City Council Hears Citizen Requests For Senior Housing, North End Center

At its regular meeting on July 13, the Greenbelt City Council discussed citizen petitions involving possible senior citizen housing near North End School, North End School itself, and a drug problem at Springhill Lake.

Senior Housing

The Housing Committee of the Greenbelt Consumer Co-operative requested a long-term lease on some of the land surrounding the North End School. The group wants to build a 100-unit apartment building for senior citizens and handicapped persons. The group had previously requested, without success, the lease of a parcel of land near the lake park.

Council requested that the architect for the school study the feasibility of the housing proposal.

Committee members differed over the placement of the proposed building. City Manager James K. Giese said that committee member Jim Cassels, who was not present, told him the new building would be attached to the existing school building. Committee members Anne and Tony Pisano favored placing the building behind the baseball diamond on the school grounds.

Tiny Pisano said that because of the slope of the land, it may be possible to construct a building with six stories in the back, which from the front appears to have only three stories. Pisano said that he would find a tall building on the level portion of the land more objectionable than the removal of trees that would be required under his proposal. Mike Burchick said the committee would provide the architect with a consensus proposal.

North End School

Betty Timer, of the Citizens for the North End Center, urged the council to develop a plan for use of the entire school building before beginning renovations. The committee has previously proposed a comprehensive plan for use of the school for programs including a senior citizen drop-in center, a senior citizen daycare facility, a children's daycare center, studios and classrooms for various art programs and recreation and sports programs. Timer presented the council with a floor plan showing how these programs could be assigned to the rooms in the school.

Nancy DePlatchett, representing the Greenbelt North End Center Arts Coalition, supported the proposal by Timer's group to have an Arts Center in a mixed use building and said the coalition could handle management of the studio space. She said that a number of grants were available but that the application dates are "creeping up on us."

Giese said that the grants the coalition has mentioned in the past all require an established organization and plan and that

none can be used for building construction.

Drug Problem

A Springhill Lake resident urged council to create a drug squad in the police department. He said the drug problem in Springhill Lake is getting worse. While praising the city police force, he said that plain clothesmen are needed since drug dealers disappear when a marked cruiser arrives.

Giese said that the chief intends to restructure the current Selective Enforcement Unit to focus on drugs, once a temporary shortage of manpower is resolved. He assured council that even with the shortage, drugs are not being ignored.

Police Chief James Craze, in a phone conversation, said that the shortage resulted from the need to replace four officers who were hurt in the line of duty. The four replacements are currently enrolled in police academies and are expected to begin working in November. A fifth officer resigned July 17 and will be replaced when possible.

Development Proposal

Council had received a written petition from a group of residents who want to obtain the approximately ten-acre Parcel 2 between Gardenway and Hamilton Place for development of single family homes. Such a use would be allowable under current zoning of the land. The group re-

quested a meeting in executive session to discuss their proposal. They indicated a desire to avoid getting into a bidding contest with the city, which has attempted to obtain the parcel for parkland. The meeting was held on July 20.

Outdoor Pool

Mayor pro tem Thomas X. White questioned Giese about the "zero bottom" aspect of the pool design. He said that since the worksession on the design, he had heard several concerns about this feature, including fears that the slope would be hazardous for young children, who could walk into water over their heads. He also cited concerns that the slope would be too slippery and that the gradual decline would take away from the free swim area within the pool.

Giese noted that there will be a wading pool for young children. He said that other pools of this design have not had slippage problems. In addition, Giese said since less of the new pool will be too deep to stand in, there will be more usable space than in the current pool.

In response to comments from Councilmember Antoinette Bram, Giese said that there will be a rail.

Giese said that he could arrange for council to see the plans again, but that there is a tight deadline since the city hopes to go to bid in late August.

Citizens for Greenbelt Plan Candidates' Night

Citizens For Greenbelt (CFG) will hold its biennial City Council Candidates Night on Thursday, August 27, in the City Council room. All candidates will be invited to appear, make a statement in answer to questions to be provided to them in advance, and to answer questions from the audience. The entire proceedings will be carried live on cable channel B-10 for those unable to attend in person.

CFG's Labor Day Festival Committee is currently working on plans for participation. Members interested in assisting are encouraged to contact Gudrun Christenson, committee chair.

Irene Hensel has consented to serve as Chair of the Transportation Committee and as a member of the Executive Board. The next meeting of the board is scheduled at 7:30 p.m., Thursday,

August 6 in the GHI Board Room. Members are encouraged to attend.

Alan Freas handed in his letter of resignation as president of CFG, effective July 12. A job change, he explained in the letter, with "increased responsibilities... does indeed require a great deal of extra time." Freas finds he will not be able "to put in as much time for CFG as I had planned, would like, and think appropriate."

Under the CFG bylaws, the vice president automatically steps up to the office of president. CFG's new president is Marvin Holmes

White and Hensel to Run For Seats on City Council

Two more candidates tossed their hats into the ring this week—incumbent Mayor Pro Tem Thomas X. White and challenger Irene Hensel. White, the first to actually file his nomination petitions for the city council election (he beat Mayor Gil Weidenfeld by a few hours), is completing his seventh term on council. Hensel is a long time Greenbelt resident. Each of them brings over 25 years of community activism in Greenbelt. They join Weidenfeld and Joseph Isaacs, who have already announced their candidacies.

White Biography

Thomas X. White resides at 8 Woodland Way, with his wife, Helen, and three of their seven children. The Whites have lived in Greenbelt for 28 years.

White is a native Washingtonian. He was educated in the parochial school system here, graduating from Gonzaga College High School in 1953. After attending Georgetown University for one year, he enlisted in the U.S. Navy and served for five years as a Medical Corpsman.

Leaving active service in 1959, White enrolled at the University of Maryland, and moved with his family to Greenbelt at that time. In 1962, he earned a B.S. Degree in Microbiology and has worked for the past 25 years in the field of medical products. For the past 11 years he has worked for the Pharmaceutical Manufacturers Association, where he is Director of Production and Quality Programs.

Continuing his affiliation with the U.S. Navy as an active Naval Reservist, White is completing his 33rd year of Naval Reserve service. He is assigned to a Navy Reserve Medical Unit at Adelphi, MD.

White began his active community service in 1962 when he served with the Greenbelt Jay-Cees, the Citizens for a Planned Greenbelt, and various committees and elective offices in the Greenbelt Homes, Inc. (GHI) cooperative. He served on the GHI Audit Committee for three years, the GHI Board of Directors for four years, and served as the Treasurer of GHI during 1973-74. He was one of the founders of the Save Our Community Committee (SOCC). SOCC was instrumental in preventing the location of a planned three school complex on Parcels 1 and 2 west of the Baltimore-Washington Parkway.

First elected to the City Council in 1973, White has served seven terms. While on the council he has been active also in county, regional, state, and national organizations dealing with

municipal affairs. These include:

White is a member of Greenbelt American Legion Post No. 136, Citizens For Greenbelt, the Greenbelt Arts Center and Friends of the Greenbelt Museum. He is a charter member and former president of the Eleanor and Franklin Roosevelt Democratic Club. During the past year he was appointed by council to serve on the board of Greenbelt Access Television (GATE), a new organization, formed to promote community access on cable television. White remains active in GHI, serving on the cooperative's Reserves Committee. He is a volunteer crime watch member for Woodland Hills and a volunteer worker for St. Hugh's Bingo.

Hensel Biography

Born on June 1, 1932 in New York City of working class parents, Hensel attended school and worked there until joining the Navy in 1955. Stationed in San Diego, she met her husband Richard while working in the same Navy office. She served over three years, was honorably discharged, and then moved to Greenbelt in 1958 to raise a family.

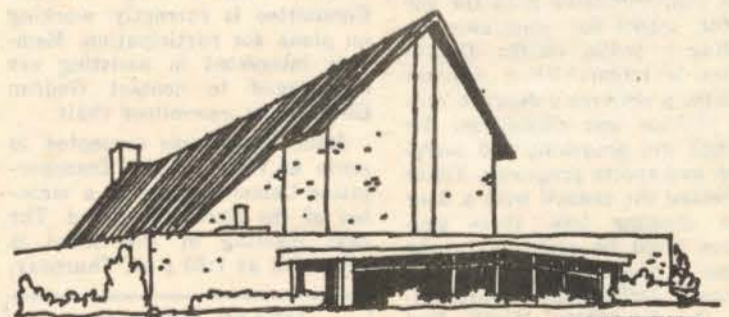

Police Looking for Three After Strongarm Robbery

On Saturday, July 11, a 29 year old black man was beaten and robbed by three white men in their mid 20's. The victim had just parked his car about 5:30 a.m. and was walking toward the apartment building at 126 Westway, when the three men, who had been standing near their double-parked van, began to yell racial slurs. The men grabbed and assaulted the victim, searched his pants pockets, stealing several hundred dollars, while continuing to yell racial slurs. The three men then fled in their 70's red van with a confederate flag in front.

Descriptions

The first suspect is pictured above in a composite identification sketch. He had a broad, full beard, and was wearing a white, sleeveless tee-shirt and blue jeans. The second man also had a full beard. The third was wearing jeans.

Three Petitions Surface for Rezoning Of Properties in Greenbelt East

Three rezoning petitions for properties in fast-growing Greenbelt East have recently surfaced. The first is from developer Michael T. Rose of Greenbrook Associates, who is requesting multi-family medium density residential-condominium zoning (R-18C), permitting construction of up to 20 units an acre. Rose plans to build 360 units in four-story condominium apartments on 16 acres, located on the southwestern side of proposed Hanover Parkway extended. The land is south of the Hunting Ridge condominium and Greenway Village rental apartments (formerly called Goddard Space Village.)

On the drawing boards for developer Mark R. Vogel of Mark Vogel Companies are two petitions — one for detached single-family homes (R-55, up to 6.7 dwelling units an acre) on 29.04 acres northeast of proposed Hanover Parkway extended and another for commercial office (CO) on 29.76 acres southwest of Hanover Parkway. The property, known as Magnolia Farms, is north of Good Luck Road and west of Doctors Hospital.

All three tracts are located within the city limits and zoned rural-residential (R-R), a single family use which permits up to 2.17 units an acre.

The Rose and Vogel petitions will be reviewed by the Maryland National Capital Park and Planning Commission (MNCPPC) in preparation for a possible hearing by the Prince Georges County Planning Board. Recommendations will also be made by various county agencies and the

Greenbelt City Council. The county Zoning Hearing Examiner will also hold a hearing (the Rose petition being scheduled for September 30). He will then forward a recommendation to the Prince Georges County Council, sitting as the District Council, for a final decision. However, if the Greenbelt City Council recommends denial of the petitions, the District Council must obtain a super majority vote - six of nine votes - to override because the Rose and Vogel properties are located within the city's borders. A super-majority vote is also required if the rezoning requests are contrary to recommendations of the Adopted Master Plan. The 1970 plan recommended that the northern two-thirds of the Rose property be developed in the townhouse zone and the southern one-third in the R-55 single-family home zone. The plan's recommendations for the entire Vogel tract was R-55 single-family.

According to preliminary information, the applicants' justification for their higher-density rezoning requests is based on substantial changes over the years in the character of the neighborhood from rural to an urban/suburban commercial and residential center. They point to extensive rezonings in the Greenbelt East area, which includes the Greenway Shopping Center, the Maryland Trade Center Park, Holiday Inn, Commerce Center I, and various low and high rise office buildings and condominium and rental apartments and townhouse developments.

Other Developments

Although road improvements are underway and programmed, the city council, city advisory boards and residents continue to be concerned about whether adequate public facilities, in particular roads, will be available to support new and proposed development in Greenbelt East and along Greenbelt Road to the East.

Other proposed new developments in the booming Greenbelt East area includes Commerce II, a mid-rise office building, and the high rise Maryland Trade Center Building III. The ten-acre former Freda Bell tract bordering the Capital Beltway, south of the Maryland Trade Center, was slated for a 478-unit high rise rental luxury apartment development. However, the owners are now talking about high-rise office buildings and retail uses for the property.

The Rose and Vogel properties are included in Planning Area 67 of the 1970 Adopted and Approved Master Plan for College Park-Greenbelt & Vicinity. Revision of this plan has been underway for several years. The county's citizens advisory committee has already met about 28 times and the MCPPC staff is now preparing an in-house report for the committee's review. Later the District Council and the Planning Board will conduct at least one joint, duly advertised public hearing on the preliminary plan. Then within four months of the close of the record of the joint public hearing, the District Council will take final action.

OUTSTANDING CITIZEN CONTEST BEGAN WITH CITIZEN SUGGESTION

Greenbelters are in a historical mode this year. And no wonder! A marker like half a century already passed makes it easy to look back. Yet not all Greenbelt traditions began that long ago. While the city in general focuses on 50 years of history, the committee to choose this year's Outstanding Citizen looks back only 14.

Correction: Make that 16. Actually both numbers are correct, and here's the story.

In 1971 former Greenbelt Katherine Keene questioned the Labor Day Festival's focus over the four-day weekend on choosing and then honoring a teenage girl with the title of Miss Greenbelt. Keene felt that persons so young could hardly have had a chance to contribute in any significant way to the community, that the attributes recognized were primarily superficial. She suggested instead that the festival committee find some means to recognize qualities about people of Greenbelt that make this community outstanding, if not unique—their willingness to be of service and their creativity in improving the quality of life in their community.

Festival chair Dave Lange agreed. Immediately he appointed a committee of citizens to work out criteria and procedures for creating an award to highlight such public service. Serving on that original ad hoc committee were the late Charles T. McDonald; retired former city manager, and Vincent Caruso, Sue Lange, Katherine Keene, and Leonie Penney. Too little time remained before the Festival weekend in 1971, however, to initiate the new award.

In 1972 creating such an award was again postponed for what seemed a more urgent reason: to honor two men in their nineties who had been associated with Greenbelt throughout its history, 'Pop' Cipriano and Jerry Goodin.

Cipriano, a local farmer from a place east of town, participated every year in annual parades, driving a gaily decorated donkey cart. Earlier, he had personally constructed a roadway connecting the city with his farm, a

meager track now part of the four-lane highway Greenbelt Rd. east of the Parkway. From the beginning, he was a Greenbelt booster.

(Cipriano Rd. is named for him, as well as a shopping center that fronts on it. Yet only strong protests by the Greenbelt city council preserved the name on local landmarks, when the county sought to regularize connecting highway names by changing Cipriano to Telegraph Rd., the name at that time for the southern portion beyond Good Luck Rd.)

Goodin had been hired as porter, as the job was called, by the Greenbelt Consumer Cooperative to sweep out and maintain the buildings in the commercial center—a job he was still holding at the age of 90. In the 30's, when he was first hired, there were few jobs for black men outside of janitorial work. He seems always to have been well-liked, and after a memorable day when he was bitten by a black widow spider that had crawled inside his empty glove, local women took over his cleaning job at the beauty parlor until he was well enough to resume his work again.

Cipriano and Goodin rode together in the Labor Day Festival Parade in 1972 as honorary parade marshals—the community's way of paying tribute to their long years of friendship with Greenbelt.

Thus not until 1973 was the first person chosen as Greenbelt's Outstanding Citizen, beginning a sequence of 13 years prior to this year of the city's 50th anniversary. If we regard the history of the idea for an Outstanding Citizen Award, we look back 16 years; but if we think only of the years since the award began, the history is two years

Procedures for Nominations
Nominations may be made by filling out the accompanying form in the Greenbelt News Review. Nominations from previous years may also be reactivated. If desired, they may also be updated. More than one person may collaborate in making a nomination, but all nominators must sign the form. Different persons may also submit different nominations for the same nominee, though organizations as a group may not submit a nomination.

To be eligible, nominations must be received by Sunday, August 16. Nominees must be Greenbelt residents. Current elected officials and political candidates are not eligible. City employees may be nominated only for activities for which the employee is not paid (excluding nominal payment).

The winning candidate will be chosen by an independent panel of Greenbelt citizens. No deliberations will be held until after the deadline on August 16.

50 Years Ago In Greenbelt

In June 1937, construction was well underway in the new town of Greenbelt. The Baltimore Evening Sun headline on June 16, 1937, reads "Uncle Sam's Design for Utopia Presents a Fair Face." The accompanying article went on to report that "the visitor may now see rows of completed dwellings facing each other across green courts; a row of red-brick steep-roofed houses on one side, a row of like houses, their bricks painted white, on the other. He may see other rows of red brick looking out from groves of oak trees and maple trees that tower above them, shaded in spite of the brilliant sunshine of the June afternoon.

"It is said that 18,900 people have been visiting Greenbelt each week for several weeks," the article continued, Mrs. Franklin Delano Roosevelt having done something for the record by visiting it four times in a recent ten days and parties of United States Senators and Congressmen helping."

Concern was rising during this period about the high cost of construction and on whether the federal government should subsidize the rents for low income families. The cost of building Greenbelt was placed at \$12.-800,000 and Resettlement Administration (RA) officials realized that Greenbelt could not be a low-income community if its residents would be expected to repay the costs—even over a 60-year period as some government officials were demanding.

The decision over rental fees delayed family selection from among the thousands of applicants. If the rents were kept low, only persons whose annual incomes were between \$1,200 and \$2,000 would be eligible to live in Greenbelt. If rents were boosted, persons earning up to \$3,000 would be eligible.

The RA officials fought for the low income community, stating that the taxpayer would not take

a loss on the project because the town could be expected to expand and the government's property would be "worth a great deal more than the sum invested in it." Further, "Greenbelt would provide a demonstration of a nearly ideal suburban community, encouraging and pointing the way for private enterprise in such projects."

While some RA officials haggled over rentals, others were busily sifting through the applications. The man who had the authority to pick the first settlers for Greenbelt was Dr. Walter Lund, sociologist, historian and Ph.D. from Princeton University. Lund's boss was John O. Walker, director of the resettlement division of the R.A. Walker later became the first general manager of the housing project when Greenbelt opened.

The first pioneer families were carefully chosen and, as Dr. Lund explained, "It will not be a case of first come, first served, but the early and late comers will

receive equal consideration."

Applicants were first eliminated on the basis of income. Those left were invited to fill out a formal application giving details on their employment and family size. Twelve to fifteen family selection specialists interviewed applicants at their homes to determine if they would be "suitable tenants for Greenbelt."

"They will not try to get only superior persons for the community," Lund explained. "They want all kinds, leaders and followers, laborers and professional persons, young and old, single folk and married couples with few or many children; all strata of society, the poet, the mechanic, the clergyman, the clerk, the aristocrat, the proletarian and middle-class folk—all in the same proportion as one finds them in an average small community of this section of the country."

However, one type of person would not be present, according to Dr. Lund. "Greenbelt will lack some of the elements of a normal community," he commented. "The morons or the criminal element" will be missing, making Greenbelt "not a typical town, but rather an ideally normal community."

What type of dental floss is best?

Senator Green Receives Municipal League Award

State Senator Leo E. Green (District 23), received top honors from both the Maryland Municipal League and the Prince Georges Municipal Association for his work on behalf of city and town governments. He received the Certificate of Distinguished Service from the Maryland Municipal League at the League's Annual Convention on June 17, in Ocean City. The award is the highest recognition offered by the League.

Senator Green was instrumental in pushing a League initiative that requires state agencies to notify municipal officials when group homes for the mentally disadvantaged and for substance abusers are to be sited within the confines of a city or town. The purpose of such legislation is to help gain community acceptance of such facilities by advising local leaders in advance of such sitings.

Senator Green is one of only two lawmakers who have received MML's highest award twice. In 1983, he was a major proponent of long sought after legislation that authorized a tax differential or rebate to alleviate the so called "double tax". Double taxation occurs when municipal residents are taxed by a

county for services the county does not provide within city boundaries.

The Maryland Municipal League is a non-profit, non-partisan association representing 143 city and town governments throughout Maryland.

The Prince Georges Municipal Association honored Green as its 1987 Legislator of the Year for his "exceptional efforts and outstanding work on behalf of municipalities." The award was presented by Seat Pleasant Mayor Frank J. Blackwell, association president, during the league's annual convention in Ocean City.

ily. She is the mother of five daughters and one son.

In May, 1959, Hensel began her involvement here by joining a church organization. When Greenbelt Citizens for Fair Housing was formed, Hensel joined and served on the executive committee, 1968-69. Also during the 60's, she joined the Greenbelt Peace Committee.

During the long struggle over the proposed location of the high school, the Save Our Community Committee was formed. From 1967-68, Hensel served on the executive committee. She collected 500 signatures in a door-to-door petition drive.

When Parcels 3 and 4 were up for rezoning in January 1979, Hensel helped start a new organization, Citizens For Greenbelt, serving as treasurer from 1979-81, and vice president, 1981-2. She has recently assumed the transportation committee chair.

In June 1984, Hensel organized some of her neighbors in Lakewood and Boxwood to regain the loss of bus transportation for students to Eleanor Roosevelt High School again using a petition drive. In two weeks 500 signatures were gathered and some buses restored.

In 1985 when Greenbelt's savings and loan was closed, she participated in the fight of depositors to get access to their money.

Hensel lives in Lakewood. A member of the Lakewood Citizens' Association, she served as vice president from 1985-6.

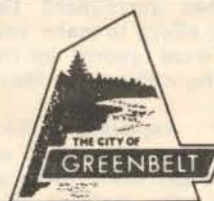
White Re-Elected to Board Of Municipal League

Greenbelt Police Respond To Barricade Situation

On Sunday, July 19, about 1:30 in the afternoon, the Greenbelt Police Department received numerous calls reporting a murder at 8-H Southway, according to Pfc. Pat McAndrew. Allegedly, he said, a woman had been shot and killed. Officers responded to the scene, but the persons inside the home refused to answer the door. Attempts to contact them by telephone also proved negative.

Officers then surrounded the house and an effort to make verbal contacts were ignored by the occupants who refused to leave the home.

McAndrew explained that, "since we did not know that an actual murder had taken place at that address, the incident was handled as a barricade situation." Southway was shut off between the gas station and Ridge Road.

The department also requested the assistance of the Prince Georges County Emergency Services SWAT Team and the Canine Unit. The Canine Unit responded along with other Prince Georges County officers from the Beltsville station. Before the SWAT team could respond, the situation was resolved.

After a half-hour standoff, a man and a woman, both residents, came out of the house. McAndrew said, "The officers with the assistance of the Canine Unit commenced to search the home to see, in fact, if a murder had occurred. They were able to determine that there was no murder, but did seize a 44 magnum revolver."

It was determined, he noted, that the incident stemmed from a domestic dispute.

The man was committed for emergency evaluation. There were no charges and no injuries. The majority of the court's residents remained in their homes.

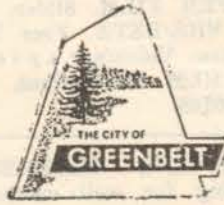
