Fire Department Is Like a Family

All the volunteer members of the Greenbelt Fire Department and Rescue Squad (GVFD&RS) are like one big family. Many have grown up with each other in the department. Some are second and third generation members of the same family. Those who enter the department without such family ties soon become a part of it. "Once it gets in your blood, you stay," said Chief Dick Wynkoop at a recent interview, at which he was joined by GVFD&RS President Jay Remenick.

The family relationship is even tighter among the department's elected leadership. Remenick is Wynkoop's brother-in-law. His wife, Nancy, Wynkoop's sister, is president of the Ladies auxiliary. Her son, Tommy Holland, is a volunteer firefighter and a city police officer. Wynkoop's parents, Henry and Betty were active members, the senior Wynkoop having been the department's treasurer at one time. Other family members are getting involved. When Wynkoop goes to the fire station in the evening, his five-year-old daughter, Kimberly, asks to go along with him to see the firefighters. "She loves to help out," the Chief said.

Remenick was not born into the "family" as was Wynkoop. The son of Joseph and Rose Remenick, Greenbelt residents since 1945, he was talked into joining the department by his good friend Joe Aulisio, now owner of Greenbelt Auto and Truck. "When I turned 16, I was headed in the wrong direction", Remenick reminisced. "I was hanging out with questionable friends. Joe talked me into applying and getting my life

straightened out."

As a junior active volunteer, the department's requirement that he maintain a B average in school led Remenick to seriously pursue his studies. When he became older, he lived at the station for five years.

At 18, Remenick became a sergeant, then later a lieutenant, captain and deputy chief. He describes himself as having been an aggressive firefighter. About three years ago, he became less active as a fire fighter and more active in the administrative end of the department. He was elected vice president. This January, he was elected president for a two-year term. He has been with the department for 22 1/2 years. The Remenicks live in GHI. He is a Supervisor of Metro Rail Revenue Service for the Washington Metropolitan Area Transit Authority.

Family Tradition

Wynkoop's entire family has been involved with the department. Born and raised in Greenbelt, he joined when he was 13. As a junior associate, he learned the ropes of the fire service, what the various fire tools were for and he also learned a little discipline. He became a junior active at 16 and a senior active at 18, becoming a sergeant. When he was 17, he moved into the fire house and lived there for 11 years. He moved up the ranks to become assistant chief and became the top line officer three years ago. He is now in his second two year term. Married for eight years, his wife, Theresa, is treasurer of the Ladies Auxiliary. The Wynkoops live in Glen Oak Apartments in Greenbelt East. He is a mechanic at the central garage of the Board of Education.

Chief Wynkoop is responsible for the operations of the Department. He must see to it that the department coordinates its firefighting activities with those of the other departments on the fire scene and that command procedures set forth by the county fire chief are properly carried out. Right now is a difficult period as a new county chief, Lemuel Roberts, formerly from Philadelphia has taken command. (James Estep, who

served as chief for many years, retired and now is a newly elected county councilmember.)

Wynkoop is concerned that the new chief, coming from an environment lacking volunteers, is implementing policies without consulting with the volunteers. He feels that Roberts should be working more closely with the county Fire Chiefs Council.

Budget Concerns

Wynkoop is concerned about proposed cuts in the county fire service budget. County Executive Wayne Curry has proposed a 7% cut for the total fire service budget and a similar reduction in the monies budgeted for the volunteer fire companies. The county is supposed to provide funds in its budget to pay for the operating costs of the volunteer fire companies and the maintenance of the fire houses.

One example of how cutbacks will affect the volunteers is that the county will no longer pay for gas and insurance for the personal use of departmental vehicles, such as the chief's car. The Chief believes that he needs to have a vehicle with him at all times in order to respond to fire calls when the alarm sounds on his beeper.

"One of the things that no one should ever consider doing is cutting public safety," the chief said. "If you want to get the job done, you can't cut the budget." He noted that each year everything becomes more advanced and greater knowledge is required to combat the combustion of sophisticated chemical products. More hours of training are required to know how to deal with the various eventualities.

Special Challenges

Wynkoop discussed several special challenges the department faces. Wynkoop's first concern is with the difficulties of evacuating the handicapped and elderly in case of a fire in Greenbelt's senior citizen housing apartment, Green Ridge House, or in the Greenbelt Nursing Home. The high-rise buildings are another concern, since aerial ladders can only go up eight stories in height.

FBI Agent Slain, Suspect Killed at Beltway Plaza

While sitting in his car in the parking lot of Greenbelt Middle School, an FBI agent was ambushed and fatally shot by a man suspected in the shootings of two D.C. police officers after a midnight stakeout to capture him turned sour. The fleeing suspect was himself shot to death in Beltway Plaza by law enforcement agents after a running gun battle. The incident began on Monday, May 29, shortly before 1 a.m.

The suspect, Ralph McLean, 29, of Landover, died on the scene, shortly after he had shot FBI agent William H. Christian, 48, according to county police. Christian was rushed to Prince Georges Hospital Center in Cheverly, where he died a short time later, according to county police spokesman Lt. Charles Pollock.

The weapons recovered from the suspect, which county police said were linked to the April 26 murder of county police officer Sgt. John J. Novabilski, raised questions about

reportedly planned when McLean arranged to meet with her in Greenbelt. The woman was not brought to the scene, however.

County police spokesperson Lt. Charles Pollock confirmed that a witness who had made a complaint against McLean had cooperated with authorities in finding him. They obtained a warrant against See FBI Agent, page 9.

the guilt of the suspect in that case, Jeffrey C. Gilbert, 26, of Lanham. (See accompanying story.) Gilbert was arrested by county police on April 28 in Springhill Lake Apartments, where he was staying with his girlfriend. He remains the prime suspect in the Novabilski slaying, said Pollock.

Police Not Notified

Greenbelt Police had not been notified of the stakeout, according to a department spokesperson. The department first learned of the incident from Prince Georges County Police shortly after it had taken place, when county police reported to them at 12:45 a.m. that "an [FBI] agent was down." The Greenbelt Police dispatcher then alerted all on-duty officers, who rushed to the scene. Also called in were Chief James Craze, Commanders Michael Craddock and John Lann, and Detective Douglas Sappington, as well as other specialists.

D.C. Shootings

County police said McLean was wanted for the "Police Stalking" incidents in the District of Columbia. D.C. police officers Vance Warren and Eric Hayes were shot and wounded in separate incidents in January, according to D.C. Police, who said both shootings were unprovoked. The Washington Post reported that a gun recovered in the second incident was test-fired and confirmed as the weapon used in the first.

The Post also reported that a woman they identified as McLean's girlfriend had implicated McLean in both shootings after filing a report with county police that McLean had beaten her. The report said that the woman, who was placed in protective custody, helped authorities track down McLean by allowing them to monitor and trace phone calls he made to her. The stakeout was

Prosecutor to Review Charges in Police Slaying

Jack Johnson, Maryland State's Attorney for Prince Georges County, said Tuesday, May 31 that he would conduct a review of the charges against Jeffrey C. Gilbert, according to press reports, because of new evidence which may cast doubt on his guilt. He said that he would make a decision by next week.

Gilbert is charged with the April 26 slaying of county police officer John J. Novabilski, who was moonlighting as a security guard for a Kentland liquor store at the time.

Johnson also said he would be conducting an investigation into charges that police used excessive force in apprehending Gilbert, who spent four days in the hospital due to injuries sustained in the arrest. County police said Gilbert violently resisted arrest.

Earlier that day Judge William B. Spellbring, Jr. had ruled that there was sufficient evidence to hold Gilbert without bond on murder charges, although the guns recovered from Ralph McLean linked McLean with the Novabilski slaying. Police are continuing to investigate the matter.

In another late development, the Maryland State Medical Examiner's office ruled on Tuesday that McLean's death was a suicide. Deputy Chief Medical Examiner Dr. Ann Dixon, who performed the examination, said that McLean died of a self-inflicted gunshot wound to the head. She said that the numerous wounds from police and FBI bullets were non-life-threatening.

The dog's owner was described as white, 30 yr. old female, thin build, average height and wearing jeans. The dog's leash may have been blue. She was coming from Laurel Hill Road, walking toward Ridge. The woman spoke to the teen saying the dog "doesn't usually do this." She did not give her name or telephone number, perhaps because the teen and a friend hurried away.

Now Ozone Forecasts Provide Daily Information

A new ground-level ozone forecasting program was launched today in the Metropolitan Washington and Baltimore Area. Coordinated by the Council of Governments (COG), in cooperation with the Maryland Department of the Environment, the forecasts will provide the public with advice to help avoid the adverse health effects of ground-level ozone pollution, and provide tips to residents on reducing pollution. The forecasts will be made available to the news media and general public throughout the summer. They will be prepared by a team of meteorologists and technical staff from the University of Maryland, Maryland Department of Environment, Virginia Department of Environmental Quality and COG. The forecasts are based on an Air Quality Forecast and Action Guide, a simple color chart that designates the ozone levels, the weather conditions associated with those levels, and corresponding health and air pollution reduction actions.

Ground-level ozone can cause health problems such as lung damage, eye irritation, breathing difficulties, coughing and chest pain. On a typical summer day, about 60 to 70 percent of the pollutants that cause ozone are created by cars, lawnmowers and other gasoline powered garden equipment, oil based paints and common household products. In each summer since 1990, there have been an average of six days when the air over the Washington region reached or exceeded unhealthy levels. The ozone forecast program is part of an overall clean air public education campaign, a multi-regional effort by a joint task force of the Metropolitan Washington Air Quality Committee (MWAQC) and the Transportation Planning Board (TPB) working with the Baltimore Metropolitan Council.

Fifty Years Ago Black Widow Attack

January, 1945--Jerry Goodin, Greenbelt Consumer Services porter for the past five years at the shopping center was bitten by a black widow spider. The spider took up quarters in Goodin's gloves shortly after he came to work and when he went to put them on again, it expressed indignation at being disturbed. Goodin did not pay much attention to the bite at first, but when his fingers began to swell, George Bradley, manager of the Tobacco Shop, saw to it that Goodin was taken to the Health Association where he was treated by Dr. Hans Wodak who gave him an anti-toxin serum injection and sent him home to bed.

(Note: Jerry Goodin was an integral part of the commercial center for many years, remaining employed there by the merchants long after most of the stores became privately operated. In 1972 he was honored for his long service to the community by being named Parade Marshall for the Labor Day Parade.

Middle schools went 140 hours above the state hour requirement or four days beyond the 180 day minimum.

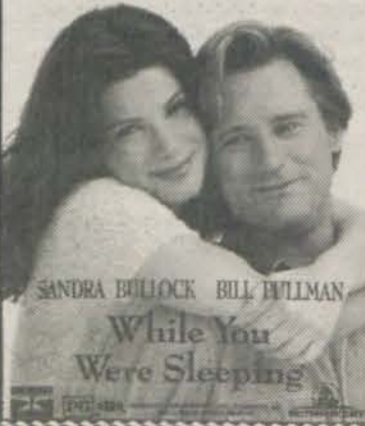

Fifty Years Ago Lest We Forget

January to May, 1945--With the accelerated pace of the American participation in World War II, both in Europe and the Pacific, Greenbelters learned of the loss of more of their young men in service. On January 26, the Greenbelt Cooperator headlined the names of five men who were war casualties. A memorial service had been held at the school for two Greenbelt High School Graduates.

Ralph Jones, class of 1943, had entered the Merchant Marine the following October. He was killed in a bomb loading accident. He was survived by his father, George Jones, a chief photographer then in Italy, his mother at 11-H Southway and a brother, George, a high school sophomore. A friend who signed up for the same ship with Jones, James, McLane, was injured and hospitalized in the same accident.

Staff Sgt. Roy Bell, the other Greenbelt graduate, was killed December 14 on Leyte after having survived the Guam campaign unscathed. A noted athlete, Bell had graduated in 1940 with one of the first classes. He was in his second year of pre-med at the University of Maryland when he entered the army in April, 1942. He was survived by his mother and sister, Patricia Ann, of 6-R Ridge Road. His father, Harry L. Bell, was a chief specialist in the Coast Guard. The Bell Family was one of the first to move into Greenbelt. Robert E. McGlothlin, whose family lived at 8-P Laurel Hill, was reported killed in Belgium in December. Elmer Kyle, of 50-D, was reported missing in action. He was with the infantry in Belgium, a member of the communi-

cations group.

Prisoner-of-War

In February, the Cooperator reported on the status of prisoner-of-war Pfc. Byron Herde of 61-F Ridge. Captured in France in July, he was first reported missing in action. Two weeks later his wife was told that he was a prisoner in a camp in southern Germany, near Dresden.

His first letters, dated in September, did not reach her until December 6, 1944. He acknowledged the receipt of food packages from the Red Cross. "When I do get back, it will be partly due to the help of the Red Cross. Tell Mommie to give them something this year," he wrote to his 14 month old daughter, Joy.

Herde did get back. On April 15 he was liberated from Stalag 4-F. He had lost 75 pounds during his 10 months as a prisoner of war. He and the other prisoners had been forced to work on a railroad in temperatures of 30 - 40 degrees below zero.

Red Cross packages alone kept them from starving, he told his wife. Returned to Ft. Meade, he had to get used to sleeping on a bed again, after having slept on a board in prison camp. He quickly regained 50 of the pounds he had lost before

getting a pass to come to Greenbelt to see his wife and daughter.

Also released from prison on V-E Day was Lt. Ralph H. Griffin of 10-E Parkway. He had been taken prisoner in Holland placed in Stalag 11-B.

Good News

Good news was received by the J. Walsh Barcus family. He had been reported missing in action during the Battle of the Bulge in Belgium. However, he managed to crawl back into the lines and had joined another company. In February he was hospitalized in England for treatment of trench foot, his wife Evelyn told the paper. Later he returned to the states and obtained leave to see his family.

Jack Gale's family were also celebrating his successful recuperation from serious injuries in the battle for Saipan. Discharged from the Navy hospital at Philadelphia, Gale returned home with plans to enter the University of Maryland in the fall. The Dwight Truckess family were celebrating the release of Mrs. Truckess brother-in-law, a prisoner of war captured at Corregidor in 1941. The release occurred with the recapture of Manila.

Lt. Harry Brown had been reported missing in action. His wife, Lt. Irene Brown, had joined the Army Nurse Corps and was stationed in India when the good news came. She obtained leave to return to the States to greet her husband on his return.

In April, the William F. Hagans family at 2-G Laurel Hill were celebrating the release and re-uniting of family members in the Philippines. Hagans, a Lt. (j. g.) was in the Philippines when his parents, three brothers and a sister-in-law were freed from Santo Tomas prison near Manila. They were well, although suffering from malnutrition.

Hagans' father, Broadwell Hagans, was the first engineer sent to the Philippines in 1900 to fortify Corregidor Island. He planned to return to the Philippines and rebuild his home. Two other family members, Captain and Mrs. John Martin, had avoided captivity and hid in the jungle and hills for two years before escaping to Australia, where he joined with MacArthur's forces to recapture the Philippines.

Other Dead

Other Greenbelt families, however, were dealing with sad news. Warren Woodward of 16-T Ridge Road was reported killed in Germany on March 19. He left a wife and three small children, David, Jimmy and Judy.

Lt. H.A. LaFlamme, U.S.N.R., lost his life off Iwo Jima on February 21. He served as a communicator on board the escort carrier U.S.S. Bismark Sea, which was sunk with over one-third of her crew and a high percentage of her officers killed.

Among those reported by the newspaper as having been wounded in Germany were Larry Childress, Lt. Dean Keith, Pvt. William P. Wentzel, Second Lt. John A. Rode, 46-L Ridge Road, former Cooperator Editor Aaron Chinitz, and Pfc. Erick Weiland. Bill Townsend, a medical corpsman, reported wounded for the second time, was recuperating in Belgium. He had been decorated with the Silver Star for bravery. Buddy Attick reported that his brother, Robert, who had been an orderly at the Greenbelt hospital, was wounded in Germany and was hospitalized in France.

Four Sons

Genial chief carpenter "Happy" Walker had four sons in the service. Son Harry, formerly employed at Greenbelt as a guard was seriously wounded in France and was recovering at Moore Hos-

pital in North Carolina. Son Russell, with the Army Air Corps, was severely burned in a gasoline explosion. Walter was with the Field Artillery in Italy for over two years. The youngest son Otis, was also in Field Artillery in the Philippines.

On Memorial Day, 1945, Greenbelters gathered at the east door of Center School for the American Legion program. A roll call of 15 names of those who had died during World War II (including two World War I veterans who had died) was read by Adjutant Arthur Gawthrop. Six gold certificates were presented to the next of kin present at the ceremony.

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Turnbull Elected President As GHI Board Sets Goals

Alan Turnbull was elected president at the first Greenbelt Homes Inc. (GHI) board meeting after the May 21/22 Board Elections. The meeting covered many topics and several important issues including historic designation of Old Greenbelt, Greenbelt Development Corporation (GDC) stock holders, establishment of the summer meeting schedule, establishment of the Board's Goals or considerations, a policy for insurance coverage, and proposed utilization of surplus funds.

Officers

The first order of business was for the newly assembled GHI Board to elect officers. President Carole Levin thanked the board and membership for rewarding her with the opportunity to serve as president of the GHI board for the last year. Alan Turnbull was elected president, and Keith Yahoda was elected vice president. Nat Shinderman was elected treasurer. Finally, Don Comis was elected to be secretary. Kathy Weber was presented a plaque for her dedicated service to GHI as a board member.

At this first board meeting after the election of the 1995-1996 GHI Board of directors, the board designated the GDC Stockholders. These individuals are selected by the GHI board to hold voting proxies for the GDC stock owned by GHI. Traditionally, the GHI board grants each GHI director a proxy for 1/9th of GHI's shares and this was done once more. The GDC Stockholders meeting was then set for June 15. At the annual GDC Stockholders meeting, the GDC Board of Directors and officers are elected by its stockholders. Traditionally, they are the same as the GHI officers.

A discussion of GDC followed. President Turnbull asked about the GDC rental rates. It was reported that the rates had not been increased except when a unit was refurbished. General manager Gretchen Overdurff verified that an increase in waste collection fees would affect rental rates. She proclaimed that GDC is the best kept secret in rental housing. Board member Bill Phelan asked about the possibility of hiring a contractor for waste collection. He also recommended to competitively bid asphalt work. Additional discussion dealt with tree limbs encroaching garages.

Next order of business included the certification of the board election. A total of 371 members cast votes. Forty-seven paper ballots were cast along with eight absentee ballots. The election results were published in the May 25 News Review.

Fee For Service

An item presented to the Board which was not on the agenda was the fee for service program. The board had previously elected to continue this program for another year. Member Susan Wisler reported to the board that GHI has a license to do business. According to Wisler, GHI does not have a contractor's license to do business. It was her opinion that GHI was not required to have a Maryland Home Improvement Contractor's License (MHIC). However, Sherry Garten stated that while property management companies can make improvements in common areas, work on individual residences would require a MHIC license. She presented the Board with a letter from the Maryland State Assistant Attorney General. She closed her remarks by stating her opinion that the fee for service pro-

gram is illegal and a contractor's license is required.

Other items on the Board's agenda included the establishment of summer meeting dates which include June 15, July 20, and August 17. The board discussed training subjects that would help them perform their responsibilities and allow them to conduct board meetings in a more efficient manner.

Board Goals

President Turnbull outlined the goals of the board for the next year which he believed would most efficiently serve the membership's interests. These included a review or update of the bylaws, GHI historic district designation study, establishment of a membership review committee, interior inspection program, replacement of reserve funds, the exploring of alternatives for resale inspections, investigation of utility rates, and the training of the board on meeting facilitation.

The board discussed the need for more communication with the membership and the need to report on committees at the board meetings. Nat Shinderman recommended that a monthly newsletter be published to inform the membership of board meetings and committee activities.

Insurance

General Manager Overdurff presented a draft policy statement that describes insurance coverage of the structure of members' homes, including additions. Overdurff stated that the current blanket policy is very liberal. The general manager's view is that in order to save the co-op money, GHI needs to clearly delineate the extent to which the structures are covered. A guideline recommended to follow is to cover anything that existed at the time the member purchased the home. It was also recommended for the board to decide how to treat the responsibility for the payment of deductibles. Currently, GHI has been paying the \$1,000 dollar deductible in all cases. The general manager recommended that GHI pay all deductibles or none. GHI management believes that a policy is needed to help clarify the payment of any future claims so that all members are treated in a fair and consistent manner. The board discussed this issue and agreed that GHI should cover the deductible to the extent that the member's insurance does not. The board agreed that what should be included in the policy is what was there at the time of the purchase of the home, including major appliances.

A final action taken by the board was a discussion of the use of surplus funds. Management proposed to use the surplus account for frame home roof repairs, underground utilities, tree trimming, parking lot repairs, and concrete sidewalk repairs. The board unanimously vetoed the use of surplus funds for tree trimming.

Heartworm Disease A Threat to Dogs

Big or small, long-haired or short, house pet or kenneled outdoors, every dog, no matter what breed, is susceptible to heartworm disease, a potentially fatal disease affecting thousands of dogs in Maryland.

Mosquitoes transmit heartworm disease, so wherever mosquitoes are present, dogs are at risk, according to the Maryland Veterinary Medical Association.

The first step toward protecting dogs is to call a family veterinarian and arrange for a simple heartworm blood test, preferably in the spring before mosquito season begins. Having the dog tested is important because a preventive program cannot begin without confirmation that the dog is free from heartworms. For a dog already with heartworm disease, treatment can be dangerous and expensive.

If the dog is free of heartworms, a daily or monthly preventive treatment will be prescribed.

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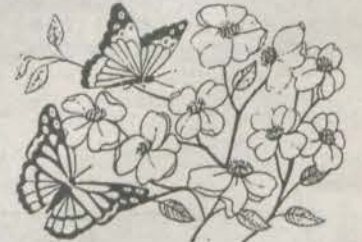

Administration

Remenick is responsible for the administrative end of the department. He chairs the board of directors, is the department's spokesperson, handles all business correspondence and appoints all committees. He wants to see the department be one of the best in the county.

Accidents on the Beltway are another high risk for the department since trucks transport a wide variety of hazardous materials through the city each day. Even the city Public Works compound can be the source of a serious incident because of the variety of chemicals and flammable material stored there. A small fire occurred there just recently.

The department has also had problems with an arsonist in an area just outside the city limits. The person threw a Molotov cocktail at one building while firefighters were dealing with another fire the person had set.

Countering these greater risks are improved fire safety codes and the required installation of better fire protection devices such as smoke detectors and sprinklers. Wynkoop notes that Halon systems are now required to be placed in mainframe computer rooms to put out the special kind of fire that can occur with such equipment.

Remenick, too, is concerned with county budget cuts. Although many are small, like the county's no longer picking up the \$600 cost of pay telephones at the station, in total they place a significantly greater burden on the department's cost of operation. Greenbelt City Manager Daniel Hobb's proposal no longer to make available to the volunteer department the equivalent of a one cent levy on the property tax for the purchase of equipment also was alarming to Remenick. He was happy to see the members of the Greenbelt City Council declare that they would restore this funding.

Remenick would like to establish better communications and relations with the city and the city council. Although he envies the well-financed neighboring departments that have casino gambling (Bladensburg is supposed to have \$23 million in the

bank, he said), there are no plans to try to bring gambling back to Greenbelt—at least so long as the city allocates one cent of the property tax rate to the fire department. "We have to live with the citizens and council," he said.

Fund Drive

Both Remenick and Wynkoop hope that they will be able to better express their need for increased funds to Greenbelt citizens in this month's annual fund drive. The department's small reserves need a boost if the department is to continue to buy needed equipment and safety gear and make up the expenses cut from the county's supporting budget. They hope that this year more local businesses, will participate in the fund drive.

A Housing

Remenick and Wynkoop are looking forward to showing off the new fire truck to the city council, which paid nearly half the cost, and to Greenbelt citizens. Presently the truck is out of state to be lettered with the necessary identification and equipment label signage. When it returns, they plan to park the truck at the municipal building on a council meeting night for the council to see.

Later, probably in July, there will be a "housing." This is a special event to show off a major new piece of fire equipment to the public and to other fire departments. Other departments will be invited to bring along equipment that they wish to show off at the same time.

Apparel Exhibit

The Historic Surratt House Museum, 9118 Brandywine, Clinton, will feature a special exhibit of 19th-century apparel. These historic artifacts are from private collections and will be on display through August 27.

The exhibit will feature an 1850s wedding gown, bonnets, snoods and caps, misers' purses, hair ornaments jewelry, and ensembles from the 1850 through 1900 era.

McLean for assault with intent to murder and other charges in that incident, which they said was unrelated to the shootings of D.C. police.

Several published reports, which Pollock could not confirm, said that McLean hated police. When police searched his apartment, they recovered rap-style lyrics to that effect, according to the reports. They also cited police sources as saying that McLean's older brother has been in jail since the early 1980s for shooting and wounding a Prince Georges County police officer.

Agent Ambushed

County police learned of McLean's involvement in the D.C. police shootings on May 17, they said. They learned on May 28 that he was in the metro area and on the way to the Greenbelt site. A task force—22 FBI agents, two county Police officers, and three D.C. police detectives, according to the Post—set up a surveillance there to arrest him.

But McLean, who may have suspected that he was being set up, according to the Post, covertly approached the FBI agent, firing several shots into the driver's window and fatally wounding him, said police. He then fled on foot through a wooded area toward the rear of Beltway Plaza. McLean ended up in a parking area behind the Sports Authority, said Pollock. There he exchanged gunfire with pursuing county officers and FBI agents, shielding himself behind pillars. He was struck several times and died at the scene. A Mac-11 automatic weapon and a Beretta 9 mm semi-automatic pistol were recovered from the suspect. Police said that preliminary ballistics test results indicated that the Mac-11 was the same weapon used to kill Sgt. John Novabilski on April 26. The Beretta was Novabilski's issued service weapon, which was taken from his body after he was murdered.

FBI Director Louis J. Freeh in a statement that the incident, which he termed a "brutal assassination," was "a chilling example of an unprecedented disregard for authority by some in our society." He said the fact that law enforcement officers were themselves being targeted should serve as a "wake-up call" to the public.

Christian, a 20 year veteran of the FBI and a native of Maryland, resided in Woodbridge, Va., according to the FBI. He served in the FBI's Detroit bureau before returning to the Washington area in 1986. He is survived by his wife and four children, ages 18 and 27.

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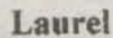
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Hello Again !!

Well, it's summer time officially according to the date. I hope everyone enjoyed their 3 day weekend, I know that I did.

Hot weather brings out the worst of any vehicle condition that's not quite fully developed into a problem.

Seems like most of all the fatigued components that have lasted the last couple of months will surface very shortly. Some of the problems are difficult to diagnose and correct without the addition of heat of some sort. Now, during this season, the most common condition is an overheating condition. Try to diagnose one of these conditions when it seems that all components are functioning normally until the AC gets switched on and the vehicle has been driving at Beltway speeds for 2 hours. Very tough, to say the least. That's why it's very important to keep your scheduled maintenance current as indicated in your vehicle owner's manual.

Don't take anti-freeze for granted that it's only a winter time problem. Not so. Anti-Freeze also raises the boiling temperature of the coolant so it's very important to make sure it's at the proper setting.

We have seen many internal gasket problems arise from the PH level of the antifreeze becoming too acidic. This tends to eat gaskets and hoses at a very premature rate. So be careful of the condition, just apply simple preventive maintenance scheduling and you, too, will be just fine.
