas," could be delayed.

City Manager James K. Giese and Administrative Assistant Michael P. McLaughlin voiced council concerns on February 1 when they met with Major Riddick, director, and Lance Billingsley, bond attorney, of the County Housing & Community Development Department and Marty Webber of the Prince Georges County Economic Development Corporation.

In a memo to city council, McLaughlin said the county representatives pointed out that the proposed development is a "luxury" development with many

amenities—a type of development that the county feels is presently lacking and one that is desired by workers now being attracted to the county.

Riddick told the News Review that a presentation will be made before the city council in the near future. He thought construction would take two-and-a-half to three years, with building to start in August or September of this year.

McLaughlin's memo also stated: "The use of county funds also means that 20% of the units would have to be set aside for 'moderate income persons' who are defined as persons whose income does not exceed 80% of the median income of the area," (approximately \$28,000 for a family of two and \$36,000 for a family of four).

A spokesman for Glendening observed that if the county did not assist in financing of the more desirable and expensive luxury apartments, the property owners could decide to build less-expensive moderate-type apartments with fewer amenities, since the land is already zoned for high-rise apartments.

Sunrise Village

The proposed Sunrise Village rental apartment complex will consist of wing-shaped, twin 11-story buildings. Located in Greenbelt, the property, formerly known as the Freda Bell tract,

Which Comes First - Roads or People? Authorities Worry about Congestion

One thing is certain: development is booming in East Greenbelt and a great deal of road construction is planned. But whether road improvements can keep pace with development and whether all the road projects can be completed at about the same time are points of dispute.

Construction of the Greenbelt Road/Kenilworth Avenue grade separation is already underway with completion slated for the summer of 1987. Widening of Greenbelt Road between Mandan Road and Southway, reconstruction of the Baltimore-Washington Parkway interchange at Greenbelt Road across from the Greenway Shopping Center, and the extension of Hanover Parkway to Good Luck Road are planned to alleviate severe traffic congestion that new development will generate. (Recently a decision was made to widen

Greenbelt Road from Mandan to the Capital Beltway overpass near the American Legion in order to connect with the improved Greenbelt Road/Kenilworth Avenue interchange.)

Coordinated Projects Needed

"Timing is important," said Michael Snyder, District Engineer for the State Highway Administration. "Unless construction of each road is coordinated with the other, it could be a difficult problem to work out," he explained. Snyder worries that an unimproved Greenbelt Road would not be able to handle the increased traffic — nearly double — generated by the improved Greenbelt Road/Kenilworth Avenue interchange.

"The key project," Snyder said, "is the widening of Greenbelt Road along with the reconstruction of the (northern) portion of the Greenbelt Road bridge spanning the Baltimore-Washington Parkway." Without its improvement, a bottleneck would be created at the bridge.

County and city officials say it makes no sense to improve Greenbelt Road without also going ahead with the Parkway ramp reconstruction across from Greenway Center at the same time. Not to do so, they say, would mean that that portion of Greenbelt Road would have to be modified later.

However, Lester Wilkinson of the Maryland-National Capital Park and Planning Commission thought it was important that Greenbelt Road be widened even if the Parkway improvements could not be done simultaneously. Snyder indicated that the State would not issue a permit for construction on Greenbelt Road unless the bridge was improved also.

The problem is this: Greenbelt Road, a State road, will be improved by the county with Tax Increment Financing (TIF) funds and is included in the county's Fiscal Year 1987 Capital Im-

Al Herling Gives Concert

Albert K. Herling turns 70 this month. Instead of receiving a party from family and friends, he is giving a party — a piano recital — for the Prince Georges community. The proceeds of the concert will help retire a debt to the Baltimore Symphony Orchestra (BSO) for concerts performed in the county.

"The last three concerts the symphony gave at Eleanor Roosevelt High School resulted in a very healthy deficit," Herling explains. "The symphony orchestra can't afford to write off such debts. I thought one way to do it might be to have a concert to help pay this debt. It's my personal way of celebrating my 70th birthday, which only happens once in a lifetime."

Herling is founder and past-president of the Baltimore Symphony Society of Prince Georges County which began sponsoring BSO concerts here in 1966. He has been a member of the Board of Directors of the Baltimore Symphony, and he is founder and a board member of the Prince Georges Arts Council.

He began playing the violin at age 6, and switched to the piano at 8. After 10 years of instruction in piano, he entered Oberlin Conservatory of Music on a scholarship, but even with his tuition paid he could not afford to stay in school.

After a few years working in New York, Herling enrolled at Tufts Theological Seminary in Boston. He continued with his music.

"During my second year at seminary, I became assistant to the head of the music department," he recalls. "I worked up two courses in music for the seminary students — church music and hymnology. This was the first time instruction in sacred music was given to candidates for the ministry." He also conducted the campus Navy Band and served, for over four years, as the conductor of Tufts 98-piece symphonic band.

After a couple of ministry appointments, Herling, now married to Frances Ericson, realized the family couldn't live on a minister's

salary. He says about those days, "We discovered the value of pork liver, which is cheap, and the butcher always thought we had a cat."

The Herlings settled in Greenbelt in 1953.

In Greenbelt, Herling was asked to conduct a non-sectarian chorale which met in the Jewish Community Center (now Mishkan Torah Synagogue). The year-and-a-half with the chorale was "a lot of fun," and kept his interest in music high, as did his continuing to play the piano "to my utter amazement that I could still play," he recalls.

Herling turned to the labor field for employment, taking a couple of positions in public relations before accepting a post with the Bakery, Confectionary and Tobacco Workers International Union as director of public relations and managing editor, a position he held until his retirement in January, 1979.

He found playing the piano therapeutic; it eased the strains of writing and being responsible for the entire 12 pages of a Union newspaper.

"When I retired I decided to get back to the serious study of piano," Herling says. He applied to the University of Maryland,

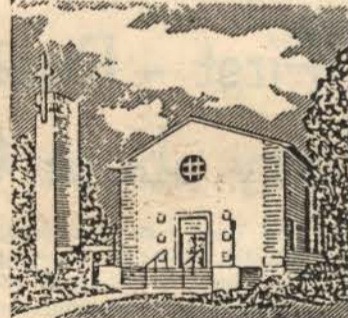

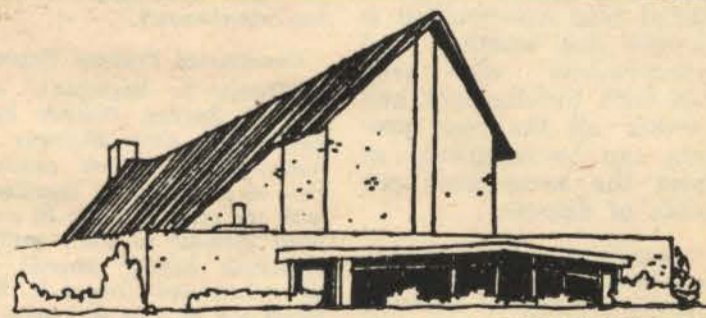

provement Plan (CIP). But the Parkway reconstruction, including the bridge, is federally funded.

Parkway Funding

State, County and Federal officials have been pressing for the release of Federal funds. County Executive Parris Glendening said that money has already been authorized for the rehabilitation of the Parkway but "not shaken loose." He observed that the Greenbelt Road/Parkway intersection was in need of improvement because of "the burgeoning development" in that area.

U.S. Congressman Steny Hoyer has reintroduced legislation to begin the rehabilitation process. House Bill 595 would retain jurisdictional requirements of the Parkway in the Federal government permanently as a pre-condition for Federal funding of the project.

Hoyer said, "If a 1985 supplemental appropriations bill is considered by Congress in probably March or April, I will work to appropriate \$4 million for beginning engineering and design work. Also, if this money becomes available, design could begin on troublesome areas such as the Greenbelt Road/Baltimore Parkway interchange. The engineering-design stage for the entire Parkway could take from one to one-and-a-half years.

In an effort to expedite the Parkway ramp and bridge im-

has frontage on the Capital Beltway and is north of the Goddard Space Village Apartments and south of Maryland Trade Center Park. Over the years the R-10 land has had various owners, with the current owner being John Bednarik. Plans for a high-rise apartment development have been on the drawing boards for years.

The towers will each have 239 units connected by a common lobby-amenity area.

Each tower will feature im-

provements, Snyder is exploring with the National Park Service the possibility of receiving advance funding for the project from the State and county if reimbursement from the Federal government is assured.

In a letter to Snyder, Mayor Gil Weidenfeld expressed appreciation for this effort. "The City of Greenbelt shares your concern as to the need to improve the Baltimore-Washington ramps and the bridge over the Parkway in conjunction with any widening of Greenbelt Road," he said.

Hanover Parkway

The extension of Hanover Parkway to Good Luck Road will be funded by TIF funds and included in the county's CIP for FY 1984.

Construction of Hanover has been delayed, however, because of problems of acquisition of rights-of-way. If the county is unable to negotiate successfully with property owners, condemnation proceedings could take from six months to a year. Construction could possibly take place in 1986, and perhaps continue on into 1987.

level penthouse apartments with ceiling to floor glass exterior walls. Washers and dryers will be installed in all units. passed an audition, and has studied there ever since, most recently under Santiago Rodriguez.

"I am very grateful to the University of Maryland and the state for offering senior citizens the opportunity to go to school at no tuition cost. This is an extraordinary opportunity," Herling emphasized, adding that at the risk of sounding moralistic, he believes "If senior citizens have some ability they should be using it to benefit the community."

Who is his favorite composer? "Each provides a different level of satisfaction," he reflects. His concert will be held Thursday,

February 28, at 8:15 p.m. at the Utopia Theater. The program will include four Bach Preludes, the Second French Suite by Bach, Mozart's C Major Sonata K 330 and two Chopin nocturnes and waltzes.

Herling will not be altogether forgotten by his family. His twin sister, Mrs. Cecil Ostrove, is flying in from Los Angeles with her husband for the twins' first joint birthday celebration in about 50 years.

Son Konrad and daughters Karene Hardesty and Erica Magrum and two grandchildren will attend the concert.

Police Blotter

Pfc. Hahn located the suspect from a February 2 strong-arm robbery of a store in Springhill Lake Shopping Center. The resident male juvenile was processed at police headquarters and released to the custody of his parents.

A holdup, strong-arm robberies, thefts and shoplifting dominated the police log during the week. The holdup, in which a so-called "night bank deposit" was stolen, took place in Beltway Plaza parking lot just after noon on February 1. On February 6 a strong-arm robbery at about 1 p.m. in Beltway Plaza was reported. The victim had a description and possible whereabouts of the suspect, and Pfc. Lynn arrested the suspect, a resident male adult at Springhill Lake Shopping Center and charged him. About 6:30 p.m. the same day, a Parkway Road resident reported he'd been the victim of an assault/robbery at his home, but police found the man too drunk and uncooperative to help them find anyone.

On February 3 officers confirmed a theft in the 400 block of

Ridge Rd., and three minutes later, another theft (a bicycle) in the 6000 block of Springhill Drive. Sometime during the day of February 6, there was a breaking-and-entering at a residence in the 7100 block of Ora Glen Drive, reported by the resident after she got home that afternoon. Another report to police of a possible breaking-and-entering during the week turned out instead to be a domestic problem.

It was also a week of unruly shoplifters. Police took over one disorderly male shoplifter from Beltway Plaza Security early in the week, and several days later two disorderly female shoplifters. All three suspects were charged with theft.

Officers confirmed an attempted auto theft in the 9000 block of Edmonston Rd. early in the morning of February 1. As the week went on, the owner of an auto earlier reported as stolen called police to tell them he had found his car after receiving an anonymous tip as to its whereabouts. In the wee morning hours of February 7 Sgt. O'Neil found an auto near Springhill Lake Recreation Center that had been stolen the evening before from the 9100 block of Springhill Lane.

In two days there were three auto accidents with injuries, two of them requiring ambulance transport to a hospital. Two of the accidents were during evening rush hour, one at Cherrywood Lane and Greenbelt Rd., the other at Ivy Lane and Kenilworth Ave. The third was another for the growing count at the Mandan Rd./Greenbelt Rd. intersection, about 1 a.m. on February 2.

Finding of Not Guilty In Child Abuse Case

Prince Georges County Circuit Judge David Gray Ross recently found 20-year-old Angel Jova of Hyattsville not guilty on charges of sexual abuse of a child. The alleged victim was a five-year-old boy attending the Early Learning Center in Greenbelt. Jova at the time was an aide at the day care center.

According to Assistant State's Attorney William Missouri, the child "froze" on the witness stand and "could not say where he had been touched." This testimony would have been necessary, according to Missouri, for a finding of guilt.

Jova was arrested on August 1, 1984 and charged with sexual child abuse. In October 1984 a grand jury indicted him on one count of sexual child abuse, two counts of third-degree sexual offenses and another count of assault and battery. All charges

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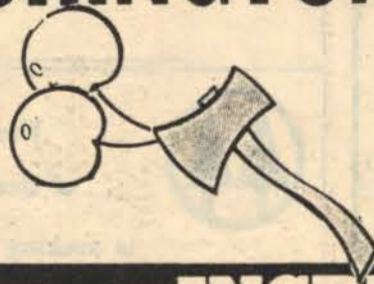
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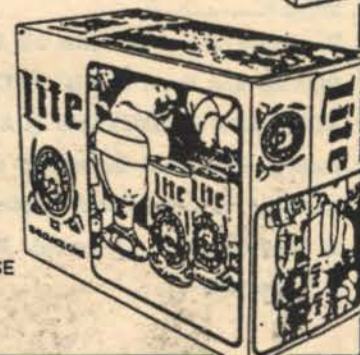

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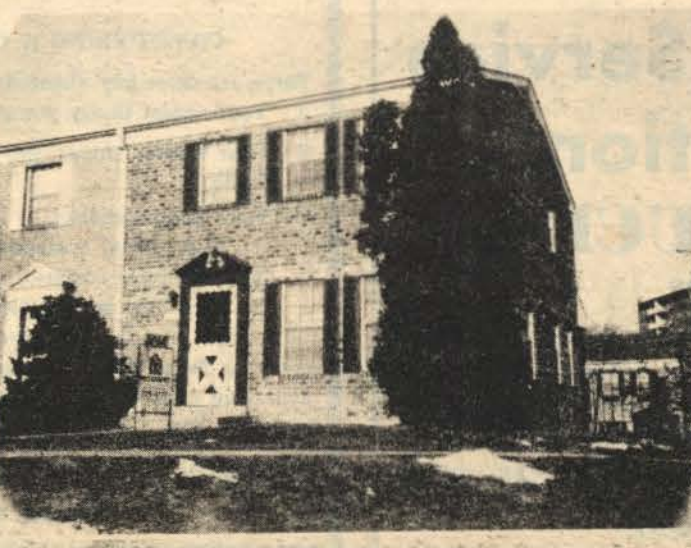
