New Recycling Truck Arrives

The city's top-of-the-line recycling truck has finally arrived. Beginning on Monday, August 11, look for the bright yellow truck on your recycling route on your new collection day. See the schedule in the city ad (located elsewhere in this paper) to check your new recycling day.

Collector Reggie Cameron will be the crew leader and driver performing Monday-Thursday recycling collections through September 30. Public Works employee Kenneth Carpenter and a temporary worker will supplement the crew. Beginning next week, yard debris and appliances will be collected again by regular refuse crews.

The truck came 866 miles from Canada to Greenbelt. The Labrie Top Select recycling body with a Navistar motor was built on the south shore of the St. Lawrence River in Canada. The Labrie has a 37.5 cubic yard capacity and is equipped with the "Maximizer," a movable partition in the body of the truck. The side-loading buckets are raised by a hydraulic system and are

dumped through the roof into the proper compartment.

More than a third of

The new truck enables city crews to pick up both refuse and recycling on the same day.

Greenbelt's waste was entering the recycling program, so there were reasons to discontinue the twice-a-week collection service. Purchasing the recycling truck enables city collection crews to pick up both refuse and recycling on the same day. Streets and curbsides will appear less cluttered by cans, recycling bins and bundles.

New Schedule

The first phase of Greenbelt's recycling and refuse collection changes will start on August 11. Detached homes (non-GHI) must bring yard debris and special trash to the curb, but do not need to call for collection. GHI collections do not change, and residents must continue to call in for

pick up. Refuse collections will continue to be twice per week through September, with yard debris collections on Wednesday. In October, when once per week trash collection starts, yard debris, appliances and scrap metal will be picked up on Fridays.

Residents are reminded that when a holiday occurs on recycling day, collections are canceled (effective through September). Until September 30, refuse will be picked up on the second collection day of the week. Residents are always guaranteed at least once per week refuse collection.

On October 6, when the once per week refuse collection begins, refuse and recycling will be picked up on the next business day after a holiday. Special arrangements will be made for the Thanksgiving holiday. Holiday schedules will be delivered or mailed to each refuse customer in the next few weeks.

COG Is Monitoring Air Here

Greenbelt is among 20 jurisdictions in the region that are being monitored for air quality by the Metropolitan Washington Council of Governments (COG). Readings of the monitoring devices are accomplished daily by a team of meteorologists from COG, the University of Maryland, the Maryland Department of the Environment and the Virginia Department of Environmental Quality. The Greenbelt area monitoring station is located at the Goddard Space Flight Center.

The ozone monitors measure the parts per billion of ground level ozone in the air. These are translated into color codes

and reported in newspapers, and on radio and television. Updated information may be obtained by calling COG's hotline 202-962-3299.

Code green indicates that the air quality is good; code yellow, moderate; code orange, approaching unhealthy. Code red sounds an alert that the air quality has reached the unhealthy level.

Since the end of June, air pollution levels in the region have exceeded the Federal regulated pollution standards for six days. The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency has established the ozone standard at 120 parts per billion. The new limit under the 1990 amended

Clean Air Act requires the Washington area to reduce ozone-causing emissions to 80 parts per billion by 1999.

The COG spokesperson noted that these new standards could increase the number of air pollution violations in the region by as much as five times. However, the region should experience improvement in air quality when stricter car emission testing and inspections go into effect in Maryland and Northern Virginia starting October 1, 1997.

Ozone Effects

An invisible gas, the ozone layer found in the upper atmosphere is essential to life be-

Filing Deadline for Council Candidates Is September 22

On Tuesday November 4, Greenbelt citizens will elect the five members of the City Council who will represent them for the next two years. Greenbelt residents who want to be nominated for City Council, sign a petition for someone to run for council, or plan to vote in the election must be registered to vote in Prince George's County. Since universal voter registration began in Greenbelt in 1991, the city has not maintained a separate voter registration list.

Voter Registration

Registering to vote is the first step to qualify as a voter - whether to run for office or to vote for a candidate in the November 4 regular election. Although the county Board of Elections will handle all registrations, registration forms may be picked up during regular office hours at the city offices, 25 Crescent Road (Municipal Building), or at

the Greenbelt Library on Crescent Road. Voters may also call the Board of Elections at 301-637-2814 to request a form by mail. All completed forms must be received by the Board of Elections in Upper Marlboro by 4 p.m. October 6.

Qualifications

In order to vote in Greenbelt, and to be registered with Prince George's County, one must be a citizen of the United States of America; at least 18 years of age as of November 4, 1997; domiciled within the corporate limits of the city of Greenbelt as of the date of registration; not convicted more than once of an infamous crime and not currently under a sentence imposed pursuant to a conviction of an infamous crime (direct questions to the election office, 301-952-3270); and not under guardianship for mental disability.

Greenbelt Boundaries Could Grow through Annexation

Homeowners of Parkside, a two-year-old development next to Greenbelt Park, have voiced their desire to be annexed by the City of Greenbelt. Parkside is an eight-acre rectangular area jutting into Greenbelt Park from the south side and bounded on the south by Good Luck Road. Currently an unincorporated area with a Riverdale address, the development is comprised of 31 homes in the \$190,000 to \$230,000 range. Parkside is technically adjacent to Greenbelt, since the corporate city limits include Greenbelt Park, an 1,175-acre federally maintained park lying to the south of the city. Parkside homeowners are aware that annexation would make them liable for Greenbelt city taxes.

The Greenbelt City Council held a work session in late May to meet with Parkside homeowners, who are considering a formal petition to the city, asking for annexation. The group seeks to be part of the city for various reasons: it is attracted by Greenbelt's community spirit and enhanced quality of life; a Greenbelt address, if accompanied by a change to a Greenbelt zip code, would give residents a break in home and automobile insurance rates; and, if annexed, Parkside would be protected by Greenbelt's police force. Pam Hand and Tim Edwards, co-presidents of the Parkside Homeowners' Association, claim that the development, called "Parkside at Greenbelt," was initially marketed as being part of Greenbelt. Papers from the builder specified a Greenbelt address, and all utilities had a Greenbelt designation. Some Parkside residents are former

Greenbelt residents and believed a move to Parkside would keep them within the city of Greenbelt.

In anticipation of a formal petition for annexation, council and city staff are conducting preliminary assessments of the feasibility of providing services to an area such as Parkside. Mayor Antoinette Bram has indicated a neutral stance by the council in regard to the "completely unresolved" issue. Proponents of annexation point out that they would contribute to the City of Greenbelt by adding to the tax base and believe that Parkside residents, together with the City of Greenbelt, could be effective stewards of Greenbelt Park. Council members and Greenbelt residents familiar with the issue caution that council must carefully weigh all factors to determine if annexation would bring a net gain to the City of Greenbelt.

Petition by the homeowners' group would require the city to schedule public hearings on the issue. City staff estimates that an annexation procedure, with its myriad of legally mandated steps, would take at least six months from the time council received a formal petition.

Greenbelt has extended its boundaries at other times. When Hunting Ridge residents asked more than 10 years ago to be annexed, the city took in the entire southeastern part of Greenbelt, including Schrom Hills Park. The annexation was completed in 1984. Parkside, though geographically adjacent to Greenbelt, differs logistically from outlying areas of Greenbelt since access by road is cut off from the city. In order to reach the development, one must leave the city limits.

Open Letter

To Jerome Dancis:

Thank you for your recent letter to the News Review. As I wrote in response to an earlier reader inquiry, our teachers are evaluated twice a year. Without basis, you imply that these evaluations are routinely performed by persons who are not capable of performing them. It does not take much talent to determine if a teacher is any good. Within minutes, you were able to determine if your own children's teachers were up to the task. Personnel evaluations are only one of many tools we use in evaluating employees. Furthermore, these evaluations are usually helpful to the employee in identifying weaknesses that need to be corrected.

As you point out, principals have a great deal of self-interest in making sure they hire the best teachers they can find. Student performance on standardized tests is more and more a basis of judging our principals. When test scores are down, the principal is held accountable. Witness the full scale reorganizations undertaken this year at five county schools. Principals who want to thrive will make sure that useful personnel evaluations are conducted. This personnel review process has been extremely effective for them in having unwanted personnel transferred or dismissed.

Your implication that properly conducted personnel evaluations in 1994 may have been earlier indicators of failure in 1997 may or may not be true. And at this point it won't matter. If test scores are not improving, teachers and principals could face replacement. The poor personnel evaluations that those educators got three years ago was the early warning system that should have told these employees to shape up or ship out.

Sure, we can all agree, as you suggest, that some teachers are not qualified to teach the material that they are assigned to teach. In a 120,000 pupil system, some of the 8,000 teachers may indeed be in over their heads. However, our system of checks and balances including outspoken and unhappy parents, poor personnel review, low test scores and principals

being held more and more accountable should help to reduce the number of these under-performing teachers.

We can increase the prospect of having better teachers in our classrooms by raising their pay, thereby making our system more attractive to them. Recall that our teachers are the lowest paid in these parts. Too often, our best teachers are lured away by the prospect of better pay in neighboring systems.

Your thoughts on public education are, as always, appreciated. Please do not hesitate to contact me directly if you would like to discuss these issues further.

Protect Our Woods

I'm writing to express my support for entrusting our woodlands - Parcel 1, Parcel 2 and "the 72 acres" - to the protection of the Maryland Land Trust Conservancy. At the very least, the issue deserves more in-depth investigation before being dismissed by the News Review as "unpatriotic" (7/17 editorial). Do you consider National Parks to be unpatriotic? As for ensuring "flexibility" for future city councils (a concern expressed in a 7/24 letter) - any choice about land usage decreases future flexibility. Unfortunately, it was the flexibility in years past that allowed the sale of our original 800 acres of greenbelt. Through the dedicated work of many people, 183 acres were acquired by the City in recent years. The Maryland Land Trust Conservancy is really just the final step of that acquisition - it is a sort of insurance policy to forever protect the woods from development.

I've lived in 5 Court of Gardenway in old Greenbelt for seven years. Much of what I like best about my home is due to the proximity to the woods - it's why I bought a GHI unit in this particular court, and what I expect will be a major "quality of life" selling point if and when I sell. It's difficult to express how much I value and appreciate "my" woods. My cats and I enjoy walking the paths and we're kept fascinated by watching the birds and deer and other critters who

wander on the outskirts.

The city of Greenbelt encompasses four square miles (about 30,000 acres), mostly devoted to housing, shopping, businesses, movie theaters, and restaurants. It seems to be a relatively small commitment to set aside 183 acres for passive recreation activities like hiking, birdwatching, and just listening to the rustling leaves and other sounds of nature.

Without adequate protection, there will always be potential threats to the natural woodlands and open space that forms what's left of our greenbelt. It is very difficult to constantly protect against development - each issue must be fought separately, and it is always a matter of short-term goals and rewards (such as money) vs long-term goals and rewards (the beauty and peace of natural woodlands). Greenbelt recently lost a battle with the federal government over the location of the new USDA buildings on the BARC property in Beltsville, and other developments on that BARC land are being proposed. The citizens of Greenbelt may not have much influence over the development decisions of the Federal government, but we do have the power to keep our own land safe. As a citizen of Greenbelt, I urge the city council to, at least, consult with experts on the Maryland Land Trust Conservancy to obtain detailed information on the issue so that the city can make a truly well-informed decision. Let's choose to protect our woods - permanently.

Nominations Due August 11 For Outstanding Citizen

The Outstanding Citizen award is presented annually to a Greenbelt citizen who has provided exemplary volunteer service, past and present. Greenbelt's 1996 Outstanding Citizen - Paul Rall - epitomizes the activities of many unrecognized volunteers. The award was first given in 1974. Paul Rall and the 24 recipients of the Outstanding Citizen Award that preceded him have provided countless hours of unpublicized service.

When asked about his reaction to being selected Greenbelt's Outstanding Citizen, Rall responded, "I felt honored to be listed among those individuals that have contributed significantly to the City. It was a heart-warming experience. I especially enjoyed riding in the parade with my grandchildren."

Rall stated that he enjoys volunteer work but that he makes an effort to contribute without being in the forefront of most activities. When he first moved to Greenbelt, Paul Rall's initial volunteer efforts involved his church - St. Hugh's. That service expanded and has involved the crime-watch program, after-school reading programs, food for the homeless and fund-raising for the mentally retarded. Rall is also active on two boards - the Greenbelt Federal Credit Union and Greenbelt Consumer Co-op.

Service Is a Responsibility

His parents raised him with the belief that community service was a responsibility of every person. Commenting on the mandatory service required for high school graduation, Rall noted, "While it's unfortunate that all parents do not instill a sense of community service in their children, the community-service requirement exposes some teenagers to a pattern of service and hopefully develops habits that will continue beyond high school."

A softball fan, Rall was interested in watching his son-in-law

play in the annual memorial game that's part of the Labor Day Festival. His daughter's (Frances Fendley) mission was to convince him to watch the opening ceremonies and be there when the Outstanding Citizen award was announced.

Candidacy for Council

Any qualified voter of the city wishing to run for council may do so by obtaining the following forms:

1. **Nomination Petition** - This form requires the signature of at least 50 qualified voters of the city, and must be signed by the circulator of the petition and notarized. The signatures should give the petitioner's proper name (e.g. Mary Doe not Mrs. John Doe) and address.

2. **Acceptance of Nomination** - This form notes that the nominee agrees to serve, if elected. It must be filed along with the nomination petition and an affidavit containing a Sworn Statement providing the candidate's name, date of birth, Social Security number and resident address.

3. **Financial Disclosure Statement** - This form lists business entities and real estate interests held by the nominee and family, and sources of specified income or debt. The statement covers the period January 1, 1996 through June 30, 1997. Candidates who had previously filed a statement for calendar year 1996 will be required to file a supplemental report for the period of January 1 through June 30, 1997. The financial disclosure statement must also be notarized.

The deadline for filing to be a candidate in the November 4 regular election is Monday, September 22 at 5 p.m.

The City Clerk verifies that nomination petitions meet the requirement of the city charter.

A drawing will be held by the Board of Elections in the City Offices on Monday, September 22 at 7:30 p.m. to determine the order in which names shall be placed on the ballot. This meeting is open to the public; candidates, their families, supporters, and interested citizens may attend to witness the draw.

Candidates are also required to file a notarized interim report of campaign contributions no later than noon, October 20. A final campaign contribution report must be filed no later than 5 p.m. Monday, November 10. These reports shall list the name, address, and amount contributed of every contributor, other than the candidate or a member of his or her family, who has contributed more than \$25.00 in furtherance of the candidate's nomination and election.

Absentee Voting

Voters who will be unable to appear at their polling place on November 4 by reason of illness, religious beliefs or absence from the city may vote by absentee ballots. The first day to apply and vote by absentee ballot will be Wednesday, October 15. (Please watch for city ad.)

Election of Council

The five candidates each receiving at least 40 percent of the total number of votes cast and the highest number of votes cast will be elected. If fewer than five candidates receive at least 40 percent of votes cast, a run off election will be held on Tuesday, November 11. Twice as many as there are positions to be filled will be submitted to the voters. In more than 20 years this has not been necessary.

Greenbelt does not have provisions for election of the mayor or mayor pro tem by the electorate. At the organizational meeting on the Monday following the election (Monday, November 10) the newly elected council will elect the mayor and mayor pro tem. Traditionally, the new council has

cause it blocks out the sun's harmful ultraviolet rays. However, high concentrations of ozone near ground level can be harmful to people, animals, crops and other materials. These pollutants have many sources including automobiles, trucks, buses, industrial smoke stacks, gasoline stations and oil-base paints.

A spokesperson for COG noted that when air quality approaches unhealthy levels, residents should "refuel cars after dusk to limit daytime pollution releases, avoid mowing lawns with gasoline-powered mowers, share a ride, use mass transit and bicycles and telecommute."

Employing these voluntary measures will help keep the air quality from degrading into code red unhealthy levels.

COG also recommends that when air quality reaches code red unhealthy levels, "children and elderly individuals should reduce outdoor activities, healthy individuals should limit strenuous outdoor work or exercise and individuals with heart or respiratory ailments should limit their outdoor activities. If breathing becomes difficult, move indoors."
