Westchester Park Committee Explores Annexation Prospect With Council

The city council held a worksession on August 3 with representatives of Westchester Park who wished to explore the possibility of city annexation of the Westchester Park area and to seek the city's support in opposing an application for rezoning of the undeveloped part of the property.

Robert F. Crecco and Lorraine Hiatt, members of the steering committee of the Westchester Park Ad Hoc Committee, and Virginia Theis (standing in for committee member Joseph Haskell, who couldn't attend) came to the council to see if a coordinated approach to the rezoning application could be worked out. The Westchester Park Ad Hoc Committee is a residents group formed to oppose any commercial rezoning of the land adjacent to Westchester Park.

Greenhome & O'Mara, a large Greenbelt-based engineering firm, has filed a request for rezoning of the tract to Commercial Of-

fice (C-O). According to the rezoning application, the firm intends to build its headquarters on the tract. The corporation is contract purchaser of two parcels of land (totaling 17.43 acres) for which it is requesting a zoning map amendment. One of the tracts is currently zoned Residential Planned Community (Rural Residential) and the other Residential Highrise. The new master plan being circulated for comment by the Maryland-National Capital Park and Planning Commission calls for both parcels to be rezoned to the Rural Residential category, with recommendation that the land be developed as a Comprehensive Design Zone (CDZ).

Single Family Homes

Crecco said that the committee intended to support R-55 zoning for the two tracts since that category allowed only single family homes at a reasonable density. R-R zoning allows even less density but the CDZ, according to Greenbelt's Planning and Development Coordinator Celia Wilson, does allow increas-

ed densities (slightly above R-55) and a mix of single family homes and townhomes in return for innovative design, retention of green space and site plan review.

The city council, in an earlier worksession on the master plan, had already indicated that it would support the MNCPPC plan to keep the site residential. At this meeting council members indicated that they would oppose any change to C-O for this tract.

Annexation

The question of possible annexation of the Westchester Park properties and the rest of what is known as the Jaeger tract occupied most of the worksession. City Manager James K. Giese outlined the steps which the residents would have to take to institute the procedure: a petition signed by the owners of 25% of the property (in assessed valuation) and a petition signed by 25% of the registered voters. Greenbelt has to prepare and publicize an outline of services See WESTCHESTER PARK, p5

as possible so that the various associations can individually present their positions to the city council when it considers its comments on the master plan at its regular meeting on August 8.

Greenbelt Private Corp.

At Goldberg's request, GEAC also discussed a recommendation by the Community Relations Advisory Board (CRAB) that the city set up a private corporation to receive donations and corporate gifts to be used for public activities in the city.

GEAC took no position on formation of such a corporation. However, they voted to recommend to their boards that stipulations should be sought to ensure that the governing body of any such corporation should be representative of all part of the city.

The next meeting of GEAC will be held at the Hunting Ridge Community Building on September 1.

"AGNES OF GOD" GIVEN GRIPPING PERFORMANCE

Using a play written with three strong female characters, three strong female actors brought off a tour-de-force at the second night's performance of "Agnes of God," one of an alternating series of evenings of drama offered this summer by the Summer Repertory Theater group of the Greenbelt Arts Center. Despite the bare gymnasium ambience of the Center School stage, the miniscule audience listened in rapt attention as Marie Tousignant, Pam Parker-Visconage and Amy Louise Kneisley carried us through a series of revelations as each of the three characters developed and interacted with one or both of the others.

The production was perfectly cast—Tousignant as the worldly-wise Mother Superior of the convent of a contemplative order of nuns, Parker-Visconage as the sophisticated and rather hostile former-Catholic psychiatrist, and Kneisley as the naive innocent, Sister Agnes.

Dr. Livingstone has been appointed by the court to investigate the psychological state of the apparent murderer of a newborn infant within the confines of the convent walls. Mother Miriam Ruth is at first bent on protecting the fragile Agnes; later we wonder how much she is really protecting herself. Through two gripping sessions of hypnosis we learn much about Agnes' former history; and in the process of her investigation, the psychiatrist learns much also about herself.

A minimal stage set of black flats, cut into with black draperies to disguise entrances, and furnished only with black-cushioned simple chairs focused all attention on the moving figures in this curious triangle. All three

characters were also costumed starkly—one in white, one in a black habit with large white collar, the psychiatrist in white blouse and dark grey suit. The lighting was also simple but effective—only a reduction of intensity when Agnes would enter to act out an earlier episode recalled by Mother Miriam Ruth. Yet this very simplicity highlighted the emotional color of the interactions in the drama.

Although Center School is not air conditioned, a floor fan provided air circulation and the room's high ceiling helped to keep temperatures down. Seats for the audience were folding chairs. Yet the play was so gripping and the pace so unslacking that one concentrated wholly upon the stage.

I have only one criticism of the performance. In the next-to-last sentence of the play, Parker-Visconage, whose projection was always a little subdued, dropped her voice so low that this listener missed the crucial words that explained the "miracle." (See ad on page 5.)

Coakley & Williams Reception A Prelude to 10K Race

Coakley & Williams, the development and management firm headquartered in Maryland Trade Center Park, gave a reception on July 19 to prepare for the 2nd Annual Coakley & Williams 10K race to be run on September 25. The reception, held in the new Holiday Inn at Calverton, featured speakers representing the world of sports, representatives of some of the organizations which will benefit from the race, and the sponsoring firm.

One of the speakers was Rick Holborow, a blind runner who has been invited to participate in the 1988 Paralympic Games in Korea in October. The Coakley & Williams 10-K race will help him get there, said Rory Coakley. Holborow, who ran the Marine Corps marathon in 3 hrs. 24 min. gave those present some idea of how he trains and some of his experiences in running. He runs with a sighted partner. He wore out several friends during the marathon, he said.

Other beneficiary organizations include the Columbia Lighthouse for the Blind, the City of Greenbelt Historical Museum, and WLT's Good Light Fund. Charles Fagen, director of the Columbia Lighthouse for the Blind, gave a brief update on both the traditional services provided by the organization and new kinds of assistance which include such things as instruction of the blind in getting around on Metro and microwave cooking.

James Keating, vice-president and general manager of radio station WLTT, spoke about the station's Good Light Fund which gives needed equipment and supplies to the disabled. He said that over the last four years, \$150,000 worth of equipment

such as wheelchairs, braces and tires for trucks have been given to 85 organizations.

Pete Wysocki, former Redskin player, said he had run "two or three thousand miles ten or fifteen yards at a time," finished with some witty remarks. He praised Coakley & Williams for its efforts in starting the benefit 10-K run and characterized it as a "goal-oriented, can-do organization."

Coakley said that more than 200 runners participated in the 10-K last year and over \$12,000 was donated to charity. This year the sponsors are hoping for some 600 runners and have set a goal of \$23,000 in charitable benefits. Among special attractions will be post-race refreshments by local restaurants, T-shirts, and a one mile Fun Race.

Coakley thanked Greenbelter Larry Noel of the Prince Georges Runners Club and the Greenbelt Police Department for their help in arranging and managing the race.

The race will be run in the Greenbelt East area and will start at 8:30 a.m. Participants must complete an entry form and pay a fee. Mail entries must be postmarked by Sept. 16; Walk-in entries will be permitted on Sept. 23. For further information, call 345-9730, ext. 360.

GREENBELT EAST GROUP DEFINES POSITION ON AREA MASTER PLAN

At its meeting on August 4, the Greenbelt East Advisory Committee focused on the proposed master plan for the Langley Park-College Park-Greenbelt areas. The master plan is being circulated for comments by the Maryland-National Capital Park and Planning Commission, which prepared it. The final comments of the city are due by September 7.

GEAC Vice-President David Lychenheim, presiding in the absence of the president, Robert Zugby, asked each committee member to address any proposal in the plan which was of concern and on which GEAC should recommend a position. After all members had responded, the concerns came down to three: proposed rezoning of school sites, road extensions and proposed rezoning of the property adjacent to Westchester Park.

On a motion by Jack Davis of Hunting Ridge, GEAC members voted to recommend to its parent boards that they oppose the proposed rezoning to the R-55 category of the two-school site in Greenbelt East and instead support retention of the Rural Residential (R-R) category. Members also supported a strong statement of interest in these sites if, in the future, the school board should declare them surplus.

On the subject of road extensions, GEAC members voted to recommend that their parent organizations support acquisition of the rights-of-way for extension of Mandan Road to Brae Brook Drive and of Brae Brook Drive to Hanover Parkway. The motion made clear, however,

that GEAC members wanted the power of deciding to build these extensions to remain with the city of Greenbelt, in consultation with Greenbelt East residents.

After some discussion, the members also voted to oppose the extension of Kenilworth Avenue to the north of the city. Members decided, however, not to take a position on other road extensions proposed in the master plan, specifically the extension of Ridge Road to meet Cherrywood Lane.

GEAC members also voted to recommend that their boards support the residents of Westchester Park in opposing commercial development on the land south of their residences.

J Davis, a member of the city's Advisory Planning Board, and Sheldon Goldberg and Derek Thompson of Windsor Green, who had both attended the city council worksession on the master plan on August 1, gave GEAC members the benefit of their background knowledge on questions which arose during discussions of the various master plan proposals.

Lychenheim urged that the representatives try to get their association boards to act on these recommendations as soon

City Gets Update On New Interchange

On August 4, City Manager James K. Giese met with State Highway District Engineer Michael Snyder and Traffic Engineer Majid Shakhb to receive a briefing on the Greenbelt Road/Kenilworth Avenue interchange. State Senator Leo Green and Delegate Charles ("Buzz") Ryan also attended.

Snyder listed the changes undertaken since the interchange was opened and Green requested that a written report be given to the city. When Snyder asked if the city had further concerns, Giese noted that a request had been made for improved lane directional markings before the left turn to northbound Kenilworth. Giese also agreed to check with the police department to see what problems they may have observed and to also review accident records. The written report will be presented to council for further comments.

Snyder noted that the queuing on the fire lane southbound ramp from Kenilworth onto Greenbelt Road that was shown in the city's videotape no longer occurs.

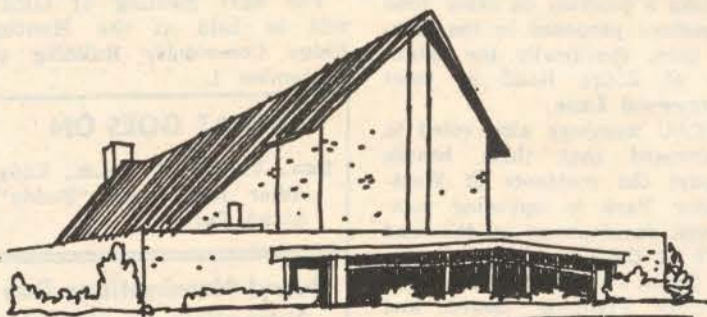

Why must baby teeth be treated if they fall out anyway?

Baby (deciduous) teeth serve several important functions. Besides their basic role in chewing, baby teeth aid in proper speech, give form to the face, and most important, hold the space for the permanent teeth which will eventually replace them.

Although permanent teeth begin forming even before birth, some are not ready to erupt into the mouth until age 12 or 13. If one or more of the baby teeth are prematurely lost or even just hadly decayed, these permanent teeth may come in crooked or be prevented from erupting at all due to loss of adequate space.

A resident in the 400 block of Ridge Road who was walking from his car toward his apartment building was robbed at gunpoint about 1:30 a.m., August 4 by a man with a 4" stainless steel revolver. The robber took the victim's wallet containing a small amount of money and joined a woman who was standing nearby. They fled on foot towards the vicinity of 402-408 Ridge Road. The suspect was a white male, 25 to 30 years, 6'0", 145 lbs., with brown collar-length hair, mustache, wearing a dark-colored shirt and jeans. The woman was white, 25 years, 110 to 120 lbs., brown shoulder-length frizzy hair, wearing a black and white striped shirt and jeans.

The Cineplex Odeon Twin Theatres box office at Beltway Plaza adjacent to the Super Fresh supermarket was robbed at gunpoint about 9:50 p.m., July 31 by a man with a dark-colored handgun while an accomplice stood nearby as a lookout. The gunman handed the cashier a Bradlees store bag and ordered her to put the money in the bag. The two men fled on foot with over \$200 in cash. which the city would provide to the residents.

The talks were exploratory in nature. Crecco said the committee needed to get an idea about "the scale of economies you can give us" in return for the city taxes the residents would have to pay.

In a long list of advantages to being in the city, Mayor Gil Weidenfeld pointed out that the city has more clout in zoning matters than does an unincorporated area. If a city opposes a rezoning in its boundaries, the District Council requires a "super-majority" of six councilmembers to approve that zoning over the city's objections. He noted that no developer in several years has sought rezoning over the city's objection.

There were many unknowns in the discussions—for instance, who owns the streets in Westchester Park. The city would assume maintenance of streets where ownership could be turned over to the city, Giese said. He also pointed out that trash pickup is paid for by city residents in addition to city taxes but that not all parts of the city subscribe to the city trash system, preferring to hire private firms.

Weidenfeld noted that, while city taxes are currently \$1.21 per hundred dollars of assessed valuation, city property owners end up paying considerably less than that. The county gives a 50 cent 'differential' to city taxpayers to compensate for services (primarily police protection) which the county does not supply to Greenbelt residents because the city takes care of them. Moreover, city property owners are exempt from the M-NCPPC park tax, which amounts to 28 cents this year. When these two offsets are subtracted from the city tax rate, it falls to less than 50 cents.

The committee members seemed inclined to accept an offer made by the council to have members of council or city staff meet with the residents of Westchester Park to discuss the possibility of annexation and to answer any additional questions. No date was set for such a meeting.

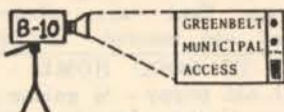

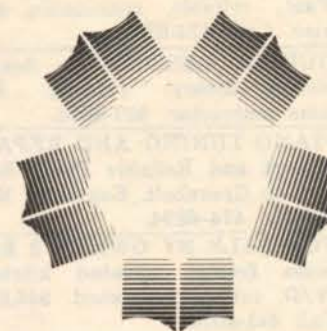

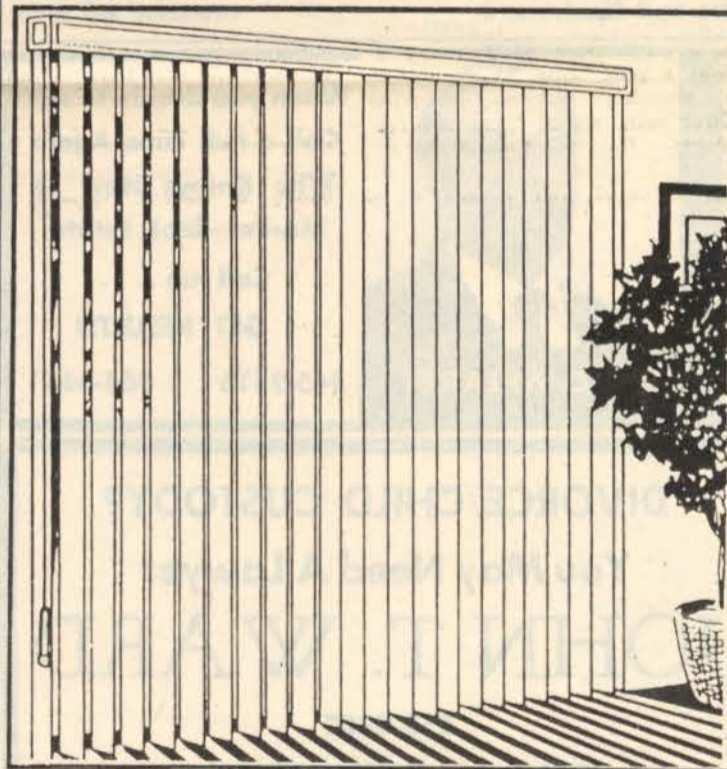
