Budget Adopted, Taxes up 2.5c

City tax rates will increase by 2.5 cents for the next fiscal year, to \$1.355 per \$100 of assessed valuation, following the Greenbelt City Council's adoption of the fiscal year 1995 budget on May 23. The adoption followed a public hearing held the week before and a final work session on May 18. Expenditures are expected to total \$12.3 million, slightly higher than projected revenues of \$12.1 million. The difference will be made up from reserves.

When this budget takes effect, the city will hire a new police officer primarily to work with and around city schools. This officer was added following the murder of a Greenbelt youth near Eleanor Roosevelt High School. The details of how this officer will be used have not yet been worked out.

revenue from 65 - 70% of the tickets written. Bram worried that a significant increase in parking tickets would overburden the police department's ability to administer the tickets, leading to requests for staff increases next year.

Bram, who asked for more study before the new position was approved, was the lone councilmember voice in opposition. The others strongly supported the proposal both to meet citizen concerns about blatant violators not being ticketed and to free up police officers for more important duties.

Community Center

Council took advantage of construction delays to reduce the budget for the community center. It now appears that the center will be unable to open until July 1995. Council agreed to delay hiring a center manager until November and to delay other expenditures to reduce the community center budget by \$93,300.

for people, not cars." The department wasted no time in arranging to purchase these cars. Shortly after adopting the budget, council approved a department request to purchase these cars for \$161,009 for delivery after July 1.

Officers who spend at least some of their off-duty time on-call will receive additional compensation (\$15,500). In addition, council added \$20,000 for a study of how to effectively increase automation in the department with particular emphasis on computer assisted dispatching.

Kap Kapastein, representing Beltway Plaza at the May 16 public hearing urged council to take the steps necessary to reach agreement on establishing a police substation at the shopping center. The Plaza is still interested in providing and furnishing the space and paying a portion of the staff cost he said. The councilmembers expressed interest in continuing the discussions but did not provide any funds in this budget. If negotiations with the plaza are successful, Councilmember Edward Putens suggested that the storefront station could either be started without additional officers or that reserve funds could be used to hire an officer.

Other Changes

Greenbelt CARES will get a crisis intervention counselor (\$40,000) and funds for supporting the Education Advisory Committee that council is expected to establish shortly.

City employees will get a 1.5% cost of living adjustment, plus a 1% increase in their merit pay hikes. The latter increase will take effect at different times for different employees, so the net effect is equivalent to a .5% increase, according to Hobbs.

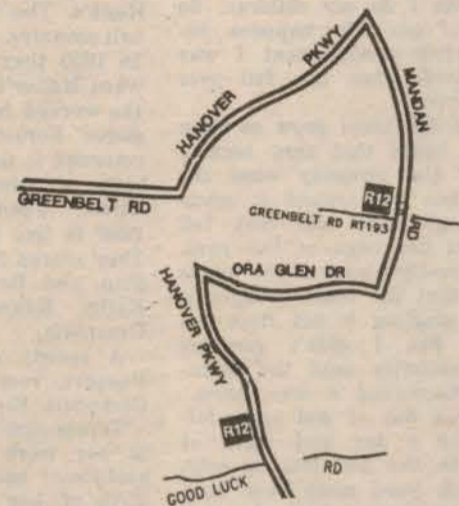
All city staff will also get an additional day off with pay. This "employee appreciation day" will be a personal leave day with no one receiving holiday pay, so no cost has been budgeted for this benefit.

Employees under the "Pension System," which covers employees hired since 1984, will receive an additional one percent deferred compensation, part of a long-term strategy to reduce inequalities between the different pension systems covering city employees.

Bus Connections Improve Service for Greenbelt East

This is the second article in a series of three concerning bus service in the various sectors of Greenbelt.

Bus service to Greenbelt East improved to its best ever when the new Greenbelt Metro station opened six months ago. Two metro stations, shopping malls, and points around the city can now be reached in a short period of time. Some residents can reach some points of interest in a matter of minutes.

A new bus route has doubled bus service north of Greenbelt Road and brought six-day-a-week bus service to residents south of Greenbelt Road for the first time.

North of Greenbelt Rd.

The pre-existing bus, the T16, still travels the same route that it did with very minor changes to the route outside Greenbelt. During rush hour the bus is designated T15 or T17, depending on whether it goes throughout Capital Office Park or Goddard Corporate Park.

The new R12 bus travels along Mandan Road and Hanover Parkway past Glen Oaks, Greenwood Village, Greenbriar, and Eleanor Roosevelt High School. Since both buses travel between the New Carrollton and Greenbelt Metro stations, people now have twice the bus service they had.

Some differences between the two may matter to people, depending on their destination. It is a faster trip to both metro stations on the R12. But the trip to Beltway Plaza is quicker via the T16. The T16 goes right up to Doctor's Hospital, but it is a longer trip. The shorter trip to the hospital on the R12 requires passengers to walk up to the hospital from the bus stop on Good Luck Road.

South of Greenbelt Rd.

Whole new transportation options are open to those who live

south of Greenbelt Road now that a bus travels along Mandan Road, Ora Glen Drive and Hanover Parkway six days a week. Residents are now only a few minutes ride from other points around the city.

Many residents are equidistant from the New Carrollton and Greenbelt Metro stations. But some residents near Hanover Parkway are just a few minutes ride from the New Carrollton Metro station.

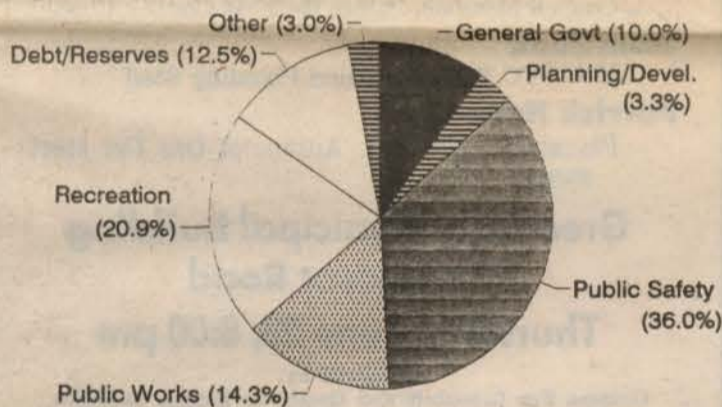
More Options

Increased and improved bus service through Greenbelt East means that people have greatly expanded travel options throughout the metro region via public transportation. Once one gets to a Metro station of course one can go anywhere easily in the subway system.

Since seven buses stop at the Greenbelt Metro station, people can hop on to travel to such places as the University of Maryland, Laurel, Prince Georges Plaza and Route One. (See separate box for details.)

More than ever before, Greenbelt East residents are part of a transportation system that can easily take them to many destinations throughout the area.

Parking Enforcement

In addition, residents and guests will no longer be able to ignore "No parking" signs with the virtual impunity they have become accustomed to. A new parking enforcement officer will be hired by the Department of Planning and Community Development. Council hopes that parking ticket receipts will increase by enough to offset the cost of this civilian position. Although Police Chief James Craze thought this likely, ("It's a gold mine," he said) Hobbs urged council to be more conservative, and expect that the new position would cost the city \$19,000. He was concerned that ticket writing by police officers would decline. Craze said his officers would "make a good faith effort" to enforce parking laws. Director of Planning and Community Development Celia Wilson estimated that the parking enforcement officer would only have to write seven tickets a day for the city to break even.

Deputy City Treasurer Jeffrey Williams cautioned council that not all those ticketed would pay up promptly. He estimated that the city would collect the

This is equivalent to 2.6 cents on the tax rate.

At the public hearing two citizens spoke against the proposed tax increase. Diane Holland objected to a property tax increase to fund a luxury such as the community center. Higher taxes for essentials, such as police protection, would be acceptable, she said.

Marshall Reinsdorf, who said he had voted against the community center referendum agreed with Councilmember Thomas White, that he "must be a good loser" and accept the vote to convert Center School to a Community Center. However, he told council that many of his friends in the city live paycheck to paycheck. Taxes should not go up faster than people's pay, Reinsdorf argued.

Police

Once again the largest changes are to the police budget. In addition to the schools officer, two additional dispatchers (estimated cost \$59,000) were authorized. Councilmember Rodney Roberts pressed to make the schools officer a bike officer. "I'm getting sick of paying for cars," he said, "I want to pay

A Requiem

The woods surrounding our house are part of my life. I watch the light play on the trees throughout the day; I check on them like I do my children. So much of our life happens beneath their canopy that I was unprepared when one fell over this winter.

Three oak trees grow so close to this house that they became part of the property when the fence was put around it many years ago. The oak that fell stood at the edge of the yard. It was really a part of the woods except that the fence brought it inside, singling it out from the others. But I didn't consider this peculiarity until the morning I discovered it was down.

After a day of wet snow followed by a day and night of hard rain, the tree lost its hold. The back yard must have been too soggy to support the oak when the winds began at midnight. I can see it falling in my mind, but that night none of us heard it as we slept beneath the sound of the wind and rain.

The light out back is different now and I notice the change all the time. I'm surprised it bothers me so. But I think I know why: it was a healthy tree and it fell without warning. My attentiveness all these years could not stop it. In its descent, the oak's wide branches clawed at a decaying tree that remains standing. It withstood the oak's fall but it clutches two long branches ripped from the oak. They are caught in a craggy, rotten split in the trunk of the dying tree.

Those suspended branches are impossible for me to ignore. They are symbols hanging there at the end of the woods, the edge of our yard, visible from every window. No longer silent like the night the oak fell, that pair of branches now resound. They reverberate with real tragedies that happened around me recently. They whisper to me about "C.J." Brown's sudden death. They resonate with my concern for his parents, family and my community. And then they lift prayers out of my heart for people I've never met.

Some good comes from heart-break if you look for it. John got stronger from weekends of splitting logs, and we have next winter's supply of firewood. A large patch of sunshine now reaches a corner of our yard that had always been shaded by that oak, giving us the chance to plant sunloving flowers.

I have likened our trees to people before. This summer the woods seem alive with identity because one tree fell. I hope the empty spot that "C.J." left will quicken as we fill our loss with new meaning.

Five Women in Jigsaws Offer Superb Production

"All women are my sisters" repeats one of the women in the Greenbelt Arts Center's (GAC) production of Jennifer Rogers' "Jigsaws." The young woman, Alex (played by Shannon Johnston) has come home to Florida from Boston for the Christmas holidays. When things get to be too much for her to cope with she reminds herself that "all women are my sisters... even those in my family."

There are five women in this play and they manage to involve us in their story so that we care about what happens to each of them. Sometimes we know how they feel, as if we've been there, sometimes we're annoyed or fearful. Sometimes we feel like we're watching something familiar, sometimes we wince inwardly. This is a family with resemblances to our own. But along with all this there is comic relief and there are times when the play is very funny, other times the comedy is lighter.

All of the characters grow and change in front of us. Each actress did a superb job of portraying her character. There is grandmother Emma played so humanly by Judy Holland. She could be your grandmother except she seems to accept new ideas a bit more than many of her generation. Marie Tousignant and Sandy Hamlin play her daughters — straight-laced bossy Sylvia and earthy Pat (though Pat is straight-laced in some ways, too.) Sylvia's younger daughter Monica (Jennifer Anne Salmons) compulsive, inhibited, shows undercurrents we didn't suspect in the beginning of the play. It is interesting to see the contradictions and characters so aptly portrayed. We could hate one and then we can't. We gradually begin to build an empathy for even those

characters we at first were inclined to dislike or dismiss. They're so female — so human. We are reminded not to judge what we do not know or understand — to be a little forgiving — to see ourselves in each! Yes, each!

It's a funny play but it also makes us think.

Director Steve Blais has done a splendid job in bringing this play to us, as has his wife Jo who was producer and assistant director. It was Jo Blais who urged the group to produce this play and we are so glad she did.

We must also commend Bob Thompson for the great job he did with the set. The lounge room was so real with even anti-macassars on the chair and sofa back. It didn't look at all pieced together as sometimes happens.

Many people helped to make the performance top notch. We liked the way the stage was darkened. Props were changed so quickly and quietly that we were hardly aware of them.

We certainly would recommend the play. However, we would caution people that there are some subjects discussed that are adult and some language used that may turn off others.

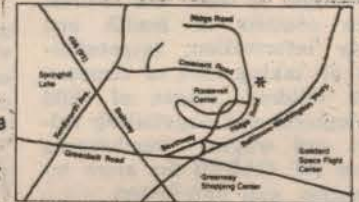

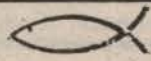

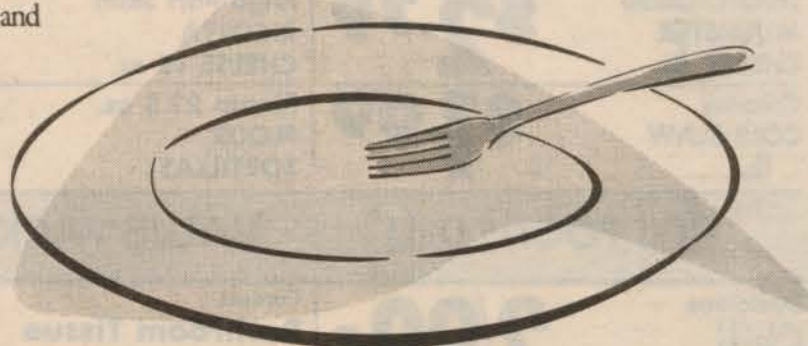

He is described as black, in his 30s, 5'10", 175-185 lbs., black hair, brown eyes, dark complexion and a thin moustache, wearing a white sweatshirt a blue T shirt, and blue jeans.

Around 11:30 a.m. on Thursday, June 2, officers responded to a report of domestic violence in the 5900 block of Cherrywood Terr. The wife of a 44-year-old resident man told officers that she had been punched in the face by her husband during a verbal argument. As a result, he was arrested and charged with battery. Revenues

Interestingly, despite reducing the tax hike from 4 cents down to 2.5 cents, expected revenues are greater than in the budget originally proposed by City Manager Daniel Hobbs. The city gained a significant new revenue

source this spring, when the state General Assembly approved legislation that gives cities a portion of the hotel/motel tax. For the current fiscal year, the city expects to receive approximately \$178,000. The proportion of tax received will double for the next fiscal year.

The councilmembers gave great credit to Mayor Antoinette Bram and Deputy City Manager Michael McLaughlin for the city receiving a share of this tax. Bram credited McLaughlin with providing her a perspective that was very convincing to the legislators—although receiving a share of this tax is very significant for city budgets, the shared revenue accounts for just .04 per-

cent of the county budget.

The city will also receive \$42,000 more in state aid to police and a \$17,800 "code enforcement rebate" from the county. The rebate recognizes that the city is performing code enforcement work that the county would otherwise have to do.

All of the increased revenue was used to provide additional services or to fund "unmet needs" identified by the departments but not included in Hobbs' proposal.

Greenbelt did not receive the federal drug grant that was to have been used for a community oriented police officer for the Metro station. As a result, although the number of police of-

ficers authorized will be the same as under Hobbs' original budget proposal, the cost to the city will be \$25,000 more.

Effective Tax Rate

In addition to the 2.5 cent increase in city taxes, residents will feel a stronger county tax bite as well. The municipal tax differential for Greenbelters will decrease by four cents, effectively raising citizens' taxes by that amount. This will be partially offset by a reduction of the county property tax rate by 1.4 cents as proposed by the county executive.

Ron Simon, of Hunting Ridge, complained at the public hearing that residents of that community do not get equal services for their tax dollars. The problem is that the roads within the community are all private driveways through the parking lots, not public streets. As such, the city does not plow them. City Manager Daniel Hobbs said that the city cannot use tax dollars

to maintain private property.

The private nature of these roads has caused other problems for residents, Simon said. Police have told residents, he said that there is nothing the officers can do about improperly tagged or suspicious vehicles in the lots. Councilmember Judith Davis said that there are similar concerns in many of the city's condominium communities. She called on council to address these concerns and determine what the city can do to help condominium homeowners.

City Notes

Additional Fibar material was placed to level the area at the Portable toilets in Buddy Attick Park for better handicap-accessibility.

Picnic tables were delivered, 17 in all, for various social functions. Underpasses were inspected for graffiti and some at Greenbelt Elementary School painted over.
