## Skateboard Park Moves Closer to Reality Here

"There will be a skateboard park in Greenbelt," Mayor Judith Davis announced at a Greenbelt City Council worksession on Wednesday, October 30. "Sixty-thousand dollars has already been allocated for that purpose," she said.

The worksession was attended by 20 or more young Skateboard Coalition members, led by Matthew Moegel, Matthew Schultz, Donna Oster and skateboarder parent Doug Mangum. The group discussed with council the proposed location and design of the park.

Several locations were ruled out immediately. Two of these, "Candy Cane City" and the seldom-used sand volley ball court, were automatically eliminated because of the potential adverse environmental impacts of the structure on nearby active streams. Locations on Lakecrest Drive and in Springhill Lake were also rejected as "too far away." Other possibilities included the small ball diamond behind St. Hugh's, which is still needed for Little League; the open area at the entrance to the Boxwood development, which would probably meet local opposition; and the area between the Aquatic Center and the Youth Center, which was

deemed too small.

In the end, the consensus of those present was that the little-used Braden Field tennis courts 7 and 8 would be the ideal location. This location has the further advantage, they noted, of already having a solid foundation and paving, albeit in need of repair.

Various configurations and construction materials were discussed, especially surface materials. Some, it turns out, last longer than others; some come with guarantees. Steel is noisy and is unwanted by the Coalition. In the end, it was decided that the Department of Recreation and the Skateboard Coalition will work together on the park's design and to determine the best and most economical materials and equipment. Several vendors will be consulted in this endeavor.

No time-line was established at the worksession, but, as Davis said, "This is a start."

The skateboard park will be a staffed facility with rules and equipment requirements. Hours and fee schedules will be determined by the Recreation Department. However, the possibility was discussed of free passes in exchange for helping with maintenance.

## Lions Support GAC Concert

They include fostering greater understanding of international relations, promoting principles of good government and good citizenship and providing a stimulating forum for free discussion of all matters of public interest.

The concert, which features flutist Joseph Cunliffe and guitarist Georgia Cavallaro, collectively known as "Flutar," and 14-year old pianist and cellist Zenas Chang, should draw a young and young-at-heart audience. While the program will offer a high quality of artistry, it will also offer the community an opportunity to learn more about an organization which has given much to Greenbelt.

## Co-op Meets, Awards Patronage Refund

Approximately 50 members attended the annual meeting of the Greenbelt Consumer Cooperative on Saturday, October 26 and learned that not only was their cooperative in good shape but that once again there would be a patronage refund. This year the board approved a patronage refund of \$51,685 – all of which will be distributed to members. Treasurer Joe Timer reported that during the past fiscal year the store had sales of \$9,058,409, representing an increase over last year of \$541,122. Sales were such that the cooperative was also able to contribute to the Employee Retirement Plan and award employee bonuses.

Manager Bob Davis spoke of the challenges posed by the competitive market in the D.C. suburban area but said that the grocery store was holding its own. He spoke of upcoming issues facing the store including a remodeling that he hoped would be underway by next spring. Davis acknowledged the tremendous contribution made over the past 18 years by retiring board

chair Jim Cassels. These remarks were underscored by applause from the audience.

Later in the meeting, incumbents Jill Stevenson and Leta Mach were unanimously re-

elected to positions on the board as was member Paul Moran, who replaces Jim Cassels. Following questions from the floor, door prizes were awarded and the meeting was adjourned.

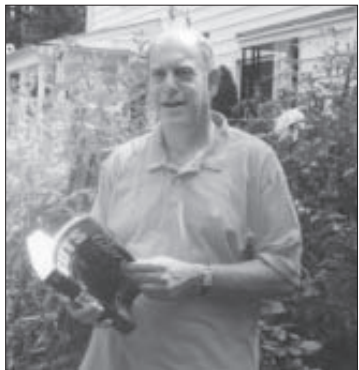

the lowest turnout with 49 fewer votes and only 27 percent of the registered voters voting. Greenbelt North End had the best turnout with 58 percent of the registered voters voting, but that was down three percent from four years ago. Greenbelt Center's turnout was down by four percent.

The support for most Democrats seeking office against Republicans was as strong or stronger than four years ago, with the exception of the county executive race. The Kathleen Kennedy Townsend/Charles R. Larsen gubernatorial ticket received 74 percent of the Greenbelt votes cast, about the same as the percentage cast four years ago for the Glendening/Townsend ticket. Both Comptroller William Donald Schaefer and Attorney General J. Joseph Curran increased their Greenbelt victory margins in their successful reelection bids. Also increasing his winning margin in Greenbelt by eight points was Congressman Steny Hoyer.

### Ballot Questions

All ballot questions won easily with the exception of the state ballot question 2, which permits the General Assembly to pass emergency laws creating or abolishing any public office or changing the terms of duties of any officer. The question barely won statewide, with 51 percent voting for it. In the county, 56 percent of the voters supported the constitutional amendment while Greenbelters, like state voters gave only 51 percent of their votes to the proposal.

All other ballot questions were approved with margins ranging from 71 percent to 91 percent in both Greenbelt and the county. The most popular proposal was the state constitutional question 1 that will permit District Court Commissioners to issue temporary civil peace and protective orders in domestic dispute cases.

The most popular county bond proposal in the city was the one seeking approval for the issuance of up to \$1,750,000 for library facilities bonds. While that proposal was almost as well received countywide, the most popular bond proposal throughout the county was the issuance of up to \$10,302,000 in bonds for public safety facilities.

Both in the city and in the county, the least favored county question was the Charter amendment proposal relating to redistricting and filling vacancies on the county council with 71 percent of Greenbelt voters and 74 percent of the county voters favoring it.

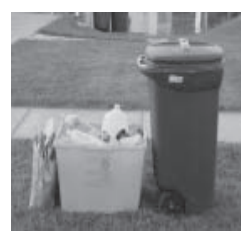

# Hollywood and the Military; Probing the Link

War movies – as Americans we grew up on them, consuming reels of combat scenes along with our buttered popcorn. Nearly 850 Hollywood films have featured America's armed forces, according to Greenbelt author and military historian Lawrence Suid. His new book "Guts and Glory: The Making of the American Military Image in Film" examines many of them, and probes the relationship – "the mutual exploitation" – between Hollywood and the Pentagon.

The Greenbelt Library will host a lecture and book signing by the author on Wednesday, November 13 at 7:30 p.m. Suid's book, published by the University of Kentucky Press, updates his first edition of "Guts and Glory" which covers films through the mid-1980s. Suid credits his friend Dolores Haverstick, also of Greenbelt, with making valuable contributions to the new edition.

While the Pentagon has used its influence with Hollywood to promote a positive military image, the film industry has also benefited by receiving military assistance for its commercial films. But Suid is more interested in how the relationship between "two of the most powerful organizations in the world" has shaped Americans' perceptions of war, violence and the armed services.

"Hollywood, the greatest educator of the masses, has never cared for the truth," he says. As a result, young viewers, who believe what they see on the screen, often develop a distorted view of war.

### Hollywood

What they see, overwhelmingly, is America winning – a legacy of World War II, which has resurfaced as a popular Hollywood theme.

"Our military was successful – all you had to do was to look at the movies. The attitude was that agrarian peasants – whether they be Japanese or Vietnamese – were no match for us," he said.

In the book, which he considers military history not film history, Suid argues that Hollywood's creation of the image of an all-powerful fighting force through the late 1950s contributed to the ease with which President Johnson took the nation into the quagmire of Vietnam.

But Hollywood backed off from producing combat films when images of that war aired nightly on network news shows. "Vietnam will never be popular or successful on film because there were no

happy endings," he says.

Before Vietnam, many leading directors and screenwriters had taken part in World War I or World War II, and understood the military culture. That's not true for many contemporary Hollywood directors, who are more willing to alter historical truth.

### Recent Example

The most glaring recent example, in his view, is "Pearl Harbor" which is riddled with inaccuracies. Suid interviewed director Michael Bay and the producer and both admitted that the film, modeled on "Titanic," focused more on love than historical details.

"The script is wildly inaccurate," Suid says. The number of

Americans who died on the Doolittle raid was seven, not five, and the planes did not have radios that could broadcast back to the base. Bay also changed the date of the delivery of a telegram that warned of imminent battle, which alters the perception of who knew what about the possibility of a Japanese attack. Worst of all, he says, is a scene where Evelyn is in the military communication center. "That would have been impossible," he says.

One film that ranks higher in Suid's estimation is "Black Hawk Down" based on the U.S. military

involvement in Somalia. "This is a movie that is reasonably accurate and yet it's entertaining. You don't have to leave the truth behind to make a successful film," he says.

"But people go to films based on real wars and realize that the filmmakers have lied to them. At some point, people will begin to ask, 'Does truth matter at all?'"

It does, he insists, citing the recent Wall Street scandals as proof that ignoring the truth carries a high cost to society. "If this happens more broadly, we'll be the lesser for it."

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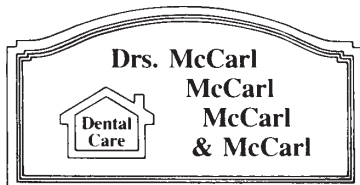

# Survey Planned for SHL; Greater Resources Sought

Meeting in the Municipal Building on October 30, members of a group working on improving life for residents of Springhill Lake (SHL) discussed ways to bring needed resources to the apartment community. Present were Greenbelt Human Resources Director Connie Harris (who shortly had to leave for another commitment), Prince George's County Human Relations Commission official Tanika Greene, Greenbelt Police Officer Lewis Gonzalez and the city's Neighborhood Improvement Team Leader Renee Landon. Joanne Brooks, representing Catholic Charities, arrived later.

### Survey

Greene distributed copies of a resident's needs survey prepared "to find out what would make them stay, what would make them comfortable," she said.

In a discussion of problems in the area, Gonzalez said he felt that the issue of unattended children was one of the most important and that parenting classes were needed. He said that some people are sub-letting portions of apartments in which to live. Neighborhood Watch was discussed, but Landon said residents did not want to participate.

Greene asked how things have been in the community since the stabbing which was the original impetus for meeting. (A stabbing occurred last autumn after a fight between an Hispanic and an African-American resident.) Gonzalez responded that there were "not too many fight complaints" since then. He stated that "things have been cleaned up and generally look better except for some trashing of Section 8 or transitional housing units."

Discussion ensued about how to get the survey distributed in the community. Landon suggested using the new Springhill Lake newsletter or distributing the survey door to door.

Greene said that it would be impossible to contact all the residents, but felt the survey would give a general idea of what people in the community want. The issue of safety during door-to-door distribution of the surveys was discussed. Landon suggested that groups of three distribute the surveys from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. on a Saturday.

There was discussion of sending the surveys home with students at the elementary and middle schools. Gonzalez suggested the possibility of having Springhill Lake maintenance personnel help in survey distribution. Landon mentioned the possibility of placing a box for the surveys in the rental office.

### Catholic Charities

When Joanne Brooks arrived at the meeting, she described various programs provided by Catholic Charities at its site in Langley Park where there is a staff of three. When Greene inquired about a program for residents to learn English (or Spanish), Brooks said the Catholic Charities course takes 12 weeks. It is taught twice a week for one hour at Langley Park. Landon suggested checking with the school system to see if space could be made available at the Springhill Lake Elementary School. The Recreation Center was another possibility mentioned, as was Giant Food's Learning Center located in Springhill Lake. It is

Giant's employee training facility.

Brooks mentioned a Catholic Charities program providing an immigration attorney and another program which signs up children for Medicaid or a Catholic Charities health program. She added that Catholic Charities is devising another program to give health care to adults.

Job resources was another need discussed. Brooks said Catholic Charities partners with Work Force Services, a Forestville employment organization. She volunteered to ask that program's coordinator what assistance might be possible in Greenbelt.

### Grants

"The money is out there," Brooks told the group, concluding that "a grant is needed to do this right." Nearly every Catholic Charities project in this area is the result of a grant, she said. If volunteers are to be used in Greenbelt programs, then a grant must be written with special incentives for them. Greene stated she will look into grants.

Gonzalez suggested creation of a Springhill Lake soccer team.

## Museum Lecture To Be on New Deal

What does "building community" mean? How are Greenbelt and other federally built New Deal towns carrying forward the ideal community principles on which they were founded? Stuart Patterson, a doctoral candidate in American studies and culture at Emory University in Atlanta, will provide a presentation on Tuesday, November 12 at 7:30 p.m. at the Greenbelt Library.

From small agrarian colonies like Arthurdale, W.V. to larger garden cities like Greenbelt, the federal government designed a hundred or so new towns as "demonstration models" of what FDR described as the New Deal "principle of the local community." This talk will explore the conflicts between the real and the ideal in the New Deal communities. By comparing a series of the new towns and their current community museums, Patterson will demonstrate how the past and the present, the real and the ideal, relate to ongoing community building.

Patterson is currently writing his Ph.D. dissertation on two New Deal "subsistence homesteads" communities, Arthurdale, W.V. and Aberdeen Gardens, Va.

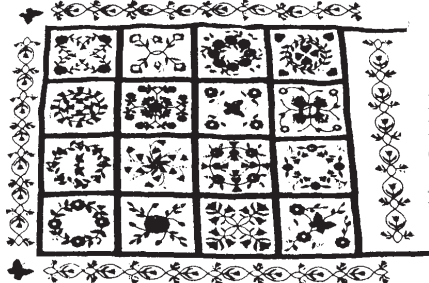

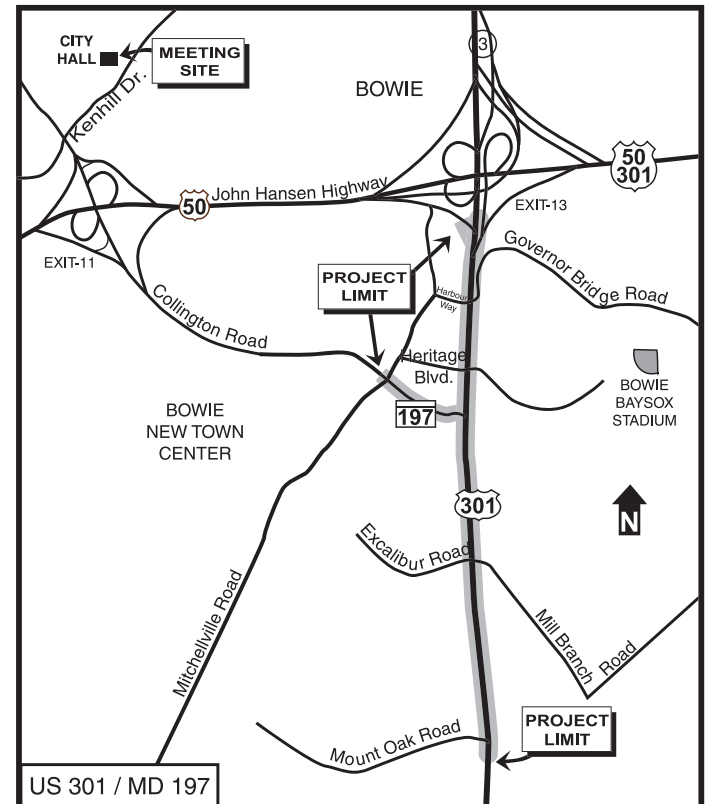
