### U.S. Navy Band Sea Chanters **Concert Features Bill Edwards**

Over three million viewers have watched the U.S. Navy Band's official chorus, the Sea Chanters, featuring Greenbelter Bill Edwards, perform selections from Jersey Boys on YouTube. Greenbelters have the opportunity to see these lively artists at Eleanor Roosevelt High School (ERHS) on Thursday, September 1 from 7 to 8:30 p.m., an early lead-in to the Greenbelt Labor Day Festival.

The 39-year-old Edwards last took the stage at ERHS 22 years ago when he was a student there. He is excited to return. "Drama and musiing with the Sea Chanters at University earlier this year. ERHS, he said, "is a fantas-

tic way to bring the community together, celebrate America, give back to the community and represent the military, and it's going to be a great honor to be able to do that in my hometown."

While he grew up in Bowie, Edwards spent a large part of his childhood in Greenbelt. His grandparents lived here, he attended Camp Pine Tree and his father had a law practice in Roosevelt Center. ### Drive Safely Near Schools

As children return to school, I thought it would be appropriate to remind drivers to proceed with extra caution around schools and in neighborhoods, particularly before and after school. According to a 2013 report by the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration, more school-age pedestrians were killed from 7 to 8 a.m. and from 3 to 4 p.m. than any other hours of the day.

What is the law regarding school buses in Maryland? Maryland law requires motorists to stop 20 feet from the rear or front of a bus when the stop arm is out and lights are flashing. In addition, if a bus has stopped for passengers on a two-lane road, a two-lane road with a turning lane or four-lane roads without a median, all traffic has to stop in both directions. The only exception to this rule is if there is a divided highway of four lanes or more with a median separation. Then only traffic behind the bus must stop.

Possible consequences for speeding near schools, failing to stop for buses or passing buses can result in tickets and fines due to hidden cameras. Let's all make a conscious effort to drive safely and look out for students.

The 2016 Greenbelt Labor Day Parade will take place on Monday, September 5, from 10 a.m. to noon.



### Unpalatable Truth, or Cozy Illusion?

Florence Foster Jenkins comes to the Old Greenbelt Theatre this Friday, August 26 and stars the preternaturally talented Meryl Streep, who nails it again. Having channeled so brilliantly Julia Child, Margaret Thatcher and Isak Dinesen, she now inhabits the persona of Florence Foster Jenkins, an abysmally untalented, sinfully wealthy New York socialite who aspires to operatic greatness in the 1940s. Streep's own early opera training helps her to portray a woman who never hits a proper note, no easy task.

Her uxorious husband St. Clair Bayfield (the excellent Hugh Grant) enables her delusions of grandeur, shields her from scathing but accurate reviews and packs her audiences with sycophantic friends and bribed, would-be critics.

Her pianist Cosme McMoon (the superb Simon Helberg, Howard in The Big Bang Theory), is initially aghast at the Sisyphean task of propping up Jenkins but eventually opts for loyalty and illusion over truth.

So when should we choose a sedative fairy tale over unpalatable facts? And is doting hubby Bayfield a parasitic gigolo or a true gallant swain?

Directed by Stephan Frears (The Queen, Philomela), Florence Foster Jenkins is rated PG13 and runs 1 hour, 50 minutes

### Well Baby Program Registration Begins

The Greenbelt Assistance in Living (GAIL) program, in partnership with the D.C. Diaper Bank, Bowie State University and Washington Adventist University School of Nursing, is pleased to announce the kickoff of the Diaper-Baby Mobile Wellness Program. Residents residing within incorporated Greenbelt with infants wearing diapers ranging in size from newborn to size 6 are eligible to register for this free program.

Nursing students will complete an assessment, educate families on growth milestones, discuss nutrition options for babies and immunization schedules, provide referral for local resources and provide free diapers. Twice during the program participants will receive free produce and recipes.

The program will begin Thursday, September 22 and run through Thursday, December 15. Visits will occur twice a month on Thursdays between the hours of 9 a.m. and 3 p.m. Beginning Thursday, September 15, student nurses will call program participants to schedule their specific time slots. Residents who keep all of their appointments will be eligible for a special prize at the end of the program. 
The ensemble performs a variety of music ranging from traditional choral music, including sea chanteys and patriotic fare, to opera, Broadway and contemporary music.

He is survived by his wife of 59 years, Gladys; children Robert Howey, Peggy (Chris) Carley, Debra (John Gordon) Keats, Kim (George) Cox and John Howey; sister Linda (Joe) Houser; grandchildren Michael (Stacey) Howey, Katrina (Scott) Kuster, Christopher (Samantha) Carley, Sarah (Sam Lobos) Amaya, Tiffany (Nick) Zook, Ashley Ruehl, Sadie Howey, Gerald Ruehl, and Jasmine Howey; and 11 greatgrandchildren. He was preceded in death by his parents, Robert and Eva Howey, and his daughter, Tina Marie.

Mr. Howey's parents were one of the first families in Greenbelt; his father helped build the city. As referenced in the December 29, 1937, News Review, he played the Baby Jesus in Greenbelt's first Christmas Pageant.

Mr. Howey served in the Marine Corps early in his life. He joined the Metropolitan Police Department and later retired from the Uniformed Division Secret Service as a lieutenant. ### <u>In Memoriam</u> Robert T. Sommers

**Robert T. Sommers** 

Robert T. (Bob) Sommers, the last member of Greenbelt's pioneer Sommers family, died June 16, 2016 in Annapolis, at the age of 91. At a memorial service at Kalas Funeral Home in Edgewater on August 13, representatives from the military, Greenbelt American Legion Post 136, the

Greenbelt Museum and the College Park Moose Lodge gave tribute to his service in those organizations. His three children told stories of his life in the categories of sports, patriotism and family.

Mr. and Mrs. James J. Sommers and their four sons, James, William, Robert and Richard, moved to Greenbelt from Reading, Pa. in early 1938 as original residents of 9-M Ridge Road. Mr. Sommers Senior, a World War I veteran, was a charter member of Greenbelt Post 136 of the American Legion. Mrs. Sommers became a Gold Star Mother in 1943 when their son William died while serving in the Navy in the South Pacific.

All four boys graduated from Greenbelt High School (GHS): James in 1941, William and Bob in 1942 and Dick in 1945. James later became a Trappist monk, known as Brother James. Youngest brother Dick was a

close friend of my late husband Henry McFarland; he was best man at our wedding in 1949 and godfather for our first child. Dick died of heart disase while still in  $\frac{1}{2}$  his sixties.

From an early age, Bob Sommers' interests were baseball and basketball. His mentors were Ben Goldfaden and

Vincent Holochwost of the town's Recreation Department, and he was an original member of the Grizzlies, a group of alumni of the GHS sports teams which is still in existence today. At GHS, he was manager of the basketball team. In the official history book about Greenbelt, which is sold in the Greenbelt Museum, Bob's photo is there twice on page 90, with both baseball and basketball teams. In later years, he served as a timekeeper for the University of Maryland basketball games. I always watched for him when the games were televised.

But perhaps the most famous role for Bob was his appearance in the film The City, which was shown at the 1939 World's Fair and is now studied as a resource for planned communities everywhere. In the several scenes of boys riding bikes through an underpass and all around town, Bob

### City Summer Help Program Helps Participants, City

The Greenbelt Department of Public Works Summer Help Program was revitalized last year, having offered temporary employment to individuals in the 1970s through the early 1980s. In its second year, the program saw increased productivity in 2016. Joe Doss, who started his career as summer help and is now supervisor of playgrounds, stated that the department "is able to handle a much bigger workload thanks to the additional summer help staffing." The importance of summer help cannot be overstated, as it plays a key role in meeting the city's needs and the department's goals, he said.

Summer help assists public works achieve its mission of maintaining and beautifying Greenbelt's green spaces, parks and outdoor recreational areas. Despite record-breaking heat, the additional staffing improved the department's response time to cutting grass, maintaining roadways, chipping and re-painting curbs, using thermoplastic for road markings, among many other essential public services.

Public Works is dedicated to preserving Greenbelt's legacy as a planned community through caring for the community infrastructure. Summer help in the horticulture crew and the parks crew keeps landscaped areas attractive and playgrounds safe. Summer help in the streets crew maintains sidewalks, bike lanes and roadways for use by pedestrians, bicyclists and vehicles alike.

Quinn McCracken, a master of fine arts student, described his summer help experience on the streets crew as a "New Deal type job in a New Deal place." McCracken was particularly proud of his role in bike path maintenance with the installation of new sharrows (shared-lane marking). McCracken recognized the significance that "kids will be grateful for having a better way to get to school" thanks to the bright new sharrows indicating where riders should cycle. Summer help is a truly unique employment opportunity to restore and conserve Greenbelt's historic heritage as a walkable,

Joshua Eggleston, an undergraduate film student living at home in Greenbelt for the summer, enjoyed "being a part of making the city look nice and giving back to the community." Eggleston said that he learned first-hand that the streets crew is 'very hard work and takes a lot of sweat and time." Thanks to his film background, Eggleston captured footage of staff in action that will be released at a later date.

The summer help program provides valuable career training and opens all kinds of doors for talented, young professionals. Leo Donovan had never used a chainsaw before serving on the parks crew. Donovan gained the practical experience and confidence using a chainsaw that are necessary for his career path as he works towards becoming a firefighter. Not only do the city and its residents benefit, but also the summer help learns valuable skills and gains real-world experience.

McCracken, Eggleston and Donovan unanimously agreed that their favorite parts of public works are the camaraderie and the approachability of staff within the department. Summer help reinforces the department's commitment to offer valuable community services and educational opportunities. Public works is proud to provide career training for qualified participants interested in learning about horticulture, parklands, street maintenance, mechanics, geographic information systems and more.

### Pat Mische's Garden

One of the finest art exhibits in Old Greenbelt is Pat Mische's garden. A recent resident of GHI, Pat moved in close to my home on Ridge Road. I walked by her house while the garden went through its beginning makeover, and watched with great interest as the place became transformed.

Now it is a true masterpiece of beauty. So when I asked Pat if she would like me to write a review of her artwork, she invited me over to her outdoor table, where we drank cold tea made from the mint leaves from her garden and munched on sweet cookies. My dog Epi was also included and she sat with us, very happy with her share of the sweet meats.

The circular table set with eight chairs is surrounded by planter trellises providing a very nice private area. In the planters, coleus and canna are blooming. Pat explained how she created the beautiful beds of flowers which

stored in some cool place so they won't freeze."

Pat pointed out that her honeysuckle vines come back every year. "They turn brown and straggly and look like they're dead, but they're not" she said. Pat tries to attract as many bees, birds, and butterflies as she can. She mentioned that these creatures especially like daisies, honeysuckle, zinnias, bee balm, asters and salvia. The big step is putting the little tiny plants which emerge from the seeds into the soil.

"It's amazing", said Pat, "that some of the seeds are so

small you can barely see them, yet they grow into strong healthy vegetation."

Among these are the 'little miracles" of carrots and peppers. Pat uses plastic cups and cuts the bottoms out of them digs a hole and places the cup inside it. These are the cabbages, Brussel sprouts, cauliflower and tomatoes. But radishes, peas and cucumbers can go directly into the ground. Pat said that tomatoes and cabbages have to be put in a different lace every year because

"The plant tells me what it needs to be living in tune with nature, and I try to serve the plant as well as I can."

Every plant is an expression of the infinite. Some of the plants must be moved. Plants like marigolds sometimes like to be next to tomatoes and beans. Marigolds infuse something through their roots.

Transplanting is a very sensitive time for the plants. Pat men-



tioned that little plants can go into shock when transplanted; it is their most sensitive time. There are the natural enemies to consider. Also the wind or rain can knock them over and the cut worms, bugs and caterpillars can eat them.

As we walked around the garden Pat showed me the beautiful stepping stones artistically created by her grandchildren and the lovely statues she has placed in her flower beds. She mentioned that each statue was chosen to represent the characteristics of her grandchildren. These added another dimension of beauty and joy in the overall plan of the garden. It is truly a very special haven; something Pat has created with the skill of a sensitive and knowledgeable artist.



surround her house and spill out into the front yard. She grows most of her things from seed and told of how she starts the seeds in almost any kind of container including egg shells, cups or trays. She uses a seed starter type of soil. She puts these containers in a place where a grow-light can shine on them, a window or a nice, sunny spot.

"It's very time-consuming," Pat explained, "but a wonderful hobby." Planting bulbs is a different kind of approach, and Pat said that many of her daffodils and shrubs grow for 20 years. The trees are also in this category, "Cannas have to be lifted out of their soil in the fall and of the soil depletion, and also because of the cutworms and caterpillars. "Sometimes I feel like a servant," Pat confesses.

Sit in the shop on a Friday and you'll see people come and go, hear any number of people chatting and laughing, either with their stylist or other customers or both. Some read magazines as they sit carefully tucked under a dryer. Some stop in just to say hello or get a cup of coffee.

Then there are those who come just to get a shampoo from "angel hands". That's Jenny Arias, Maria's younger daughter, who customers dubbed angel hands because of her heavenly shampoos. She works part-time at the shop and has been popping in and out of there since childhood. Some customers have been coming to Maria's for so long they remember Jenny as a baby. Even more have watched her grow up, marry and have her own children, Alicia and Janelise. They visit the shop too, as their mother did. Maria's other daughter, Laura Wyman, is a career woman. At the age of 17 she announced she wanted the same salary as men make, and now she does. She and her husband gave Maria a granddaughter, Zoe.

#### Customers

Ten-year customer Catherine Rodrigues Dean lives in Lanham and found out about Maria from people at her church in Bowie and her sister-in-law. Another Lanham resident, Eleanor Hipsley, comes every Friday. When asked for how long, she thought for a minute and said, "Gee whiz, about 15 or 20 years." When asked why, she replied, "Just look at my hair today! That's why." (Later, both she and Maria decided it was time for a permanent.) As Maria brought her a cup of coffee Hipsley said, "Maria gives me service with a smile." She and others, including Maria, laughed. Another 10-year customer, Pat Kelly, who also comes in weekly, added, "Maria makes us all beautiful." Again, more laughter from that corner of the room.

Suddenly Maria whispered to this reporter that the lady coming through the door is Maria Snoddy and she has been coming to Maria's shop for more than 41 years. Prior to opening her salon, Maria Wyman worked for Bernard Brooks, owner of an earlier beauty shop then located on the second floor of Roosevelt Center, over what is now Beijing restaurant. Maria left there in 1976 to open her own, current salon.

Within minutes of Maria Snoddy coming in, Pauline Bordas arrived. The two have been best friends since childhood and each has been a customer of Maria's for more than 40 years. They each are second generation customers. Prior to Maria's Beauty Shop, their mothers went to the salon owned by Brooks and took their daughters there too, where Maria did their hair. When Maria left to open her own shop, the Snoddy and Bordas families followed her to her new, sidewalk-level location. Snoddy describes Maria as spiritual, kind and sweet. Others agree and say they just love her. Maria says she loves every one of them too, "even the ones who give me a hard time." Everyone laughs, knowing Maria is her same, steady self no matter who or what. Family is how customers describe Maria and other stylists, as they in turn describe customers.

third generation families also, the Chotiners and Maddens. Therese Madden Stringfellow boasts that her mother Kitty was the first person to walk through the door when Maria's Beauty Salon opened in 1976. A more recent person is Lucy, who at the mention of Maria's name said, "wonderful woman." She's been coming for about five years. Her mother, also a Maria customer, sent her there.

Maria doesn't always answer to the name Maria. Customers have other names for her, such as Angel Maria, Taxi Driver Maria, when she picks up nearby customers whose rides to the shop fell through, and Psychologist Maria. She's also Dr. Maria. One customer who had a terrible cough for three weeks would not make an appointment with her doctor, fearing the wait would be too long. With some nudging she gave Maria her doctor's phone number. Maria called and the customer was seen that day and treated. Flying Fingers attests to her speed when the customer has little time. She got the moniker Hair Whisperer after customers teased that she can cut hair blindfolded. Maria laughed, but she tried it one day, just to see if she could. She could.

Maria knows a lot. When asked about appointments, she said, "It's all in here," as she pointed to her head. She doesn't need an appointment book. She remembers names and phone numbers and even styles of customers who have been gone for years.

Over those 40 years, Maria has seen customers die, go to nursing homes, leave to live with their children or move away. Just as Maria doesn't forget her customers, her customers don't forget her. Two of them made extraordinary efforts to tell Maria what impact she made on their lives. Jennifer, who had moved to Germany years ago, stopped in to see Maria when she returned stateside and was passing through Maryland. She said she had to stop by to tell Maria that she "is 15 years late" telling her how much she appreciated everything Maria had done for her. She was equally grateful for the chance to thank Maria in person after so many years.

Jodi was the other person. A few years ago when Maria came to the shop to open up early, she

noticed a man and a woman sitting in a car in front of the door to her shop. She thought that was odd because other businesses had not yet opened. She went inside and they followed. Jodi told her that she had moved out-of-state 31 years ago and that for 31 years of her life Maria has been on her mind. She was visiting the area and wanted to stop in to thank her for giving her her first job. The woman's husband piped up, yes, she really does think about her all this time.

#### Staff

One person didn't get hired when she went to Maria hoping for her first job. Donna Price told her mother she wanted to be a beautician and she was so disappointed when Maria said, "No, honey, I can't hire you." The reason was that Donna was only 11 years old. When she reached high school she was accepted into the 3-year cosmetology program at Laurel High School, from which she graduated in 1985. She went back to Maria, said "I have my license now," and began working there in October of 1985, more than 30 years ago. Even though Donna has moved in and out of the area at times she still has a chair at Maria's. She talks about how she and Maria and the other stylists and customers have gone through weddings, births, deaths, divorces and life's happenings together over the years. Donna now cuts the hair of college-age students and adults she remembers coming to her as children.

Debbie Matlak has been a stylist in three shops for 17 years. Maria's is her third, where she has been the last seven years. "Maria's is more than a beauty shop," she says, "It's like family." This phrase is repeated over and over again by customers and staff. Debbie is adamant that Maria's is her last shop and she wouldn't work anywhere else. Customers take pictures of themselves with stylists, to put in family albums.

Mimi Hui Yim has lived in the Greenbelt area for more than 25 years and has been at Maria's for about five years. She likes everything about the shop and customers and is happy to be there. Maria

Due to his perseverance and skill, Kumar has represented the U.S. in international table tennis competitions as part of the Paralympic Program. During the tournament he will demonstrate his prowess and accept challenges from all who dare.

Beltway Plaza continues to expand, with new tenants Fallas and 5 Below, more sponsored events such as the Greenbelt Blues Festival and National Night Out and sponsored community groups like the Greenbelt Fraternal Order of Police and Students Against Destructive Decisions. On Friday, August 12, Theresa and Karl Skaggs celebrated their upcoming retirement with family, friends, co-workers and employers with tears, laughter and a tiny little tractor. The couple, who met while they were both working for the city of Greenbelt, are both retiring on August 31 after 30 years in Human Resources (HR) for Theresa and 35 years in the Public Works department for Karl.

It was an emotional night because these two employees "embody what I call the Greenbelt way," said Theresa's current boss Mary Johnson, the director of Human Resources. Johnson recalled when her home burned down on one of the coldest nights of the year. She turned around in the parking lot to find the Skaggses with a bag of supplies including clothing for her son and a hair dryer for Johnson. "She's been that for all employees," said Johnson. "Her title is Human Resources Specialist but she is so much more." Johnson explained that Theresa has helped every city employee for the last 30 years. "She's retired over 100 of our employees. Theresa's been a confidant to many employees, a friend to many employees and always lends an ear," she said. An example Johnson shared was when Theresa used her own leave to take an injured employee to physical therapy when the employee could not drive. "You can train people in HR but kindness and empathy and being comfortable talking to people, that's not something you can train in people," she stated.

assistant director of Public Works said, "They won't get another one like Karl." Phelan talked about Karl's creativity and talent in producing a variety of projects, including stone benches, the stone patio at the lake, the stone walkway up to the Community Center and the numerous adopta-benches around town. When talking about the adopt-a-benches that Skaggs and his co-workers have built, Karl said for him, "It wasn't just a task. It was somebody's mother, or somebody's father, somebody's family member."

Karl has also put a lot of time into building and maintaining infrastructure of our community, such as mowing the ball fields, building bus shelters and bridges and renovating the movie theater. Karl said he wanted "to give people a place to sit and think and to find some peace 'cause the world's kind of hectic."

Greenbelt Mayor Emmett Jordan presented the Skaggses each with a plaque, a check and a gift. The city councilmembers talked about Theresa's friendliness, Karl's humor and the dedication both showed in their positions. Councilmember Edward Putens talked about how Karl was a strong advocate for the public works employees and department. Councilmember Judith Davis explained how Theresa was always there when you needed her, no matter how busy she was, she was always welcoming.

Theresa and Karl's direct bosses also gave them plaques and cards. Karl's third plaque of the evening was presented to him by his co-workers. It featured a small tractor similar to the one Karl drove when he maintained the city fields.

Karl and Theresa share a giving mindset. Karl said, "Ever since I was a kid I've got more pleasure out of giving somebody a gift than receiving one and I'm still that way to this day." Theresa's mindset is similar. When asked about her job, Theresa said, "It's like family so you just help as much as you can, whoever you can. You do what you need to do to help them."

During their retirement they will still be helping out. They are moving to West Virginia to help Karl's elderly stepfather on the family's farm. They also have plans to travel and visit family both in and out of Greenbelt.

Theresa said she was too overcome to say much or read her speech or even give it to someone else to read. Karl was emotional when he spoke to the crowd of over 100 friends, coworkers and family. Karl said, "This wasn't just a place to come to work eight hours a day for the last 35 years. This community raised my family." Pointing to Theresa, Karl says, "That was the greatest thing the city gave me."

is the boy who has a flat tire. As a docent for the Greenbelt Museum, Bob was in great demand to tell the story of the filming of those scenes, how his mother had to wash his shirt every day so he could look the same for the next day's filming. Even in his senior years, Bob always had a role in the Museum's floats in the Labor Day Parade.

Bob joined the Army soon after graduating from GHS and became a paratrooper, serving in the European theater during World War II. After completing active duty as a sergeant, he joined the National Guard, earning the rank of first lieutenant. He was an early member of Greenbelt's American Legion Post 136. After retiring from his 43-year career as a technician in the C&P Telephone Company, he became even more active in the Legion. He was present at every Memorial Day and Veterans Day activity and often brought his collection of Army photos and

memorabilia to display at Legion events. He had many friends through his associations with sports and the military and was known as a great talker and teller of stories, especially about the early days of Greenbelt.

Bob is survived by his wife of 65 years, Doris Sommers; sons Gary of Middletown, Md. and Randy of Elizabeth City, N.C.; daughter Jody Sommers of Annapolis and Atlantic Beach, Fla.; three grandsons and two granddaughters. At the memorial service, Randy told of wanting to be a paratrooper like his dad, influencing his choice to join the Army Special Forces and become a Green Beret. Grandson Kyle (Gary's son), who was a member of the Army honor guard at the service, has served in Afghanistan and is currently training to be a helicopter pilot.

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### **Open Mic Newlyweds** Celebrate at New Deal

James Riordon, who has hosted a monthly open mic at the New Deal Café in Greenbelt since 2000, and Martha Heil, cohost since 2006, celebrated their courthouse wedding at an open mic on August 11.

Riordon has lived in Greenbelt since he bought an apartment in Greenbriar Condominiums, across the hall from then mayor Judith Davis. In 2006, he and Heil bought a GHI home. They now live in one of GHI's freestanding units.

The couple are both science writers, he for the American Physical Society and she for the Maryland NanoCenter, both located in College Park. He was the president of the D.C. Science Writers Association in 2008.

Their wedding clothes reflected each other's interests. The groom wore Betabrand's Haeckeloha shirt, a tribute to the drawings of Ernst Haeckel, a 19th century biologist and Darwin contemporary, whose drawings of embryos helped establish evolutionary biology. This is a nod to the bride's work in upholding the teaching of evolution in public school classrooms through service on the board of the National Center for Science Education.

The bride wore a dress with a design of the data from the Laser Interferometer Gravitational-Wave Observatory (LIGO) experiment, which Riordon promoted when the papers announcing the results were published by his employer earlier this year. He also launched the Einstein@Home distributed computing experiment, in which LIGO data is sent to participants' computers for analysis to find gravitational waves. The experiment detected gravitational waves created by the Big Bang.

He stayed with the Maryland Boychoir through the eighth grade, the same year he reprised his role in Amahl and the Night Visitors, this time at the Kennedy Center with the Washington Opera. "That was probably the best thing I had done up to that point," Edwards reflected. "It was a completely professional production, amazing sets and costumes, live animals, and at the time I thought it was neat, but I also thought it was normal. Now I look back and I think, wow, I did not understand how big of a deal that was!"

After university, where he majored in music, Edwards did contract work with Tokyo Disney Resort for five years before joining the Sea Chanters in 2006. All group members have jobs in addition to singing: finance, public affairs, planning national tours, etc. Edwards is in charge of programs. He has also been able to bring in some of his own arrangements and compositions; although the Navy Band has professional arrangers, there are opportunities for group members to create their own pieces.

"There are 11 United States Navy Bands throughout the world," Edwards said. One of those bands is in D.C. Its mission is to support the President and other high-ranking government and military officials, providing musical support at ceremonies, public concerts, funerals and events. The communication manager for the U.S. Navy Band, Senior Chief Musician Melissa Bishop, explained by email that the chorus also "participates in public outreach activities for the Navy, representing the sailors deployed around the world, around the clock. Throughout their history, the Sea Chanters have remained true to the Navy's watchwords of pride and professionalism, and they continue to flourish as a vibrant ensemble." The Sea Chanters mount a tour once a year to a different region of the country; in Spring of 2016 they were in New England and in 2017 they will tour the Upper Midwest. The tour "is probably

one of my favorite things we do all year," said Edwards. "We get to perform for every kind of person across the U.S.; it's definitely a great honor."

For young people interested in music or theater, Edwards encourages them to "do as many different kinds of music - and if you're into acting, as many different types of plays -as you can; while you have the chance to do it, do it! When you walk into an audition, they want to hire somelot of experience under your belt, that's only going to help you."

While Edwards didn't originally plan to join the military he turned 30 in boot camp - he found that "it's the perfect fit" for him. "I get to sing good music every day with people I like, I get to serve my country and I get paid for that!"
