Small Response To Squad Plea

The Greenbelt volunteer rescue squad has so far netted \$81.50 in its current fund-raising campaign. Only 37 people responded to the squad's pamphlet, distributed to every home in Greenbelt two weeks ago - although self-addressed stamped envelopes were enclosed.

According to Milton Laikin, squad representative, the volunteer group will be forced to discontinue operations unless new equipment is secured in the near future.

Since the rescue squad was formed in the summer of 1948, over 100 Greenbelters have called on the organization for emergency ambulance and first aid service.

St. Hugh's Parish Dedicates Building

"The whole diocese joins in congratulations to you," said Msgr. John J. Spence, in his sermon at ceremonies attending the formal blessing and dedication of St. Hugh's parish hall and school. He remarked that the new building was an addition to a community "addicted to order and simplicity," and that it "symbolizes an instrument of security on the part of a people who are aware of life's lasting values."

Preceding the sermon was the blessing by Archbishop Patrick A. O'Boyle, greetings by Father Victor J. Dowgiallo, pastor of the parish, and a presentation of an American and a Papal flag to the parish by Colonel Charles F. Baish, on behalf of the 4th Degree Knights of Columbus.

The Archbishop commented that St. Hugh's was the first school and hall dedicated since his appointment to the Archdiocese, where the plans had been drawn after his coming here. He extended congratulations to the pastor, the sisters, and people of the parish.

Greenbelt Adds 325 To List of Voters

Greenbelt's registered voter list increased by 325 on the past two Tuesdays, special registration dates. Democrats accounted for nearly 83 per cent with 268; Republicans registered 50, independents, 6, and Progressives, 1.

Approximately 5600 new voters were registered throughout Prince Georges County, with figures unavailable last night on a few precincts.

Vote Next Year

First opportunity for new voters in Maryland to use their elective power will be September, 1950, when the two major parties hold primaries. Senator Millard E. Tydings (D.) will see the end of his six-year term in 1950, and the two-year term of Lansdale G. Sasseer (D.) Representative from the 5th Congressional District, will also expire next year. In order to be considered by one of the political parties for candidacy in the November elections, aspirants must file a petition to that effect before the closing date, which is some weeks before the primary.

Locally, Greenbelters have been promised at least two more special registration days before the primaries. In the meantime, registration is open during office hours at Upper Marlboro.

GHA Members Vote To Adjust Charges

Members of the Greenbelt Health Association voted at a meeting Tuesday night to adjust association fees to improve its financial situation. Monthly dues for children were changed from 50 cents each to 75 cents, and the maximum dues for a family from \$4.50 to \$6.

First office call in any 7-day period will cost \$1, and the first home call in a 7-day period will now cost \$2, instead of \$1; however, no charge will be made for routine office checkups in obstetrical cases, or for office calls to receive injections.

Prepayment Voted

To assure GHA sufficient operating cash immediately, each member family will be asked for a \$10 prepayment of dues, which will be credited to the family's account at the rate of \$1 per month, starting January 1.

Robert Morrow, GHA president, stated at the meeting that members now owe the association about \$1600 in extra charges from the last 90-day period, and that if this were collected promptly the association would be in a better position to handle its current expenses.

Meet Again

Members present decided that another meeting should be held in three months to review the financial status of the association. Meanwhile, the board of directors will continue efforts to obtain a second full-time physician.

Co-op News Flashes

According to Co-op News Flashes, published by the Potomac Co-operative Federation, "Greenbelt Consumer Services, Inc., opens its junior department store this week and will have a number of attractive specials in the store Thursday, Friday, and Saturday. The ultramodern supermarket celebrates its first anniversary simultaneously and will have a large list of food specials running for an entire week beginning Thursday . . ."

Council Authorizes New City Solicitor; Eisner No Longer Public Health Doctor

Permission to dismiss John S. White as city solicitor was granted City Manager Charles T. McDonald by the council Monday night.

Also, it was learned that Dr. William Eisner ceased to be public health officer for Greenbelt in September. Public announcement of this was drawn from the city manager by a question from *The Cooperator* reporter present at the meeting.

To Employ Powers

The manager was authorized to employ Ralph W. Powers in place of White, who was city solicitor from August 1943 to July 1, 1947 and from March 16, 1948 to the present. His salary since the March 1948 date was \$1,000 per year. Powers, employed as Greenbelt's city solicitor in September 1941, joined the armed forces in January 1942 but continued to be available for the city's legal work. When the town councillor (a post since discontinued) also began military service, White was employed. Although Powers was on military leave from Greenbelt, he did not ask for reinstatement upon his return. He is a Hyattsville attorney, and president of the Prince Georges County Bar Association.

Dr. Eisner has been public health officer since January 1944 at a yearly salary of \$1,300 until September 1949, when it was cut to \$1,200. McDonald is acting health officer at present without receiving the remuneration of that position.

(Note—According to the present public health ordinance, the duties of the Public Health Officer include the supervision of the clinic, inspection of sewage and garbage disposal, and inspection of sanitary conditions in the barber and beauty shops, as well as in the food stores and places where food is served. At present, City Manager Charles T. McDonald, at no increase in salary, has taken over these duties, in cooperation with the County Board of Health. Dr. Hans Wodak has been taking charge of the clinic on Tuesday mornings.)

Mr. McDonald said that in the near future he plans to present to the Council his recommendations for changes in the stated duties of the public health officer.)

Invited to GVHC

An invitation to meet tonight with the board of Greenbelt Veterans Housing Corporation was accepted by the council. The subject of the meeting was not made public.

The youth center advisory board advised the council by letter that the Drop-Inn has run out of funds, with two more months to go. Maintenance of the teen-age center is supported by a city budget figure of \$1,000 per year. According to the lease with Public Housing Administration, no larger figure may be spent by the city for the Drop-Inn. McDonald said it was impossible to keep the building in operation for \$1,000, and the council agreed that he should include a higher figure in next year's budget with full explanation.

The resignation of John R. Teel from the advisory board was accepted with regret.

City Does PHA Job

A gravel walk along Crescent Road to St. Hugh's school will be laid by the city in the near future, and other safety measures are underway for other school areas, McDonald said. A letter from Adelbert C. Long was read at the meeting. It suggested action by the city in the matter of the Catholic school. Laying of sidewalks is the responsibility of PHA, but the council agreed that inasmuch as PHA has no funds for the purpose, city labor and materials should be used as temporary measures insofar as possible.

The council authorized, along with other purchases, an audiometer for the public health clinic, a table and

Council Studies Utility Proposal

A 24-page report was presented to the Greenbelt City Council Monday night on the possibility of the city of Greenbelt purchasing the public utilities at the time of the sale of Greenbelt. The study was prepared by Edmund Mester, a student professor in the government research department of Maryland University, and City Manager Charles T. McDonald. The property involved in the purchase would include the sewage disposal plant and pipes, the water-tower and water-distribution plant, and the electric sub-station and power lines.

The study included data on other Maryland municipalities which own and operate their utilities at a profit, and the approximate cost of operating the utilities in Greenbelt. It also includes an appraisal of the value of the property, based on expected income.

The survey discussed the costs of manufacturing electricity as compared to buying electricity; and the cost of digging wells as compared to purchasing water. The report included information on the administration of utilities, and the bases for setting up rate schedules.

Council members plan to study this report, and discuss it at the next meeting.

Md. U. Orchestra Free Concert Nov. 17

The first fall concert of the University of Maryland Symphony Orchestra will be given next Thursday, November 17, at 8 p. m. in the Central auditorium on the University campus. Admission is free.

Featured composition will be Beethoven's First Symphony. Selections by Mozart include *Così fan Tutte* Overture, *Serenade* from *Eine Kleine Nachtmusik*, *Theme* from the *Piano Sonata in A*, *Minuet* from *Don Juan*, and *Allegro* from *Symphony Number Twelve*. Rameau's *Tambourine* and *Waldteufel's Tres Jolie* will complete the program.

Professor Frank Sykora, concert artist and teacher, is conductor, and Joseph Powers the assistant conductor. Students, faculty members, and other University personnel comprise the membership, which also includes local members of the Prince Georges symphony orchestra.

Squad Asks Help

Several weeks ago the Greenbelt Rescue Squad, a volunteer organization which provides free ambulance and first aid service to the people of Greenbelt, distributed some pamphlets telling of their activities and needs. They appealed to the people for money to carry on the work which they are doing.

However, only a few kind and thoughtful people troubled themselves to send to the Squad some money in the return address envelopes which were provided with the pamphlets.

On the other hand the members, themselves, respond to ambulance calls day or night, whether convenient or not. All they know, is that someone, somewhere, needs them.

Now the Rescue Squad needs you; you whom they have helped so much, and you whom they may help tomorrow. The Rescue Squad will cease to be, unless you are willing to help. They are employing an old 1937 Buick, an ambulance, with no rescuator, inadequate first aid supplies, and scarcely enough money to buy the various incidentals necessary to operate the ambulance. All they have is a small group of young men, with first aid experience, enriched by completing an advanced course in first aid from the American Red Cross.

The members of the Squad want to help you. They cannot do this unless you first help them.

If you want Greenbelt to have an ambulance service, to safeguard you and your children, then now is the time for you to act. This is your organization and its fate is up to you.
