

Opponents of Highrise Hold Information Session

The proposed 25-story apartment building that landowner David Hillman wants to put up next to the existing Lakeside North Apartments is “inappropriate for here,” said Brian Almquist.

Almquist and his wife Donna organized an information session on the proposed building at the Greenbelt Fire Station hall on June 4. Over 100 people came during the four-hour session, Almquist said, using the signed petition to estimate.

He had pictures of the proposed land use and facilitated discussions of what it meant to have a green belt and the value of woods. In their flyer, distributed ahead of the meeting, the Almquists state that current zoning regulations require the forested land to remain undeveloped.

Most of the attendees were worried about the proposed project's size, its effect on the city and its cost to the woodlands.

However, Almquist noted that not everyone who came was against the development.

As noted in the News Review article on April 14, the plans for the 400-unit luxury apartments were presented to the council for consideration. While the council can voice support or dissent, the zoning issue is not the council's to decide. Hillman, who is the owner of the Lakeside North Apartments, proposes to use underdeveloped land next to those apartments. When the apartments were built in 1963, they were zoned R-30, a zoning category that the county is now phasing out.

The Planning Board of the Maryland-National Capital Park and Planning Commission will hold a public information session to discuss the zoning issues, set for June 20, 6:30 to 8:30 p.m. in the Greenbelt Library.

Muhammed Ali Quietly Visited Greenbelt in 1976

Muhammed Ali came to Greenbelt in April 1976 without fanfare and without most city residents knowing about it. But Greenbelt police officers did. They helped serve as bodyguards.

On April 30, Ali fought Jimmy Young at the Capital Centre. He was approaching the end of his career but was still world champion. He defeated Young in 15 rounds.

Before that fight, he trained in this area and part of that training was road work at Greenbelt Park. It was then as now a quiet out-of-the-way place, a spot that would not result in over attention to the famous fighter.

I did not know about it until Chief William Lane told me. Lane was one of a number of

city officers who got to meet Ali and he proudly showed me a photo of himself with Ali in the park.

Current Chief James Craze, then private first class in the police department, was another of the officers to meet Ali. Craze has a copy of an April 28, 1976, issue of the Washington Post showing Ali jogging in the park with three squad cars trailing him. Craze says that he was driving the first vehicle. The next day, Ali autographed a copy of the newspaper for him.

Craze has also provided me with his recollection of the event: “Yes, I had the good fortune of spending some time with Ali in

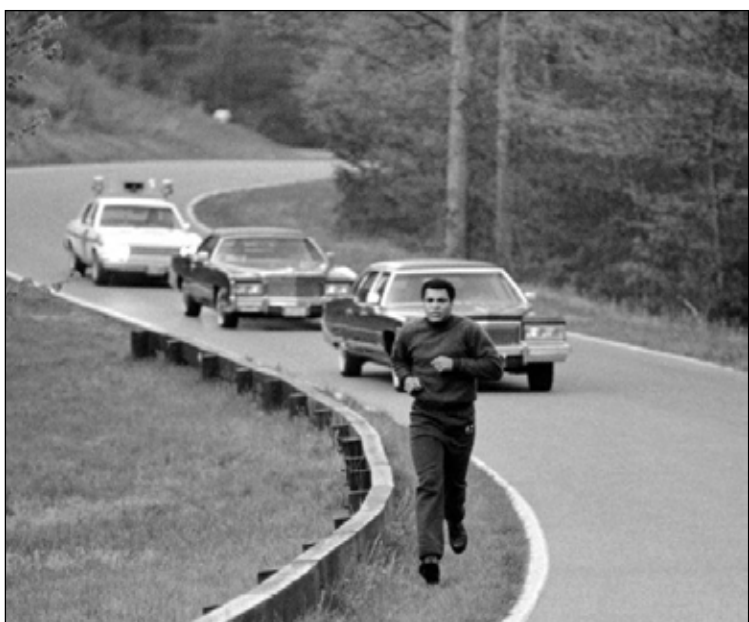

ACE Student Awards Presented At May 23 City Council Meeting

The Greenbelt Advisory Committee on Education (ACE) Awards Ceremony was a highlight of the May 23 meeting of the Greenbelt City Council. All available seats were filled for this annual event as parents, students, principals and teachers celebrated the selection of the outstanding students.

ACE committee member Melinda Brady opened the presentation, mentioning that the ACE Student Awards have been given out every year since 1996. Recipients must be residents of Greenbelt enrolled in the high-

est grade level at a local school. There are currently seven schools that are either located in Greenbelt or are the primary school for children living in Greenbelt. They are Greenbelt, Springhill Lake and Magnolia Elementary Schools, Turning Point Academy, Dora Kennedy French Immersion School, Greenbelt Middle School and Eleanor Roosevelt High School. (Turning Point Academy is a charter school that draws students from around the county. This year, the school did not have any students eligible for the ACE Student Award.)

In addition to the city council, a number of local dignitaries were present and congratulated the awardees: State Senator Paul Pinsky; Delegates Tawanna Gaines, Anne Healey and Alonzo Washington; and Ingrid Harrison, representing County Councilmember Todd Turner. A number of the school principals were also present.

The purpose of ACE is to serve as a link between the community and the city council, addressing education issues and promoting high quality schools for the people of Greenbelt.

The purpose of the awards is to recognize Greenbelt students who honor the city's traditions of citizenship, leadership and academic achievement. While many

Many Cats and their Kittens Left at Animal Shelter Steps

Twenty-eight abandoned cats and kittens appeared on the steps of the Greenbelt Animal Shelter on June 3 and 4, almost overwhelming the shelter. The first batch of 19 were left in boxes and carriers outside the shelter on Friday afternoon. Shelter employees discovered the second batch of boxes filled with nine animals on Saturday morning.

The shelter is set up to only accept animals from Greenbelt residents, and not set up to receive so many cats at once. Since these cats were dropped off anonymously, the employees do not know where the animals were from.

Greenbelt is the only no kill shelter in Prince George's County. That is the likely reason that so many animals were abandoned here, Shelter employee Howard Stanbeck told several news orga-

nizations.

"The person who dropped these cats off should have notified us," said Stanbeck, "The Greenbelt Animal Shelter only accepts animals from Greenbelt, but we could have directed them as to where they could have taken the animals."

The animals were in fair condition, Stanbeck reported, though all of them have fleas. Greenbelt has procured the assistance of other shelters including Alley Cat Rescue to move the cats and kittens toward adoption.

Both the Greenbelt Animal Shelter and the Greenbelt police are investigating to find out where the kittens came from. People with information should contact Animal Control at 301-474-6124 or the Greenbelt police at 301-474-7200.

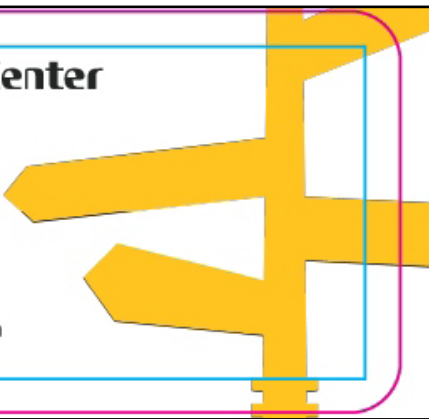
