To make an appointment to give a pint of blood in the American Red Cross blood bank program call Mrs. Ralph Neumann, Greenbelt 6416. Transportation to Hyattsville and back will be arranged if necessary.

This is an opportunity for the residents of Greenbelt to participate in a program which is part of the vast national program of the Red Cross for collecting blood to be used in the nation's hospitals wherever needed. It is planned to have the Bloodmobile at Hyattsville every few weeks, on a Thursday in order to meet the continuing needs of the community. Mrs. Neumann may be called for an appointment and will answer calls for information.

Gobbel Leave Pay Okayed By Council In 4-1 Decision

At a special meeting last Friday night, the Greenbelt town council voted, four to one. to pay departing town manager James T. Gobbel for leave accrued during his entire town employment, including the period when he was also employed by the federal government. Of the \$2300 total leave check, \$1400 was for 56 days of leave accrued during the controversial double-duty period. The balance of \$900 represented 36 days accrued since Gobbel became fulltime town manager in June, 1946.

One Votes No Opposing the majority vote was Councilwoman Elizabeth Harrington, who initiated the inquiry into Gobbel's accrued leave with a request for a statement last winter. The statement was presented at the April 19 council meeting. It included a claim for 24 days annual leave per year for the period when Gobbel also received 26 days annual leave per year from the federal government. Mrs. Harrington's refusal to accept a former council's action in retroactive approval of the double leave led to postponement of council decision, pending a legal opinion from John White, town solicitor, who was town solicitor when the action was taken.

White's decision, presented by Gobbel in White's absence at the July 12 council meeting, found the former council's action legal. Final council decision was postponed un-til Friday night, so that complete records could be studied.

Reads Preliminary Decision At the insistence of Mrs. Harrington, Gobbel, at Friday's meeting, read to council for the first time a preliminary decision he had received from White soon after it was requested. Missing from the solicitor's final opinion was "grave concern" he expressed in the preliminary report over two questions: whether Gobbel could be considered a full-time employee while dually employed; and whether Maryland statutes prohibiting municipal employees from receiving leave or salary retroactively applies to Greenbelt town employees.

Although the attorney's opinion made no reference to White's concern over the two questions, he still refused to pass upon the "wisdom" of granting pay for the leave authorized by the former council.

Charles T. McDonald Appointed As The New Town Manager

Charles T. McDonald will be Greenbelt's third town manager. Unanimously accepting Mr. McDonald's application at a special meeting Tuesday night, the town council indicated that his extensive experience in town government and in dealing with Public Housing Administration were the deciding factors in his favor.

Experience Cited

At present the general housing manager of a 1960 unit housing project at Middle River. Maryland, Mr. McDonald was until several months ago Greenbelt's maintenance engineer. His experience also includes two years as community manager and three years as maintenance engineer at Greenhills. Ohio; and a special assignment to assist the community manager at Greendale, Wisconsin, in a study of proposed expansion.

Mayor Thomas Canning, in endorsing Mr. McDonald, said that a total of six out of 27 applicants had been interviewed, and that from those six, final choice had rested between three "top notch" men. The clincher for McDonald, according to Canning, was his association with PHA.

Will Make Good Manager

Councilman Granahan issued a statement to the effect that while one of the other three men had been his preference. he was certain that McDonald would make a "good manager" and "live up to the expectations of the council majority." He added that he would give the new town manager the "fullest

McDonald follows in the foot-steps of Roy S. Braden, who served as town-community manager from 1937 to 1943; and James T. Gobtown-community manager from 1943 to 1946 and town manager from 1946 until last Monday. A resident of Greenbelt, McDonald is 53 years old.

The town council will hold its next regular meeting August 15.

Two Greenbelters Hit By Cars On Monday

Two Greenbelters were struck by cars Monday evening, but both are reported nearly recovtred.

Compounding the mistake in judgment made by their predecessors, the town council last Friday night voted four to one to give the departing town manager a lump sum payment for accrued leave, including 56 days from the period when he was dually employed by the federal and the town governments.

Many questions still remain unanswered. Why did Mr. Gobbel wait until Friday night to acquaint the council members with John White's preliminary decision, made immediately following the council's request for it? Why did the final decision, read at the July 12 council meeting, skip all reference to the "very grave concern" Mr. White felt in his preliminary decision as to whether Mr. Gobbel was actually a full-time employee of the town at the time in question, as to whether he was considered a "municipal employee" in the Maryland state legislative provision that municipal employees cannot receive retroactive pay? Was it because Mr. Gobbel didn't like the sound of it? Why was there a lapse of nearly three months between preliminary and final decision? Why were council members not given a copy of the final decision prior to the July 12 meeting (supposedly the last meeting before Gobbel's resignation took effect)? Was the delay and abrupt presentation planned, so that council would have no time to consider the decision and act wisely?

Mrs. Harrington was the only member to maintain the position that the action of the Bauer council in granting the leave in the first place was wrong, and should be rescinded. Mr. Granahan, however, expressed thte concern that so many others have expressed, over and over again: that the town solicitor, in direct violation of the Town Charter, was not present to be questioned on his decision. It was with obvious reluctance that Mr. Granahan concurred in the majority action giving Mr. Gobbel the \$1400 in-

The town council has the right to expect the solicitor-who above all others should be familiar with charter provisions—to appear at council meetings, as the charter states he shall. His repeated non-compliance with this provision, with few exceptions over a period of years, gives them ample right to exercise another power vested in council: to fire John White and hire a town solicitor who will do his job.

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
