Chief Richard Bowers, during the Greenbelt City Council meeting on August 12, applauded police department employees for their actions during the April incident at Schrom Hills Park when five teens were wounded by gunfire. These employees

went above and beyond normal service in terms of providing life-saving first aid, securing the scene and performing the ensuing investigation. Bowers recognized them with three types of awards: (i) letters of commendation, (ii) Class One commendations and

(iii) Silver Star awards.

Those receiving letters of commendation were: Evidence Specialist Maria Auchter, Public Information Officer Ricardo Dennis, Officer Andrew Ordaz,

PGCPS Bus Transportation Update

Prince George's County Public Schools (PGCPS) outlined changes last week to better streamline school bus transportation ahead of the upcoming 2024-25 school year. These updates come after the many problems with bus transportation that marred the first

day of the 2023-24 school year. An ensuing audit of the PGCPS transportation system identified specific issues that are now being addressed.

In an effort to "ensure the safe, efficient and punctual transportation" of students, PGCPS introduced a new bell schedule for every school in the system. Greenbelt Elementary will shift to an 8:30 a.m. arrival and a 2:40 p.m. dismissal. Greenbelt Middle School will begin at 9:30 a.m. and dismiss at 4:10 p.m. while Eleanor Roosevelt High School students will start at 8:30 a.m. and end at 3:10 p.m.

Along with updated bell times for all PGCPS schools, some bus stop locations will be moved in an effort to consolidate stops. Prior to this upcoming school

year, 76 percent of students who are eligible for transportation – 65,000 – had a bus stop located 0.24 mile or less away from their home residence. The new plan increases the average distance for students to walk to their bus stop to 0.46 mile. New walking zones in which students are not considered to need bus transportation have been designated for this school year. Students in these zones who live close to their designated school and

Prince George's Public Schools Will Open Monday, August 26

For the 2024-2025 school year, Prince George's County Public Schools (PGCPS) has a new student information system, Synergy. Parents are asked to create an account in Synergy's ParentVUE portal, where they can register students for classes and access information on class schedules, test scores, attendance and transportation. Resources for learning to use ParentVUE can be found at tinyurl.com/parentvue-support and through links on each school's website. Anyone who doesn't have access to a computer can visit the school to register students.

New Student Orientation

This Friday, August 23, is Student Orientation Day for all new and transitioning students. Each school will provide details on times.

Transportation

To prevent past problems with school bus transportation, PGCPS has made several changes. The number of students using the buses will be reduced by increasing the size of walking zones around each school. Once parents have set up their ParentVUE portal, they can download the Stopfinder app, which allows tracking of

On Screen at Greenbelt Cinema

Fly Me to the Moon

Starring Scarlett Johansson and Channing Tatum, the film is a stylish romantic comedy set against the high-stakes backdrop of NASA’s historic Apollo 11 moon landing. When she is brought in to fix NASA’s public image, sparks fly in all directions as marketing maven Kelly Jones (Johansson) wreaks havoc on launch director Cole Davis’s (Tatum) already difficult task. When the White House deems the mission too important to fail, the countdown truly begins.

Didi

In 2008, during the last month of summer before high school begins, an impressionable 13-year-old Taiwanese American boy learns what his family can’t teach him: how to skate, how to flirt and how to love your mom. Critic’s consensus: “A semi-autobiographical love letter to teenage angst that’s also slyly self-critical, [the film] is a deeply moving personal statement by writer-director Sean Wang.”

Crotchety retired doctor Isak Borg (Victor Sjöström) travels from Stockholm to Lund, Sweden, with his pregnant and unhappy daughter-in-law, Marianne (Ingrid Thulin), in order to receive an honorary degree from his alma mater. Along the way, they encounter a series of hitchhikers, each of whom causes the elderly doctor to muse upon the pleasures and failures of his own life. These include the vivacious young Sara (Bibi Andersson), a dead ringer for the doctor’s own first love.

The Song Remains the Same

Filmed in 1973 over the course of a three-night stand at New York City’s Madison Square Garden, this concert film shows Led Zeppelin at the apogee of their hard-rocking glory. In addition to featuring such indelible hits as Dazed and Confused, Whole Lotta Love and Stairway to Heaven, the live footage is interspersed with elaborate fantasy sequences, backstage shenanigans and a glimpse of what the business side of such a large touring operation entails.

school bus locations in real time. All PGCPS students can also now ride The Bus free of charge with their school ID, without needing to register in advance. (For more school bus information, see story on page 1.)

Immunizations

Immunizations are required for all students to attend school. The rule is no shots, no school, no exceptions. For families who lack insurance or whose insurance doesn't cover immunizations, the county offers immunizations on a sliding-fee scale at the Cheverly Health Center, 3003 Hospital Drive, Cheverly, and the Laurel Clinic, 14207 Park Center Drive, Laurel, on Mondays through Fridays from 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. More information can be found at pgcps.org/immunizations.

Backpacks

Clear backpacks are required for all students in grades 9 through 12 and in nontraditional programs. They are optional for students in grades 6 through 8. Students may carry a small, non-transparent pouch inside the backpack for personal items.

have a safe pedestrian route will not receive bus transportation to and from school. The PGCPS is working with county agencies, including crossing guard units, the Department of Public Works & Transportation, and school resource officers, to ensure that these walk zones will be safe for students. According to Transportation Director Keba Baldwin, the school system and these agencies will meet once a month to review the new procedures.

Families also have the option to opt out of receiving bus transportation, such as for students who will receive daily rides to and from school or are student drivers. The school system received around 3,000 opt-out requests in a survey sent to parents,

said Baldwin.

Those who utilize bus transportation during the school year can download the Stopfinder App. The app is described as offering GPS tracking of buses, notifications when a bus picks up and drops off students and notifications when buses are running late.

These updates to transportation are part of the school system's "Phase 1" that will be completed during the current school year, with more improvements during "Phase 2" to come during the 2025-26 school year.

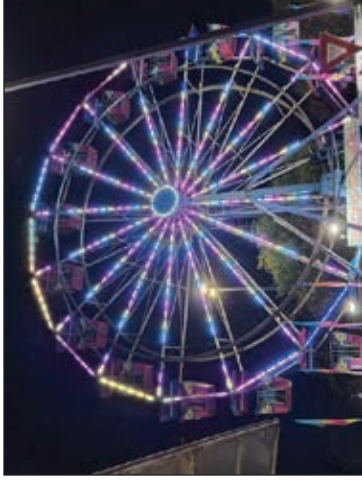

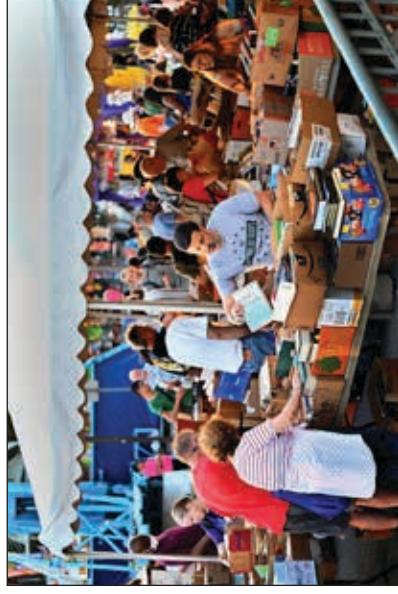

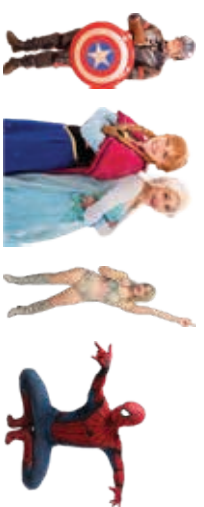

Council Addresses Wide Agenda

The Greenbelt City Council met on Monday, August 12 to cover a multitude of issues including state and county legislation, speed cameras, fire and EMS coverage, Greenbelt Police Department initiatives, online bill pay for residents, and equipment and file digitization purchases. Council began by commending Greenbelt police officers for their response to the Schrom Hills Park shooting in April 2024. (See separate story, page 1.)

Legislative Summary

Darrell Carrington of Carrington and Associates provided an overview of the 2024 Maryland legislative session and implications for next year. (The firm advises the city on county and state legislation.) Highlighted legislation included a law imposing higher fines for street racing and exhibition driving, a bill allowing civilians to review speed camera data and a rent stabilization bill for Prince George's County. He noted that next year the state is facing a structural budget deficit while simultaneously the state and counties will begin implementing the Blueprint for Maryland's Future to improve student performance and education quality; thus there may be increases in fees or taxes.

Mayor Emmett Jordan asked about a county bill that would give municipalities more authority in terms of planning and zoning efforts. Carrington felt that this bill (HB1059) is unlikely to move forward because there is no appetite on the county council to give this authority to municipalities.

School Zone Camera Law

In the past Maryland legislative session bill HB364 passed, which permits the county to place cameras on stop signs near schools. The bill allows "stop sign monitoring systems on state and local highways situated within school zones" and is designed to promote safety by preventing drivers from ignoring stop signs in school zones. The bill requires the county council to pass enabling legislation to guide establishment of these systems, which Prince George's County Council is expected to take up next month and approve.

Councilmember Jenni Pompei has been tracking the law and asked where the cameras would be, how many would be allowed and if the county would provide funds for the system. Since the county council has yet to write the enabling legislation, these technical details remain to be clarified.

Jordan suggested writing a letter of support to the county council regarding this upcoming legislation, and a motion passed to do so.

Fire and EMS

City Manager Josué Salmerón reported that the city continues to seek a legal and administrative resolution to the county fire department's removal of career firefighters from Greenbelt. Legal counsel has filed an amended complaint and an opposition to the county's motion to dismiss the suit filed by Greenbelt and other municipalities.

Jordan wanted to assure the public "that a huge amount of work is going on behind the scenes to try and make sure that Engine Company 35 is staffed" and that there is adequate fire

and EMS protection for the community.

Pompi added that they have not received raw data from the county fire department regarding this decision nor have they received the report that actually determined how the county was going to reallocate staff.

Online Bill Pay, Fees

The city is ready to launch an online bill pay system that would allow Greenbelt residents to access, schedule and securely pay their bills online. However, when paying with a credit card or other electronic payment system there is generally a fee associated with the payment. The question posed to council was whether the city should cover those fees or should the fees be covered by the residents paying the bills. The city currently pays transaction fees on behalf of Greenbelt residents when they participate in other city-sponsored programs in the recreation, code enforcement and police departments.

This led to a discussion among council about what the costs for this would be in the future (the total cost for the first year could be up to \$50,000). Councilmember Rodney Roberts felt that it is probably not appropriate for the city to cover these fees. Councilmember Amy Knesel pointed out that this cost would never go away and that consumers are already accustomed to paying such fees. She wanted to make sure that residents can still pay via check without a fee and City Treasurer Bertha Gaymon affirmed that they can do so.

Councilmembers agreed that the online bill pay system should move forward with residents covering their own credit card fees.

License Plate Readers

Police Chief Richard Bowers provided an update on the License Plate Reader (LPR) Camera System and a draft policy for the

system, which will be reviewed by the Public Safety Advisory Committee. This system is designed to record license plates to identify stolen vehicles, locate suspects and track vehicles associated with criminal activity. The plan is to place eight cameras along roads in the city. Bowers provided a map showing tentative locations. To minimize costs, some cameras may be mounted on PEPCO poles. There will be a meeting with the contractor in September to begin planning the installation.

Jordan and Councilmember Kristen Weaver posed questions regarding camera locations. Bowers said the locations are limited by cost but that in the future cameras could be moved.

Weaver wanted to ensure good communication about this system with the public, especially in terms of data retention and who has access to the data. Bowers responded that the department is planning sessions to meet with residents.

The draft policy states that data collected by the system will be used only for law enforcement purposes and access to the data would be restricted to authorized personnel. Historical data would not be retained by the city. After 24 hours, locally stored LPR data would be deleted and become the property of the Maryland Coordination and Analysis Center.

Body Cameras Contract

Staff recommended that the city council authorize the city manager to execute a five-year contract with Axon Enterprise, Inc., for body-worn cameras, digital evidence management, less-than-lethal weapons and associated training, at a total cost of \$737,151.90. The current contract with Axon expires at the end of the year.

Registration Remains Open For Curbside Composting

Registration remains open for Greenbelt households to receive free curbside food scrap collection for 12 months in a program sponsored by the City of Greenbelt.

Signup for the program is on a first-come, first-served basis. Residents should register on the Compost Crew website at this link – customers.compostcrew.com/subscribe – or by scanning the QR code with this article.

The program is open to all Greenbelt residents, who may join individually or in combination with close-by neighbors to help fill the seven-gallon bin for weekly pickup. After a \$20 one-time charge to purchase the collection bin, pickup service for 12 months is free. New households will join the 200 that started in February.

Compost Crew, a locally owned food-scrap recycling business, will pick up food scraps weekly and deliver them to their compost processing facility, named Compost Outpost, at Trinity Assembly of God Church on Good Luck Road. High-quality compost will be returned to Greenbelt for use as a soil-improving additive in community gardens and public spaces. Composting will reduce food waste

going to the landfill and lower greenhouse gas emissions coming from the landfill.

How Does Old Greenbelt Figure In the Childless Cat Lady Stakes?

Recent political rhetoric has disparaged a group of people who are described by a certain political candidate as “childless cat ladies.” The question before us is whether the speaker realized that Greenbelt is a cat lady hot spot and how that might affect the vote.

A childless cat lady is perhaps defined as an older female who has zero children (by choice or chance) and one or more cats (or who supports roving cats). Indeed, a number of the News Review’s members might reasonably be tagged as cat ladies – and are proud of it.

The housing epicenter of Greenbelt, the cooperative known as GHI, is a particularly suitable habitat for such persons. Cats have immediate outside access (for those running free), the houses are relatively small and affordable (perfect for a woman and her cat) and the monthly co-op fee takes care of most maintenance so

a resident male is of little obvious value. It is a place where a woman and her cat can flourish.

Greenbelt is likely, therefore, to be disproportionately populated with cat ladies – and here is the flaw for the remark’s propagator – they have the time to vote (as they are not constantly appeasing husbands and children). Frankly, cat ladies are people any politician with half a brain should take seriously, avoid offending and, if possible, recruit to their campaigns.

Whether cat ladies are intrinsically more inclined to vote Republican or Democratic is unknown but since their sympathies would be clearly with the under-cat, it seems likely that the offending remark may move the overall vote leftward for all but the most intransigent.

A man who does not respect cat ladies should not hold the reins of power.

Transportation Plans, More Jobs: Greenbelt Prepares for the FBI

The FBI headquarters relocation promises the community increased public transportation and connectivity through extended ramps, increased run times for Metrorail’s Green Line and MARC trains, and the addition of more buses. It will bring jobs, too, but with them traffic and congestion, some fear.

The Greenbelt Metro

The northern Prince George’s County portion of Metro’s Green Line opened in December 1993 and connected West Hyattsville, Prince George’s Plaza, University of Maryland-College Park and Greenbelt stations to the D.C. Green Line stations and the other Metro lines. According to data from the U.S. Census Bureau, of the almost 25,000 people who reside in Greenbelt, nearly 11 percent commute to work using public transportation.

In determining that the Greenbelt site would be the most advantageous for the new FBI headquarters, the GSA found its proximity to the Greenbelt Metro Station to be crucial.

“People who come to work here in Greenbelt [at the] FBI, they will be able to take the Metro train, get off the train and walk directly to the site,” said Mayor Emmett Jordan. “It’s a fantastic walkable site; it’s also shovel-ready.”

The Greenbelt site will require the construction of the missing northbound access from the Capital Beltway to both the Metro station and the FBI site. Currently, the Greenbelt Metro Station has an entrance and exit ramp for commuters coming from the north, leaving the station inaccessible from the south side. Extending ramps to the Beltway is part of the plan when construction begins for the new headquarters, stated Jordan.

“That’s going to make Greenbelt Station a bit more accessible off the highway,” said City Manager Josué Salmerón, speaking of the newest neighborhood in Greenbelt. In addition, Salmerón said the plan includes “an expansion of the Greenbelt Station Parkway [to connect] Greenbelt Road to the Metro station.”

The extension of Greenbelt Station Parkway is intended to improve accessibility for nearby Greenbelt residents and those who will be working at the FBI headquarters.

“The folks have now been living in [Greenbelt Station], in this beautiful neighborhood, for quite some time,” said Jordan. “I think it’s going to be a shock to them [when] the road from the Beltway is finally completed and extends all the way up to Greenbelt Road.”

Residents’ Concerns

Expansions may come with drawbacks, however. Specifically, traffic congestion.

“We already have incredibly high traffic volume through Greenbelt,” said Marion Holland, a resident of Greenbelt Homes, Inc. She added that with 7,500 FBI employees commuting to and from work daily, the traffic will only get worse.

“Other roads would have to be reconfigured, widened and changed in various ways, or else we’re going to see a lot heavier traffic,” said Stephen Holland, a former member of the Transit Riders United group for Greenbelt.

Traffic is a real concern among city officials and residents. Jordan notes that the city will do what it can to alleviate the increased traffic congestion. The Green Line and the MARC train will likely run more often, and there will be more buses.

Job Creation

Two of GSA’s criteria for deciding the headquarters relocation were “advancing racial equity and support for underserved communities through the federal government” and “strengthening the vitality and livability of the communities in which federal facilities are located.”

According to the site selection decision summary provided by GSA, Greenbelt allows for the greatest opportunity for economic development within historically underserved communities. The GSA reported that of the proposed sites, Fairfax County in Northern Virginia benefitted from \$377 billion of federal spending between 2012 and 2023, compared to Prince George’s County’s \$100 billion.

“This project is an important step toward undoing some of that disregard or lack of investment in our county,” said Salmerón.

“I think it’s going to bring much-needed money to the area,” said Didi Peck, longtime Greenbelt community member and vice president of the Greenbriar Condominiums HOA.

According to information provided by Prince George’s County Executive Angela Alsobrooks regarding the economic impact of the relocation, the new headquarters will bring a minimum of 7,500 jobs directly to the FBI and nearly 2,000 jobs indirectly to support the FBI’s presence.

“It’s going to be all kinds of different jobs,” said Jordan. “From service workers to FBI agents, technology workers, administrative jobs.”

The new site for the headquarters will also include mixed-use development, which includes retail, commercial, residential and

Deputy Police Chief Tim White reported that storage costs for managing digital evidence have increased since 2019 when the current contract began. The new contract includes upgrades to Taser 10 technology and virtual reality training using Oculus headsets.

Roberts asked about a device that wraps around the legs and was wondering if the department uses it because it seems safer compared to a Taser. White said that it is called a bolo and he hopes to get a test model for evaluation. The contract cost for Year 1 is \$136,774.58, which has been allocated in the approved Fiscal Year (FY) 2025 budget. Council voted to allow the city manager to execute the contract for the first year.

K-9 Engine Rebuild

Vehicle 607, a 2018 Chevy Tahoe assigned to the K-9 unit, needs engine repairs at a cost of \$16,396. When a check engine light repeatedly appeared, the vehicle was sent to Sport Chevrolet in Silver Spring which found that it needed extensive repairs.

Roberts wondered how one goes from a check engine light to an engine rebuild. He did not feel that this was a good deal for the public and objected to approving the funds. Council decided to table the issue to another meeting and get further input from Assistant Director of Public Works Brian Kim.

DEI and Climate Change

The Greenbelt Advisory Committee for Environmental Sustainability (Green ACES) sent a time-sensitive request asking council to sign a letter opposing efforts to add language to FY 2025 federal appropriation bills that would prevent funding of DEI and climate resilience efforts.

Greenbelt currently has efforts in these areas such as electric vehicle acquisition and infrastructure, carbon reduction goals and the DEI audit. Such language may limit the city's ability to acquire federal funds to support future projects in these areas. Weaver asked her colleagues to sign a letter opposing language by members of the U.S. House of Representatives that would restrict funds for DEI and addressing climate change. Council agreed.

File Digitization Project

Council voted to allow Salmerón to enter into a contract with e-ARC to provide file collection, file scanning and data integration for files in the Municipal Building, primarily in the administration and finance departments. This work, in conjunction with revision of the city's records retention policy, will eliminate 150 file boxes and allow better use of space in the city manager and finance offices. Salmerón said this is part of the overall modernization strategy to bring the city into the digital era. The proposed contractor e-ARC completed a test box and Salmerón said he was happy with the result. The contract is for \$64,172 and the

project will be completed by the end of 2024 or early 2025.

Jordan wanted to know how the files were being tagged and made accessible. Salmerón said the city instituted a Dewey Decimal System years ago. However, with optical character recognition software the file is tagged and the city can do further tagging via Microsoft SharePoint (the information sharing system). Greenbelt is moving toward the Microsoft 365 platform (which includes SharePoint) for storing data in the cloud.

Pompi wanted to know if the contractor would destroy the paper records. Salmerón responded that the records would eventually be destroyed but the city's records retention policy is currently being updated. As of now the contractors are holding the paper records, which will either be destroyed according to the city retention policy, sent to the Maryland State Archives or returned to the city.

Web Services

Council approved funds to renew the contract with Granicus Web Services for FY 2025 at a cost of \$42,214.39. Granicus

support includes publishing city council materials for public on-line access. This amount will be prorated and partially refunded when the city cancels the contract after migrating to a new website platform, if staff gives Granicus a 30-day cancellation notice. The migration to a new platform is expected to take approximately six to eight months.

Purchase Authority

Council will review any purchase of goods or services costing over \$10,000. Each year the city does business with vendors below this limit but over the course of the fiscal year may need to go above the limit. Therefore, a resolution was introduced that would authorize the purchases of goods and services from a known set of vendors where the cost usually exceeds \$10,000 over the fiscal year. Gaymon and her staff provided lists to council that identified the vendors the city may use in 2025, including new vendors.

Jordan pointed out that this is a first reading and asked councilmembers to review the lists before the question comes up again in September.

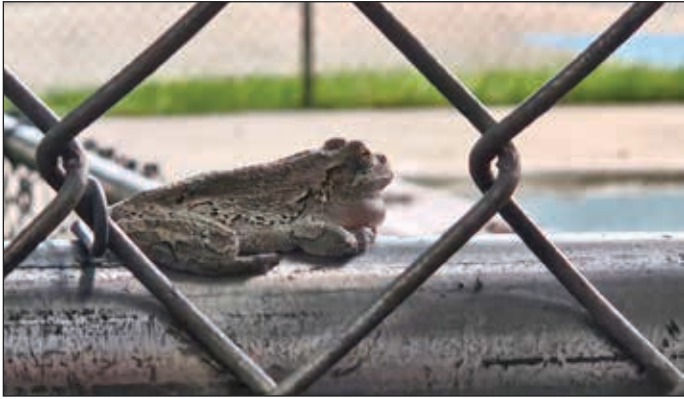

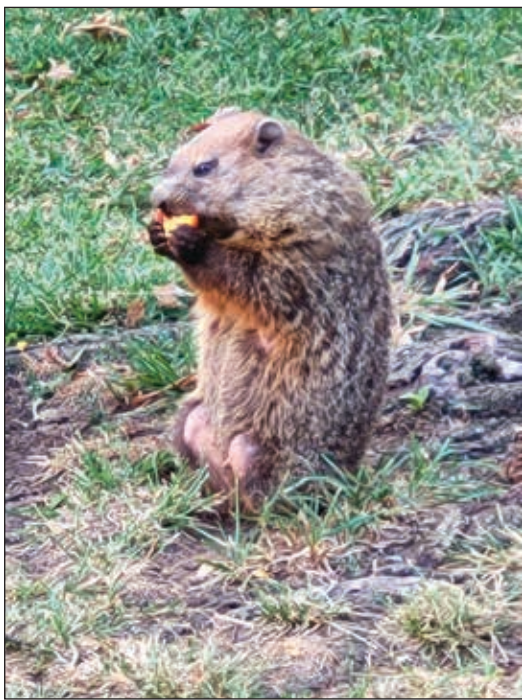

office space, said Salmerón.

With restaurants and new service industries surrounding the headquarters site, Greenbelt residents will have more business and economic opportunities closer to home, he added.

Some community members, like Marion Holland, question the impact of restaurants and other services coming to Greenbelt.

“They need to bring in jobs where people can come in on an entry-level and progress through to a livable wage,” said Holland. “Restaurants and retail isn’t going to do it.”

Recently, the Greenbelt community witnessed a town-favorite restaurant, Chevy’s, close, she added. “Most of these places can’t keep employees as it is because of the fact that they don’t pay a livable wage,” said Holland. For Holland, more restaurants and

service jobs will never last in the Greenbelt community.

However, some community members hope the decision to locate the headquarters in Greenbelt will attract people to the area.

“I think it’s gonna be a whole boost to the area,” said Peck. “I’d like to see as many people that are actually working here, choose to live in Greenbelt.”

The FBI headquarters and mixed-use development center will bring opportunities for restaurant and retail jobs and transform the economy, said Jordan. “It’s an investment in Prince George’s County, and the federal government is committed to doing that,” he added.
