Turner, Baker, Mfume: Winners In Greenbelt, but Not Overall

A watershed election, a generational change - whatever the term, Greenbelt will see new faces among its elected officials come January.

Ingrid Turner was the surprise winner in Greenbelt for the county council seat vacated by the popular Doug Peters, but not by much. She garnered 38.4 percent of the vote, Fred Robinson 36.6 percent and Darrell Carrington, 25 percent. The race is so close with Turner up by about 90 votes that absentee ballots may determine the outcome.

For county executive Greenbelt gave strong support to the seeming underdog Rushern Baker. Counted out not too long ago, Baker had been climbing steadily. Baker took 67 percent to Jack Johnson's 32.8 percent. Nevertheless, Johnson won across the county.

The third big decision facing Democrats was choosing a replacement for retiring Senator Paul Sarbanes. While Ben Cardin is the winner across the state and did okay in Greenbelt, Kweisi Mfume did much better - 49.0 percent to Cardin's 38.9. In the county Mfume took 69 percent to Cardin's 19.

no better in Greenbelt than elsewhere in the state with 16.8 percent. Peter Franchot, defining himself as the only real Democrat running for comptroller, handily beat his competition here, with 59.1 percent and won over Janet Owens statewide.

For attorney general Douglas Gansler came in a strong first. One hundred voters ignored the directions handed to them at the door that Tom Perez could not serve in the office and voted for him anyway.

In the battle for register of wills, Greenbelters strongly supported Lynn Skerpon in her fight to keep her job with 65.7 percent. Cereta Lee, who was backed by most Democratic slates, was tops here only in Precinct 8, Springhill Lake, but won easily in the county.

In many races there was no contest: governor, congressman, state senator, state's attorney, sheriff and most Democratic central committee positions.

For delegates to the Maryland House, Greenbelters gave top vote to their own Justin Ross, but also backed the other incumbents Tawanna Gaines and Anne Healey.

Top Vote Getters

Greenbelt's top vote getter was the team of Martin O'Malley and Anthony Brown running for governor and lieutenant governor with 1,970 votes. In second place, with 1,879 votes, was 5th District Congressman Steny H. Hoyer. Hoyer was seen at Precinct 13 talking with voters at 7:30 p.m. checking the numbers. He speculated the turnout - though not great - was not bad in Greenbelt's Precinct 3. Precinct 3 turnout was 28 percent; Precinct 6, 39 percent; Precinct 8, 9.9 percent; and Precinct 13, 21 percent. Election judges in all the precincts seemed pleased with their numbers. Turnout around the district, Hoyer thought, was light. State Senator Paul Pinsky, also unopposed, took third place with 1,818 votes.

Republicans

Registration figures show Republicans represent 13 percent of the registered voters in Greenbelt. There was no competition for the offices of governor, attorney general and judge of the orphans court. There were a number of elective offices for which there were no Republican candidates.

Lewis Elected **GHI** President

The Greenbelt Homes, Inc. (GHI) Board of Directors met on Thursday, September 7 and elected board treasurer Sylvia Lewis to succeed Julia Eichhorst as president. Sue Ready was elected as vice president and Sheila Alpers was named treasurer by board consensus.

Ready recently was elected by the board to fill the seat formerly held by the late Joyce Abell. The GHI bylaws state that interim board members filling vacancies during a board term are elected by the board of directors after the vacancies are publicized. One board seat remains open as the result of a job relocation by Eichhorst and the board will vote on candidates for that seat at the September 21 board meeting. Lewis has been active with GHI since 1997 when she became a member of the cooperative's Member and Relations Committee. She has also served on the Audit Committee (chair 1999-2000), Investment Committee and on the board of directors since 2000, serving as treasurer. Born in London, England, Lewis has been a GHI member since 1968 and obtained her U.S. citizenship the following year.

Council and Police Reflect On Sept. 11 Anniversary

The Greenbelt City Council meeting began on a somber note on Monday, September 11 as Mayor Judith Davis opened the meeting with reflections and remembrances of that date in 2001. She said that like Pearl Harbor and President Kennedy's assassination most people remember where they were when the attacks occurred.

Davis introduced the Greenbelt Police Department Honor Guard for the presentation of the colors and then asked those present to stand, join hands and offer a moment of silence to remember and honor those who died at the World Trade Center, the Pentagon and in Shanksville, Penna.

She also asked people to remember two Greenbelt residents who had died and the victims of Hurricane Katrina. After the silence, the assembled group recited the Pledge of Allegiance.

Captain Thomas Kemp of the police department spoke about the role Greenbelt police played that day, offering his appreciation not just for those who were deployed to the attack site but also for those who remained behind and worked overtime to cover the city and nearby areas of concern, such as NASA's Goddard Space Flight Center. He called the department's response "truly a team effort."

Kemp said the department has received a first-responder award from the community of Arlington, Va., which he brought to the meeting along with a poster displaying patches from all 43 police departments that helped out at the Pentagon after the attack. The award is on permanent display at

Greenbelt's New U.S. Post Office Has Grand Opening

With songs, cheers and a ribbon-cutting, the new Greenbelt Post Office at 7600 Ora Glen Drive was formally opened on Sunday, August 27.

Attended by about 150 people, the ceremony began with a routine by the Eleanor Roosevelt High School varsity and junior varsity cheerleaders. Timothy C. Haney, Capital District manager for the United States Postal Service, welcomed all to the new "state of the art" post office and introduced members of the city council, previous postmasters John "Foxx" Hyater and Emory Harman, acting postmaster Galo Tolentino and Steny Hoyer, Congressman from Maryland's 5th District, as a "strong supporter of the Postal Ser-

vice and the City of Greenbelt." The color guard of the Eleanor

Haney continued his remarks, noting that the ten-year process of creating the new post office was "worth the wait" and will be a "great new home" for customers, businesses and employees. He then called for a moment of silence for two Greenbelt postal employees, Pamela Pinkney and Andrea Davis, who died during the process of opening the new facility.

Haney thanked the city council for their efforts in making the new facility possible and introduced Mayor Judith Davis. She then recognized Bowie Mayor Fred Robinson for his partnership with Greenbelt in the postal facility relocation and Sheldon Goldberg, president of the Greenbelt East Advisory Committee, for assistance in the process of relocating the post office and Hoyer for his in obtaining funding.





Obituaries

Angela M. Schreiber

Angela Schreiber, a long time resident of Greenbelt and one of the founders of Greenbelt Play-

ers, a semi-professional theater group, died on August 16, 2006. She directed and acted in many productions that commenced at St. Hugh's School in the late 1970s and went on to hold community productions in Greenbelt's Utopia Theatre. Productions held from 1980 through 1984 included "Wait Until Dark," "The Heiress," "Moon for the Misbegotten," "The Glass Menagerie," "The Diary of Anne Frank," "The Red Shoes," "Arsenic and Old Lace," "I Remember Mama," "Night Watch" and several Broadway reviews and talent shows.

Local Writer's Book Featured at Tribute


"The Lizard King Was Here: The Life and Times of Jim Morrison in Alexandria, Virginia" is the latest book from Greenbelt author Mark Opsasnick. A 1980 graduate of Eleanor Roosevelt High School and a 1984 graduate of the University of Mary-

land, he has written six books including "Capitol Rock," a history of rock and roll music in the Washington, D.C., area and "Miscellaneous and Unknown," an examination of unusual information and cultural artifacts in Prince George's County.

The subject of "The Lizard King Was Here," Jim Morrison, was best known for having been the lead singer of the popular 60s rock and roll band "The Doors."

"The Doors" released six critically acclaimed studio albums for Elektra Records from 1967 to 1971. The singles broke the Top 40 eight times, including the number one hits "Light My Fire" (July 29, 1967) and "Hello, I Love You" (August 4, 1968). Morrison died of heart failure in July 1971 at the age of 27.

Opsasnick became interested in the music of "The Doors" in 1972 as a 10-year-old fifth grader at St. Hugh's School, first reading



about the band in various rock and roll magazines at the Greenbelt Library and later noted that most of the published books on Jim Morrison/"The Doors" - more than 50 in all - skipped right over the singer's teenage years in Alexandria. Opsasnick interviewed

dozens of Morrison's former high school classmates and uncovered a wealth of never-before published information, including a wide range of experiences that motivated his later poetry, lyrics and work as a performing artist with "The Doors."

Opsasnick will be discussing and signing copies of his book "The Lizard King Was Here" at "The Jim Morrison Tribute," a free event to be held at the New Deal Café on Sunday, September 17 at 1:30 p.m. The afternoon will also feature Greenbelt guitarist-vocalist Geff King performing the music of "The Doors" and other 60s rock bands.





Incumbent Robert Ehrlich, with 211 votes for the office of governor, Michael Steele with 182 votes for the U.S. senate and Scott Rolle with 178 votes for attorney general won top Republican honors in Greenbelt. Harvey Geller: A Life in Constant Motion

Ask Harvey Geller, 85, about his life, and he can measure the decades in the games and sports that have brought him pleasure through the years – and a level of physical prowess that has won him many awards, including his latest, a place in the Maryland Senior Olympics Hall of Fame.

As a boy in the Bronx, Geller began with urban games – stickball, hide-and-seek, Three Feet Off to Germany, wall-board, boxball, Hit the Penny, Triangle (a punch-ball game on a triangle course) and roller hockey. Then came the year-round sports of youth: softball, summer-league basketball, sandlot football. In high school and college he earned varsity letters in soccer and in track and field.

"I have half-written a book called 'Games of My Youth," said Geller with a smile.

Perhaps he should consider a sequel. In his active adulthood – the last 60 years – he has competed in cycling, racewalking, running, swimming, basketball, golf, tennis, volleyball and table tennis events, to name a few.

"It's like an addiction," he said. "If I was in training and got hurt or if it was raining, I would still cycle 30 miles a day in my 60s and 70s."

Among his longest events are his more than 10 "century" bicycle rides – 100 miles in a day, including one from Salisbury to Assateague Island and back. "If you do that much, you can feel bad. But I'm very rarely sick and have had no debilitating dis-

eases. I have had broken bones – the kind you get when you play sports."

Geller came to Greenbelt in 1957 and began work as a statistician with the National Cancer Institute, where he was involved with the early development of the use of high-density films to detect early breast cancer – a technique which evolved into today's mammography. In his free time, he took up racewalking which became his favorite sport along with cycling. Since then he has played with the senior softball team and in his 70s he also obtained his scuba-diving certificate.

After he retired in 1980, he traveled with his wife Helen in a small motor home to places of natural beauty, where he cycled

for miles. He also has enjoyed Elderhostels that offer canoeing, cycling, rafting and kayaking.

In 1981, he began "competing" – he says it's more cooperative than competitive – in racewalking, track and field, cycling, and swimming events in the Maryland Senior Olympics. In the 25 years he has participated, Geller has won more than 100 medals, more than half of them gold. He has set age-group records in racewalking and cycling and still holds the record for the 75 to 79-year age group in the 5K and 10K cycling time trials.

Beyond the state senior Olympic events, Geller has won 15 medals in national-level competitions. "I've gone to eight nationals in places like Disney World, Baton Rouge, St. Louis and San Antonio," Geller recalled. His most recent national event was 2003 in Hampton Roads.

Even on the national level, Geller says the Senior Olympics "are more about people helping each other than being overly competitive. It's not just about winning."

Other active Greenbelters have also participated in the Maryland Senior Olympics in various categories, including racewalking and track and field.

Geller and other senior athletes selected for the Maryland Senior Olympics Hall of Fame will be honored at a "Celebration of Athletes" on September 21 in Towson. The honorees were selected for making "exemplary contributions to the Senior Olympics through their accomplishments and support at the state and national levels."

Byers said the cooperative spirit of the people he met reminded him of Greenbelt. Ordinary citizens came to offer support, bringing food and personal care items. He feels the experience has had a lasting effect on all who went there.

Davis thanked the police for their service. She thanked the fire department as well, saying they too had been first-responders and made sacrifices on that day.

County Planning Board **Reconsiders SHL Plan**

At its September 7 meeting, the Prince George's County Planning Board agreed to schedule a hearing to reconsider the Springhill Lake Preliminary Plan of Subdivision. According to Celia Craze, director of Planning and Community Development for Greenbelt, the Planning Board set no schedule or time limit.

At the meeting Robert Manzi, city solicitor, reminded the board there are still issues to be resolved between the city and AIMCO, the owner-developers of Springhill Lake. Manzi challenged the process by which the Prince George's County Council eased the rules under which the Planning Board had rejected the Preliminary Plan last spring.

But, Craze reported, the fact that the Planning Board was not agreeing to approve the plan but only agreeing to reconsider their prior disapproval, that provided a reasonable basis for the city to agree with the request for reconsideration.

Manzi and Craze then met briefly with Pat Teagarden of AIMCO and their attorney Andre Gingels, to identify the school and recreation issues yet to be resolved. They further recommended that AIMCO contact Terri Hruby, the city's assistant planning director, for further discussion and, perhaps, to draw up a development agreement to spell out terms.

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

cation was too small for customers and employees and that for safety and security reasons a new post office was necessary. The city offered five parcels of land to the Postal Service and with the choice of the present site, the "sunrise property" also was obtained for the city. GEAC assisted with the design and placement of the facility, ensuring there was a wooded buffer and approving entrance and egress traffic patterns.

Davis noted that the Postal Service continues to work with the city in providing the mobile van at the municipal building and that it is working to open a postal facility in Roosevelt Center.

Hoyer was the next speaker and began by joking that the parking lot was supposed to have been air-conditioned but the funding was cut, in reference to the very warm day. He thanked Haney, Davis and the council for "caring so much about the city." He then stated that post offices are "more than just buildings - they are community-binding facilities," which connect residents with their families and friends.

After Barnes sang "America the Beautiful" and Haney presented framed Chesapeake Bay stamps to participants in the ceremony, Haney, Hoyer, Tolentino, Davis and the council lined up to cut the ribbon tied between the posts of the entrance

Refreshments were served by the cheerleaders in the lobby and tours of the facility were offered by postal employees. Tolentino explained that he has been in charge of the Greenbelt facility since December 2005 in the prolonged absence of postmaster Elgin Cooper. He has been a postal employee since 1981 and resides in Charles County. His usual assignment is in Huntingtown, Calvert County. The new facility is two-and-onehalf times larger than the facility beneath the Co-op, enlarging from 8,000 to 20,000 square feet and the number of post office boxes has increased from 900 to 1,700. Tolentino added that at present the number of employees has not yet been adjusted to the needs of the new facility but that he is working hard to add employees. Customer service representative Damien Hatcher noted that revenues at the new facility are up 26 percent over this time last year, possibly because businesses that did not use the old facility because of its size have returned to Greenbelt's new post office. Tolentino gave a brief demonstration of the automated postal facility in the lobby, which weighs

letters and parcels and dispenses postage and sells stamps, using credit or debit cards. He stated that passport services will be added soon. The tours also took participants behind the public areas to show how mail is sorted and prepared for delivery. Participants were shown the mail slots for their residences, which adjust to the volume of mail delivered there. Mail carrier David Kremnitzer demonstrated an uncanny ability to, when given a street address, name all residents at that address.

Haney stated that the Capitol District ranks fourth in the nation for prompt delivery of first-class mail and has received the Five-Star Customer Service Award twice.

City Notes


Staff reports that work continues on the skate park project.
