Council and GHI Board Work Out Agreement on Local Playgrounds

At the request of the board of directors of Greenbelt Homes, Inc., the city council held a work session on April 1 to resolve any remaining questions about a division of responsibility for playgrounds in the city which lie in GHI neighborhoods and are commonly called "GHI playgrounds," although they are in fact open to the children of all city residents. The discussions at the work session basically confirmed the contents of a memorandum of understanding already approved by council at its meeting on March 9.

The understanding was based on a proposal the GHI board made to the city last year concerning new division of responsibility for the playgrounds. GHI proposed that the cooperative assume land maintenance for all the playgrounds; the city would then provide and maintain play equipment and the material at the base of the equipment, as well as providing insurance coverage for use of the equipment and trash removal.

GHI has budgeted \$20,000 for grounds maintenance (including grass cutting and disposal, leaf raking, sodding and ground cover replacement and picking up trash); the city estimate for its share of the work (including equipment replacement and maintenance, tree trimming, trash removal and liability insurance) comes to the same figure and in-

cludes \$5000 per year for new or replaced equipment. Councilman Edward Putens pointed out at the worksession that equipment is expensive. He suggested that more should be budgeted. City Manager James K. Giese replied that nothing in the agreement would prevent the city from spending more in any one year if it was necessary. Councilman Thomas X. White also pointed out that costs of the program are subject to annual review and that adjustments could be made at that time.

GHI will form an inspection committee for an annual survey of the playgrounds to suggest where work and equipment are needed. At the worksession, White suggested that a city representative be invited to meet with the GHI committee, a suggestion readily agreed to by the five GHI board members present. President Margaret Hogensen and Directors Andrea Haslinger, Nancy Hutchins, Debbie Hartwick, and Ray McCawley.

PRAB Reservations

The GHI board had requested the worksession to clarify a recommendation by the city's Parks and Recreation Advisory Board (PRAB), to which council had referred the GHI proposal on playgrounds, in its report of February 19. PRAB endorsed the GHI plan but recommended that the city council consider "more details for transitioning the G.H.I. playgrounds to the type of relationship that exists between the city and other neighborhoods." The possibility that the arrangement was to be considered only temporary by the city was of concern to the GHI board. As Mc-

Cawley expressed GHI's position. "This is the way we think it ought to be."

Apparently a misapprehension was at the basis of PRAB's recommendation that GHI playgrounds should have the same status as those in other neighborhoods. According to Keith Chernikoff, chairman of PRAB, he had not realized that more than half of the playgrounds in the GHI neighborhoods had actually been dedicated to the city many years ago.

Sixteen of the 27 "GHI playgrounds" were turned over to the city in 1953, according to GHI General Manager Ron Colton, of these 16, four are actually small green-space areas (such as the southeast corner of Crescent and Scuthway) and not actually playgrounds. The 12 playgrounds which are city-owned lie primarily within neighborhoods of the masonry homes. The other 11 playgrounds which lie on GHI land are primarily within the neighborhoods of the frame homes. These 11 playgrounds are governed by a use agreement with the city which, Giese said at the worksession, predates his arrival in Greenbelt 24 years ago as city manager. Colton said that the use agreement could be updated but that considerable surveying costs would be incurred.

Chernikoff said that the fact that so many of the playgrounds actually belonged to the city satisfied his reservations about "the equity issue" in relationship to playgrounds in other parts of the city.

Other Playgrounds

According to Recreation Director Harry G. Irving, playgrounds in other city neighborhoods are either on city property and equipped and maintained by the city, or they are on private property and are privately maintained. Many of the privately owned playgrounds were built by the developers and then turned over to homeowner or condominium associations to be maintained.

In most parts of Greenbelt, both city playgrounds and private playgrounds exist in some form. For example, there are about 32 playgrounds owned and maintained by the Springhill Lake apartment complex; the city owns and maintains a Recreation Center in Springhill Lake with a large community playground, and another playground adjacent to the Greenbelt Middle School. These city facilities primarily serve children and youth from Springhill Lake.

Similarly, Greenbriar has four playgrounds which are privately owned and the city maintains a municipal park next to nearby Eleanor Roosevelt High School; in Windsor Green, there are eight privately owned playgrounds and nearby a five-acre city-maintained See PLAYGROUNDS, p. 4, c. 1

CFG in Support of Pool School and Police Station

At the Citizens for Greenbelt (CFG) annual meeting on Thursday, March 26, motions were passed supporting the renovation of North End School and construction of an indoor pool and a new police station.

The three motions which were passed related to the city's \$6 million bond issue, approved by the voters of Greenbelt in 1985. Unanimously supported was the motion for building the new police station with funds from the bond issue. A majority approved a motion to support renovating North End School. A majority of CFG members also supported building an indoor pool with the bond issue money.

Also passed unanimously was a motion supporting a bill before the Prince Georges County Council that would delay processing of zoning applications in an area undergoing review of a master plan. This bill is cosponsored by Greenbelt's county council member Richard Castaldi.

A whole new slate of officers was elected at the meeting. They are: Alan Freas, president; Mar-

vin Holmes, vice-president; Brenda Simons, secretary; and Mike Esancy, treasurer.

Freas said he wants to see a larger and revitalized CFG. As steps toward this goal, Freas said members will be receiving a letter from him outlining areas of concern and things CFG plans to do. Several ad hoc committees will be appointed by Freas, including membership, the Labor Day Festival, constitution and by-laws revision and fund raising.

Outgoing president Keith Chernikoff was given a ski bag at the meeting.

The first meeting of the new executive board will be held on Wednesday, April 22 at 8 p.m. in the Board Room of Greenbelt Homes Inc.

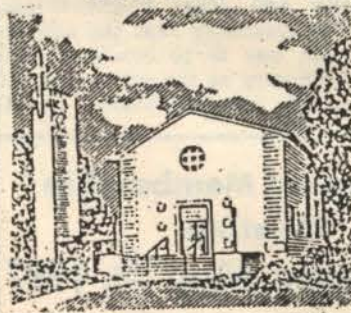

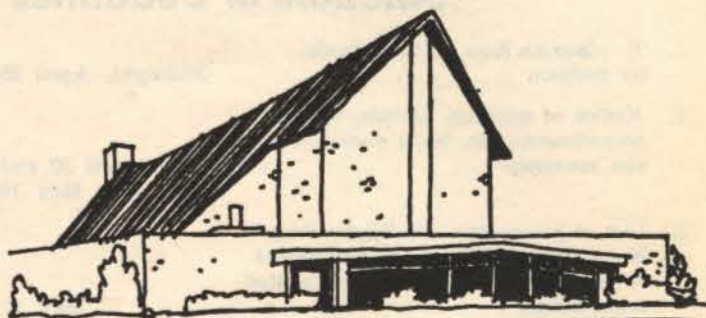

PROCLAMATION

WHEREAS, During the month of April, the Greenbelt Volunteer Fire Department and Rescue Squad, Inc. is conducting its Annual Fund Drive and is seeking the support of the community to raise the funds necessary to assure proper maintenance of its equipment and facilities, and to assure that the fire and rescue services provided by its volunteers continue to be of the highest quality; and

WHEREAS, During Greenbelt's 50th Anniversary, it is appropriate to remember that fire services date back to the construction of Greenbelt, when a 500 gallon per minute pumper, furnished by the Federal Government, was manned by three two-man platoons, supplemented by workers and guard personnel employed on the project; and

WHEREAS, These efforts of the men and women of the Greenbelt Volunteer Fire Department and Rescue Squad, Inc. and their Ladies Auxiliary could not have been successful without the year in and year out support of the citizens of Greenbelt and their generosity in responding to the annual fund raising appeals of the department;

 facility on land belonging to the Board of Education. This property may be used for a school in the future.

In general, Irving said, the privately-owned playgrounds are reserved for children of residents of the neighborhood; the city playgrounds are open to all Greenbelt residents.

New Base Material Tested

According to Public Works Director George Smith, the old asphalt is being removed from GHI playgrounds and a new cushioning material being tested in four playgrounds. The material consists of finely shredded rubber, which is a by-product of tire re-capping. Councilmember Antoinette Bram raised questions about this material, pointing out that it may not be biodegradable. She also expressed some concern about its washing into drains. Chernikoff said that the material was being scattered outside the boxes, which are supposed to contain it.

Smith acknowledged that scattering is a continuing problem, as with any material. However, he said that had received only one complaint from a parent, who had said that the material was dirty. He added that the kids like it.

In response to a question by the News Review, Chernikoff later said that PRAB will look into the questions raised about this material.
