Play it Big at Greenbelt New Year 2009 Party

Greenbelt's big New Year 2009 celebration launches at 6:30 p.m. on Wednesday, December 31 and continues into the New Year, ending at 12:15 a.m. on Thursday, January 1, 2009. The party is held at the Greenbelt Community Center and the Greenbelt Youth Center.

Stand a safe distance from the opening ceremonies featuring fire dancers, an award-winning soprano, a violinist and improvisational dancers. Set in the lunar landscape of the Greenbelt Skate Park in front of the Youth Center, the fun begins at 6:30 p.m. on Wednesday, December 31.

Flights of Fire is a local fire dance troupe directed by artist Christie Otvos. The group has a rotating roster of personnel and any given show may include fire poi dancers, fire hoopers, fire staff spinners, fire eaters, fire fan dancers or other features. Greenbelt resident Angella Foster leads her dancers in whimsical, structured improvisations at the skate park. Foster is a choreographer currently pursuing her MFA at the University of Maryland, College Park. See ad-

ditional performances by Foster's troupe in the art gallery in the Community Center (8 p.m.) and among the inflatable games at the Youth Center (9 p.m.).

Especially for Kids

From 7 to 11 p.m., giant inflatable action games will already be attracting lines of kids at the

Youth Center. See an awesome hooping show and join in an all-inclusive hoop jam with Noelle Powers from 7 to 8 p.m. Hoops will be provided for all ages. Featured recently on CNN, Powers encourages people of all ages, abilities, sizes, genders and lifestyles to experience joy and peace with a hula hoop.

At the opening ceremonies, Izolda Trachtenberg, another Greenbelter, performs on violin. A gifted singer and songwriter, she has over 15 years experience teaching singing and environmental education. She is the author of Life Elements and a practitioner of holistic life coaching, tarot consultation and Chi Energy/Reiki healing. Later in the evening, Trachtenberg will give palm and tarot readings at the Community Center (9 to 11:30 p.m.).

A featured singer at this year's opening ceremony will be Daniele Lorio. A soprano with a "big sweet sound," in the words of Washington Post critic Anne Midgette, Lorio holds a master's degree in opera performance from the University of Texas at Austin. In December 2007, Lorio won

Acting Superintendent Wm. Hite Would Like Job Permanently

The Eleanor and Franklin Roosevelt Democratic Club of Greenbelt invited the newest elected member of the Prince George's County Board of Education, Amber Waller, to be the club's guest speaker at its December 19 end-of-year meeting. Waller, who earlier had been appointed to the board to fill a vacancy, was officially elected at a special election held as a part of the November general and presidential election. She had been unopposed for the office.

Waller agreed to attend the meeting but offered to bring with her to speak Dr. William R. Hite, Jr., the acting superintendent of the county school system. Hite was hired by former School Superintendent John Deasy to be deputy superintendent. He had been the assistant superintendent at the Cobb County (Georgia) School District and before that with the Henrico County, Va., school system as director of Middle School Instruction.

Hite thanked the club for helping to elect Barack Obama president. He noted that he was a Democrat.

On the Rise

He told the club that the county school system, consisting of 30,000 students and 18,000 employees was on the rise. He had

come to the school system as a part of the Deasy team. Since then, student achievement in the county has outperformed all other jurisdictions in the state, he said. He is delighted with all of the school staff. He said that the system had an outstanding group of teachers who were working to make Prince George's an outstanding school system.

Every high school now has at least eight advanced placement classes. The Doswell Brooks Elementary School has been named a Title 1 Distinguished School, one of only two in the state this year. The county hadn't had one before, he said.

The prestigious Milliken Award was given to the Tulip Grove Elementary School. He said it was considered to be comparable to an Oscar among teachers. It is an award that is not sought, rather the school is sought out to receive the award.

He noted, however, that there were many challenges facing the school system, with the biggest being the budget and finances. He said that the school system would probably lose half of the \$23,000,000 state funding on this year's budget.

Improving math scores was another challenge. They needed to be ratcheted up, he said. The

school system will switch to using the ACT standard for testing rather than HSA standards.

Hite said that he was originally from Richmond, Virginia, and was one of three siblings. He noted that he had very loving parents. While not rich, they had riches in many ways, he said.

Hite strongly expressed his desire to become the next appointed school superintendent.

After Hite, Waller briefly commented that she would become a member of the Roosevelt Club. She was pleased to bring Dr. Hite along when she had been invited to attend. She said that Dr. Deasy had been very good to work with and that she looked forward to working with Dr. Hite. Waller said that she expected the Board of Education to announce its selection procedure for appointing the next superintendent in mid-January.

Questions

Hite was asked if there was a possibility that the Gates Foundation, to which Dr. Deasy had gone, might work with the county in any way. Hite responded that that was a good question and that he expected an announcement soon on what the foundation might fund relating to the county

There Is No "I" in SHL Team On 5th Grade Polar Express

All A Boaaaaard – let's take a journey on the Polar Express. Follow your nose to Room A-3: Destination? You guessed it, its Ms. Dayao's 5th grade special education class and unlike some classes the students in this class are in for a real treat. Today is "fun-fun Friday." Most Fridays, students are engaged in a cooking activity. The hallway is filled with the savory aroma of bacon and eggs, pancakes or spaghetti and the line is wrapped around the classroom. During this exercise students are given the opportunity to stir, mix, measure and on occasion even flip the pancakes. While students are instructed with a modified curriculum they are also exposed to life skills. It is here one experiences the epitome of Special Education.

Most would agree, "the classroom – not the trench – is the frontier of freedom now and forevermore," as exclaimed by our 36th president Lyndon B. Johnson. The classroom is where we gain lifelong skills to reside in and build our communities to move forward in a productive, interdependent manner. It's these skills learned in life that bring us freedom.

Coleen Dayao, the fifth grade teacher and a native of the Philippines, says the children are fortunate because they are able to learn what other students may miss and because what they learn will prepare them for tasks beyond the classroom. Dayao, who holds a bachelor's in Elementary Education focusing on Special Education from the New Era University, is

in her second year teaching at Springhill Lake Elementary. She encourages students to gain a certain level of confidence and a sense of independence. "Aside from cooking and shopping, we're doing hygiene too because that's very important," explains Dayao.

Chiming in as tears well up in her eyes, Rhonda Maclin passionately describes the Polar Express team. "We have a wonderful team," says Maclin, a Seabrook resident and an 11-year veteran at the Springhill Lake school. Maclin says the level of commitment and the closeness of the team are amazing. The Polar Express is comprised of five close-knit staff members all working together to prepare 10 Special Education students who

are either autistic or mentally retarded for the world beyond the classroom. "There are five of us," Maclin said, "and working together on a daily basis is truly a blessing."

Maclin came to Springhill Lake after working for the government for some years. She applied as a substitute at Spring-

hill Lake and the rest is history. Passionately describing the Polar Express she explains that the children, in addition to a modified curriculum, are exposed to a variety of life skills in preparation for the outside world. Staying relatively consistent with "fun-fun Fridays," every other Wednesday these students take a community trip to the grocery store and aisle

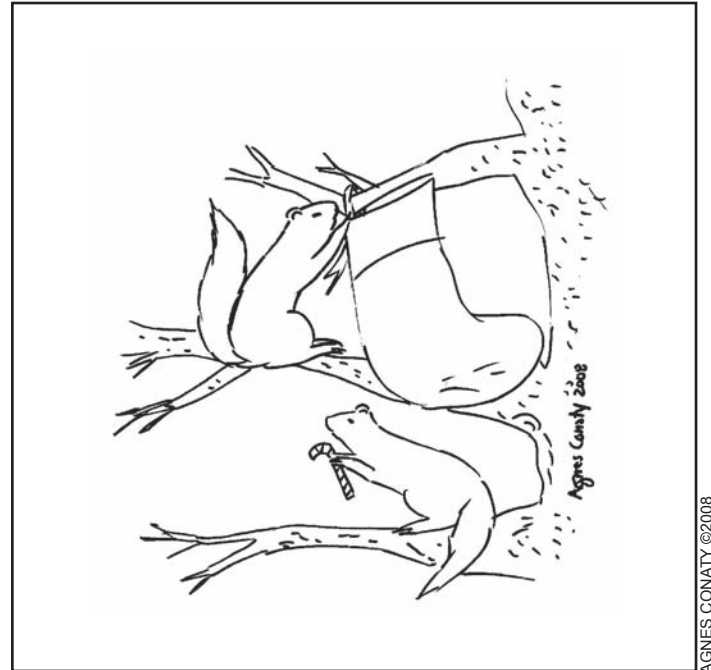

schools. Another questioner asked if the proposal put forth by Deasy to eliminate middle schools and convert to K-8 schools, which was later dropped, might be revived. Hite said that was still an active plan. As a first step, the School Board will be considering consolidation of school boundaries to make such a plan possible. He said that K-8 would be offered at schools of choice and that there would be several around Greenbelt. A new one is being developed in College Park at the former Friends School. It will be for performing arts and an immersion school. Its students will consist of 70 percent from at-large and 30 percent from the neighborhood.

Prince George's County Councilmember Ingrid Turner was present at the meeting and expressed concern over the political ramifications of school boundary changes. Hite said the staff would look where there is space, where programs can be consolidated and where seats are available. He expected the process to begin at the June 8 board meeting.

When asked to comment on delinquency and behavior training, Hite said that the school system has had the highest atten-

dance rate this year of any year since he has been here. He said there is now better record keeping. A child's presence is now known for each class. There are pockets of behavioral problems to be dealt with but all-in-all suspension rates were low.

As to improving the quality of teachers, Hite noted that this year the system had completed the hiring of teachers by July 1. He listed various projects that had been done to develop a stronger pool of teachers. The best source, he said, is the Maryland Teachers Program.

New Officers

Prior to Hite's talk, the club elected officers for the coming year and Waller administered the oath of office to the new slate. Karl Shipps replaced Ed Terry as president.

by aisle are taught to read labels and compare prices.

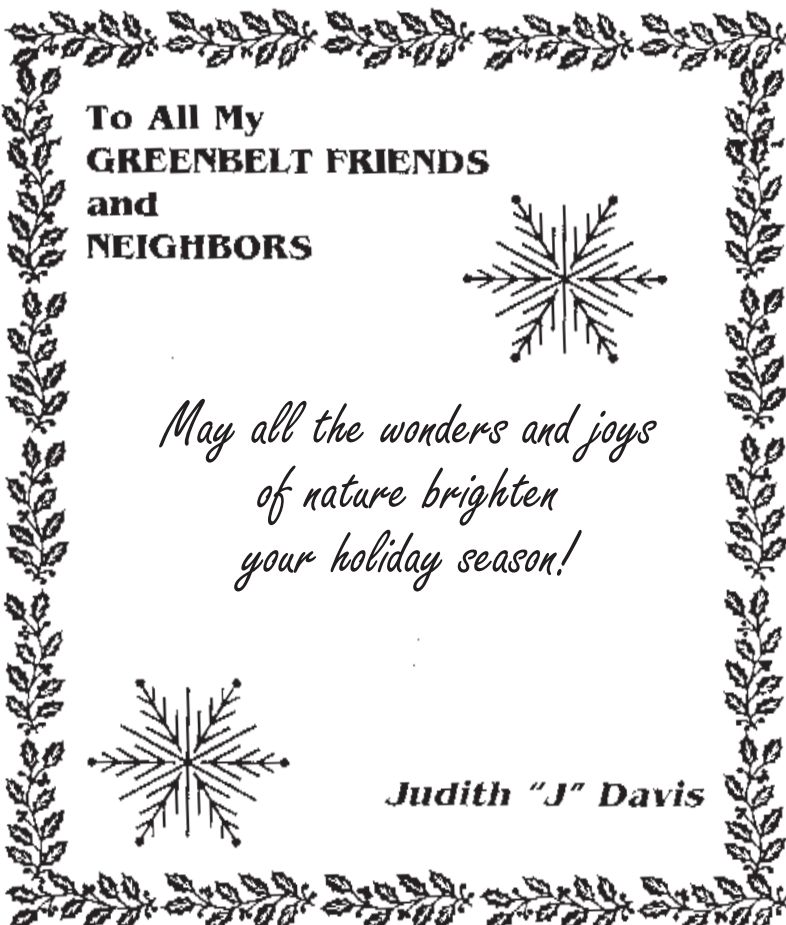
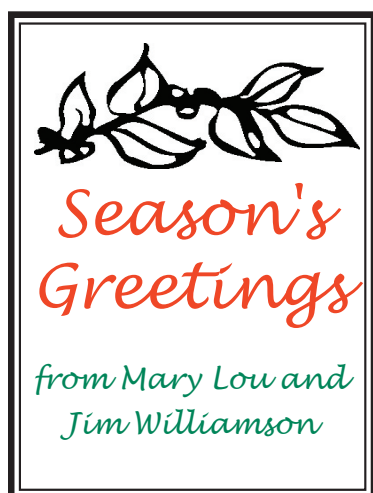
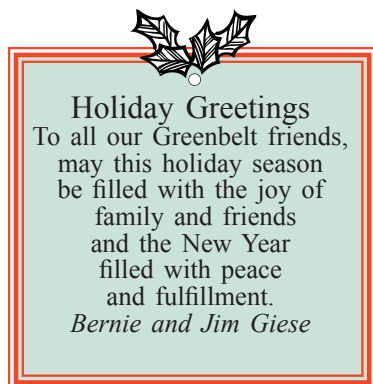
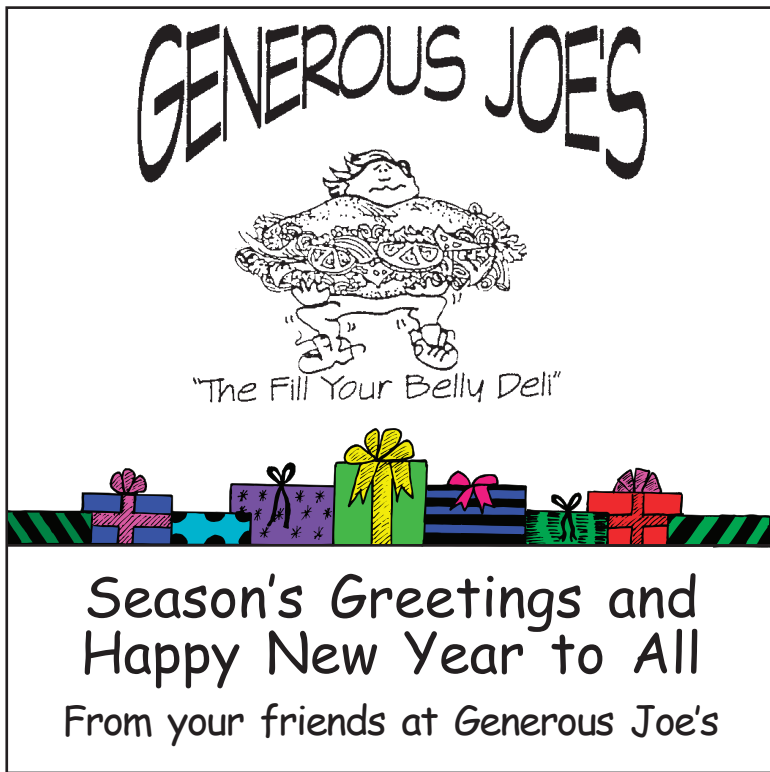
A "typical-not so typical day," explains Maclin begins with homework, the opening which involves covering the date, to include the month, the actual day and the numerical date, life skill activities and motor skill development.

When asked what their greatest accomplishments were, simultaneously exemplifying the closeness of the team, Dayao and Maclin both respond "that knowing you are helping someone else and seeing the achievements/progression of our students is our greatest reward." Today explains Maclin with excitement, was no ordinary day; three out of 10 students were able to randomly identify words listed alphabetically on the board.

A challenge to some, simple for others; these students are grasping the basics of life. "We want them to walk away with skills that allow them to operate in the real world," says Maclin. For reinforcement the students are able to utilize these skills when mixed with the regular school population during recess and lunchtime. It gives them the opportunity to interact with others and utilize the life skills they've been taught. The student population is very accommodating, report the two teachers.

Taking Special Education to a higher level the students are also given the opportunity to participate in the Special Olympics. The Special Olympics which offer training and competition opportunities in 30 Olympic-type sports is a place where students are accepted, are able to further develop their physical abilities and demonstrate courage. The students usually compete in the baseball throw and the 50, 100 and 200 yard dash.

In addition to a modified curriculum made just for them, these students are being molded into life skill achievers. Just like the little boy in the Polar Express the faith of the team is evident in the achievements of these students.



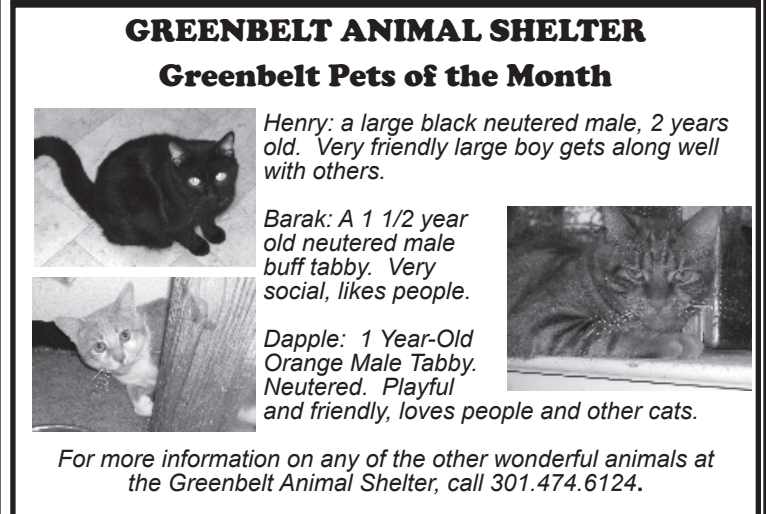

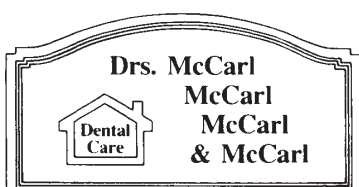

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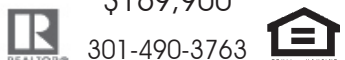
