Supporters of BARC Programs and Research Establish Organization to Augment Resources

A non-profit organization, the Friends of Agricultural Research - Beltsville, Inc. (FAR-B) is seeking private support for scientific and educational programs at the U. S. Department of Agriculture's Beltsville Agricultural Research Center (BARC). Considered the country's—if not the world's—premier agricultural research facility, BARC is the largest of 138 facilities of the Agricultural Research Service (ARS). Located on 7,200 acres adjacent to Greenbelt's northeast border, the center's land has been chipped away for over a decade for political reasons.

"FAR-B will try to do what the federal government, under budget constraints, is unable to do," said the group's president, Dr. Russell Steere, retired chief of the Plant Virology Laboratory at Beltsville. Members seek funds or volunteer their expertise for conferences to maintain and strengthen biological collections, upgrade laboratories and greenhouses, and support scientific explorations, expeditions and libraries. They also accept contributions for research at Beltsville.

"We are responding to enormous public interest," Steere said, "to protect the high quality of science at Beltsville, and of all of the Agricultural Research Service, that has for decades given us the technology for food and agricultural industries." He added that research at Beltsville, with one-sixth of all the agencies' scientists, "is a national treasure."

Research by 450 scientists at BARC includes work on protecting crops from diseases and environmental stresses; developing super vaccines for animals; protecting and improving soil and water resources; and, by enhancing the quality of farm products, meeting human nutrition needs.

The rapidly growing membership of over 100 is already helping to organize scientific conferences. Dr. Ted Byerly, chairman of FAR-B's information

committee and Greenbelt resident, said that in the spring the organization and the ARS are co-sponsoring the Twelfth Annual Beltsville Symposium in Agricultural Research, an international event. Byerly, retired director of Science and Education at Beltsville, noted that FAR-B was hopeful that a National Visitors' Center would be established in the old log lodge which was previously used as a cafeteria. Constructed by the Civilian Conservation Corps during the 1930's, the lodge is now being rehabilitated.

FAR-B will also support other agency facilities in the immediate Beltsville area: the U.S. National Arboretum, the Beltsville Human Nutrition Research Center, the U.S. Plant Introduction Station at Glenn Dale and the Family Economics Group at Hyattsville.

Organized in the spring of 1986, FAR-B signed a memo of understanding with the U.S. Department of Agriculture's ARS. To help achieve its goals, the group will reach out into neighboring areas for support, including funds, from the business community and private organizations. Potpourri

- The U.S. Department of Agriculture's first research activity in Beltsville began in 1910 in a dairy barn. Gradual expansion of the research program followed and in 1935 several of the large buildings of Georgian architecture were constructed. In a land swap between the Department of Defense and USDA around the time of World War II, all plant science programs moved from Virginia to Beltsville.

- ARS shares some of its 7,200 acres with other governmental agencies, including State Depart-

ment Personnel, Secret Service Training Center, Food and Drug Administration and Environmental Protection Agency. These agencies lease land from USDA. About 2200 persons are employed at BARC, of whom 1400 are ARC employees.

- BARC and its neighbors, the Patuxent Wildlife Preserve, the Goddard Space Center and the Forestry Service project, comprise a total of about 11,000 acres of green space.

- USDA's Renaissance program, a comprehensive seven-year plan, is expected to rejuvenate BARC and bring the center up to "tomorrow's standards," according to Byerly. He pointed out that the aged structures and laboratories need renovation. The program's goal is for BARC to remain the largest and most diverse agricultural research center in the world. By upgrading facilities and providing scientists with state-of-the-art research equipment, BARC should be able to take its place as the premier institution of its kind.

- Pressure by federal, state, county and city officials and by citizens have continued to play a major role in preventing the wholesale selling off of BARC's land by the federal government to private parties. Originally about 14,000 acres, the center now comprises about 7,200 acres. Concern has also been voiced about the adverse effect that nearby proposed road improvements would have on BARC.

- The location of the University of Maryland's proposed Agricultural Biotechnical Center, originally slated for 10.5 acres of BARC land north of the Agricultural Library between Route 1, Sunnyside Avenue, and Rhode Island Avenue is uncertain at this time, according to Dr. Paul Mazzocchi of the University's chemistry department. Mazzocchi said that funding for "initial work to establish the center" and for personnel is included in the University's budget, which must be approved by the state. Dr. Shain-del Kung has been appointed as Acting Director.

CLASSES ARE BEGINNING AT GREENBELT MIDDLE

Greenbelt Middle School Co-op, a multi-community effort to provide varied exercise and skill classes open to the public and in their neighborhood schools, will register teens and adults on Monday, January 12, from 6 to 7 p.m. at the Beltsville Community Centre at 3900 Sellman Road.

Classes at the Greenbelt Middle School of Edmonston Road include aerobics (four kinds), auto mechanics, ceramics, cooking (oriental), photography, sign language, and weight training. Two Options Available For Paying Estimated Tax

Maryland State Comptroller Louis L. Goldstein reminds nearly 200,000 Maryland taxpayers that they have two options in filing final estimated tax payments for 1986.

Taxpayers may submit a fourth quarter declaration of estimated tax payment by Friday, January 16 — or they can wait and file a regular 1986 Maryland income tax return on or before Tuesday, February 2.

"Any balance due must be paid in full when filing the regular return," Goldstein said.

Generally, taxpayers who earn income which is not subject to withholding should be filing quarterly declarations of estimated tax if their state and local tax is expected to be more than \$100.

New Parking Program at GHI Receiving Favorable Response

According to information provided by Greenbelt Homes, Inc., the board of directors at their December 18 meeting dealt with parking policy implementation in a third quadrant of GHI, a report on new regulations of the Share Loan Service Corporation, a resolution about use of surplus income to reduce members' charges and a report on the meeting with members in the first quadrant, where the parking policy is being implemented.

Implementation of the parking policy in Quadrant III was discussed and a meeting with members of the affected courts set for January 15. Quadrant III is made up of 13, 15, 17, 18, 19, 20 and 21 Courts of Ridge Road and 1, 2 and 4 Courts of Southway. According to General Manager Ron Colton's report to the board, this area is unique in that five of the courts (15 and 19 Ridge and the Southway courts) have no in-court parking and the homes were built so that new parking is practically precluded. On street parking is heavily affected by the Crescent Road apartments and the proximity of the Roosevelt Mall.

The proposal presented by management would provide reserved spaces in the 13 Court of Ridge (where surplus parking spaces

are available) and for members of the 2 and 4 Courts of Southway. Members of the 15 and 19 Courts of Ridge and the 1 Court of Southway would be allocated spaces in the 17 Court of Ridge, which also has more parking places than units.

SLSC

Colton reported that several changes in loan and fee structure had been made by the Share Loan Service Corporation. Borrowers who wish to take advantage of SLSC Adjustable Rate Mortgages must provide a 20% down payment, he said.

A second change in SLSC policy would require an additional one-half point on loans under \$50,000. Colton said that this change was adopted reluctantly by the SLSC board, since SLSC

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Howard Laster

Howard Laster, 56, former chairman of the Department of Physics and Astronomy at the University of Maryland, died of cancer on December 31 at his home in Iowa City. He had lived in Greenbelt from 1956 to 1977, when he moved to Iowa to become Dean of the College of Liberal Arts at the University of Iowa. He resigned that position in 1983 because of illness, but remained on the faculty as a professor of physics.

Dr. Laster, a specialist in cosmic ray astrophysics, was widely regarded as an expert on energy and energy policy. In Maryland he served on the Governor's science advisory board, in which capacity he helped to establish the Maryland Science Center at the Baltimore Inner Harbor. He also participated in developing State research and planning programs in the areas of energy and the environment, was active in University affairs and governance, and was a founding board member of the University Community Concerts series.

Dr. Laster was born in Jersey City, graduated from Harvard University in 1951, and received a doctorate in physics from Cornell in 1957.

Survivors include his wife, Miriam, of Iowa City; a son, Jonathon, of Hyattsville; three daughters, Elizabeth of Stockholm, Jane of Iowa City, and Sarah of Washington, D.C.; two brothers, Seymour and Owen, both of New York City; and two grandchildren.

In lieu of flowers, the family suggests donations, through the University of Iowa Foundation, to the Literature, Science, and Arts Program, Iowa City, Iowa 52242. A memorial service will take place in Iowa City on Saturday, January 17. In addition, there will be a memorial service at the University of Maryland at a date to be announced. Further information will be available from the Physics Department at the University of Maryland, 454-3401.

Fitzmaurice

Greenbelt pioneer Joseph L. Fitzmaurice, 74, of Woodland Way, died Saturday, January 3 of a stroke. He had been a patient in the Greenbelt Nursing Home. The Fitzmaurices were original Greenbelters, moving into the apartments in 1937 while waiting for their house to be finished.

Mr. Fitzmaurice had been an administrative law judge with the Civil Aeronautics Board for more than 20 years, retiring in 1974. Joining the federal service in Washington in 1937, he first worked for the General Accounting Office and the Commerce Department.

Born in Chicago, he graduated from the University of Notre Dame and Georgetown University Law School.

Mr. Fitzmaurice was a member of the first Board of Directors of Greenbelt Homes, Inc. He was a member of St. Hugh's Catholic Church, was active in the PTA of St. Hugh's School and was a member of the Holy Name Society. He was past president of the Notre Dame Club of Washington.

He is survived by his wife Mary of the home address, sons James P., Greenbelt and Joseph P., Forestville; daughters Mary Dorsey, Greenbelt, and Ann C. Layne, San Diego; brother Walter, Minneapolis; sisters, Julia Pederson, Cato, Wisconsin; and Helen Fries, Manitowoc, Wisconsin, and eight grandchildren.

A mass of Christian burial was offered on Wednesday, January 7 at St. Hugh's Church. Interment was at Gate of Heaven Cemetery, Silver Spring.

Impatient for Indoor Pool

To the Editor:

There are a lot of Greenbelt citizens waiting for the indoor pool, passed with the not too recent bond issue.

Among them, the 75-member Roosevelt varsity swim team and the 85-member Greenbelt summer swim team members who need it for winter training, instead of swimming at Piney Branch Pool in Takoma Park, Colesville Pool in White Oak, and elsewhere.

Other groups in Greenbelt are waiting also: those wanting it for water safety courses, learning to swim, recreation, conditioning and rehabilitation programs, etc.

Why are we waiting and losing about 5%, or \$100,000 a year, to inflation, instead of getting the pool in the ground. If necessary, it would save money to hire a temporary person to advance the completion date a year or so plus allow us to take advantage of the current low interest rates. If the city keeps dragging its feet, there won't be enough money for the pool.

The need is there, the mandate was given, what we need is action. There's no reason why the project can't move along as rapidly as the police station and the North End School, starting now!

Police Blotter

Two women, ages 35 and 54, suffered puncture-like stab wounds from a weapon which may have been an ice pick as they struggled with a pocketbook snatcher about 6:25 p.m., Tuesday, December 23. The victims, walking in a parking area in the 7700 block of Hanover Parkway, were approached by a young black man who grabbed one of their purses but was unable to pull it away as both women fought him, and he fled without the purse. Neither victim had seen a weapon but they discovered they had been injured during the struggle. The older woman had a puncture wound to the left arm and the other a chest wound. Both were treated at AMI Doctor's Hospital in Lanham and released. The suspect was described as a black male, 16 to 21 yrs., 140 lbs., black hair, wearing an off-white jogging outfit.

A 24-year-old woman who was getting out of her car about 7:15 p.m., December 26 in the 9000 block of Breezewood Terrace was accosted by two black males, one armed with a handgun, who forced her back into her car and robbed her of the jewelry she was wearing, her purse and a wool coat. They fled on foot. The one with the gun was 20 to 22 yrs., 5'8", 160 lbs., brown eyes, possibly with a mustache, wearing a dark blue down jacket with a hood. The other was in his late teens, 5'4", 130 lbs., close-cropped hair, wearing a large tan or beige down jacket.

Officer Tom Kemp arrested a 25-year-old Greenbelt resident about 2:25 a.m., December 19 after the man had gone into a violent rage in his apartment in the 200 block of Lakeside Drive, apparently under the influence of PCP. Officer Kemp, after speaking to family members in the apartment found suspected PCP in the suspect's possession. He was held on \$500 bond, charged with possession of a controlled dangerous substance and possession of drug paraphernalia.

Officer Robert Keller tried to stop the occupants of a stolen 1986 Toyota Camry about 9 a.m., December 26 in the 6000 block of Breezewood Drive. The car, which had been reported stolen in Montgomery County the previous day, was driven off with the officer in pursuit. After a brief chase the suspects jumped out and ran. They were arrested after extensive foot chases, one as far away as Berwyn Heights. A 19-year-old non-resident male was charged with theft and held on \$10,000 bond. The other two were Greenbelt juveniles, a brother and sister, ages 12 and 14. The girl was released to a parent and the boy was held at Boys' Village in Cheltenham.

Officer George Mathews arrested three men, two of them Greenbelt residents, who broke into a vacant apartment at No. 11 Parkway about 1 a.m. January 1 with the intention of having a party there. They were charged with breaking and entering. Two were held on bonds of \$1,000 and \$500. The third was released on personal recognizance.

Investigating suspicious persons in a car in the 8900 block of Edmonston Road about 8:30 p.m., December 25 Officer David Lucia arrested two 17-year-old males, a Greenbelt resident and a non-resident after he found they were in possession of alcohol (beer), marijuana and drug paraphernalia. Officer Jim Parker arrested a 55-year-old non-resident about 2:30 p.m., December 31 at the Dart Drug in Greenway Center after the man was seen by a store employee concealing merchandise and leaving the store with it. He was held on \$500 bond on a theft charge.

Pediatric Predicaments

The Gynecological Examination

The practice of pediatrics has changed greatly since I first opened my doors to patients 23 years ago. In those days my practice consisted mainly of very ill children below the age of puberty.

Nowadays, pediatrics emphasizes preventive medicine and child development. Furthermore, many of my patients are getting older, and I am grateful to note that they are reluctant to leave my practice even after they reach college age.

It is also a well known fact that adolescents are increasingly active sexually. It was my custom in the past to refer sexually active adolescent women to gynecologists. Adolescent gynecology, however, is different from the adult variety. It is more time-consuming, and fraught with legal as well as medical complications. Most gynecologists, therefore, are not happy about such referrals.

I have decided, therefore, to bring in a female associate, Dr. Vijaya Kumar, who will help me with the practice of general pediatrics, and who will also give advice on sexual matters to teenage women, do pelvic examinations, and prescribe contraceptives if this is desired. I have also taken a refresher course in adolescent gynecology recently at the Georgetown University Hospital.

We feel that the following youngsters should have a gynecological history and breast and pelvic examinations:

- a) all women over the age of 18 years;
- b) all sexually active women;
- c) women with symptoms that could be gynecological;
 - 1) painful or irregular menstruation;
 - 2) vulvar or vaginal pain and/or discharge;
 - 3) stoppage of menstruation;
 - 4) no sign of puberty by 15 years of age;
 - 5) puberty before age 9 years;
 - 6) abnormal uterine bleeding (between periods);
 - 7) exposure to sexually transmitted diseases;
 - *8) suspicion of sexual molestation or rape;
 - 10) severe lower abdominal pains.

*These conditions will not be managed in our office. They will be referred to the appropriate facilities or consultants.

Confidentiality is always a ticklish subject in these matters. It will be our policy to keep whatever we are told by our patients in the strictest confidence. There are two exceptions: threats to the life and welfare of our patients (such as suicide); and threats to others.

We urge and encourage our adolescent patients, both male and female, to consult us with any and all problems they have, so we may serve them in the best possible manner.

had made its mark as a mortgage banking company by concentrating its efforts on this segment of the market. He said the decision to adopt the increase reflects the fact that SLSC could no longer recover its costs on the smaller loans. Colton noted that the impact on individual borrowers will be less than \$250 per loan.

Colton also reported that the new SLSC rules would require buyers of some of the one-bedroom GHI units to increase their down payment on the unit to 20% in order to get a loan. Colton said the staff will be researching several options for finding a source for 90% loan-to-value financing for these one-bedroom units.

Use of Surpluses

The board adopted a clarifying resolution, recommended by GHI's auditors, which explicitly states that any savings in operations or surpluses will be returned to members in the following year in the form of reduced charges. The resolution specifically states that the surpluses include the value of patronage refunds issued by the National Cooperative Bank. According to Colton's report to the board, this resolution merely confirms what has been GHI's practice in the past. The return of surpluses to members is an IRS test for cooperatives. If the test is not met, any excess income would be subject to taxation, Colton indicated.

Meetings

Colton reported on a December 11 meeting for members in Parking Quadrant 1, which includes the 11, 12, 14, and 16 Courts of Ridge and the 7 and 11 Courts of Southway. Fourteen members attended the meeting. Colton said that the proposed measures for alleviating parking problems were, in general, well received. Members suggested that some additional parking might be added at the rear of the attached boiler room in the 14 Court of Ridge. Colton said the staff will analyze this suggestion to see if it is feasible.

The board of directors will meet this month on the regular schedule on January 8 and 22.

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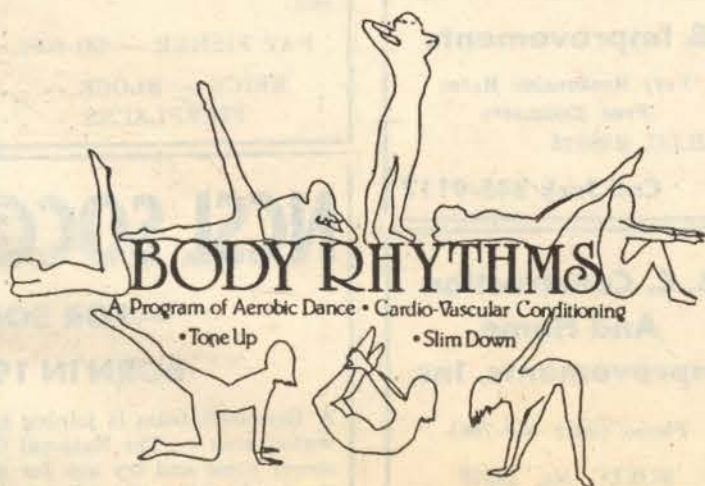
