Lease of Land for Senior Housing, Traffic Studies Asked of Council

At its September 11 regular meeting, the Greenbelt City Council agreed to survey voters' opinions on the desirability of leasing, at nominal cost, several acres of city parkland for construction of a senior citizen apartment project. Council also agreed to seek cost estimates for conducting traffic counts at critical intersections in Greenbelt East, received several petitions related to traffic and election procedures, and gave final approval to legislation raising councilmembers' pay.

Senior Housing At the request of the Senior Housing Committee of the Greenbelt Consumer Cooperative, council unanimously agreed to put a question on the election questionnaire to determine whether voters will support leasing, for \$1 per year, 2.5 to 3 acres of city land to a cooperative cor-poration. This corporation would construct a 100-unit senior citizen apartment building on the property. The committee would like to lease Parcel 12, located across the service road from St. Hugh's school, next to the lake park. The committee's second choice is Parcel 2, across from the GHI offices. This last property was recently purchased with proceeds from the 1985 bond is-

The committee first discussed the proposed housing project with council in February 1986, requesting use of Parcel 12. At that time the council members made it clear that the site was unacceptable. In November of last year the committee again met with council. this time requesting use of part of the North End School site. Since the city is negotiating with the school board to exchange it for Center School, this property is no longer available. The school system plans to build a new elementary school on the North End

City Manager James K. Giese opposed the new request, regardless of location. In his written comments he raised two concerns. The first was the idea of permitting private use of public land at nominal cost. He noted that when public land is made available for construction, it is generally used for low-income housing. The co-op proposal would not be limited to low-income tenants.

Secondly, Giese was concerned about the effect of allowing construction of an apartment building on open space at the same time that the city is seeking help from other levels of government to finance the purchase of Parcel 1. In addition, legal problems may occur if the project were

built on Parcel 2, which was purchased with bond funds. Since bond monies were not authorized for this use, Giese said that he would have to seek the advice of the city's bond counsel. Although the questionnaire will not bind the city to any course of action, Giese felt that raising the possibility on an official city document could jeopardize the city's attempt to obtain funds.

Jim Cassels, representing the committee, reminded council that the citizens overwhelmingly approved the referendum authorizing the construction of Green Ridge House. He argued that the original plan for Greenbelt called for the city to own all the surrounding land and that it is not only possible but desirable for the city to acquire land for purposes other than parks. Cassels said that Giese's objections could be overcome by having the voters decide. He did not think that posing the question would jeopardize the city's fundraising efforts.

Senior Housing Committee member Ben Rosenzweig told council that the city must "give serious consideration to the social problems involved in taking care of the senior citizens who are taxpayers and voters and have participated in the community for half a century. . He noted that council had received a plan to clear up to 15 acres of parkland for ballfields and argued that if council is "concerned about ballfields and recreation areas, they'd better damn sight give some serious thought to paying attention to senior citizen requirements.'

Traffic

Council directed staff to obtain cost estimates updating traffic counts at four intersections in Greenbelt East. The coalition of Greenbelt East Communities requested the counts because of concerns about the "reliability and timeliness" of developer-prepared traffic studies.

City Planning and Development Coordinator Celia Wilson was skeptical that the counts would be useful in fighting development proposals. Instead, she suggested that the city could make better use of its money by having its engineer review developer studies. She noted that a traffic study incorporates many assumptions beyond the basic counts which may be just as important as the actual counts. In addition, she and City Solicitor Robert Manzi pointed out that developers' counts can be compared with data from other sources, particularly from the State Highway Administration.

Council member Edward Putens argued that counts are needed to give the city a base from which to evaluate developer proposals. He pointed out that he had asked for a citywide traffic study and that staff had been

directed to study critical intersections in the city. Wilson said that the study data had been collected but not yet put together. Counts, however, had not been taken. Instead, the staff studied the morning, evening and lunchtime peaks to identify the problem movements and times.

Roy Dahl noted that the traffic counts do not include traffic from new construction further down Greenbelt Road. He suggested that traffic counts be taken over several days and subjected to statistical analysis. Wilson said that county regulations limit the amount of "background" traffic that must be included in developers' traffic studies.

Putens questioned the accuracy of the traffic generation rates used by the county. He said that the county estimates 1.5 vehicles per house, while he knows of a household with six cars. Giese agreed that many valid questions surround county procedures, but that performing a traffic study would not resolve them.

Manzi noted that reform would require changes to county legislation, rather than merely changes in rules and regulations. He suggested that if council were serious about seeking rethey should form, meet with County County Member Richard Castaldi and the Park and Planning staff to update the traffic generation estimates. Council accepted Giese's suggestion that they first meet with the city's traffic engineer to learn more about what changes are and are not feasible.

Petitions

Council received three petitions relating to traffic and parking. One, with 153 signatures, requested the city to convert Parkway to a one-lane, one-way street. This would permit angled, nose-in parking on the evenaddress side of the street. Although Giese questioned the petitioners estimates that this would provide 57 additional parking spaces, he said, in his written comments, that the request deserved consideration.

The second petition, from the Woodland Hills Community Association, requested that the city consider placing a stop sign at the intersection of Northway and Woodland Way and consider converting Northway to a one-way street between Woodland Way and Hillside Road. In addition, the petitioners requested increased enforcement of speed limits in the area and emphasis to the drivers of city-owned vehicles that they must obey the posted speed limit.

Don Shell requested that the city investigate ways to improve traffic and pedestrian safety in

Dahl's Biography

Roy Dahl moved to Greenbelt in 1978 to attend the University of Maryland where he received a masters in Applied Mathematics. His area of application is operations research and computer science, and he currently works in the field of network design, routing and scheduling.

He lived in Springhill Lake for eight years until he invested in a home in Greenwood Village in 1986. Dahl was elected to the first homeowners'-formed board of directors in Greenwood Village and has been reelected twice. He is currently serving as president of the board as well as being





A decision will be made by the city council at its next regular meeting on Tuesday, October 10 on whether to accept any of the bids.

According to Assistant City Manager Michael McLaughlin, the lake level will be allowed to rise again. It will later be lowered when work begins. The lake level dropped more than had been expected or desired, he said.

Late last year the city council decided to clean up the lake by improving water quality of the lake and taking care of the silt accumulation in the lake. The neccessary approval of the project by the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers then took awhile to obtain.



CHARTER AMENDMENT

At its regular meeting, held on September 11, 1989, the City Council of Greenbelt, Maryland adopted Charter Amendment Resolution 1989-1 (Resolution Number 701), and the following title of the Resolution is a fair summary of the amendment:

RESOLUTION OF THE CITY OF GREENBELT, ADOPTED PURSUANT TO THE AUTHORITY OF ARTICLE 11E OF THE CONSTITUTION OF MARYLAND
AND SECTION 13 OF ARTICLE 23A OF THE ANNOTATED CODE OF MARYLAND, (1957 EDITION AS
AMENDED), TITLE, "CORPORATION-MUNICIPAL",
SUB-TITLE "HOME RULE" TO AMEND THE CHARTER OF THE CITY OF GREENBELT FOUND, IN
WHOLE OR IN PART, IN THE COMPILATION OF
MUNICIPAL CHARTERS OF MARYLAND (1983 EDITION AS AMENDED), AS PREPARED BY THE DEPARTMENT OF LEGISLATIVE REFERENCE PURSUANT TO CHAPTER 77 OF THE ACTS OF THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF MARYLAND OF 1983, BY REPEALING AND REENACTING WITH AMENDMENTS SECTION 4, TITLE "CREATION, QUALIFICATIONS; COMPENSATION", TO PROVIDE THAT THE
MAYOR SHALL RECEIVE A SALARY OF \$6,000 PER
ANNUM AND THAT THE OTHER MEMBERS OF
COUNCIL EACH SHALL RECEIVE A SALARY OF
\$5,000 PER ANNUM

The above titled Charter amendment shall become and be considered a part of the Charter of the City of Greenbelt, Maryland, according to the terms of the amendment, in all respects to be effective and observed as such, upon the 13th day of November, 1989, unless on or before the 23rd day of October, 1989 there shall be presented to the Council of the City of Greenbelt, Maryland, or mailed to it by registered mail, a petition for referendum signed by twenty percent or more of the persons qualified to vote in the regular election of the City of Greenbelt, reviesting the above Charter amendment be submitted on referendum to the voters of the City of Greenbelt.

Greenbelt East. He noted that a youth had been struck earlier this year while attempting to cross Greenbelt Road near Roosevelt High School. He said that there is no indication to Greenbelt Road motorists that the school is there. He suggested that the speed limit be reduced and a flashing light installed. In addition, the school might begin educational programs for students and hire someone to supervise students outside and direct them to the light at Mandan Road. Schell also requested additional attention to pedestrian safety on Hanover Parkway near the school. The petition was referred to staff for comment,


Council also received a pair of requests for questions to be placed on the election questionnaire for voters in November. Tony Pisano wanted to measure support for a law limiting council members to no more than three consecutive terms on council. He said that prolonged service causes stagnation. Keith Chernikoff requested a question on electing council by a mixture of at-large and district voting, along with a possible increase in the size of council. Neither of the requested questions were placed on the survey when council considered the questionnaire later in the meeting. Putens made a motion to include the questions which died for lack of a second. Mayor Gil Weidenfeld and Mayor Pro Tem Joseph Isaacs felt the questionnaire was not an appropriate forum for such questions, but supported a review of all election-related questions, with Weidenfeld supporting a public meeting on the topic.

Legislation

Council gave final approval to an ordinance increasing annua' pay to \$5,000 for council members and \$6,000 for the mayor. This increase will not take effect until after the November elec-

Because of uncertainties about the owner's plans for Roosevelt Center, council deferred action on legislation introduced at its last meeting that would ask the state to designate the center as eligible for low interest rehabilitation loans.

An ordinance establishing a Community Center Task Force was given final approval. The eleven-member group will include representatives of the Advisory Planning Board, the Park an Recreation Advisory Board, the Community Relations Advisory Board, the Arts Advisory Committee and the Senior Citizen Task Force, along with six citizen members. It will be charged with developing guidelines for the conversion of Center School for use as a community center.



COMMUNITY CENTER TASK FORCE

On June 27, 1989, citizens of Greenbelt approved \$3 million in bonds to finance a community center and expressed preference for establishing such a community center at Center School.

Council has established a Community Center Task Force to be responsible for the development of a plan and guidelines for the reutilization of Center School as a community center after it is transferred to the city. This shall include the allocation of space to various special uses and activities.

The task force shall consist of six citizen members, preferably some with background in architecture and historic preservation, and from the business community. In addition to the six citizen members, the task force shall include one representative each of the city's Advisory Planning Board, Park and Recreation Advisory Board, Community Relations Advisory Board, Greenbelt Arts Advisory Committee, and the Senior Citizen Task Force. The Community Center Task Force shall:

1) Review and consider the evolution of the community center idea from its inception in the early 1980s, including concept plans, use proposals, surveys, and

community needs.

2) Evaluate the need to preserve the architectural integrity of the Center School building which is listed in the Register of Historic Places, as well as the relationship of the use of the building to the original Greenbelt town plan as relates to the reutilization of

JOE'S TIPS OF THE WEEK

Hello Again:

Almost all of the cars we drive today have electronic ignition systems. These systems are the most reliable ever engineered. Because these systems have a lower failure rate than older systems, we tend to forget them.

Because electronic components are solid state and are non-adjustable, they have an increased lifetime. The problems with these components are heat and oil contamination or component destruction due to breakage.

Case in point: we recently had the opportunity to diagnose a non-start type of failure. The first thing to consider is the electronic ignition. After normal diagnostic testing and component testing the problem was located. After removing the distributor, replacing and installing components, and adjusting ignition timing, the engine ran better than ever.

Some problems are not so easy to diagnose and correct. Consider an undetermined problem: This will drive a good electronic diagnostician nuts!

The fact of the matter is that the distributor is no longer being used: computer electronics are now being added to all later model vehicles and are controlled by computer. This new system is being used more and more in each major automotive manufacturing line.
