New Federal-Local Task Force Fights Illegal Drug Use in Area

There is a new acronym in town -- HIDTA (pronounced hide-ta). A new catch phrase is also being bandied about. It is "functional deconfliction." Both of these were learned at the ribbon cutting ceremony for the Greenbelt headquarters of the Washington/Baltimore High Intensity Drug Trafficking Area (HIDTA) program.

Attending the June 9 ceremony were Congressman Steny Hoyer, Senators Paul Sarbanes and Barbara Mikulski, University of Maryland President William Kirwan and White House Drug "Czar" Lee Brown, an overflow crowd of federal and local area law enforcement officers and military personnel were also present.

The "WashBal" HIDTA is the seventh one established in the nation in the areas considered most critical for drug trafficking. They are federal, state and local partnerships designed to tailor anti-drug goals into regional solutions. The major local jurisdictions included in the Washington/Baltimore region are Baltimore city; Baltimore, Howard, Anne Arundel, Charles, Montgomery and Prince Georges counties in Maryland; the District of Columbia and Alexandria city and Arlington, Prince William, Fairfax and Loudoun counties in Virginia.

Federal participating agencies include the Drug Enforcement Agency, the Federal Bureau of Investigation, the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms, the Maryland National Guard, the U.S. Customs Service, the Internal Revenue Service and the Department of Defense. Other regional HIDTAs are located in New York, Los Angeles, Miami, Houston, the Southwest Border and Puerto Rico/Virgin Islands.

Prevention and Treatment

The new HIDTA will differ from the others in that its program will not only coordinate efforts and provide funding for a crackdown in drug trafficking, but include additional funding for drug treatment, testing, and supervisory and prevention programs for drug users. Experience in the war on drugs since the 1980s has repeatedly shown that law enforcement activities can have an impact on drug distribution, according to HIDTA officials, but this effect is often temporary because it does not reduce the overall use of drugs among hard-core users. Nor does it change the behavior of offenders.

Dr. Lee P. Brown, who is director of the Office of National Drug Control Policy at the White House, is so confident of the ultimate success of the local HIDTA that he plans to replicate it in other areas around the country. "We must and will address the full drug control spectrum in order to be successful in reducing drug trafficking and drug abuse," he told the gathering at the Maryland Trade Center I (OAO) Office Build-

ing, where the HIDTA headquarters are located.

After the ribbon cutting ceremony, Brown and Hoyer were briefed on the effectiveness of a District of Columbia Superior Court Drug Testing Program by Faye Taxman of the University of Maryland, who will help administer the treatment and prevention element of HIDTA, and Jake Carver of the District of Columbia Pre-Trial Services Agency. This program involves twice-weekly urine testing for drugs of convicted offenders and immediate sanctions if the tests indicate drug use. The information is put on a computer system where it can be accessed by the supervising judge.

After five months only 10 percent of the offenders in the program tested positive for drug use. In comparison, 67% of those not in a testing program with sanctions were still using drugs. Sanctions range from attending court for three days for a first offense to seven days in jail for a fourth offense.

"Deconfliction"

In brief remarks before he left for a key vote on legislation (Mikulski having left before the ceremony began for the same reason), Sarbanes called this area's HIDTA the "Premier HIDTA in the country" because of its prevention

Mall Designer Bradley-Papp Has Deep Roots In Greenbelt

Celia Wilson, Director, Department of Planning and Community Development, is happy about the awarding by the Greenbelt City Council of the Roosevelt Center Mall renovation design to a Greenbelter -- Sharon Bradley-Papp of Bradley-Papp Landscape Architecture, Inc., 6-G Ridge Road. Besides her professionalism and experience, Sharon, a third generation Greenbelter, has a strong sense of the history of the city.

Her grandparents, Joseph and Henrietta Haslinger and Inez and George J. Bradley, Sr., settled in Greenbelt in 1937. Both families lived on Ridge Road, where her parents, Penny and George J. Bradley, Jr., grew up. Sharon's parents lived in an apartment on Crescent when they were first married. Later, they moved to Riverdale, Glenn Dale, and then to England for five years. When they returned to Maryland, she was "Often dropped off at Grandmom's in Greenbelt." As a result Sharon became a member of St. Hugh's Parish, active in the Teen Club and in cross-country track. Sharon now lives -- where else but Ridge Road -- with her husband, John Papp, Jr., and three sons, John Bradley, Greg and Christopher. John Papp, Jr. is an Intelligence officer for the Federal government.

Sharon graduated with a Bachelor of Science in Landscape Architecture in 1984 from Pennsylvania State University. Eleven years of design experience followed. She first worked with Keyes, Condon, Florance Architects, a firm known for its sensitive approach to historic projects, and Oehme van Sweden and Associates, where she gained a knowledge of their world-famous innovative, creative design approach. In 1991 Sharon formed Bradley-Papp Landscape Architecture, Inc. Her projects have ranged from commercial to community to high-end residential work. With all three firms, she has worked extensively with community groups, regulatory commissions, school and city boards and city officials.

Bradley-Papp's written proposal for the renovation design reflects

her personal and professional thoughts and feelings. She wrote: "I have experienced Greenbelt in many ways, as a child running down to Ben Franklin's for penny candy, as a Landscape Architecture student learning about Greenbelt's role in the history of urban planning, and as a mother enjoying summer strolls around the lake and to the Center with my family."

"The Roosevelt Center, with its Art Deco architecture and Mother and Child sculpture, is the city's focal point both visually and functionally. . . it is truly the hub of commercial and social activity in Greenbelt. As such, its visual appeal, accessibility and functionality must be maintained. Its place as a historic site must be preserved, and integration with its surroundings handled with sensitivity. The city was conceived as a cohesive whole, and this project should be approached in the same manner. The Roosevelt Center should be effectively, safely, and beautifully linked with the rest of the community."

In her effort to be open and sensitive to the citizens of Greenbelt throughout the design process, Sharon met with interested persons at open hearings on June 5 and June 8. Concerns addressed at the meetings were: safety and security, functional issues, signage, handicapped accessibility, visual aspects, and usage and management of the Center. A questionnaire developed by Bradley-Papp is offered to anyone interested in giving input on the project. She plans to post updates on the progress of the design process in the News Review.

Parker to Chair GIVES; CCN to Give Assistance

Over 40 people attended the First Annual Meeting of the Greenbelt Intergenerational Volunteer Exchange Service (GIVES) which was held on Saturday, June 3. Farrell Didio and David Hurwitz represented the Cooperative Caring Network (CCN) of the United Seniors Health Cooperative (HSHC) Didio presented a plaque to city council members J. Davis and Rodney Roberts in honor of Greenbelt's being the first municipality to become a Contributing Organization of CCN.

A Memo of Understanding between CCN and GIVES stipulates technical assistance which CCN will provide the new group, including time of a VISTA volunteer and 1500 hours to seed the Greenbelt bank of

service credits. Volunteers who assist disabled seniors or others in need will receive an hour service credit for every hour worked. These credits may be used to receive assistance, banked for future needs, or

given to others. In that way, those who may need services, but are unable to volunteer, may maintain a negative balance.

The first officers to serve GIVES are Janet Parker, chair; J. Davis, vice-chair; Betty Deitch, secretary; Nancy Birner, financial officer; and Pat Unger, publicity chair. Additional members of the Board of Directors are Dolores Downs, Mary Lindstrom, Dorothy Pyles, Arthur Schotts, Beth Smith, and Leah Warner. Honorary members of the board are Rabbi Saul Grife of Mishkan Tora Congregation, Booker T. Hughes of the City's Senior Citizens Advisory Committee, Lillian Lee of the Paint Branch

Open Letter

Dear Members of the GHI Board: I have some comments on your new yard inspection program. Generally, I agree that it is a good idea for us to be more careful to maintain our homes and yards and I think the proposed system will be useful. However, I wanted to bring to you my concerns about priorities.

I find it hard to understand how trees can possibly be more undesirable than the toxic chemical fertilizers which seem to be freely used all around the city. It seems a bit misplaced to list such "undesirable characteristics" as "gum balls," "low hanging branches," and "seedlings in hedgerows," and to require that "noxious plants" such as poison ivy be removed.

I really fail to see how any kind of plant life, even poison ivy, is more noxious than the poisons being routinely dumped into the ground and the Chesapeake Bay for the purpose of making our community more attractive.

If GHI is going to make an issue out of the less desirable properties of trees, the least they can do is to take a stand on the less desirable properties of toxic fertilizers. In my opinion these should be disallowed not only by GHI but also by the City. The continued widespread use of these poisons makes a mockery of any policies about being responsible for our homes and community.

I hope the Board will incorporate a concern about toxic chemical fertilizers into the new yard maintenance policy.

Dismayed

I am dismayed to learn that the City of Greenbelt permits the use of malathion and permethrin within its city limits. ("Mosquito Spraying Begins, June 8.") Malathion is a nerve poison. Permethrin is a central nervous system poison.

Studies reveal that there are increases in liver carcinomas in mice that are fed malathion. Increases in thyroid tumors are found in rats fed malathion. Malathion is highly mobile in loam soils, which can be a threat to groundwater. And review of data reveals that malathion is highly toxic to freshwater fish and is moderately toxic to birds.

Permethrin is not biodegradable and is known to be very toxic to fish, bees, and butterflies. Permethrin is also known to increase the resistance of insects, thereby making infestation only worse the next year.

But frankly, I think the fact that children "act inappropriately" and become sprayed by these poisons would be enough to stop the spraying of these poisons in our city limits.

The 1994 Greenbelt Labor Day Festival was a success -- judged by the attendance, the response of those who attended, and by the financial results for the organizations who used the Festival as a fund-raiser and the income raised for the Festival itself (see accompanying table). Each year the Festival must raise enough money to cover the expenses of the upcoming year. Festival expenses such as the fees for bands and performers in the parade, the stage entertainment, advertising, permits, supplies and postage must be paid up front, while income--generated primarily as a percentage of the carnival rides and the booth commission--is received after the Festival is over. In addition, the Festival balance must include sufficient funds to compensate for low income from a year when events are rained out. The Festival receives assistance from the city and its departments in the form of services. Income is generated by the Festival itself and through donations of area business and organizations. The 1995 Festival will feature popular events and activities of the past years but will also have new or special attractions in 1995. This year is the 40th anniversary of the Miss Greenbelt Pageant and many special events are planned to celebrate this anniversary. The pageant will hold a reunion for all past pageant winners as well as those individuals who directed the pageant through the past 40 years. "Thumbs Up" for Blithe Spirit

Although I have enjoyed productions often at the Greenbelt Arts Center, I have been remiss in neglecting to mention the wonderful support of their unsung heroes. They are the members of the President's Club, Arts Club, contributors and volunteers. Therefore, I will begin by applauding their efforts and inviting you to reap the harvest of their hard work on the next two Saturdays and Sundays.

Opening night for the players can be a strain, especially when you're trying to carry off Noel Coward's *Blithe Spirit*. And in spite of the fact that the overall production rated a thumbs up, don't be alarmed if you are 10 or 15 minutes late to this production, you will have missed nothing. It takes just this much time for any spirit to take hold of this merry couple. But with the arrival of Madame Arcati (Sheilah Crossley), the impression of a bad sitcom vanishes into the delightful background of the set. The characters come to life at her seance - your preoccupation with Martinis shaken and not stirred is on more. The batty surrealism of Madame Arcati's existence takes over. Even the dead are won over by this psychic's whimsical charms.

Then suddenly you wonder if your next door neighbor is just chatting pleasantly to himself or his ex-wife back from the dead. Charles (Jack Shaw) proves you can be nagged even from the grave. But as his shallow character unfolds - sympathy for this man deteriorates. You find yourself wondering - well, is he or isn't he? A phony! And as Truman Capote would say, "He's a real phony because he honestly believes in all that phony stuff he believes in." But before you judge him, remember - he's only a man.

Jo Blais' interpretation of Ruth shows that good acting runs in the family. (You may have seen Steve Blais in "The Time of Your Life".) Her Ruth put the "perfect little housewife" compliment on the male territorial map. Blais' version of the current Missus reminds you that patience may be a virtue and certainly admirable, but it's so much more fun being bad!

And being bad is something Cristina Sovereign can put on the first page of her resume from the Greenbelt Arts Center. As the Charles' Barbie Doll ex-wife back from the dead, she made a successfully lethal entrance into the Greenbelt Cultural Scene. During

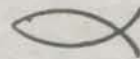
the play, she scares the living daylight out of her ex-husband's household and attempts a couple of murders to get her boy toy back. If you can stay to meet the actors afterwards, checkout the ghostly stage makeup.

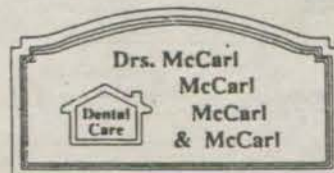

and treatment program. Referring to another aspect of the HIDTA operation, he announced that he now knows about "functional deconfliction."

Deconfliction, the avoidance of conflicting activities, is a new word coined at HIDTA as an objective of its information center located at the Greenbelt facility. Through intelligence gathering and analyses, the information center will improve the identification of major drug and firearms trafficking organizations. This information will be distributed to the participating agencies in order to warn the local jurisdictions of what is taking place and to coordinate enforcement actions among the jurisdictions, thus ensuring that limited enforcement resources are judiciously used to have the greatest impact on drug-related crime and violence.

Hoyer, too, noted that this HIDTA will be a "different kind of HIDTA" because the success of each benefits the others. The Florida HIDTA, which was involved in the recent arrests of Cali Cartel conspirators, helps reduce the flow of drugs up the I-95 corridor to this area. In turn, success here will stop the flow of drugs further north to the New York area.

"I'm really excited about this effort and excited about what it can do," Hoyer said.

\$15 Million

Brown announced that a total of \$15 million has been provided to this HIDTA, which he established in February, 1994. Of this amount, \$5 million is targeted for treatment and prevention programs to be administered by the University of Maryland Department of Behavioral and Social Sciences. Maryland is the only university participating in a HIDTA project.

Representing the Greenbelt Police Department at the ceremony was Lt. Daniel O'Neil. Arriving late because of a conflicting meeting were Mayor Antoinette Bram, City Manager Daniel Hobbs, Delegate Joan Pitkin and County Councilmember Audrey Scott. According to Lt. Michael Caddock of the Greenbelt Police Department, Greenbelt has been participating in a drug task force with the State Police, the University of Maryland Police and others for many years. This group will now work under the umbrella of HIDTA.

He expects the group now will be better able to tap the resources of the federal government agencies in monitoring and taking action against drug trafficking. This task force, which involves one Greenbelt officer on a full time basis, is already being assisted by the federal government's paying for the cost of rental under-cover vehicles and overtime for the participating officers.

Wiedenhoeff Winner In Arts Competition

Congressman Steny Hoyer (MD-5) recently announced that judges have awarded Rina Wiedenhoeff top honors in his annual Congressional Arts Competition. Rina is a student at Eleanor Roosevelt High School and a resident of Greenbelt. Her winning watercolor entry was entitled, "Self Portrait," and was among the 40 works of art received from high school students from throughout the 5th Congressional District.

Wiedenhoeff's first place entry will be displayed this summer, along

with artworks from Congressional Districts throughout the country, in a corridor of the United States Capitol. The 14th annual competition, sponsored by members of the U.S. House of Representatives on Tuesday, June 27, is designed to recognize the creative talents of young Americans.

"The excellence of our area's young artists was truly evidenced by this year's competition," said Hoyer. "The judges were presented with difficult choices and my congratulations go out to each and every participant for they are all winners."

Hello Again! One of those preventive maintenance items that I speak of all the time is what is called a SERPENTINE drive belt. This belt takes the place of the old style design of multi-belt drive systems. (see illustration.) As indicated this utilizes one belt to drive all of the accessories. This type of system frees up valuable space under the hood and unitizes the power accessories, i.e., alternator, power steering, etc. It also allows engineering changes that require rotational differences in different vehicle applications by simply changing the belt travel around a particular pulley.

The maximum belt life is around 4 years or 50,000 miles. After that this belt will develop stress cracks and in some cases, it will break. Look at the illustration. If this happens you lose all power accessories right then and there!! So it's very important to keep preventive maintenance service on these serpentine systems.

One tell tale sign of a potential condition is a chronic squeak. This could indicate a dry rotted belt. As noted most of these systems have automatic tensioners so mechanical belt tightening is not required. The tensioner may need to be replaced if it can no longer apply the proper spring weight against the belt. Another sign is discoloration. If the belt turns a brownish color this is a sign of rubber contamination, i.e., heat or chemical, and this in turn results in a much harder rubber compound.

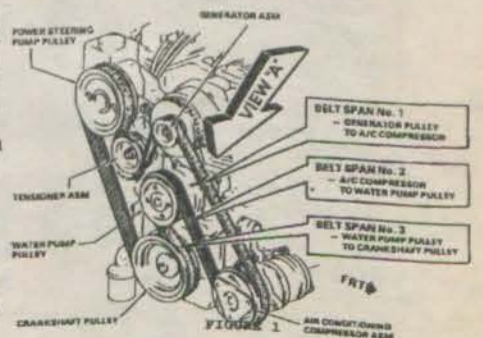

POLICE BLOTTER

Based on Information Released by the Greenbelt Police Department

An armed robbery was reported in the area of Springhill Lake Recreation Center and the 9300 block of Edmonston Road. At approximately 6 p.m. on June 3, while walking along a footpath, the victim reported being approached from be-

hind by two suspects. One suspect threatened the victim with a knife, while the second suspect moved in front of the victim and ordered him to empty his pockets. The second suspect removed cash from the victim's wallet. He was then ordered to run toward Interstate 95. The suspects fled in the direction of the Recreation Center.

apartment complex to Greenway Center on Tuesday, June 6, following a traffic dispute. The suspect threatened to shoot the victim. The suspect and vehicle are described as a black male, 30 - 39 years old, tall, light complexion, operating a brown two door Acura, registration number X886-564 (possibly VA temporary tags).

While investigating several suspicious persons at the Springhill Lake Shopping Center, the officer observed someone loitering nearby. The individual became boisterous, using profanity, after the officer requested him to approach for a talk. He continued to use profanity, despite the officer's request to stop because youths were present. 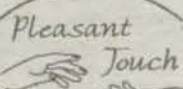
